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#### From The Manager's Office...



After successfully defending a one goal lead at Walsall in the first round of the League Cup last month we find the tables turned tonight against Swindon Town in the second round.

This time the pressure is on us as we try to pull back that one goal scored by Swindon at the County Ground last week, but I am confident that if we can play as well as we did in the first leg we will not find this task beyond us.

Swindon are never an easy team to beat and they are sure to defend their lead with determination, so we can expect a real battle tonight. One thing is certain, if the game is as exciting and skilful as our last encounter the supporters should be in for a treat.

Both clubs have established fine reputations in the League Cup over the years and both have sampled the glory and the financial rewards to be gained from an extended run in the competition, so the chance of a money-spinning third round tie will be a massive incentive to give 100 per cent effort tonight.

At the time of writing we are top of the Third Division and, hopefully, we are still top dogs following our match at Bury. We enjoyed this lofty position for a short time at the start of last season, but we were unable to stay there. We will all be trying hard to maintain this fine start this season, despite the injuries we have already suffered to Trevor Storton and Peter Henderson.

Meanwhile, the League Cup is our immediate concern and I am hoping we can field a full-strength team tonight. Whatever the result I hope you enjoy what you see and will be encouraged to come back on Saturday for our league game against Millwall.

First look at the league table, with most teams having completed three fixtures, shows that Chesterfield head a group of teams, with four points on goal difference who are nearest rivals to The Seals. Alan Birch with a double and Ernie Moss were their second half scorers in a 3-1 home victory over Plymouth.

Both these sides competed in the League Cup, second round, first leg. Chesterfield again scored three, this time without in disposing Shrewsbury at Saltergate. Alan Birch with a penalty and Ernie Moss, with two, Plywere their scorers. mouth had to settle for a 2-2 home draw against Chelsea. All the goals came in the first half with Argyle falling behind to an early goal, then going 2-1 up through Mike Trusson.

Blackburn took Sheffield Wednesday apart winning 3-0, this being their first victory, at Hillsborough, since April 25, 1931. Craig, Fazackerley and McKenzie were on target. Wednesday got back some of their pride with a 1-1 home result against Manchester City in the League Cup. Jeff King equalised in sixty-eight minutes after an early City goal. Five minutes later Brian Hornsby had his penalty kick saved.

Barnsley had a two nil league victory at Oakwell, versus Reading. Derek Bell and Ronnie Glavin were on target 'The Tykes' though found West Ham much stiffer opposition in the Cup going down 3-1 at Upton Park. Glavin was again on target for them.

Southend have started with two wins out of two after an away success at Wimbledon, Winger Colin Morris got a late winner for 'The Shrimpers', who must have a great chance of ousting Bolton from the Cup after a fine 2-1 victory at Burnden Park. With centraldefender Dave Cusack sent off just before half-time and Bolton scoring straight after the interval, things looked grim for Southend. That man Morris though was again their match-winner with two quick goals.

Two disappointing results for Colchester, going down 3-0 in the league at Rotherham and having a mountain to climb in the Cup

away leg, after a 2-0 home defeat by Aston Villa. A giant-killing act could await 'The Millers', after conceding only a first half penalty, away to Bristol City in the first leg of the Cup.

Millwall gained an away point at Gillingham in a 1-1 score-line. Kevin O'Callaghan gave the Londoners a first half lead until Ken Price equalised quickly after the break. A hard task awaits 'The Gills' at Carrow Road, after being held by the same score by Norwich in the Cup. John Overton litup the Priestfield Stadium with an early goal but they could not hold out.

Exeter had a narrow 2-1 home league win over Mansfield with Dave Pullar grabbing a last minute winner. Pullar also gave the Devon outfit an early lead at Doncaster (Cup) but 'The Grecians' faded, conceding three goals.

