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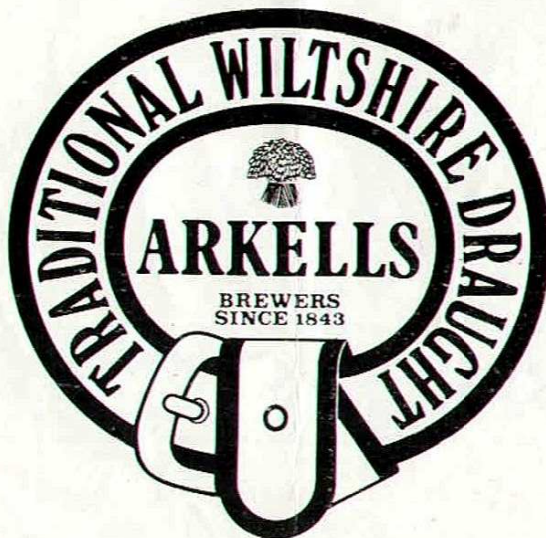

Bits and Pieces

Cardiff City was formed in 1899 and went under the name of Riverside until 1910. In that year the turned professional and set up headquarters at Ninian Park.

The club was soon elected to the Southern League and despite finishing in only fourth place in 1919-20, City then gained admission to the Second Division of the Football League. The top three clubs, Portsmouth, Watford and Crystal Palace, all joined Swindon Town in the new Third Division.

Promotion to the First Division for Cardiff came at the first attempt, the divisional championship only being lost on goal-average to Birmingham City. In 1924 goal-average again decided a championship - this time of the First Division. Cardiff lost out to Huddersfield Town by 0.024. of a goal. A missed penalty in the last game of the season cost City the title.

1925 saw Cardiff reach the F.A. Cup Final but loose to Sheffield United 1 - 0. But City made amends two years later, defeating Arsenal by the same score to become the only club to take the F.A. Cup out of England.

After the Cup win, there was a rapid decline in the fortunes of Cardiff City. In two years the club had lost its First Division status and in a further two, suffered relegation to the Third Division. By 1934 City sat at the bottom of the League and remained in the Third South until the first season after the war.

Cardiff returned to the First Division for seven seasons between 1952 and 1962.

As winners of the Welsh Cup,, the club first entered European competition in September 1964, opponents being Esbjerg of Denmark. Cardiff progressed to the Semi-Final stage in 1967/8 by defeating Shamrock Rovers, NAC Breda and Moscow Torpedo, before going out to SV Hamburg by the odd goal.

Three players have joined Swindon from Cardiff - Don Emery in 1937, Harry May in 1950 and Alan Gibbs in 1956.

The Physiotherapist

The work of a Physiotherapist at a Football Club is interesting and varied. We are very fortunate at Swindon Town to have one of the best medical rooms in the 3rd Division and in my opinion in the Football League. The Department consists of Short Wave Diathermy, Micro-Wave Diathermy, Ultra-Sonics, Wax Baths & Faradism on the Electro Therapy side. We also have a Static Cycle Rowing Machine, and Rota Gym on the remedial side of the department. The department is run under the supervision of the club Medical Officer, Dr. John Nicholas, who is in attendance at every game. Therefore, if a player has to come off the field for treatment and cannot resume playing he will be receiving treatment within minutes of leaving the field, which is very important.

The most common type of injury treated in the treatment room is the soft tissue type of injury and sprains which constitutes a sprain. This is a partial or complete tear or a stretching of one or more ligaments about a joint, caused by a sudden twisting or wrenching of the bones which make up that joint. In contradiction to strains are the type of injury produced by external violence in tissue, these are termed contusions. The most convenient way of classifying contusions is.

1. Superficial
2. Muscle
3. Joint

The four stages of repair take place in sprains as in contusions.

1. Hemorrhage
2. Hematoma formation
3. Hematoma absorption
4. Repair by fibrous tissue

How is this brought about? One should focus the immediate treatment to the control of the hemorrhage to limit the size of the Hematoma, and extravasation of fluid into the tissue.

The larger the extravasation the longer the period of absorption, particularly in footballers where you have a short period of time to get them fit for the next game.

The later treatments begin 24 or 48 hours later when a thorough appraisal of the sprain or contusion can be made as regards to the amount of hemorrhage and the size of the hematoma.

