#### MARKET STEPPENT

I HAD a long talk with the players before last weekend's game because I am determined that we keep a positive attitude about our relegation fight and don't begin believing that we are down and out.

There are still a good many points to be fought for, and they can be picked up if everyone rolls up their sleeves and commits themselves for ninety minutes.

I told everyone that, and the fact is that I will only be prepared to pick players, whatever their age and experience, who want to fight the battle.

There was nothing wrong with the effort here in our last home game against Mansfield, even though we lost 2-1. We played some good football at times but were stopped by Mansfield's strength at the back.

And I think everyone will have been pleased that our younger players, Tony Cliss, Trevor Quow and Micky Gynn did so well. Sadly Trevor got hurt and there is an article elsewhere in the programme about his situation.

One thing that does need a little clarification about that is the problems that arose while he was awaiting attention from Jim Barron.

Trevor was on the ground a fair while, and I know certain sections of the fans were angered by the apparent cynicism of Mansfield defenders who passed the ball around among themselves.

They didn't realise it was such a bad injury and knowing them as I do I'm sure there ac-



tions weren't deliberate.

It's easy to make judgements after the event and I suppose one can also question the actions of the referee in these situations.

It isn't easy for him either with play going on in one part of the pitch and an injured player in another. And it isn't easy partly because some players in the game have a reputation for play acting.

Trevor was having a good game and Micky Gynn had what must have been one of the best-ever debuts on this ground. He could have scored twice in the second half and I'm absolutely delighted with his all-round performance.

In truth the youngsters' ability here took me by surprise. If it hadn't they would have been in the side sooner and I can say here and now that there are others knocking on the door—Steve Collins, Phil Chard among them.

The reserves sent a young side to Brighton last Thursday night for the first leg of the cup and drew 1-1 and they were due to play here again last night in the second leg.

Which brings me to the work of the groundstaff under Derek Poole.

He has had a terrible time with the weather this winter and still managed to keep the pitch in good playing order. That sort of effort easily gets overlooked and I feel it well worthwhile giving Derek a public thank you for his efforts.

Well, that's the scene set for two more home games this week which we badly need to win.

Tonight's visitors Swindon are going to be in a determined mood because of their promotion chances and I know their manager Bobby Smith was over here last Tuesday to take a look at us.

We had good League Cup results against them early in the season I understand, and although we have a different look about us these days I feel we can give them a hard game.

If everyone puts 100 per cent effort into things, that is.





#### Posh's third trophy bid

POSH reserves were hoping it was third time lucky last night in the final of the Midweek League Cup.

After final defeats at the hands of Portsmouth and Watford, Posh were bidding to lift the cup for the first time.

After a tremendous performance at Brighton, who are chasing a league and cup double, the reserves went into last night's home leg all square at 1-1.

injuries having restricted the number of senior players available for the seaside trip last week, coach Jim Barron paraded no fewer than eight teenagers against an experienced Brighton line-up.

Billy McEwan, back after a three match ban, Bill Green and Barry Butlin were the only players with league experience but the youngsters responded to the challenge to extend the reserves' unbeaten run to 12



The youth team squad plus other players who are on associate schoolboy forms, spent three days at the Posh ground having coaching sessions with manager Peter Morris, coaches Brian Owen and Jim Barron and the youth staff.

In fact, Butlin put the reserves in front at Brighton but the home side equalised through former Spurs and England striker Martin Chivers, their recent £15,000 capture from Norwich.

Included on the Posh subs bench for the first time was Huntingdon schoolboy Michael Higgins, while in the side were two other schoolboys, Tim Gale from Coates and Trevor Slack from Farcet.

Slack, in fact, joins the apprentice professionals staff this summer and he could be accompanied by Gale.

The reserve side at Brighton was: Dean, Byatt, Collins. Leadbeater, Green, Winters. Chard, McEwan, Butlin, Gale Slack.

Apart from their cup bid, the reserves have still more than a passing interest in the league title race.

Posh, who haven't lost since the 2-0 home defeat by Northampton back in November. are currently third, five points behind Brighton with three games in hand.

Southend are second, three points ahead of Posh who have a game in hand. Posh drew 1-1 with Southend in their last league match, the game having been switched to the Essex coast even though Posh had already played at Roots Hall.

Posh should have been in action at home to Brighton but

the London Road pitch was unplayable so alternative arrangements were made. Barry Butlin got the goal in a 1-1

Meanwhile the youths are still in with a chance to reach the final stages of the South East Counties League Cup.

JIMMY ALLEN (goalkeeper)—Born in Scotland he was signed from Brora Rangers in 1970 as an apprentice and on full forms nine months later. Although he made his league debut in 1971, it was not until 1976-77 that he became established in the side.

JOHN TROLLOPE (full back)—Locally born and has been with the club since he was an apprentice making 737 appearances to the end of last season. Last season he passed the record for one club domestic appearances, retired to become youth team manager and awarded the MBE. But he has found that his services are still required.

