

Bob Smith says.....

Although we did not manage to win two points against Exeter City on Tuesday evening we still got a very valuable one point and if that sounds as if I am considering a draw as acceptable I am not for at this stage of the season it is imperative that we keep getting results but I also say that it is equally important that we do not lose. Strong words were said by me after Tuesdays game to certain players and I am sure that in todays game we will go out and attempt to play our normal attacking game in an effort to gain maximum points. In my notes for the last home match I mentioned that in a lot of the matches from now until the end of the season good football may take second place to the team that scraps for everything. Pitches now become hard and dry and the ball begins to bobble and at times this does not allow for flowing football so players whether fighting for promotion or relegation must show the right kind of character. I am confident and convinced that we have enough of those players here at Swindon.



IN TOWN TODAY

Chesterfield's recent run of four games without a win, from which they collected only one point, leaves them still in some danger of relegation. At the moment they have a sufficent number of points in hand to cushion them against runs like that but they will need to average a point per game from their coming matches if they are to steer clear of the Fourth Division next season.

The club has made several new signings this season, among them being former Swindon defender Colin Prophett who now usually plays alongside John Cottam in the middle of the defence.

Colin began his career with Sheffield Wednesday and was transferred to Norwich for £45,000 in 1973. We signed him for £20,000 just over a year later and he made well over 150 first-team appearances for us.

Cottam made his League debut for Nottingham Forest in 1971 and, while with them left for loan spells with Mansfield and Lincoln. Chesterfield signed him in 1976.

Prophett's arrival at Saltergate meant that Sian O'Neill lost his place, though he has made some subsequent appearances in the back four. Sian was a reserve player at Leeds and made his League bow soon after joining Chesterfield in 1974.

Bobby Flavell and Ken Burton are the fullbacks. Flavell learned his game with Burnley without getting a chance in their League team. A move to Halifax in 1975 helped him to establish himself and he joined Chesterfield last summer.

Burton, a former England youth international, made some 50 League appearances for Sheffield Wednesday and, after a loan period with Peterborough, signed him for Chesterfield in 1973.

Glen Letheren made just one First Division appearance with Leeds but, while with the Peacocks, he was loaned to Scunthorpe - - - for whom he made 27 League appearances in 1976/77 -- Chelsea and Notts. County. Chesterfield signed him last season.

The midfield has undergone several changes and Geoff Salmons, Les Hunter, Colin Tartt, Andy Kowalski, Gary Pollard, and Ricky Heppolette have all appeared here.

Salmon is a player of great experience. He first played League soccer with Sheffield United in 1967/68. He made 180 League appearances for the Blades, most of them in the First Division, and in 1974 he was signed by Stoke for £200,000 He completed more than a century of First Division games for the Potters until last season returning to Sheffield United on loan. He later signed for Leicester but last season moved on again, to Chesterfield for £35,000.

Hunter, Kowalski and Pollard all developed in the junior teams, Hunter getting his League chance in 1975/76. Kowalski has been in the side since 1972/73. Pollard was introduced last season.

Tartt emerged with Port Vale and made almost 200 first-team appearances for them prior to his transfer to Chesterfield two seasons ago.

Heppolette made his early appearances for Preston and was transferred to Orient for £40,000 in 1972. Crystal Palace paid £15,000 for him in 1976 but he remained only a few weeks before signing for Chesterfield.

A feature of the Chesterfield attack has been the return of striker Ernie Moss who recently celebrates with goals in three successive games. Moss began his career with Chesterfield and was on three occasions their leading scorer. He moved on to Peterborough in 1975 and Mansfield paid £20,000 for him almost two years later. He lost his place at Field Mill this season and was happy to return to his original club.

Rod Fern, Steve Cammack, Phil Walker and Gary Simpson are other players who could appear in attack.

Fern is leading the club's scoring list for the third season in a row, with 13 goals so far. Rod opened his career with Leicester and played in their 1969 F.A. Cup Final team. Luton signed him in 1972 and he joined Chesterfield three years later.

Cammack won England youth honours in his Sheffield United days. He was transferred to Chesterfield in 1975.

Walker and Simpson both came through the junior set-up. Walker, who has scored eight goals this season, was introduced to the side last season. Simpson came in during 1976/77.

Chesterfield have won two away League games — at Brentford (3-0) and Lincoln (1-0). They drew at Carlisle (1-1), Blackpool (0-0), Hull (1-1), Tranmere (1-1), Oxford (1-1) and Plymouth (1-1).

They have been beaten in each of their last four away games at Exeter (1-3), Southend (0-2), Watford (0-2) and Chester (0-3). Earlier they were beaten at Gillingham (1-2), Bury (1-3) and Rotherham (0-1).