To stimulate hematoma absorption and tissue repair, the full power of lymphatic absorption must be brought into play. This can be done by gentle massage and infra-red short wave diathermy etc. When players are injured at the County Ground they are examined by the Club Medical Officer as soon as possible and if X-Rays are required these are done at the Princess Margaret Hospital. I, on a personal note, cannot speak too highly of them. The X-Ray Department, Plaster Room Consultant Staff, Accident Department etc, are more than helpful and the relationship with the Club makes my job much easier and trouble free. Often the X-Rays have been read and proved positive or negative and a plan of treatment is planned out by the Medical Officer and myself. This may consist of electro therapy and remedial exercise. After treatments the type of treatment given is logged down in the players medical file. The Club Medical Officer calls in about three times each week from Monday to Friday to examine injured players and to make notes of their progress and recovery period. When he or I are confident that the player can play 90 minutes competitive football he can then resume full time training.

Much more could have been written in this article on the anatomy that takes place in the department, but I do not think it would have been of interest.

MANAGER - JIMMY ANDREWS:

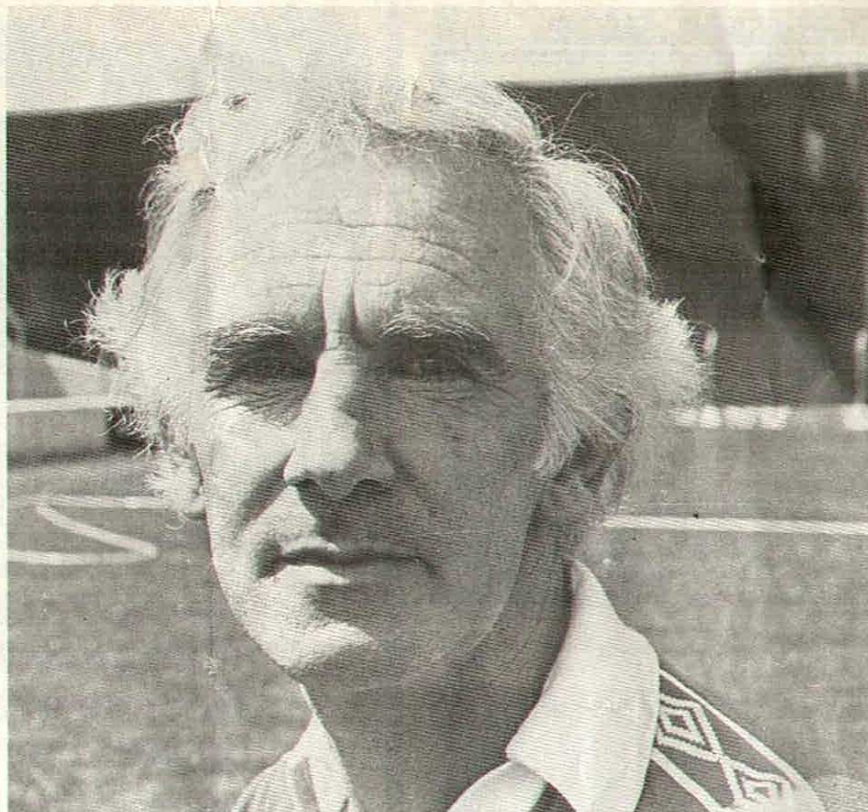
A quiet but positive Scot who made his name in football as one of the game's finest coaches. After achieving a playing reputation as an entertaining winger with West Ham, this Highlander with a shrewd appreciation of the skills in football, worked with a succession of clubs. Queen's Park Rangers, Chelsea, Luton, Coventry City and Tottenham were among the clubs who sought his advice and coaching techniques before he moved from White Hart Lane to Ninian Park - again as coach.

It was former Manchester United Manager Frank O'Farrell who brought Andrews to Wales and their first priority was to beat off a grave relegation threat to the Third Division. This they achieved with a draw against Crystal Palace in the last match of the season.

Immediately afterwards O'Farrell left to direct football in Iran and Andrews, offered the choice of going with O'Farrell or stepping into football management at last, finally decided to take charge at Cardiff. His first season ended, virtually inevitably, in relegation - but Andrews was now in the midst of rebuilding.

Cardiff, playing brilliant attacking football and with a new board of Directors, shot straight back into the Second Division with a harvest of goals from new signings Tony Evans and Adrian Alston (now playing in midfield directed by the experience of Doug Livermore and Alan Campbell).

