### **Bits and Pieces**

LINCOLN CITY F.C. was formed in 1883 and played on the John O' Gaunts ground before moving to Sincil Bank in 1894, two years after becoming founder members of the Second Division.

In its early days the club reached the Third Round Proper of the F.A. Cup before going out to local rivals Grimsby Town 0 - 1 at Clee Park in the 1884-5 season.

The 1901-2 season saw Lincoln finish in fifth position in the Second Division, which remains to this day the club's best League performance.

After claiming the wooden spoon in 1908, City were kicked out of the League but voted back within twelve months. The same fate befell the club in 1911 but again re-admission came within a year. A third re-election failure in 1920 saw Lincoln out in the cold once more, before returning to form the new Third Division North for the 1921-22 season.

City came within one place of reclaiming a Second Division berth in 1928 when only Bradford Park Avenue finished with a greater number of points - albeit eight more. 1931 saw Lincoln again finish second, this time only one point behind champions Chesterfield.

The championship win arrived just a year later, with City scoring 106 goals - Allan Hall netting 42, a club record. Nine of the Imps' haul came in one game against Halifax Town, when Frank Keetley scored six times in a 21 minute spell. Lincoln conceded 47 goals of which eight came at Crewe.

City enjoyed only a brief return to the Second, being eight points adrift of the twentieth placed club, Manchester United, at the close of the 1933-34 campaign.

Lincoln made a spirited attempt to regain Second Division status before the War, twice in a bid to overhaul promoted Stockport County. But the intervention of the War delayed City's efforts to climb out of the Third until 1948 - and then the club slipped back immediately, along with Nottingham Forest.

When the Imps won the Third North championship again in 1952 the club remained 'upstairs' for nine seasons. In winning that League, Lincoln totalled a mammoth 121 goals, with Andy Graver claiming 36 of them. He notched six in a 11-1 trouncing of Crewe that avenged the defeat nearly twelve years previously.

Andy Graver joined the City four times, the last as coach to the youth team. But as a player he was always bought by the club for less than he was sold. The man who repeatedly paid for his services was manager Bill Anderson who went to Sincil Bank at the end of the War, stayed for over twenty years and was the League's longest-serving manager prior to joining Forest in 1966.

After suffering relegation in 1961, Lincoln crashed straight through the Third the following year and had ended up in the basement of the Fourth by the spring of 1963. In three successive seasons from 1965 to 1967, City had to ask the League for another chance.

Prior to last season, a Lincoln City side has only appeared at the County

Ground on three occasions. The first was in December 1934, in a Second Round F.A. Cup-tie, when the Town won by the odd goal in seven through two by Alan Fowler and one each from Harry Bowl and Gordon Gunson. On the last day of

September 1961, City returned in a League encounter, Swindon again recording four goals, this time without reply. The successful marksmen were Cliff Jackson, Ernie Hunt (2) and the late Ralph Hunt. A Third Round F.A. Cup clash here in January 1975 saw Peter Eastoe and Dave Moss give the Town a comfortable 2-0 victory.

A rivival in the fortunes of Lincoln City first came in 1972 when the club hoisted itself to within one point of promoted neighbours Scunthorpe United. In 1975, the margin was closer, City losing out to Chester's better goal average. Ironically, had the goal difference of today been in force Lincoln would have gained promotion.

But there was no stopping the powerful City side during 1975/76, when after losing the opening fixture at Newport, only three further defeats were suffered all season. A League record 74 points were accummulated and Lincoln reached the Fourth Round of the F.A. Cup for only the third time in the long history of the club. In the three major domestic competitions, City hammered in 127 goals, John Ward recording 29, Percy Freeman 25 and skipper Sam Ellis 15 (which included ten penalties). In a 6 - 0 home victory over Southport scorers included two players on loan from Nottingham Forest - one being the coloured striker Bert Bowery and the other a certain Tony Woodcock!



