

MANAGER'S REPORT

STEVE AIZLEWOOD (defender). Steve started with home town Newport County in 1969 and made 191 appearances for them before joining Swindon in March 1976. Had made 71 League appearances for Swindon to the end of last season and is a former Welsh Under-23 International.

JIMMY ALLAN (goalkeeper). Born in Inverness he was signed from Brora Rangers in October, 1970 as an apprentice and on full forms nine months later. Although he made his debut in September 1971, it was not until 1976/1977 that he became established in the side. Had made 158 League appearances at the end of last season.

PHIL BATES (forward). Known as Chic he comes from West Bromwich but spent seven years as a part-time Southern League player before signing for Shrewsbury in 1974. Made 160 League appearances for Shrewsbury being top scorer for two seasons before signing for Swindon in January, 1978. Made a further eleven appearances for Swindon last season.

ROY CARTER (midfield). Roy who comes from Torpoint, Cornwall, played part-time Western League football with Falmouth before joining Hereford in the summer of 1975. He quickly established himself in the side there and played in the team that won promotion to the second division in 1975/1976. Signed for Swindon in December 1977 having made 64 League appearances for Hereford and had made 18 more for Swindon by the season's end.

DAVID CUNNINGHAM (forward). Dave, from Kircaldy, played 44 games for Brechin City in the Scottish League and moved to Southend in 1973.

After 56 League appearances and a period on loan to Hartlepool he moved to Swindon in the 1977 close season and made 16 League appearances last season. Although short in stature he does not lack determination and can play in midfield or on the wing.

ANDY FORD (defender). Andy comes from Minehead and started his career with Bournemouth although he did not reach their League team. A move to Southend in 1972 led to a place in the club's League side and he made 135 such appearances before moving to Swindon at the start of last season. He made 33 appearances last season mostly at left-back where he has taken over from the long serving John Trollope, but he has also played in midfield as a Central Defender.

GUS GILLIGAN (forward). One of the Clubs younger players he comes from Abingdon and has been a regular scorer with the Youth and Reserve teams. Played twice in the League team last season.

CHRIS GUTHRIE (forward). Chris made only five League appearances for his home town Club, Newcastle, but he became a regular member of the Southend side following his transfer in 1972/1973. After 107 appearances and twice being leading scorer he moved to Sheffield United in the summer of 1975 but never settled and was transferred to Swindon 58 games later in the summer of 1977. Chris made 38 appearances for Swindon last season and plays a traditional centreforward role.

CHRIS KAMARA (midfield). Chris comes from Middlesbrough but made his League debut for Portsmouth in September 1975 as one of a number of young players given a first team chance by that Club due to financial problems. Those problems forced Porstmouth to sell Chris to Swindon just before last season after 56 League games and he has since played 40 more for Swindon. A few of these have been as deputy centre-forward, but he is at his best attacking from midfield.

RUSSELL LEWIS (defender). Russell comes from Blaengwynfi and was signed from Welsh League football in the early part of the 1976/1977 season. A young player who had made six League appearances to the end of last season in central

defensive roles.

RAY McHALE (midfield). Ray comes from Sheffield and made his League debut for Chesterfield in season 1971/1972. After 123 League games he signed for Halifax where he was top scorer in one season although a midfield player. He did not miss a single match before signing for Swindon in September 1976 after 86 games. Ray made 81 League appearances for Swindon to the end of last season and usually plays as the link man in midfield although he likes to get forward and has a hard shot that made him the regular penalty taker last term.

JOHN McLAUGHLIN (defender). John, a Londoner, made his debut for Colchester in season 1971/1972, but after winning England youth honours and 66 League games he moved to Swindon in December 1973. Had made 177 League appearances for Swindon to the end of last season mostley at right back, but he also had

quite a lot of experience in midfield.

COLIN PROPHETT (defender). Colin comes from Crewe and his first professional club was Sheffield Wednesday for whom he made 113 League appearances. In 1973 he moved to Norwich but only stayed until September 1974. He made 34 first division appearances, before his move to Swindon

for whom he had played 154 games at the end of last season. Club Captain for the past two seasons and a fixture at centre-back during that time.

KEVIN ROBERTS (goalkeeper). Kevin is from Bristol and was a part-time player until he signed for Swindon from Welton Rovers in March 1977. Made two first team appearances last season.