Last Season brought a return to Cardiff's struggle to stay in the Second Division but Andrews, by signing players such as Paul Went and Robin Friday and with Peter Sayer becoming one of the most talked-about footballers in Britain, finally achieved survival in the last match of the season, as they drew with Carlisle - and sent their rivals into the Third Division on goal average.

BILL IRWIN (Goalkeeper)

Born Newtonards, Northern Ireland. 6' 2" 13st 9 lbs. Constantly fights a keen duel with Healey for the first team place at Ninian Park - came close last season to winning a cap for Northern Ireland, from whom he has been capped already at youth and amateur levels.

PHIL DWYER (Defender)

Born Cardiff. 5' 11" 11st 4lbs. The all-purpose player of his hometown club. Has played at centre-half, defensive wing half, mid-field and striker - but prefers the right-back spot and has captained the Wales Uner-23 from this position. A tough, challenging player and one of the finest tacklers in the Second Division.

BRIAN ATTLEY (Defender)

5' 8" 10st 4lbs. Can play either side as a full-back and firmly established himself in the first team last season. Another of the locally produced players who is making impressive headway. Quick, intelligent defender who can threaten sudden danger from overlap raids.

PAUL WENT (Defender)

Born London 6' 12st 10lbs. One of the most travelled and expensive centre-halves in British football. His moves - Orient, Charlton, Fulham, Portsmouth and now Cardiff - for whom he signed last season - have totalled over £250,000. Powerful, commanding and a man who can start moves with brilliant long passes.

KEITH PONTIN (Defender)

Born Pontyclun, 6' 1", 11st 7lbs. Made a sensational start last season to a promising first team run - came on as substitute for the injured Morgan in a European Cup Winners Cup tie against Servette Geneva and faced Martin Chivers.

ALBERT LAMOUR (Defender)

Born Belfast, 5' 10", 11st 2lbs. Came to Ninian Park in the same deal that brought his countryman, Bill Irwin, across the Irish Sea. Efficient, calm 'sweeper' who has successfully played with a succession of City centre-halves.

STEVE GRAPES (Mid-field)

Born Norwich, 5' 6", 9st 5lbs. Followed Livermore from Carrow Road to Ninian Park almost exactly a year later. Quickly gained a place and his incisive, inventive style has added a new dimension to Cardiff's attacking play.

JOHN BUCHANAN (Mid-field)

Born Dingwall, Scotland. 5' 10", 9st 7 lbs. On of the finest strikers of a ball in the entire Football League. Can hammer in goals with either foot from ranges up to 30 yards. In true Scottish tradition, he attacks with flair and spirit. Signed from Northampton Town where Welsh born manager Dave Bowen discovered him.

DAVID GILES (Mid-field)

Born Cardiff. 5' 5", 10st 4lbs. A Welsh Youth and, last season, Welsh under-21 international. A busy, stylish player who played more first team football last season than in his previous two seasons put together.

ALAN CAMPBELL (Mid-field)

Born Arbroath. 5' 8", 10st 7lbs. One of the most naturally gifted players in the Second Division. This former Scottish Under 23 international who started his career with Charlton and then played a leading role in Birmingham City's promotion to the First Division, has been a vital asset to Cardiff. He arrived in March 1976.

PETER SAYER (Forward)

Born Cardiff, 5' 6", 10st 2lbs. A player who took British Football by storm last season. Opened 1977 by scoring the famous 'Match of the Day' goal that knocked Spurs out of the F.A. Cup - and never looked back. In the next five months, he won two under-21 caps and then four senior caps.

TONY EVANS (Forwards)

Born Liverpool. 5' 8", 11st 7lbs. Another of Cardiff's success stories. Signed in July 1975 as a 21-year old free transfer from Blackpool, he surged to fame in Cardiff's promotion season by scoring 29 first team goals. Topped the 20 mark again last season and scored in every competition.

David Cunningham, the left-winger who joined us from Southend this summer, began his first-class career with Brechin City in the Scottish League. Kirkcaldy-born David earned his place in the Brechin side during the 1971/72 season and it was at the end of the following campaign that he decided to try his luck in English football with Southend United.

Like most Scots, he needed time to acclimatise to the different pace and style of English football and it was over a year before he earned a regular place in the Shrimpers' League eleven.

Last season he helped Hartlepool over a difficult period by joining them on a successful loan spell.

Below we analyse David's first class career to date, showing the F.A.Cup record against each opponent in the Football League, the F.A. Cup and the League Cup. His goals are shown in brackets whilst "s" denotes he played as substitute.