PETER GROTIER (Goalkeeper) Though Lincoln paid a club record £20,000 for Peter in 1974 they didn't pay themselves. Supporters clubbed together to raise the cash! Peter grew up with West Ham United He spent a loan period with Cardiff in 1973/74. League record: West Ham 50 aps:

TERRY COOPER (Defender)

Ferry opened his career with Newport County, moving to Notts. County in 1970. He first joined Lincoln in 1971/72 on loan but then returned again to Meadow Lane.

League record: Newport 64(4) aps., 1 gl; Notts. Co. 3(6) aps; Lincoln 219(1) aps., 10 gls.

BRENDAN GUEST (Defender) Brendan, who served his apprent iceship with Lincoln, turned prof-essional in December 1976 and he made his League debut against Grimsby at Christmas that year. By the end of the season he was holding a fairly regular place.

League record: Lincoln 28(1)

PHIL NEALE (Defender)

Phil is one of the now rare band of cricketer-footballers. He turns out for Worcestershire during the summer and he celebrated his last birthday by scoring a century. He made his first League appearances for Lincoln three seasons ago.

League record: Lincoln 96(4) aps., 7 gls.

CLIVE WIGGINTON (Defender) Clive is one of the newest acquisitions to Lincoln's playing staff, having been signed from Scun-thorpe earlier this season. He spent several years as a Grimsby player until signing for Scunthorpe in 1975.

League record: Grimsby 163(8) aps., 6 gls; Scunthorpe 88 aps., 7 gls; Lincoln 26 aps.

**DENNIS LEIGH (Defender)** 

Dennis's first club was Doncaster Rovers but he made the short move to Rotherham in 1968 and he spent more than four years as a permanent member of the Millers' first-team.

League record: Doncaster 33(2) aps., 1 gl. Rotherham 154(5) aps., 10 gls; Lincoln 161 (3) aps., 2 qls.

PHIL HUBBARD (Midfield)

Phil returned to his original club last season for £6,000 though Lincoln had sold him to Norwich for £20,000 in 1972. He was a striker in those days and topped the Imps' scoring list in his first two seasons.

PETER GRAHAM (Forward)

Peter is another player with a fine scoring reputation.

But he twice topped Darlington's scoring list before his £12,500 transfer to Lincoln in 1973.

ALAN JONES (Midfield)

### John Ward speaks to Jimmy Allan

Jimmy Allan comes from Balinthorpe, a fishing village on the north east coast of Scotland 40 miles north of Inverness. "That's 650 miles from Swindon", he pointed out. He got used to living away from home before he moved south: when he went on a preapprentice course after school to learn building and engineering trades in Inverness there were no buses or trains to Balinthorpe so he could only go home at weekends. Even then he did not see a lot of home because he was playing football for Brora Rangers a further fifty miles north. While still at school Jimmy was spotted by Northampton and had a fortnight's trial during one school holidays. They turned him down on the grounds that he was too small. In those days he may have been: he was only five feet seven. Now, seven years later, he is six feet. "I seemed to put on an inch each time I went back to Scotland in the summer," he said with a grin.

When he first joined Swindon, signing as an apprentice after a two week trial and turning professional on his seventeenth birthday four months later, he used to go back to Scotland for twelve weeks every summer. He could always find people to take him salmon fishing in the estuaries because being a local boy he knew how and where to set the nets. Now he is married and his wife, Clare, works for Nationwide Building Society in Swindon so they can only go to Scotland for her fortnight's summer holiday. So no more salmon fishing but Jimmy seems to find plenty to occupy his spare

time. In the summer he goes canoeing and although he has never ridden a motor-bike in his life he is a speedway fanatic, an interest shared by Clare even if when it comes to football "she only comes to watch the big games!" Jimmy is currently doing up the house they live in in Scarborough Road on the west side of Swindon. He is also repairing the collapsed deck of his 50 year old model sailing yacht. It is six feet long with a seven foot mast and is clinker-built of mahogany. He plans to sail it in the sailing pool at Fairford.


