MANAGER'S VIFWPOINT

It is rather an unusual experience for the Club to be playing a home match on a Friday evening; this was something that was not our choice. The Football League in their wisdom felt that as both Southampton and Brighton are at home on Saturday it would be a good thing from the gate point of view if we play on the Friday.

I personally feel that the effect that even though the other two Southern Clubs are at home it will have no effect on our gate at all, but having said that it will be interesting to see what kind of support we get on a Friday evening. The main problem is of course that it may deter the people who have to travel a fair distance and also our fans from the Isle of Wight, but on the other hand it does mean that some of our supporters who play on a Saturday afternoon are given the

opportunity of watching a game. Generally, clubs that play on a Friday

evening are those of the lower Division teams which are surrounded by First Division teams and one of those are Tranmere Rovers, who are obviously competing with either Everton and Liverpool, but I am quite sure that football supporters as a whole have been brought up on a tradition of Saturday afternoon football and it will be terribly difficult to get them to change their way of life.

After the disappointing final result against Peterborough, when incidently I thought we played our best football of the season in the first half, it is really important that we win this evening's game. Let us hope that the players can give a consistent performance for 90 minutes and not as so often has happened in the past, play brilliantly for 45 minutes and then deteriorate for the rest of the game.

SWINDON TOWN

STEVE AIZLEWOOD (Centre Half). Began his League career at the age of 16 with Newport County Football Club, his home town Club for whom he made 191 League appearances before his transfer to Swindon in March 1976. He won four Welsh under-23 caps with Newport and had made 43 League appearances for Swindon to the end of last season.

JIMMY ALLEN (Goalkeeper). Born in Inverness he was signed from Brora Rangers in October 1970 as an apprentice. Signed on full forms in July 1971, he made his League debut two months later, but had only occasional spells as first choice until last season by the end of which, he had made a total of 114 League appearances.

TREVOR ANDERSON (Forward). Comes from Belfast and started his career with Portadown before transferring to Manchester United for whom he made 13 League appearances. Joined Swindon in November 1974 and has played a number of times for Northern Ireland being a regular cap last season. Very much a player of pace and skill on the ball he had made 101 League appearances for Swindon to the end of last season.

DAVID CUNNINGHAM (Midfield or Forward). A Scot from Kirkcaldy his first Club was Breehin City for whom he made 44 League appearances before moving to Southend in 1973. He made 56 League appearances for Southend and spent a period on loan to Hartlepool before signing for Swindon on a free transfer in the 1977 close season.

COLIN PROPHETT (Defender). Comes from Crewe where he played as an amateur for Alexandra, but made his professional debut and a total of 113 League appearances for Sheffield Wednesday before moving to Norwich City in 1973. He played 34 First Division games there before his transfer to Swindon in September 1974, since then his League appearances total 112 to the end of last season. Usually plays as sweeper from which position he captained the team during 1976/1977.

KENNY STROUD (Midfield). Although London born he served his apprenticeship at Swindon becoming a professional in 1970, but had to wait several seasons to gain a regular first team place.

Has played as a central defender but is usually found in midfield from where he scored a spectacular goal against Everton last season which was captured by TV cameras. Had made 120 League appearances to the end of last season.

JOHN TROLLOPE (Full-Back). The Club's longest serving player he is a former apprentice and signed professional in August 1960. Also holds the club appearance record with 698 League appearances to the end of last season and around 800 in all competitions. Now the only playing survivor with the club of the promotion winning sides of 1963 and 1969 the latter of which also beat Arsenal in the League Cup Final at Wembley. Born a few miles from the ground one of the most loyal and hardworking players in the game.

CHRIS KAMARA. Born in Middlesbrough and signed Schoolboy forms for that Club. Joined Portsmouth as an apprentice and signed a full professional contract in December 1975. He made 64 first team appearances for Portsmouth signing for Swindon in August 1977.

CHRIS GUTHRIE (Forward). Born in Newcastle, but only made five appearances for his home town Club before moving to Southend where he made 107 League appearances and in two seasons was leading goalscorer and voted player of the year for that Club. Transferred to Sheffield United during the 1975 close season, but although he made 58 League appearances in his two seasons there he did not settle well and moved to Swindon in July 1977. He also played for England Schoolboys.

RAY Mchale (Midfield). A native of Sheffield he played 123 League games for Chesterfield before moving to Halifax Town in October 1974. In almost two years there he did not miss a match, making 86 League appearances and was leading goalscorer in 1975/1976. Transferred to Swindon in September 1976 he made 41 League appearances to the end of last season and likes to score goals coming from positions in midfield.

JOHN McLAUGHLIN (Midfield or Full-Back). Born in London and served his apprenticeship with Colchester United for whom he made 66 League appearances. He has played for England at Youth level and attracted a £25,000 fee when signing for Swindon in December 1973. A regular member of the team since then he was originally a full-back and spent most of last season in that position, but has also spent some quite lengthy periods in midfield. Made 136 League appearances to the end of last season.

DAVID MOSS (Forward). Signed from non-league football with Witney, his local team, he made his League debut for Swindon in April 1972 and has since played 172 League games to the end of last season. Last season's leading goalscorer and player of the year he is an orthodox winger and although usually played on the left can play on either side.





JIMMY GREAVES

Jimmy Greaves was born in London, and played his early

football for Dagenham Schools, winning Schoolboy

International honours. On leaving school he joined

Chelsea, and was with them from 1957 until 1961 when

he joined Milan F.C. In November of 1961 he returned to

England, joining Tottenham Hotspur, making his League

debut on December 16th against Blackpool, celebrating

the occasion with a hat trick. Set a goalscoring record for

Spurs when he scored 37 League goals, thereby passing

the previous total of 36 held jointly by Bobby Smith and

DENIS LAW

This brilliant international footballer had built up an outstanding reputation at the very early age of 28. Born at Aberdeen he joined Huddersfield Town Football Club as an amateur in 1955. His skill and dedication to the game was soon obvious and he was signed as a professional in 1957 and soon graduated through to the first team where he was spotted by the Scottish international selectors and chosen for Scotland at the ripe age of 18.

In 1960 Manchester City persuaded Huddersfield to part with him for a fee of £35,000 — a record at that time. His reputation was, of course, well known on the Continent and it was not surprising when Italian clubs started to nibble.

Eventually Turino Football Club succeeded in enticing him away in July, 1962. Manchester United were successful in getting him to sign for them for the record fee of £115,000. He did, of course, play an outstanding part in Manchester's successful Cup run and it was a fitting reward he scored the first goal at Wembley in a Cup Final that was considered one of the best ever.

Probably the greatest honour accorded him was being chosen for the "Rest of the World" team selected to play England in the Football Association Centenary Match at Wembley. England were successful, but Denis was, in the opinion of many, the most outstanding player.




