


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
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
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Come twenty-to-five this afternoon, I hope I will not be in the same position as I was after the last home game.

We had been beaten 2-0 by Brentford and I had to face a crowd of Pressmen outside the dressing rooms and explain what I thought had gone wrong.

I had to be honest and tell them I simply did not know.

I had just had a long session with the players, going through the match, and I had to admit I had no explanations and no ideas on what I could do to change the pattern of our form at home. The Brentford defeat meant we had scored none and conceded five goals in three League games here, and failed to win any of our five League and Cup matches here.

Yet away from home we've lost only once in six games—
and that at Manchester City in the League Cup a little
unluckily—and we've already proved we are a force to be
reckoned with in the Third Division.

I think we probably would have won at Colchester last week if lan Fleming had not been sent off, and on Tuesday we faced one of the best sides in the division so far, in Millwall, and controlled at least half of the game.

So it is very nearly the same story as before as we go into today's match. We've had two good away performances and, on paper at least, there is every reason to suppose we will get a result on our own ground.

A couple of managers—Bill Dodgin of Brentford and Bobby Roberts of Colchester—have expounded their own theories about why we haven't done that so far. They have talked about visiting teams raising their game when they realise they're playing on a top-class ground, and about our players being under pressure from the crowd to do well. I know some of the lads share one view or the other

For my part I can only plead for your patience once again.
I know we're capable of playing as well here as we do away from home and I believe one of these days we will get an early goal and then really bury someone. I hope it will be today.

THE FOLLY OF PREDICTIONS

Rotherham manager Jim McGuigan had only one thing to say to everyone who quizzed him about promotion prospects as his side topped the Third Division table last week: "We may have made a great start, but we've got two tough away games coming up. Our results there will put our start into perspective".

The matches McGuigan referred to were at Blackpool last Saturday and Carlisle in midweek.

Rotherham lost both, with the result that the top of the table now seems a bit further away.

All that doesn't mean Rotherham's promotion hopes can be written off. It simply goes to prove the folly of making predictions after just half a dozen games.

PROMOTION COMPARISONS

It's interesting to compare Saturday's Third Division table with the positions at the same stage of last season. Watford and Swansea, promoted eventually, were admittedly top and second, but third was Hull, who slipped as low as 20th later on, and fourth was Peterborough—who were relegated!

EARLY PACE SETTERS

Having said that, I concede that Millwall have a "Watford" look about them after the early matches, and could stay at the top all season.

However, Rotherham, Oxford and Grimsby of the first five will not, in my opinion, be involved come next March, and I don't fancy Blackpool that much either.

I would still put my cash on today's visitors Swindon, and last season's fourth club Gillingham (12th a year ago), and I may have to revise my thoughts on our city rivals, United, who have impressed me recently.

FLYING THE FLAG

Finally, I'm sure everyone here will wish our local rivals Chesterfield the best of luck when they carry the Third Division flag against Liverpool in the League Cup at Anfield on Tuesday. Manager Arthur Cox always preaches the simple approach—"The way Liverpool do it"—to his players as they prepare for any match.

This time they'll be able to watch Liverpool's style at close quarters and, win or lose, theyre bound to at least pick up a few tips.

... AND TODAY'S VISITORS

Swindon just missed out on promotion to Division Two last season, failing by three points after faltering on the run-in. Subsequently they started this season among the favourites to go up and their opening results suggest they mean business once again.

Their midweek win over Chester gave Bobby Smith's side nine points from seven games and put them on the heels of the leaders.

The area in which Swindon will need to tighten up this season is their vulnerability away from home. They scored the most home wins—17—of all the Third Division teams last time, but lost ten away matches, and ultimately this cost them promotion.

Two of those away defeats came in their last two games when they needed to pick up at least three points. The first was here when goals from Brian Hornsby and Ian Nimmo gave Wednesday a 2-1 win and then Blackpool dealt them a 5-2 thrashing in the last match.

Swindon's two away reverses this season have, incidentally, both been suffered in South Yorkshire—at Bramall Lane on the opening day of the season when United won 2-1, and at Rotherham where the Millers gave them a comprehensive 3-0 beating.



Obviously we hope the trend continues today, but with Andy Rowland and Alan Mayes in goal-scoring form it will be no easy task.