Jimmy, who comes from a strongly Christian home, is a member of an organisation called "Christians for Sport" which was started in the United States by tennis stars Stan Smith and Roscoe Tanner. They wanted to expand it to include professional footballers in Britain and two years ago Jimmy joined with Alan West of Luton and Don Nardiello of Coventry. He helps by going round schools answering questions with an evangelist. I asked the obvious question, was it not very difficult being a Christian in the apparently unchristian atmosphere of professional football? What about all the swearing, for example? "I've heard swearing ever since I went to college" he replied. "People swear everywhere, not just when they watch football. It's normally because they can't think of anything else to say. It is difficult in that football can be a very selfish game with everyone looking after themselves but I play it because I enjoy it so

much as a game. "I asked whether, since he obviously found some conflict between his Christian ideals and getting on in football, he had thought of becoming a priest and indulging in his love for football by, say, coaching in

a youth club in a depressed area. "Me be a priest? I wouldn't have it in me," was his answer. "If I 'witness' while I am playing football that's enough for me."

When we returned to talking about football I asked why he had decided to become a goalkeeper. Jimmy laughed. "I've often fancied playing outfield but I could never run. That's why I've always been a goalkeeper! "I asked what sort of training he did. "The three goalkeepers will start off training together. We do body work, that's with a medicine ball to strengthen the stomach muscles, then reflex work, sitting on the ground with two balls going from side to side, until it's time for a five-a-side game perhaps." said that I thought that his style had changed over the years: when he started in the first team he seemed to stay on his line relying on his tall centre-backs like Frank Burrows to deal with any high balls.

Nowadays he seemed to go for the crosses much more. "That could well be true," he said. "Maybe I used to be a bit over-awed by crosses. Now that I'm bigger and stronger and more experienced I know what's going to happen. There is one weakness that I'm working on at the moment and that is organising the defence: I haven't got a loud enough shout!"

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### **Spotlight on Division 3**

If Wrexham become the first Third Division side ever to reach the F.A. Cup final, they will have to thank striker Dixie McNeil for making it possible. On Monday night he hit Wrexham's second goal to kill off those gallant little non-Leaguers Blyth Spartans in a fifth round replay. In the first match it was only a last-minute McNeil goal that saved the Welsh club from a sensational defeat.

McNeil has now scored in each of Wrexham's eight F.A. Cup ties this season and has ten goals so far in this competition. The all-time F.A. Cup record was 15 claimed by Tottenham's Alan Brown back in 1900/01 - - - and that must be a good omen for Wrexham.

For Spur's, in 1900/01, were the last club from outside the two top divisions to win the F.A. Cup. Can Wrexham now emulate that feat?

They face a mighty stiff task next Saturday when they meet Arsenal at The Racecourse Ground. Yet Wrexham have already scored three Cup victories over First Division sides this season so they certainly will not be over-awed.

Wrexham signed McNeil from Hereford for £60,000 this season and he has already netted 22 times for them.

The Third Division leaders Gillingham were surprisingly held to a 1-1 home draw by lowly Plymouth Argyle but they still look back on an unbeaten run of 15 League games. Argyle's equaliser was hit by young Gary Megson - - only his second goal in league football. It could prove invaluable in the long run as Plymouth struggle to avoid the drop into Fourth Division football for that would be the first time in their history.

Another of the leaders to slip last weekend was Cambridge United who were held to a 1 - 1 home draw by Preston North End, one of the clubs snapping at their heals. Cambridge, in fact, were quite relieved to get even one point and for that they had to rely upon an Alan Biley penalty with only seven minutes remaining.

Cambridge have smashed two club records this season - - - - they drew their record League attendance of 10,998 for the local derby against Peterborough and a few weeks ago they went into top place in the Third Division table for the first time.

Preston, grateful for the point that continued their climb up the table, are unbeaten in their last five games.

Victory over Rotherham last weekend halted a run of seven successive defeats for Bradford City. The Valley Parade Club had looked like ending that run a week earlier when they led Plymouth 1 - 0 at Home Park when the game was abandoned half-anhour from the end because of snow.

