

# Bits and Pieces

Whatever the outcome of next week's replay between Sheffield United and Aldershot, Swindon go into the Fourth Round having a good Cup record against both these sides. In fact, neither club has yet recorded an F.A. Cup victory over the Town - at home or away. If Aldershot are successful against the Second Division opponents it will give them a chance to avenge three consecutive home defeats by Swindon and equal their best ever F.A. Cup performance, when they reached the Fifth Round back in 1932-33.


PAUL GILCHRIST, the Town's freetransfer signing from Portsmouth now seems to be finding the goal-scoring touch which first attracted the attention of Southampton over six years ago. Paul was born at Dartford, in Kent, and made his League debut for nearby Charlton Athletic when, as substitute he replaced Ray Treacy (who later joined the Town) in the home game against Birmingham City on September 20 1969. His first full appearance came just three days later at Ashton Gate where Charlton, struggling at the foot of the Second Division, were hammered 6-0 by City. In seven first-team outings that season Paul never finished on a winning side. After a fruitless period on loan to Fulham, Paul went north to join Doncaster Rovers - where he partnered Mike Elwiss, now at Crystal Palace, in attack. Paul scored on his debut for Rovers the only goal in a 1 - 0 victory at Crewe and only Elwiss got more goals for the club that season. Southampton signed Paul in March 1972 and within a year, he had

made the number nine shirt his own. In the Saints successful march to Wembley in 1976 Paul scored two useful goals - one in a 4 - 0 Fifth Round replay win over West Bromwich Albion and the other at Stamford Bridge in the semi-final against Crystal Palace


At Lilleshall they have an Astro-Turf



# WALSALL HOPE FOR LONGER STAY by Tony Pullein

Having been in constant membership of the Third Division since 1963 --- longer than any of the other current members -- Walsall are as keen as anyone to get out, providing, of course, it is at the right end!

This year, however, their only hope of a change is a downwards direction and new manager Frank Sibley is determined to halt the slide that saw the Saddlers enter the New Year following a run of only one win in eight League games.

It may be significant that Walsall's slide has coincided with the departure of their champion goalscorer Alan Buckley whose first Division ambitions were finally realised when Birmingham City signed him for £200,000. In his five full seasons with the Saddlers, Buckley was always top scorer with tallies of 24, 27, 35, 23 and 29. He netted eight times before his departure this season.

Walsall's attack now usually lines up with Donald Penn, Terry Austin and Roy McDonough in the front three.

Penn, is one of several youngsters either already in the team, or knocking on the door. Until being given his head this season, he had made only one previous League appearance as substitute last season.

Walsall paid Plymouth £25,000 for Austin last season and he scored six goals for them in their final seven games of the campaign. He waited patiently in Crystal Palace's reserves and moved to Ipswich in 1974. Two seasons ago he went to Argyle as part of the deal that took Paul Mariner to Ipswich. Terry is Walsall's leading scorer with eight goals.

McDonough, who joined Walsall from Birmingham a few weeks ago, had been given only two matches in Birmingham's First Division side --- in 1976/77 --- but, though he scored a goal, he did not get another chance.

There is a wide choice of midfield players, including Steve Waddington, Alan Birch, Jeff King, Jimmy Kelly and Brian Caswell.

Walsall recently smashed all club records when they paid Stoke £40,000 for Waddington. He grew up with the Potters when his father was manager and made his League debut in 1976/77. Birch is another of several locally-developed players in the Walsall side. He got his break in 1972/73 and has now made well over 100 League appearances for the club. He has scored five goals this season.

King made his entry into professional football with Scottish club Morton but signed for Derby in 1974. After loan periods with Notts. County and Portsmouth, he joined Walsall last season. Kelly was signed from Wolves a few days before this season kicked-off. He had been an occasional first-teamer at Molineaux following his debut in 1973/74. Two seasons later he went to Wrexham on loan.

Caswell developed in the club's junior teams and made his League debut in 1972/73. He is usually at left-back though he also played in midfield.

Contenders for defensive positions include Tony Macken, Ian Paul, David Serella, Ricky Sbragia, Colin Harrison and Caswell.

Macken took over the right-back spot last season following his £10,000 transfer from Derby. He made a number of First Division appearances for the Rams after making his debut in 1975/76.

Serella first tasted League soccer with Nottingham Forest in 1971/72 and for the following two seasons he was a regular member of their back four. He initially joined Walsall on loan in 1974/75 and then agreed to make the complete transfer the following season.

Sbragia, who had trials with Rangers, Bristol City, Ipswich and C. Palace, signed for Birmingham City and made his League bow in 1974/75. Walsall paid £15,000 for him this season.