#### Sealand Road Welcomes...

#### The Robins



Tonight's visitors Swindon Town are appearing at Sealand Road for the first time in a Cup game but they bring with them the reputation of being one of the lower divisions' best Cup fighting teams. As a non-League team they reached the semifinal of the F.A. Cup in 1910 and 1912 but they went even further in the League Cup in 1969 when they beat Arsenal 3-1 to become only the second Third Division side to win the trophy at Wembley.

The Robins' Cup trail started with a home tie against fellow Division 3 side Torquay whom they narrowly defeated 2-1. Bradford City were their next opponents. A 1-1 draw was the result in Yorkshire but in the replay Bradford were 2-0 up after only 18 minutes play. Swindon gradually settled, however, and eventually beat the Fourth Division club by the odd goal in 7.

Round 3 saw Swindon drawn against Blackburn and a single Don Rogers goal was enough for victory. The Robins then met First Division opposition for the first time when they were drawn away to Coventry. Against all the odds the first meeting ended all square at 2-2 — this after

Swindon had been leading 2-0 with only 4 minutes to play! The replay saw no similar lapses, however, and Swindon won 3-0.


The fifth round provided another stiff obstacle in Derby County. The Rams were challenging strongly for promotion to Division 1 and had already beaten Chelsea and Everton. Swindon were undaunted and after a goalless draw at Derby they won through, again with a single Don Rogers goal.

Swindon's opponents in the two-leg semi-final were Burnley, a young team going great guns in the League. Again Swindon were not worried and came away from Turf Moor with a useful 2-1 lead. The second leg saw Swindon start as favourites but after 52 minutes they were two goals down, only to fight back to force a third game. The decider was played at West Brom's ground and Swindon eventually triumphed 3-2 after extra time.

After playing 11 games, two of which had gone to extra time, the Robins were at Wembley!

On Saturday March 15, 1969 Swindon and Arsenal met on a mud bath of a

Wembley pitch in front of 100,000 spectators. Swindon drew first blood just 10 minutes before half time when Smart scored after irrepressible Rogers had outplaced the Arsenal defence. In the second half Arsenal piled on the pressure but Swindon held firm until 4 minutes from time when Gould equalised. Many expected Swindon to crack but against the odds they came back and scored twice in extra time through "man of the match" Rogers.

The team that won the Cup for Swindon was:-Downsborough, Thomas, Trollope: Butler, Burrows, Harland: Heath, Smart, Smith, Noble and Rogers, Substitute: Penman.

Swindon's victory was achieved at a time when only First Division clubs were allowed to enter the then Inter Cities Fairs Cup and so a special match was arranged with Roma, the Italian Cup winners, and Swindon won 5-2 on aggregate. This competition was the forerunner of the infamous Anglo-Italian competition which Swindon also won in its inaugural year, by beating Napoli 3-0.

Previous to their Wembley triumph Swindon's best performance in the competition had been achieved when they lost to West Ham in a fourth round replay in 1963-64. Three years later they had again reached the fourth round but were beaten by the then holders, West Brom.

In recent years their League Cup fortunes have fluctuated somewhat. season 1976-77 they suffered a first round defeat at the hands of Northampton Town, losing 3-4 on aggregate. The following season saw them dreaming of another Wembley appearance, however. In the opening round they defeated Swansea 3-1 at the Vetch Field and 2-1 at Swindon and in second round they hammered Cardiff 5-1. After a 1-1 draw at Portsmouth in round 3 the Robins triumphed 4-3 in the replay. They then travelled north to Wrexham having scored 15 goals in 5 ties only to lose rather disappointingly by two goals to nil.

Last season Swindon's first round opponents were Portsmouth whom they beat 4-2 at Swindon after a goalless draw in the first leg. In the second round they travelled to Upton Park and

beat West Ham by 2 goals to 1. The reward for this fine performance was a game with Third Division strugglers Peterborough and again hopes of a good run were high especially when Swindon drew 1-1 at London Road. The replay, however, saw the Posh score twice without reply and Swindon's run was finished.

