

Bits and Pieces

Soccer has been played at Deepdale, home of Preston North End, for over a hundred years. Like many of the current names in the Football League, the club started life as an offshoot from a Cricket Club - in 1881.

Preston's first president and teammanager, Major William Sudell, was largely responsible for bringing professionalism as we know it to the game. Not until 1885 did the Football Association come to accept officially the payments being made to players. This came about after a drawn F.A.; Cup tie involving North End and Upton Park, who lodged a complaint with the F.A. As a result of the protest the replay never took place, Preston being expelled from the competition for that season, 1883-84.

In reaching the F.A. Cup Final of 1888, North End defeated Hyde United by a record twenty-six goals to nil, but the referee lost track of the time and it was estimated that the game ran some thirty minutes beyond its scheduled duration.

Later that year Preston became founder members of the original Football League and recorded a feat which is never likely to be approached, let alone equalled, again. The club performed the 'double' of winning both the League Championship and the F.A. Cup, but in so doing remained undefeated throughout the season and failed to concede a goal in lifting the Cup. Just four League points were dropped and only fifteen goals were conceded in 22 matches. The 'goals for' tally registered 74. Aston Villa were the nearest rivals some eleven points behind.

The League title was retained the following season and the runners-up position held for the next three campaigns.

The first appearance of a Preston side in the F.A. Cup Final since 1889 was at Stamford Bridge in 1922, the last to be played before the switch to Wembley Stadium. Huddersfield Town provided the opposition and took the Cup by virtue of a hotly disputed penalty twenty minutes from time. By a strange coincidence the clubs met again in the Final sixteen years later and again a spot kick decided the issue. Just one minute of extra time remained when George Mutch was tripped in the area. He smashed home the kick off the underside of the crossbar. This victory also made up for North End's Wembley failure a year previously when Sunderland, a goal down, fought back to win 3-1.

The 1939 success was coupled with a surge up the First Division table to put the club within sight of a second 'double' win. The championship depended on the last game of the season, a home fixture with Arsenal. A record 42,684 crowd packed Deepdale to see the Londoners snatch the title with a 3-1 victory.

In 1953 Arsenal again pipped North End to the First Division championship, but only on goal average. Twelve months later the club was back at Wembley where, despite the efforts of Tommy Docherty, Eddie Quigley, Charlie Wayman and Tom Finney, West Bromwich Albion took the trophy by the odd goal in five. Docherty had taken over from Bill Shankly in 1949 and it is rumoured that when Shankly handed his shirt to young Tommy he said "You don't have to do anything with that - it runs round by itself".

Tom Finney played for fourteen seasons at Deepdale and gained 76 England caps.

One more trip to Wembley came in 1964 when, as a Second Division club,

Preston faced West Ham United. But again there was no joy for the 'Lily-whites' as the scoreline was a repeat of that ten years before - 2-3.

In 1970, Preston found itself in the Third Division for the first time ever. Although taking the championship at the first attempt, the club suffered relegation again in 1974, along with Swindon and Crystal Palace.

Frank Becton, a forward who had played for the Football League representative side, spent two short spells with the Town around the turn of the century. He came to Swindon from Preston originally but returned to his native county to sign for Nelson before again linking up with the Town who, incidentally, went under the nick name of the 'Shunters' at the time.

The former Swindon and Preston forward Ray Treacy is now with Shamrock Rovers assisting Republic of Ireland manager Johnny Giles.



ROY TUNKS (Goalkeeper)

Roy, who commenced his career with Rotherham, joined Preston for £15,000 in 1974. In 1968/69 he spent a loan period with York City and in later years also played for Ipswich and Newcastle

League record: Rotherham 138 aps.; York (loan 4 aps; Ipswich (loan nil aps; Newcastle (loan) nil aps; Preston 138 aps.

GRAHAM CROSS (Defender)

A former England youth and under-23 international, Graham enjoyed his finest years with Leicester, playing in four cup finals for them.

League record: Leicester 496(3) aps., 29 gls; Chesterfield (loan) 12 aps; Brighton 46 aps., 3 gls; Preston 25 aps., 1 gl.

JOHN McMAHON (Defender)

John has been a Preston firstteamer for several years, He began as a forward and actually played his first League games for Southend when he was on loan to them in 1970/71. He later won his place in the Preston side and eventually moved to full-back

League record: Southend (loan) 4 aps; Preston 233(1) aps., 6 gls.

DAN CAMERON (Defender)

Dan is enjoying regular firstteam football at Deepdale left for a loan spell at Colchester two seasons ago and he joined Preston in 1976

League record: Sheff, Wed, 31 aps 1 gl; Colchester (loan) 5 aps; Preston 38(2) aps.

MIKE BAXTER (Defender)

Mike made his League debut in 1975 and was carefully groomed to take over from former England star David Sadler He had been a fairly regular member of the squad for two seasons and is 'now very much a number one choice for the number five shirt.

League record: Preston 78(1) aps. 5 als.

