

NEWS ON THREE

THREE-IN-A-ROW BATES

SWINDON striker Chic Bates hit the only goal of the game to give the Wiltshire side a 1-0 win over visiting Rotherham last Saturday and take his tally for the season to seven. Bates has netted in each of the club's last three games.

With both Swansea and Watford back in winning form, Shrewsbury lost ground at the top when they were held to a 1-1 draw at Plymouth who, under Malcolm Allison, have been showing a marked improvement this season. After lan Atkins had given Shrewsbury a 27th minute lead, Brian Bason equalised in the second half for Argyle.

Watford's latest victims were close neighbours Brentford who fell to goals from Ross Jenkins and Luther Blissett at Vicarage Road. Jenkins is now the Third Division's leading scorer with 15 League and Cup goals and, if Blissett maintains his recent run of five goals in five games, he could well be challenging his club mate soon. Blissett has scored ten times so far.

The local public is certainly rallying round the Vicarage Road club. Last Saturday's attendance was 15,180 and Watford's average home crowd in the League is 13,403 compared with last season's figure of 11,352 when they won the Fourth Division championship.

As Watford celebrate success, the gloom is deepening at Brentford, one of the clubs promoted with Watford. Defeat at Watford left them second from bottom of the table and it's beginning to look as if they will repeat the process of their last promotion. When the Bees last came up in 1972 they returned to Division Four at the end of the following season.

Manager Bill Dogin is continuing his search for players, though he released one of his proposed signings after a two-month trial period last week. Billy Eames, the former Portsmouth player made an explosive start to his Bees' career when he hit a goal after only six minutes in his debut against us.

Mr. Dogin was most impressed at the time and said: "The crowd would lynch me if I let him go."

Sadly, Earnes didn't maintain his form and Dodgin has now lost interest. "I think it is important to assess a player over a period of time, not just on one performance," he said.

Lucky Colchester last week announced they had made a profit for the second year in succession. The latest accounts show a surplus of £28,937 — £20,000 more than the previous year.

Tranmere's Ronnie Moore is hoping history may repeat itself. He hit a hat-trick in the local derby against Chester which Tranmere won 6-2 and that's the first time he's scored as many as three in a match for three seasons. In 1975/76 he scored three fours and a three in a total of 37 goals and over the Christmas holiday he actually scored in successive matches against Stockport and Newport.

Player/manager John Toshack's first League goal of the season was sufficient to give Swansea both points against visiting Exeter City. More good news for Swansea was the inclusion of their midfield star Jeremy Charles in the Wales' squad for the forthcoming European Championship match against Malta.

Jeremy's father Mel Charles won 31 Welsh caps and his uncle John played 38 games for his country but Jeremy, in spite of his scoring record, was beginning to think he'd missed the boat. "You see dad was first capped well before he was 20 and Uncle John was only 17 when he first played for Wales," said Jeremy. "My greatest hope for this season was that I might get into the Welsh under-21 side. But this news is great. Even if I don't get into the final squad it is a great honour to have been considered."

Carlisle United kept well up with the promotion race when drawing 0-0 at Sheffield Wednesday. Carlisle, unbeaten at home, have yet to win away but they've drawn four of their six away games. The loss of a point was another set-back for Wednesday who have managed only one home League victory so far — 3-2 over Southend early in September.

Mansfield Town, drawn to play Burnley in the semi-final of the Anglo-Scottish Cup, have a good chance of becoming the first Third Division side ever to appear in this particular final. Only one club from outside the First Division — Nottingham Forest in 1977 — have actually won this trophy and it has yet to be won by a Scottish club.



SWINDON TOWN

AWAY FORM AGAIN TROUBLES SWINDON

THOUGH Swindon have not managed to win any of their six away League games, and picked up only two points so far, they won 2-1 at West Ham in the League Cup and then earned a replay by drawing away to one of the leading Third Division sides Peterborough in the next round.

It's a problem that must perplex new manager Bobby Smith for, in the League, Swindon were completely outplayed at Walsall where they were beaten 1-4 and they also went down at Plymouth (0-2) and Chester (0-2).