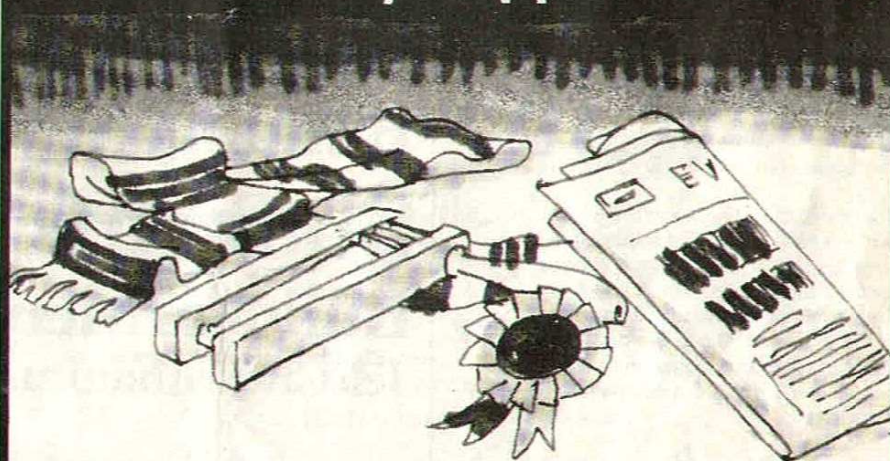
The economic situation within the Football League is desperate enough

Spotlight on League Cup

Holders Aston Villa shouldn't have too much difficulty in overcoming their first hurdle as they seek to add to their record of three League Cup successes. Though they travel all the way down to Devon to face Exeter City the home club has rarely caused any big sensations in Cup-ties in the past and they certainly don't look good enough to start a new reputation against Villa.

The second round draw has set up some exciting looking ties. European Champions Liverpool are at home to newly-promoted Chelsea and should progress to the next stage. The strange thing is that, though Liverpool have won just about everything else they have played for over the past decade, the Reds have never made a serious challenge in the League Cup.

Liverpool are one of the only four of this season's First Division clubs never to have reached the semi-final. Coventry, Ipswich and Notts Forest are the others.

Manchester United the F.A. Cup holders, have never appeared in a League Cup final though they have on three occasions reached the semi-final. They have a difficult tie at Arsenal - and that means a nostalgic return to Highbury for United manager Dave Sexton.

Mr. Sexton had accepted the job as Arsenal coach - an appointment he previously held - during the summer but changed his mind when offered the Old Trafford post.

Derby, who appear to have a cosy home game against Orient, will not have forgotten the almighty scare they had against this Second Division side in the F.A. Cup three years ago. On that occasion the Rams visited Orient - and were 0 - 2 down in a quarter of an hour.

Derby had to rely upon the rarity of two goals from Colin Todd to earn them a replay - they were Todd's only goals of the whole season! Derby won the replay, but only by 2 - 1.

Rochdale, the only Fourth Division club ever to reach the League Cup Final, expect their best attendances for very many years when Leeds United go to Spotland. Rochdale got to the final in 1962 in the days when it was played on a home-and-away basis. They lost 0 - 4 on aggregate to Norwich.

Wimbledon didn't appear as inhibited as some of the other newly-elected clubs have been in the League Cup. The Dons beat Gillingham 4 - 2 on

aggregate in their first-ever League Cup tie to qualify for a real plum tie at Tottenham.

Hereford United, who gained their League place in 1972 as a direct result of knocking us out of the F.A. Cup drawing with West Ham, didn't do nearly as well in the League Cup. Since becoming a Football League club, they have never beaten a club of a higher Division in the League Cup. Their best feat was in reaching the third round in 1974/75. They were beaten in the first round this season by Bournemouth.

Bournemouth will have only 13 players from which to choose their team for their tie at Queen's Park Rangers - - - and two of them are goalkeepers and another is the manager! Bournemouth have only 15 professionals. Micky Cave is still in the U.S. and new striker Terry Shanahan, the former Chesterfield player broke his jaw on the opening day of the season. Manager John Benson has had to abandon his retirement plans to play in the middle of the defence.

Manchester City who have appeared in two of the last four League Cup finals at Wembley, and have a total of three final appearances to their credit, visit Third Division Chesterfield this week, apart from Aston Villa, City have the most distinguished of all recent records in this competition.

City beat West Bromwich 2 - 1 in the 1970 final, they lost to Wolves in 1974 but then returned to triumph over Newcastle 2 - 1 two years later.