FRANCIS BURNS (Midfield)

Southampton paid £50,000 for him in 1972 but he didn't settle in the South and left after only one season to sign for Preston at £40,000

League record: Manchester Un. 111(8) aps., 6 gls; Southampton 20(1) aps; Preston 178(2) aps., 9 gls.

GORDON COLEMAN (Midfield)

Gordon made his way through the junior teams to earn his big break in the League football in 1973/74. He earned himself a regular place for the first time last season, when he hit three goals. He has recently been playing at right-back.

League record: Preston 105(12) aps., 10 gls.

MIKE ELWISS (Forward)

Mike topped Doncaster's scoring list in his first two seasons in League football in the early 'seventies and in 1975 commanded a £70,000 fee when he joined Preston.

League record: Doncaster 106(1) aps., 30 gls; Preston 175(1) aps., 55 gls.

SEAN HASELGRAVE (Midfield)

Sean starred in the First Division with Stoke City for several years, following his debut in 1970/71 and was transferred to Nottingham Forest for £40,000 in 1976.

Preston signed him this season.

League record: Stoke 106(7) aps., 5 gls; Nottm. For. 5(2) aps., 1 gl; 4 Preston 22 aps.

ALEX BRUCE (Forward)

Alex is once again Preston's top scorer with 23 goals to his credit before the weekend. Last term he topped their list with 26. Alex began with Preston but left for Newcastle in a £150,000 deal in 1974.

League record: Preston 55(7) aps. 22 gls; Newcastle 16(4) aps., 3 gls. Preston 113(2) aps., 60 gls.

STEVE DOYLE (Midfield/Defend

er) Though normally a midfield player, Steve can also play in the back four. A product of the club's nursery set-up, Steve came through for his League debut in 1974/75.

League record: Preston 77(6) aps., 2 gls.

RICKY THOMSON (Forward)

Ricky has been challenging strongly with John Smith for the centreforward spot and at the moment is in possession. He came through the juniors to take his place in the League side in 1974/75.

League record: Preston 27(6) aps. 9 gls.

John Ward talks to Colin Prophett

When Colin Prophett left school he became an apprentice with Rolls Royce Car Division in his home town of Crewe. He played for Crewe Alexandra as an amateur and caught the attention of Sheffield Wednesday. Their manager Alan Brown insisted that he finished his apprenticeship before he signed as a professional. No sooner had he done so than Alan Brown was off to Sunderland to be replaced by Jack Marshall. There were two more managers during Colin Prophett's time at Sheffield Wednesday, one of them Danny Williams. Once he had made the first team, apart from a few games when he gave way to Peter Swan he held his place, normally at centre-half, until he left. He turned down a move to Carlisle but accepted Ron Saunders offer to go to Norwich in May, 1973. In December the same year however Ron Saunders left Norwich and when John Bond arrived with a strong contingent of players from Bournemouth Colin became unsettled by being expected to play in a variety of positions, full-back, and midfield as well as the more similar centre half and sweeper. He did not need much persuading to link up again with Danny Williams in 1974 at Swindon.

From an earlier talk I had had with Danny Williams it was clear how important he considers the part played by his captain. I asked Colin how he liked the job. "When you are geeing up the others it's a bit difficult to concentrate on your own game. Frank Burrows is always telling me to put my own game first. Off the field all the players have to remember that in a sense they are representing the club but with the captain it's even more so. If a group of players goes to a function it's the captain who has to make a speech and if any of the players says anything against the manager or the club it's the captain's job to put a stop to it." I asked him if he ever became fed up with some of the crowd barracking him at the County Ground, "It doesn't really bother me. At least I know that if they were on at me they are probably leaving the others alone. The way I look at it is this: probably they have a row with the wife to get to the game when she wanted them to take her out shopping and they are taking it out in the players!'



Colin lives with his wife Cathy and three year old daughter Emma in Stratton St. Margaret. Like her mother Emma is already football mad. This is just as well since in addition to playing Colin coaches Hambro Life on Wednesday evenings and watches their games in the Sunday League, not to mention taking a keep fit class on Monday evenings. In the summer he plays cricket two days a week for Swindon BR. He could have a game every day but limits himself to be fair to the family. A medium pace bowler, he has been picked for Wiltshire against Hampshire Second Eleven. He became a professional footballer rather than a cricketer simply because the opportunity for the former was there. Even now he talks of one day becoming a Saturday professional in the North Staffordshire League.

What of the future? Colin has his eye firmly fixed on football management in due course. "I've played under enough to find out a bit about it," he said, with this end in view he is learning all he can from Danny Williams. He has passed the preliminary stage of the F.A. Coaching Badge and is putting theory into practice by coaching Hambro Life. They are doing well in the league and he clearly gets a kick when the change of tactics he suggests in the half-time talk brings results in the second half: "It shows that I can do it with the players," he says. But if anyone has the idea that Colin is preparing to bow out gracefully as a player he should think again. I asked him what he thought of the forthcoming freedom of contract. "It could be great for young players who want to move on. But for me, I want the longest contract I can get!"