Mr. Smith must have thought their dismal run was over when Swindon took a 2-0 half-time lead at Colchester in their last away game. But they conceded three in the latter period to lose 2-3!

Their two points were collected at Tranmere (1-1) and Shrewsbury (0-0) on their first two trips of the season.

Mr. Smith has been quite busy in the transfer market since taking over in the summer. Three of the players he has signed were with him at Bury. Ian Miller, whom he signed from Doncaster, began his career with Bury but then moved to Nottingham Forest; Brian Williams developed into an outstanding winger under his guidance at Gigg Lane while Andy Rowland had matured into one of the best strikers in the lower divisions after joining Bury from Derby.

The manager also signed goalkeeper Chris Ogden from Oldham and midfield man, or forward, Paul Gilchrist from Portsmouth during the close season.

In the first round of the League Cup Swindon defeated Portsmouth 4-2 on aggregate and they then stunned West Ham with their astonishing 2-1 victory at Upton Park in the next round. A third round 1-1 draw at Peterborough looked promising but they then disappointed in the replay when losing 0-2.

They were without Andy Rowland for this game, however, as he was cup-tied.

Since losing their Second Division status in 1974, Swindon have been striving in vain to get back again. The position looked good after a bright start to last season but then they faded, largely due to a series of failures away from home — the problem that still plagues them today.

Manager Danny Williams retired from full control of the team at the end of last season after his second spell in charge. During his earlier term of office he led Swindon to victory over Arsenal in the 1969 League Cup final as a Third Division side. They also won promotion that same season. Now Mr. Williams is assisting Mr. Smith in the running of the side.

PEN PICTURES

CHRIS OGDEN (Goalkeeper)

Chris joined Swindon from Oldham in a £6,000 transfer this summer. He had been at Boundary Park since his amateur days and

made his League debut for the Latics in 1971/72. Chris made 128 League appearances for the club but lost his place mid-way through last season.

JOHN McLAUGHLIN (Defender)

John completed his apprenticeship with Colchester United and made his first League appearances for that club in 1971/72. Swindon signed him in 1973 and he has been their right-back since then.

STEVE AIZLEWOOD (Defender)

Steve is a former Welsh under-23 international defender who normally plays in the centre of the Swindon defence. But recently, because of colleagues being cup-tied, he had a successful run at centre-forward, scoring two goals. Steve first played League soccer with Newport County in 1968/69 and Swindon signed him for £12.000 in 1976.

KEN STROUD (Defender)

Ken has been with Swindon since his apprentice days, first stepping into their senior team in 1971/72. Now he is fast approaching his 200th game for the club.

RUSSELL LEWIS (Defender)

Russell was recalled to the centre of the defence when Aizlewood was injured recently. He made his League bow in 1976/77 but had played only six League matches prior to this season.

ANDY FORD (Defender)

Andy didn't make the League team with his first club Bournemouth so he joined Southend United in 1973. By 1973/4 he was in their senior side and holding a regular place. Swindon signed him in 1977 and, after a short run in midfield, he settled down in the left-back position.

RAY McHALE (Midfield)

Ray has a reputation for scoring goals, netting 14 times last season and 12 the year before that. He began with Chesterfield and in his second season (1972/73) in their first-team he was leading scorer with 12 goals. Halifax signed him in 1974 and he topped their list with 16 in 1975/76. He joined Swindon two seasons ago.

CHRIS KAMARA (Midfield)

Swindon paid Portsmouth £20,000 for Chris at the beginning of last season after he had spent two seasons in Pompey's first-team. He scored 11 goals last season.

PAUL GILCHRIST (Midfield/Forward)

It's less than three years since Paul won an F.A. Cup winners' medal with Southampton but much has happened to him since then. He was transferred to Portsmouth early the following season (1976/77) and last summer was given a free transfer by Portsmouth. His first club was Charlton and he served Fulham on loan before joining Doncaster in 1971. Southampton secured his signature less than a year later.

