






SWINDON TOWN

TUESDAY 8th MAY 1979 KICK OFF 7.30 pm







This evening's game brings us to the end of an eventful season and there is a distinct possibility that the result could have a bearing on who appears in the Third Division and who in the Second next season. Our visitors, Swindon Town, to whom we offer our usual warm welcome, have been well in the running for promotion for much of the season and although we do not have recent results to hand, at the time of writing, they are still in with a shout.

Our victory over Mansfield by 1-0, following a similar win over Rotherham, took us to 43 points from 43 games and a respectable mid-table position. It was the first time since the fifth match that we had been on a parity of points from games. The Mansfield victory was watched by England cricket star, Ian Botham, a school mate of Len Bond, and he had the satisfaction of seeing Len keep his fifteenth clean sheet in 32 League games this season - a truly remarkable record. Steve Phillips popped in our winner to put himself joint leading scorer with Andy McCulloch.

It is customary at this time of the year to review the season but our Match Facts and Figures pages give a good indication of results and the fluctuation in our fortunes. Manager Bill Dodgin contends - and with every justification - that whilst the signing of Barry Tucker the previous year was the turning point in winning promotion, the dual transfer of Jim McNichol from Luton and Dean Smith from Leicester proved crucial. Since their signing, there has been a marked upturn in results and, indeed, we have lost only 8 games in the League since they joined us, compared with 9 in the opening 13 games! Full credit to all members of the staff who have striven so hard to wipe out the dismal start. The Manager always believed that the Club would not go down and that the players had faith in their own ability - and this proved to be the case.

This is also a sad time of the year when one has to say good-bye to old friends and this is particularly so in the case of Mickey Allen, who has been released by the Club after eight years loyal service. He was a bargain £8,000 signing from Middlesbrough and has appeared in a Brentford shirt in 223 League games and in a variety of positions from striker, to midfield, to central defender and to his best position of left back. He has always been a credit to the Club and the number of cautions he has received could be counted on one hand. He is returning to his native North-East and everyone at Griffin Park wishes him well in the future and thank him for his services in the

past. In addition to Mick, Gary Rolph and Dave Silman are also being released and we wish them every success in the future and trust they will speedily get fixed up with another club.

It is also the time for us to express our thanks to those who have given us such assistance in producing the Match Day Magazine and the 'Soccer Special' (of which a number of copies are still on sale at 20p each). In this category particularly comes Graham Haynes who unfailingly produces his copy on or before the due day and the content of which takes him hours to prepare - and all of this is done voluntarily and much appreciated by everyone from the Chairman downwards. We have also been pleased to feature news of the Junior Bees and thank John Lonnen for taking this column over with the untimely illness of John Warren, Alan Rogers has continued to produce 'Supporters News' and John Monks has again been responsible for the glossy production of the Match Day Magazine. My own personal thanks also goes to Ann Lamb, without whom I would find the production doubly difficult to prepare, and to Sue Morgan for her splendid photographs throughout the season. In conclusion, we have tried our best to cover events inside and at times outside the club so that supporters have a record of the season and, therefore, we give details of recent Reserve games which have taken place, as follows:-

For our final home game of the season, we welcome Swindon Town to Griffin Park for the first time in 13 years. Originally the fixture was scheduled for January 6th, but Town's FA Cup involvement precluded it going ahead. In retrospect, they would probably have preferred to have played the game then with only one defeat in six games (0-2 at Watford) behind them and Brentford struggling to put it together. As it stands now we are a very different proposition from those days.

Only Watford (8) and Swansea (8) have recorded more away wins than Swindon's seven victories on foreign soil, but the four home reverses they have suffered to Blackpool (0-1), Plymouth (1-3), Colchester (1-2) and Swansea (0-1) means that of all the clubs in the shake up for promotion, their home record rates as the worst.

Swindon's late burst onto the promotion scene has seen the County Ground attendances more than double in recent games. Prior to Swansea's visit on Easter Saturday when the crowd numbered 16,971 the best figure was the 8,396 who witnessed the goalless draw with Carlisle in March.

These notes went to press before Saturday's home game with Gillingham which I should imagine would also have provided another bumper gate, as a win over their Kent rivals would have lifted the Robins to within an ace of Second Division football next season.

This is Swindon's first visit to Griffin Park since March 1966 when a late goal from Roger Smart after Brentford had made nearly all the running, enabled them to complete a lucky double and push us to the very brink of the Fourth Division abyss. The previous month it was a late penalty which scuppered Brentford at the County Ground. Our visit to Swindon in December 1977 produced a truly classic Cup tie, and although going down 2-1 it was probably the team's best away performance of the season. Brentford's goal came on the hour mark when Willie Graham was tripped in the area and Steve Phillips made no mistake from the spot to collect his 15th goal of the season.