KENNY STROUD (midfield). Ken is a Londoner but has been with the Club since he was an apprentice and is now one of the longest serving players at the Club. Although signed as a professional in 1970 and made his League debut in 1971/1972 it was not until 1974/1975 that he gained a regular place in the team. Ken had made 154 League appearances to the end of last season, mostly in midfield but he enjoys playing as a

central defender when the need arises. JOHN TROLLOPE (defender). John Trollope is locally born and has been with the Club since he apprentice making 737 League appearances to the end of last season, nearly all at left-back. Last season he passed the old record for one club domestic appearances in this country, retired from the first team to take up the job of Youth Manager, was voted player of the year by the readers of the local newspaper and was awarded the M.B.E. He reminas in training as cover and could still beat Jimmy Dickinson's League appearance record for a single club player. BRIAN WILLIAMS (midfield). Brian is from Manchester and played 148 games for Bury until present Swindon Manager Bobby Smith sold him to Q.P.R. during the 1977 close season. He made 22 First Division appearances for Q.P.R. last season before signing for Swindon in June, 1978. IAN MILLER (forward). Ian comes from Perth but he first played League football for Bury, making nine full appearances and a number as substitute. He moved to Nottm. Forest but did not make the first team until a further move to Doncaster Rovers in August 1975. He became a regular first team player there before his transfer to Swindon who had been interested in signing him for a number of

months in the 1978 close season.

We play Reading at Elm Park on Good Friday evening and finish the season at home to Barnsley on May 5th.

We look forward to an entertaining and enjoyable season and the loyal support at all our games that we have received in past seasons.

League Cup Chat

Today starts Round One of the Football League Cup and similar to the F.A. Cup, starts with the lower division sides battling with each other for the possibility of meeting a division one or two side in Round Two. For rounding up purposes however, the bottom eight clubs from Division Two start in the first round and this season five of them have been drawn to play clubs from our own division.

MILLWALL visit ALDERSHOT, BRISTOL ROVERS play HEREFORD UNITED, NOTTS COUNTY are at home to SCUNTHORPE, PRESTON NORTH END play HUDDERSFIELD at Deepdale and CAMBRIDGE UNITED are home to NORTHAMPTON, which was a fourth division fixture just three seasons ago.

As usual there are some interesting 'derby' matches. DONCASTER play neighbours SHEFFIELD WED. at Belle Vue, TORQUAY travel further west to Home Park, PLYMOUTH and SOUTHEND entertain WIMBLEDON at 7.45 p.m. this evening.

Promoted clubs from fourth to third, namely WATFORD and BRENTFORD meet at Vicarage Road, SWANSEA travel east along the M4 to Welsh rivals NEWPORT COUNTY and WIGAN ATH. make their

League Cup debut at Prenton Park, Tranmere.

Other regionalised matches include — in the south — BOURNEMOUTH home to EXETER, READING versus GILLINGHAM at Elm Park, and COLCHESTER take on CHARLTON ATH. In the Midlands WALSALL play HALIFAX and 1977 Debenham Cup winners CHESTER meet finalists PORT VALE at Vale Park.

Three Yorkshire clubs are at home, BARNSLEY against CHESTERFIELD, ROTHERHAM versus

HARTLEPOOL and next week's opponents BRADFORD CITY play LINCOLN.

Elsewhere the Stags play the Quakers, MANSFIELD versus DARLINGTON, and the Mariners entertain the Minster Men, GRIMBSY against YORK. Seasiders BLACKPOOL journey north to Cumbria to play CARLISLE, and BURY, missing out on promotion last season, will be out to beat third division champions WREXHAM in North Wales.

And to our own tie with SWINDON. It is certainly overdue, with regard to last season's meetings, for the result to be in our favour and let us hope we win by a clear margin this afternoon to carry us through the

second leg and for another home draw in the Second Round.

GROUND REGULATIONS

- 3 Being in possession of any stick, pole, banner or flag.
- 4 Throwing or discharging missiles.
- 5 Going on to the playing area or adjoining track.
- 6 Climbing on any building, wall or fence.
- 7 Obstructing any gangway, passageway or alleyway.
- 8 Jostling, swaying or otherwise interfering with the comfort of any spectator.
- 9 Singing obscene or indecent songs or using obscene or indecent language.
- 10 Making any offensive or insulting gesture.
- 11 Defacing any notice or advertisement displayed within the Club premises.

The Club reserves the right to refuse admission to any person. The consequences for disobeying these regulations have often been most severe. Individuals have been sent to prison and borstal and club grounds have been closed as a result of serious incidents.