ROY CARTER (Midfield)

Hereford saw Roy playing in the Western League for Falmouth Town and signed him in 1975. He made more than 70 League appearances for Hereford and then signed for Swindon last season.

IAN MILLER (Forward)

Swindon paid Doncaster £25,000 plus player Micky French to sign lan in the last close-season. As an 18-year-old he was playing in Scottish junior football for Geanfield Swifts when Bury signed him in 1973. He made a few League appearances for the Shakers before he was signed by Nottingham Forest. But he got no games in their first-team so he moved to Doncaster in 1975 and for three seasons he was a fixture in their senior side.

ANDY ROWLAND (Forward)

Andy joined Swindon from Bury a few weeks ago for £80,000. He was originally with Derby but he didn't make the Rams' first-team. A transfer to Bury in 1974 lifted his career off the ground and for the past three seasons he has been Bury's top scorer with 21, 21 and 15.

BRIAN WILLIAMS (Forward)

Brian spent several seasons in the first-team at Bury, making more than 150 League appearances for the Shakers. After a sparkling game against them in the League Cup, Q.P.R. signed him in 1977 for £70,000. Brian played in almost half of their First Division fixtures last season, then moved to Swindon for £55,000 in the summer.

CHIC BATES (Forward)

Chic made his name with non-League Stourbridge when he fired home 51 goals in 1973/74. That performance pursuaded Shrewsbury to sign him for £50,000 and he continued to score regularly in the Football League. He was Shrewsbury's top scorer with 15 goals in 1976/77 and he moved on to Swindon last season.

A Gesture Deserving a Better Fate

THE cynics will say, from time to time, that there's no room in football for sentiment or for doing one's rivals a good turn.

And, weight must be added to their argument by the recent experience of the Sheffield Wednesday manager Jack Charlton, who "caught a cold" as it were last weekend when his goalkeeper Bob Bolder fractured his elbow in the match with Carlisle United and has been ruled out of action for two months.

Charlton's good turn 10 days earlier had been to lend young Chris Turner to Lincoln City, and the City boss Willie Bell had only the same day gone on record as expressing his grateful thanks to his former Leeds United colleague.

Unfortunately, for Sheffield Wednesday, the loaning of Turner to Lincoln left them without experienced cover in case Bolder was hurt.

It was long odds against it happening, but of all the goalkeepers playing in the Football League that afternoon, it had to be Bolder who suffered serious injury.

The League regulations mean that Wednesday cannot recall turner until the loan period ends on November 3rd. Lincoln would undoubtedly like to help, but it is difficult, as the manager says, to see a way in which they could do so.

Jack Charlton's gesture in allowing Turner to come to Lincoln, partly because the lad was keen to get back into first team football, deserved a better reward than it got; the cynics, as I said, might well say it served him right, but I take the other view.

It makes a refreshing change to see a manager in Charlton's position prepared to help out a colleague in distress, and if every manager in the country had the same attitude in this respect, football as a whole would be a happier game to play.

In many cases, the original sporting concept of the game has gone by the board, and we recognise the reason why this has happened. These days, only success is important to football clubs.

Without success, without a winning team, life becomes increasingly difficult for football managers, for directors, for players and even for reporters.

I've lost count of the number of people who recently have complained that my match reports didn't agree with their version. Strange, when the team is winning, I never hear that sort of comment; it's all roses then, but I won't complain.

It is all part and parcel of the life one has to lead when connected with professional football. Everybody loves a winner, and football fans are no exception.

I hope things work out for Jack Charlton over the difficult time he is likely to have before his two goalkeepers are fit again. In the meantime, best wishes to Chris Turner . . . and of course, to Lincoln City's number one goalkeeper Peter Grotier.

He still rates among the best in my book.

City took a five minute lead when Hails found the net and that was how the score stayed until half


Troops made it 2-0 to City in the 60th minute and then Hails rounded off the scoring and completed his hat trick with goals in the 70th and 78th minutes.