This season's first round draw again paired Swindon with Portsmouth. The away leg resulted in a 1-1 draw with Rowland scoring for Swindon and goals from Carter and Mellor (own goal) saw Swindon through to round two and their meeting with the Seals.

Swindon are managed by ex Seals player BOBBY SMITH who joined them from Bury, after having taken Bury from Division 4 to Division 3. Bobby will be able to call on the experience of General Manager DANNY WILLIAMS and Coaches WILF TRANTER and BRYAN HAMILTON to help him in his managerial career with the Robins.

Swindon's playing staff contains many experienced professionals. Competing for the goalkeeper's jersey will be Scotsman JIMMY ALLAN and Lancastrian CHRIS OGDEN who played 24 and 22 League games respectively last season.

Following the sale of Steve Aizlewood to Portsmouth during the summer, the back four will be chosen from ANDY FORD, RUSSEL LEWIS, KEN STROUD, BILLY TUCKER, BRYAN HAMILTON and JOHN TEMPLEMAN.

Ford joined Swindon from Southend in 1977-78 and has since made 39 appearances. Lewis is a young central defender who will be hoping to gain a regular first team place this season after making 5 appearances in the last campaign. Stroud is one of the longest serving players at the club having made his debut in 1971-72. He has been a first team regular since 1974-75 and can also operate in midfield. Tucker is a player well known in Third Division circles. He began his career with Hereford before joining Bury in 1977 and moving to Swindon last year.


Hamilton, is the exlpswich and Everton player and also has over 40 caps for Northern Ireland. He has spent most of his career in midfield but has adapted well to a full back role for both club and country.

Templeman joined Swindon this summer. He joined Brighton in 1966-67 and made over 200 appearances before moving to Exeter where he played a further 200 games.

The midfield selection will be made from RAY McHALE, BRIAN WILLIAMS, ROY CARTER and CHRIS KAMARA.

Two strikers who have spent most of their careers in Division 3 are ANDY ROWLAND and PHIL "CHIC" BATES. Rowland almost joined Wrexham in 1978 but a September. last minute change of mind saw him sign for the Robins. He also played for Bobby Smith at Bury. Bates was signed from Shrewsbury in January, 1978 and was Swindon's leading scorer last season with 14 goals.

Three other players competing for forward places are wingmen IAN MILLER and DAVE CUNNINGHAM and youngster STEVE ABBLEY.


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#### Away Travel News

Tonight's soccer oddities are under the headings beginning with the letter 'D' -

#### DEBUTS

S. Milton had an unhappy debut in the Football League as goalkeeper for Halifax Town against Stockport County on 6 Jan, 1934; he conceded 13 goals, an unenviable record. Yet another goalkeeper who will not forget his baptism in League football in a hurry is D. Murray (Crewe Alexandra) v Lincoln City in a Division 3(N) game on 29 September, 1951 — he conceded 11 goals.

#### DIASTERS

The biggest disaster in the history of the game occurred in The National Stadium, Lima, Peru on Sunday 24 May, 1964. Six minutes before the end of the match between Peru and Argentina, the referee disallowed a goal by the home team and a riot quickly broke out. The police used tear gas, and during the ensuing panic to get out of the ground 301 people were killed and over 500 injured.

71 people were killed and about 200 injured in a stampede at The River Plate Stadium, Buenos Aires, 23 June, 1963, following a game between River Plate and Gival Baca Juniors.

The worst British football disaster occurred at Ibrox Park, Glasgow — 2 January, 1971 when 66 people were killed and close on 150 injured in a crush whilst leaving the ground at the end of a Rangers v Celtic fixture. Burnden Park, Bolton was the scene of a nasty disaster in March, 1946, 33 people were killed and over 400 injured as crush barriers broke in a tightly packed section of the ground during an F.A. Cup tie, Bolton v Stoke City.

#### DOUBLE

Only four clubs have won the Football League Championship and the F.A. Cup in the same season. Preston North End 1888-89; Aston Villa 1896-97; Tottenham Hotspur 1960-61 and Arsenal in 1970-71.