Chesterfield were beaten in the first round of the F.A. Cup. After drawing 1-1 at Darlington, they lost their home replay 0-1. In the League Cup they ousted Barnsley by 3-1 on aggregate in round one and then pulled off a fine 2-1 win away to Second Division Orient. Their run finally ended in an extraordinary game in which they were beaten 4-5 at home by Charlton.



Arsenal's re-appearance in the F.A. Cup final gives the Gunners the chance to follow a modern trend and Brian Talbot the opportunity to get into the Guinness Book of Records. Arsenal will be aiming to emulate Manchester United who returned to Wembley in 1977 to win the trophy just 12 months after being beaten in the final.

Last season Arsenal lost 0-1 to Ipswich Town. Brian Talbot was in the Ipswich side that day but he has since been transferred to Arsenal for £450,000 and, if he plays at Wembley, he will become the first player to appear in successive finals for different clubs.

It is the second time this decade that Arsenal have reached successive F.A. Cup finals. They beat Liverpool in 1971 but then lost 0-1 to Leeds United a year later.

Liverpool were within six minutes of losing an outstanding record of their own. In no match this season have Liverpool lost after scoring the first goal. A goal for the Reds is normally a guarantee of victory or, at worst, a draw. But, after Kenny Dalglish had hit his brilliant individualistic opener, Joe Jordan and Brian Greenhoff combined to put Manchester United into a lead which they held until six minutes from time. Then Alan Hansen scored his first goal of the season to earn a replay.

The aftermath of the pre-deadline transfer flurry saw several players score on their debuts for new clubs. Barry Silkman, who thought his dream of First Division football would never be realised when he was rejected by Manchester City on medical grounds a couple of months ago, scored on his First Division debut for City at Ipswich.

Looking back on the Silkman deal, it seems a little odd that City should have considered him a medical risk when a £100,000 fee had been agreed yet felt he was in the pink of health when the figure had been reduced to £65,000! Geert Meijer, signed from Ajax for £98,000, took only five minutes to open his account for Bristol City at home to Birmingham. City went on to win 2-1.

Mick Walsh, the Republic of Ireland international striker, put struggling Q.P.R. 2-1 up against Derby in his first game for the London side who eventually drew 2-2. Walsh joined Rangers in a straight swop for former Swindon player Peter Eastoe.

Third Division Mansfield expended £30,000 on Walsall forward Terry Austin who obliged with the goal that gave the Stags a 1-1 draw at Chester.

A couple of other players also hit their first goals for new clubs, though it took them rather longer to get around to it. Gordon Taylor left Blackburn for Bury last summer but didn't register his first goal until last Saturday when he scored in their 3-0 victory over visiting Shrewsbury Town.

The other player off his mark for a new club was Brentford's Jim McNicholl but, as he is a defender, he can be excused for taking so long. McNicholl made it a double celebration by scoring twice within three minutes to wipe out visiting Blackpool's 2-0 lead at Griffin Park. They were the first goals in his League career and the Bees went on to win 3-2.

McNicholl, who previously played for Ipswich, joined Brentford from Luton earlier this season and has since played twice for the Scottish under-21 eleven.

Sheffield Wednesday, who now seem to be pulling away from the danger zone, were unbeaten in eight games before going to Watford where they packed their defence in search of a point. Their tactics nearly paid dividends but Brian Pollard eventually found a way through for Watford with only 11 minutes left. In the Fourth Division, promotion-chasing Reading found Trevor Dance, in visiting Port Vale's goal, in scintillating form and had to settle for a 0-0 draw. Yet Reading were convinced they had won when Dance made his only mistake --- and dropped the ball over his own goalline two minutes from the end. A linesman flagged for a goal but the referee had spotted a pushing offence by a home forward and the goal was disallowed.

Reading fans detected a touch of Gordon Banks in some of Dance's reflex saves. And that was no coincidence for Banks is now on Vale's coaching staff and takes a very special interest in Dance.

There was drama on and off the field at Barnsley where Oakwell's biggest League crowd (12,928) of the season turned up for the topof-the-table clash with Portsmouth. The fans were stunned when Pompey took the lead with a Steve Davey scorcher in the 62nd minute. Though Tommy Graham equalised five minutes later the match remained in the balance right up to the whistle.

Then there was consternation as Portsmouth's popular manager Jimmy Dickinson collapsed with a heart attack. He was detained in a Barnsley hospital where his condition this week was described as "poorly".

Graham's goal for Barnsley was his 11th in only 13 games.