SWINDON FOURTH IN CROWDS CHART

Swindon are the fourth best supported side in the Third Division. Surprisingly, struggling clubs like Portsmouth and Sheffield Wednesday come above us and Plymouth, another relegation-haunted side, are only just below us.

The largest Third Division crowd so far was the 16,281 that gathered for the top-of-the-table clash between Wrexham and Gillingham at New Year. The smallest was Tranmere's 2,136 for the visit of Carlisle on the opening day of the season.

Plymouth's meagre attendance of 2,843 for Bradford City's visit in February was Home Park's smallest crowd since the War. The reason was the snow and ice and the match, in fact, had to be abandoned in the second half.

Our best League crowd was 11,054 to see Tranmere Rovers over the New Year holiday.

The rather alarming point about the above chart is that only four clubs show an increase on last season's average --- Cambridge and Exeter, who were both in the Fourth Division last season, plus Gillingham and Tranmere.

It's true that crowds generally show an increase as the promotion race hots up at the end of the season, and that we still have the Easter Holiday games to come. Even so, it seems unlikely that more than about eight clubs will finish with a higher average than last season.

The bad weather of January and February didn't do the crowd figures much good, of course, yet a large percentage of the games scheduled for that period were postponed and will be played later in the season when we can expect better weather.

It seems to be a fact that interest in Third Division football is declining at the moment. The question as to what clubs can do about it remains somewhat vague.

Television has taken its toll, of course. But we cannot do away with television so we must live with it. Such suggestions as reverting to regionalised divisions would certainly save money but there is no guarantee that it would bring an increase in crowds.

In the end it is the quality of the play that draws the fans.

PRESTON NORTH END By Tony Pullein

Preston have a better chance now of promotion now than at any time since losing their Second Division place in 1974. And no one appreciates more than manager Nobby Stiles that his side would be in an even stronger position if it could win more of its away games.

Preston have won only one away game so far (by 1-0 at Chesterfield over Christamas) - an astonishing situation for a club with its eye on higher things On the other hand, they have drawn nine times away, and been beaten only five times, so that levels things up a little

Their other away points were collected at Plymouth (0-0), Colchester (0-0), Wlasall (0-0), Bradford City (1-1), Port Vale (0-0), Lincoln (2-2), Shrewsbury (0-0), Hereford (0-0)and Cambridge (1-1).

They were beaten at Oxford (0-1), Carlisle (1-3), Exeter (0-2), Peterborough (0-1) and Tranmere (0-1).

It can be seen, then, that Preston rely heavily upon their defence when playing away. They have one of the lowest goals-against tallies for away matches in the whole of the Football League.

They are fortunate in having that out standing central defender Graham Cross who has built up an excellent understanding with Mike Baxter in the middle. The full-backs are John Mahon and Dan Cameron and they play in front of the experienced Roy Tunks in goal.

In midfield they have Scottish international Francis Burns with Sean Haselgrave and Grodon Coleman. When Coleman recently switched, in an emergency, to right-back, Stephen Doyle was recalled in midfield.

Up front Preston have those prodigious goalscorers Mike Elwiss and Alex Bruce though, of the 35 goals thay have scored between them before the weekend, only five have been registered on the grounds of their opponents.

Ricky Thomson has now taken over the third forward position from John Smith.

Preston looked a good bet for promotion last season, too, until a disastrous run of defeats at a critical time killed their ambitions. Their slump was the sadder because they are one of the great names in English football. The Third Division is no place for them. Preston, in fact, were the first of football's giants and some of their early feats will probably never be beaten.

They were either Champions or runners-up in each of the first five years of the Football League's existence - Huddersfield and Arsenal established similar sequences later but never beat Preston's achievement - and in 1889 they won the Championship without losing a game and the F.A. Cup without conceding a goal. In such resounding fashion was football's first League-Cup double achieved.

When one thumbs through the record books one expects to find more material gains registered against Preston's name and it's perhaps sad to note that, though they won the championship in the first two years it was run, they have never again reached the top.

And, after that F.A. Cup success of 1889, they only once again (in 1938) took that trophy.

The string of near-misses is impressive, though. Runners-up in Division I in 1891, 1892, 1893, 1906, 1953 (when they also missed the title only on goal-average) and 1958; F.A. Cup fianlists in 1888, 1922, 1937, 1954 and 1964. There was some consolation in winning the Second Division championship in 1904, 1913 and 1951 and in achieving promotion as runnersup in 1915 and 1934.

When Preston went down into Division Three in 1970 they became one of only three ex-champion clubs to suffer that fate.

Preston soon proved that such a misfortune need not necessarily lead to disaster. As their promotion campaign reached its peak, Deepdale was several times packed to near-capacity and their final attendance figures, as they clinched the Third Division championship, were their best for three years.

Yet, three years later they were back in the Third Division again and today they are still striving to claim back their Second Division status.