Harrison is now Walsall's longest serving player with well over 400 first-team appearances behind him. He was drafted into the Saddlers' side for his League debut in 1964/65.

Goalkeeper Mick Kearns won his 14th Republic of Ireland cap in the recent clash with N. Ireland. He began his career with Oxford United, making his League bow in 1969/70. Following loan periods with Plymouth and Charlton, he moved to Walsall in 1973.



The whirlwind events of last weekend made it another Happy New Year for Bobby Saxton, who was invited to take over as Plymouth's manager following the departure of Malcolm Allison to Manchester City. It was almost exactly two years to the day since he was appointed to his first managerial post as Exeter City's playermanager.

No doubt Mr. Saxton will hope the coincidences will continue. In January 1977 Exeter were trailing some way behind in the promotion race in Division Four but he led them into the runners-up spot, and to promotion, at the end of that season.

Plymouth agreed to pay Exeter £10,000 compensation for the loss of Mr. Saxton after they had agreed upon a £35,000 fee from Manchester City for the services of Mr. Allison. Exeter completed a hectic managerial merrygoround by appointing coach Jack Edwards as acting manager and the whole affair was completed within a period of 24 hours.

Cardiff's new manager, Richie Morgan, was hoping to complete at least one new signing this week, possibly two. He has been trying to sign two very experienced Welsh internationals — Terry Yorath, now the Welsh skipper, and Malcolm Page, the versatile Birmingham player.

Yorath who was named as a possibility for the Cardiff job before Mr. Morgan was appointed, has lost his place in the Coventry side this season following an injury and he is anxious to get back into regular League football again. Yorath, who has 34 Welsh caps, joined Coventry from Leeds for £135,000 two seasons ago but the Sky Blues insisted upon signing a replacement before allowing Yorath to go. If Liverpool and England star Emlyn Hughes agrees to Coventry's terms this week then Yorath may well have been allowed a transfer to his home town club.

Play-anywhere Page would be another tremendous asset to Cardiff in their bid to avoid relegation. Malcolm has been capped on 26 occasions by Wales and can play full-back or in midfield and, during 15 seasons as a first-teamer at Birmingham, has turned out in almost every position except goal.

Birmingham have themselves been on the lookout

for new players but it seemed unlikely that they would succeed in their attempt to lure star leftback Joe Bolton from Sunderland. The Roker club has a good chance of promotion - - - and of replacing Birmingham in the First Divsion ! -and, having frightened even Arsenal with the price tag, feel confident of keeping their player. Newport County, the Fourth Division side that almost died two years ago, have turned disaster into triumph and today the club that could not afford to pay the rates in 1977 is one of the most thriving outfits in the lower divisions. Though Newport were refused help by both the local council and the Welsh F.A. when they were in trouble, they have pulled themselves round and they are about to instal a new £20,000 floodlighting system.

There were grave doubts that Newport would be able to complete the 1976/77 campaign, so serious was their financial plight. In one last desperate bid to survive, Newport appealed to their fans for help. An astounding total of £10,000 was collected and this enabled the club to carry on.

Chairman Richie Ford decided to try and build upon that. "This season we have concentrated upon building the club up", he said. "Both from the playing side and as far as facilities go. We were expecting a 15,000 gate for the third round F.A. Cup tie with West Ham and the proceeds will go most of the way towards paying for the new floodlights. We also ordered a temporary stand for the West Ham game to give our supporters a better view."

Newport, who previously had to train in all weathers in the open air, now have their own gymnasium. And an indication as to their newlyfound wealth can be gleaned from the fact that they have twice this season smashed the club record transfer payout.

First they invested £15,000 in Peterborough's Keith Oakes and then they paid Swansea £17,500 for David Bruton. Their previous highest fee was the £10,000 they paid Bristol Rovers for Brian Godfrey in 1973.

Newport, who have been in constant membership of Division Four for longer than any other club (since 1962), also have an outside chance of promotion and manager Len Ashurst was hoping for a good performance against West Ham this week to give his team confidence for the final push for promotion.

Leicester City, who so comprehensively defeated First Division Norwich City 3-0 in the F.A. Cup, included two 16-year-olds in their team — midfielder Andy Peake and forward David Buchanan and manager Jock Wallace has now announced that he is prepared to sell former Derby and Bruges striker Roger Davies.

Davies joined Leicester from Bruges last season for £100,000 after an 18-month spell in Belgian soccer. Another experienced player whom Leicester were prepared to sell was former England midfield man Keith Weller but, after his brilliant performance and spectacular goal against Norwich, the club might well reconsider that decision.