ANDY FORD (full back)—Started his career with Bournemouth although he did not reach their league side. A move to Southend in 1972 led to a place in their league side and he made 135 appearances before joining Swindon at the start of last season.

RAY McHALE (midfield) — Comes from Sheffield and made his league debut for Chesterfield in1971-72. After 123 games he joined Halifax and never missed a match before joining Swindon in September 1976.

STEVE AIZLEWOOD (defender)—Started with home town club Newport and made 191 appearances for them before joining Swindon in March 1976. He is a former Welsh Under 23 international.

KENNY STROUD (defender)—Signed as a professional in 1970 and made his debut a year later. It was not until 1974-75 that he gained a regular place in the side and up to the start of this season he had made 154 appearances in midfield and defence.

IAN MILLER (forward)—Comes from Scotland but first played league football with Bury, making nine appearances. He moved to Nottingham Forest but did not play league football again until he joined Doncaster in August 1975. He was signed by Swindon for £25,000 in the close season.

ROY CARTER (midfield)—Played in the Western League with Falmouth before joining Hereford in 1975. He figured in Hereford's Third Division promotion side in 1975-76 and then joined Swindon in December 1977.

ANDY ROWLAND (striker)—Manager Bobby Smith returned to his former club Bury in September to sign Rowland for £80,000 as a replacement for Fulham bound Chris Guthrie. Rowland made more than 170 appearances for Bury after joining them from Derby.

ALAN MAYES (striker)—A recent expensive signing from Third Division promotion rivals Watford. Mayes failed to make the grade at QPR and moved on to Watford where he was a regular until this season. He also had a spell on loan to Northampton.

CHICK BATES (forward) — Comes from West Bromwich and spent seven years as a part-time Southern League player before joining Shrewsbury in 1974. He made 160 appearances for them before joining Swindon in January last year.

BRYAN HAMILTON (midfield)—Northern Ireland international signed recently from Millwall. He made 138 appearances for Ipswich before joining Everton. After a short spell on Merseyside he moved south to London to join Millwall.

## Swindon chasing promotion place

'MATCH of the Day' viewers saw tonight's visitors Swindon impressively move into the promotion bracket with Saturday's 2-0 home defeat of one-time leaders Watford.

So the clash at London Road is vitally important to both sides with Posh needing the points to stave off the relegation threat while Swindon want the spoils to keep up their promotion drive.

Certainly Swindon's away form in recent weeks has been impressive with wins at Bury, Oxford and Exeter and a vital draw at Gillingham, another promotion contender.

Swindon stuttered at Easter with a 1-0 home defeat at the hands of current leaders Swansea, but as displayed against Watford, their confidence has been completely restored.

Since their 1-1 League Cup draw here in October (Posh won the replay), manager Bobby Smith has added £80,000 striker Alan Mayes from Watford and £15,000 Northern Ireland midfield player Bryan Hamilton from Millwall to his squad.

Mayes, who helped Watford to the Fourth Division championship last season before losing his place to Luther Blissett, has quickly established a rapport with Andy Rowland, an £80,000 buy from Smith's former club Bury.

Hamilton came into the side last Saturday because of an injury to defender Steve Aizlewood, while another experienced player missing recently is Brian Williams, a £50,000 recruit from QPR who also played with Rowland at Bury.

But while new faces appear on the scene at the County Ground, John Trollope keeps plodding along.

Trollope, who holds the record for appearances with one club, chalks up his 750th league appearance tonight, having come out of temporary retirement to replace injured right back John McLaughlin.

Trollope, who last year received the MBE for his services to the club, became youth team manager this season but his experience could prove valuable in the tense promotion run-in.

## A galling night for the boss


TWO Mansfield players leap powerfully to clear the same ball . . . the picture that tells the story of the last home game, which our fellow relegation strugglers won 2-1.


We were 2-0 down before centre-half Tony Smith finally rifled a consolation goal in what may prove to have been the most important game of the season.


Defeat devalued our Easter Saturday win at Lincoln and eased the Stags' fears that we might put a points gap between us which they couldn't make up.

#### TWELVE YEARS AGO

POSH recalled forward John Mason for the vital relegation battle against Darlington at London Road on April 24 1967 and the former England amateur international rewarded the fans with both goals in a 2-0 win.

That eased our fears of dropping into Division Four and 'Stingray', as he was dubbed at London Road, went on to score five more goals in the remaining four games to take his tally for the season to 15.

He grabbed three more for the first team before breaking his leg in a reserve game at Leicester the following winter and never got back to full fitness.

The club finally gave him a free-transfer and the former Altrincham striker later joined a big ex-Posh fraternity in South African soccer, joining up with Johnny Byrne, Ron Barnes and John Kirkham.





For Bob, who lives in Bedford Street, Peterborough, it's a reward for his service to the Radio 5 hospital broadcasting team.


Bob gives up a lot of his spare time to help the valuable service with his main task being the commentary on Posh home matches.

Bob's winning ticket was drawn out at the British Rail sports club.