#### 'DIXIE' DEAN

William Ralph Dean one of the most prolific goalscorers in the game's history. Dixie netted 379 League goals in all; (27) Tranmere Rovers; (349) Everton; (3) Notts County. Considering that soon after joining Everton from Tranmere in March, 1925 Dean suffered skull fractures in a motorcycle accident, it is remarkable that he made such a recovery and even more staggering that he has headed more goals than any other Division 1 footballer!

#### DEFENSIVE RECORDS

Queens Park (Glasgow) were formed in 1867 and unbelievably did not have a goal scored against them by a Scottish club until Jan 16, 1875. Vale of Leven broke the seven year record.

In Division 3(S) in 1925-26, Millwall didn't have a goal scored against them in 11 consecutive matches.... more recently (1973-74) York City equalled the record of Millwall's. Just spare a thought for Cardiff City in 1928-29; they finished their Division One season with the best defensive record of all the clubs in the League — but were relegated!


#### DRAWS

The record number of draws by a club in a League Season is 23 out of 42 games; this record was set last season by Norwich City.

In 1969 (Oct. 25 — Dec. 13) Torquay drew 8 consecutive Division 3 games — a League record.

On Saturday Sept. 18, 1948, there were 9 drawn games in Division 1 of the Football League, a record for any division of the League in a single day.

The following clubs have gone through a Football League Season without drawing a single game! Sunderland (Div 1) 1891-92; Small Heath (Div 2) 1893-94; Lincoln City and Walsall Swifts (Div 2) 1894-95; Stoke City (Div 1) 1895-96 and Darwen (Div 2) 1896-97.



#### Worldwide Soccer Snips



With the rules stating that only two foreign players are allowed in one team per fixture, an interesting thing happened recently in Austria. S.C. Rapid drew one each with Wiener Sportklub but Rapid brought on a sub thus having three foreigners on the park. The F.A. punished them for this error by awarding Wiener a two-nil victory.

Mimis Domazos, who appeared in 490 league fixtures for Panathinaikos, has recently joined fellow Greek side A.E.K. Athens. The thirty-eight year old star has so far gained fortynine international caps.

Leeds United's second goal, a. Carl Harris 60th minute effort, in their recent 2-0 league home victory over Everton brought their league total, for goals scored, to the 4,000 mark.

Belfast side Linfield have re-signed Swindon's Peter Dornan. The 25 year old midfielder joined 'The Robins' in 1978 for a £30,000 fee from the Windsor Park based outfit.

Scottish outfit Clyde

have recently signed ex Celtic goalkeeper Denis Connaghan. Also joining him at Shawfield is Motherwell full-back Jim Boyd on a free transfer.

Cyril Lea recently took up an appointment as Alan Durban's right hand man at Stoke City. The move was a big step for Lea who terminated a sixteen year association with Ipswich because apparently he was no longer required by the club.

An American transfer, National Conference Central Division outfit, Tulsa Roughnecks have purchased Jack Brand, Cosmos goalkeeper.

Newly appointed manager at Limerick (League of Ireland) is Eoin Hand. Ex central defender Hand has appeared for the now obsolete Drumcondra, Shamrock and Portsmouth.

Landskrona Bois recently had to call on the services of their retired ex goalkeeper Rolf Nilsson and created a new record in the process. Injury forced forty-seven year old Rolf to turn out Swedish against Sundsvall in a First Division Rolf's team won fixture. 3-2 but he became oldest player to appear in a premier game beating the previous milestone, fifteen years ago by fortythree year old Gunnar Gren who turned out for Gais Gothenburg.

David Peach's penalty against Manchester United on the opening day of the season was his sixty-fourth goal, a record for a full-back since the league was formed ninety-one years ago.

Torquay have signed twenty-four year old Black-pool forward Tommy Sermanni in a £7,500 deal. 'The Seasiders' signed the player eighteen months ago from Albion Rovers for a £15,000 fee.