Scorer of that goal was David Mc-Niven, a striker signed from Leeds United and playing his first game for Bradford. McNiven scored again in their 3 - 0 victory over Rotherham and has certainly got away to a fine start with his new club.

The Third Division is providing closer competition than any other division this season, with only 19 points separating the top and bottom clubs last weekend.

Bottom dogs Portsmouth picked up a valuable point from a goalless draw at Sheffield Wednesday but Hereford United suffered another defeat at Oxford (0-3). Now Hereford's dismal run since their last victory is extended to 13 matches.

Port Vale suffered their sixth successive away defeat when they went down 0-3 at Bury, the club formerly managed by Vale boss Bobby Smith. Vale have scored only once, and conceded 15 goals, during their recent bleak away spell.

Chester, who have drawn 15 of their 30 League games, recorded a now familiar all-square match with Tranmere. It was their fifth draw in their last eight games. There was perhaps no surprise that this particular game should end level because visting Tranmere are also running into a draw sequence. This was their fourth draw in six games.

### LINCOLN CITY By Tony Pullein

Lincoln have been recovering from a poor start to the season and now the relegation clouds seem to be clearing away from Sincil Bank. The Imps collected only one point from their opening six League games and a later run of adverse results left them in serious trouble by December.

Sadly, George Keer - who had only taken over from Graham Taylor as manager last summer - was forced to leave and he has been succeeded by former Birmingham boss Willie Bell. Lincoln certainly don't want to face another spell of Fourth Division football. When they were last relegated in 1962 it took them 14 years to get back again.

The Lincoln club was formed in 1883 and became founder members of the Second Division of the Football League in 1892. They were voted out in 1908, after two consecutive applications for re-election, but regained their place a year later.

The Imps were ejected again in 1911, once again to regain admission within a year. They were thrown out of the League for a third time in 1920 but, fortunately for them, the new Third Division (North) was formed in 1921 so, yet again, they were deprived of League soccer for only one season.

For some years the Imps flourished in the lower half of the Northern section table but in 1927/28 they emerged as surprise challengers for promotion. In the end they were well beaten into second place by Bradford. Only the top club was promoted in those days.



Lincoln continued to hover around the top and came second again in 1931, this time finishing only one point behind Chesterfield. A year later they finally won their way back into Division Two, but by the narrowest of margins - they finished level on points with Gateshead but had a superior goal-average.

Within two years they were back in the Third Division where they remained until taking the championship again in 1948. This time they were relegated at the end of their first season but they bounced back again in 1952 for their last spell of Second Division play.

Relegation this time overtook them in 1961. Worse was to follow a year later when they dropped into the Fourth Division for the first time in their history.

It was a depressing experience and it was to take them an exceedingly long time before they were to regain Third Division status.

They looked certain to make it in 1975 when, with most of the other clubs having completed their fixtures Lincoln occupied fourth place with one game to play. They were level with fifth-placed Chester on points, but possessed a marginally superior goal-average.

Lincoln went into their final game at Southport needing one point to make absolutely sure. In the event they lost 2 - 3 - and that narrow reverse was enough to give Chester the edge on decimal points. Lincoln were destined to an extended spell of Fourth Division football.

They made no mistake the following season, though. They lost their opening game but then lost only once in their next 24 League games. They closed with a remarkable unbeaten run of 14 matches which produced 24 points and they finally smashed all previous Football League records by gaining 74 points.

Lincoln have won four away League games to date - at Portsmouth (2-0), Carlisle (3-2), Shrewsbury (1-0), and Peterborough (1-0).

The Imps drew at Rotherham (0-0), Bradford City (2-2), Colchester (1-1) and Chester (2-2).

They were beaten at Bury (0-1), Port Vale (1-2), Oxford (0-1), Wrexham (0-1), Sheffield Wednesday (0-2), Cambridge (0-5) and Walsall (1-3).

Lincoln were also beaten at Preston (2-3) in the first round of the F.A. Cup and at Bolton (0-1) in the second round of the League Cup. In the first round they won 1-1 at Mansfield.