The equaliser came with 13 minutes left when Colin Prophett scrambled the ball home and with a replay on the cards, Ray McHale scored the

winner with less than three minutes remaining. The game at Swindon last September is best forgotten, with five men booked, Town's Brian Williams earning an early bath and Steve Aizlewood spending the night in hospital with a badly bruised cheek.

Robins' skipper Ray McHale curled a 63rd minute free-kick around the wall to give them the lead and Bates' header wrapped the points up four minutes from time.

Swindon is the third club with whom Bobby Smith has held the reins in the last eighteen months. Bob's first managerial appointment ended in November 1977 when Bury sacked him less than three years after leading them out of the Fourth Division. Within 24 hours he moved to Port Vale and at the end of last season took over at the County Ground.

Bob started his playing career with Manchester United, where he gained England Youth caps but failed to break into the First Team, before joining Scunthorpe. Subsequently he played for Grimsby, Brighton, Chester and Hartlepool before arriving at Bury in 1973.

His assistant is **Danny Williams**, who led Swindon to their League Cup triumph over Arsenal and promotion to Division Two in 1969.

First team coach is Wilf Tranter, who was on the Old Trafford playing staff at the same time as Bob Smith, whilst Youth Team Manager is that old war horse John Trollope, hero of a staggering 738 League matches in Swindon colours. John was last year awarded the M.B.E. for his services to Swindon Town and also voted the club's 'Player of the Year'!

Goalkeeper Jimmy Allan was signed in October 1970 from Scottish side Brora Rangers, but it was not until 1976 that he established a regular first team place. Jim now has almost 200 League appearances to his credit. In reserve is young Kevin Roberts.

ALL AT BURY

Winger Ian Miller, Brian Williams and Andy Rowland were with Manager Bob Smith at Bury. Ian, who arrived from Doncaster in part exchange for our former striker Micky French and £25,000 last summer, holds the unique achievement of being voted into the P.F.A.'s Fourth Division "All Stars" team for three successive years whilst on Doncaster's books.

Brian cost £50,000 from Q.P.R. last June, having signed for Rangers from Bury for £70,000 twelve months earlier.

Swindon paid Bury £80,000 for Andy Rowland in

September since when he has emerged as their leading goalscorer.

The same month, former Southampton striker Paul Gilchrist was signed from Portsmouth and obliged with three goals in his first three appearances. Bryan Hamilton and Alan Mayes have also arrived at the County Ground since the start of the season.

Bryan a former Linfield, Ipswich and Everton midfielder cost £20,000 from Millwall in November, and has been Capped more than 40 times by Northern Ireland since making his debut against Turkey in 1968. He skippered the national team in the 1978 British Championship from the unfamiliar position of right back.

Swindon bought Watford striker Alan Mayes for £80,000 on February 1st, 48 hours after their £250,000 bid to bring Manchester City's Mike Channon back to his native Wiltshire fell on stoney ground.

Alan, for whom Brentford bid a club record fee of £65,000 in September, scored a hat-trick at Rotherham in his debut. He was one of four Watford players voted into the P.F.A. Fourth Division representative side last season.

Alan's signing took Bobby Smith's dealings in the transfer market since his appointment past the £500,000 mark. He did it by raising £225,000 from the sale of, amongst others, Chris Guthrie to Fulham (£60,000), Colin Prophett to Chesterfield (£25,000), David Moss to Luton (£110,000) and Dave Cunningham to Aston Villa (£7,000), and the rest on the incoming players.

Skipper Ray McHale joined the Robins from Halifax in September 1976 and has since made over 100 League appearances, missing only one game last season when he scored 10 goals from midfield including five penalties.

Former Colchester full-back John McLaughlin missed only one game last year, whilst Andy Ford a bargain buy from Southend in September 1977 has taken over the left-back mantle formerly worn by John Trollope.

Welsh Under-23 International defender Steve Aizlewood was signed from Newport County in March 1976.

In midfield Swindon can call upon former Hereford player Roy Carter, Chris Kamara, a £20,000 buy from Portsmouth in 1977, and long serving former apprentice Kenny Stroud. Striker Chic Bates was signed from Shrewsbury Town, for whom he scored 45 goals in 160 appearances, in January 1978.


Above left: Trainer Eddie Lyons treats Andy McCulloch after he had scored our first goal against Southend on Good Friday.


TALKA

What a tribute to skipper, Jackie Graham, winning three times and this year in the runners-up position.

Finally, the supporters' choice of 'Player of the Year' is Jim McNichol and he, like Len Bond, will receive his trophy this Friday.