JIMMY ALLAN

Inverness-born Jimmy made his début in 1971 and has since clocked up almost 200 League games, sharing goalkeeping with Chris Ogden last season.

CHRIS OGDEN

Signed from Oldham in August, 1978, and played in 22 of the opening 23 games last season, after 128 League appearances for the Lancashire club.

JOHN TEMPLEMAN

Close-season signing from Exeter, where he missed only two matches last season, full-back John began his career at Brighton, and is on course to complete 500 League appearances before the end of next season.

BILLY TUCKER

Central defender signed from Bobby Smith's former club Bury. Made 135 League appearances for his first club Hereford, and a further 96 at Bury. Replaced Steve Aizlewood, who joined Portsmouth for £45,000 during the summer.

KEN STROUD

Centre-back or midfield player who recorded his 200th League game for Swindon in the final match of last season. London-born Ken made his League début in 1971-72.

ANDY FORD

Minehead-born Andy played in all 46 League matches last season, wearing the No. 3 shirt throughout. Started with Bournemouth, but did not play League football until he joined Southend in 1972, subsequently making 135 appearances. Signed two seasons ago as a replacement for long-serving John Trollope.

RAY MCHALE

Sheffield-born midfielder Ray started his career at Chesterfield, and had a spell at Halifax before joining Swindon. One of three ever-presents in the side last term.

IAN MILLER

Perth-born lan was a favourite with Doncaster Rovers until his flying runs along both wings at Belle Vue caught Swindon's attention in the 1978 close season. Not a regular scorer but provides a fine service for his central strikers.

ROY CARTER

Played his first League football with Hereford in 1975 after signing from Cornish club Falmouth. Joined Swindon in December, 1977, and did not miss a match in midfield last season.

ANDY ROWLAND

Cost £85,000 of the £165,000 Bobby Smith spent on improving his strike-force last season when he moved from Bury in September last year. Scored 14 goal last season after topping Bury's scoring list the previous two campaigns.

ALAN MAYES

Cost £80,000 from Watford in February this year and scored 11 goals in only 21 games at the end of last season, hitting a hat-trick at Rotherham on his début. Had added a further six goals in League and League Cup by last Saturday.

BRIAN WILLIAMS

Midfield player sold by Bobby Smith from Bury to Q.P.R. in 1977 and then bought back for Swindon a year later. Manchester-born Brian will be hoping to complete 200 League games by the end of this season.

CHRIS KAMARA

Middlesbrough-born midfielder Chris is on Swindon's transfer list after two years and over 60 games but that did not stop him scoring the winner when coming on as substitute against Chesterfield last Saturday.



Brian Cox

Brian Cox could have been excused for feeling nervous when manager Jack Charlton told him he was in the first team to face the "millionaire" line-up of Manchester City in the League Cup. After all, he had seen five goals sail past him in his previous Central League match. A daunting task for an 18-year-old, but Brian took it all in his stride.

"I didn't feel particularly nervous at all", says Brian. "I've always been quite confident in my own ability. I've been a goalkeeper for as long as I have been playing football. There's never been anything else for me, and so I convinced myself that if I just played my natural game everything would be fine". Fine it certainly was. He could not be faulted for the Colin Viljoen goal he conceded at Hillsborough—a swerving free-kick which was over the line before Brian had a chance to see it—and he went on to turn in an impressive display in the second leg at Maine Road


second leg at Maine Road.
"That was obviously my biggest game so far, and I really enjoyed it. It was a pleasing personal performance".
The City games apart, Brian's most pleasing moment of his first-team spell to date was his penalty save against Brentford two weeks ago.

"I decided to dive to the left and I was right", he says. "But the funny thing is I had a word with the lad who took the kick—Steve Phillips—after the game and he told me he usually hits them the other way!"

Brian's first associations with Wednesday were as a 14-year-old when George McCabe spotted him playing Sunday League football. He started to train at Hillsborough, graduated to the Middlewood Rovers nursery side and signed as an apprentice when he was 16.

Last season was his first as a Central League player, and he had four first-team games in October when Bob Bolder broke his arm and Chris Turner was on loan to Lincoln.

His ambitions? "Just to improve and get on in the game for the moment, but ultimately, of course, to play as an international".





Bond again distinguished himself, saving well from a Fleming volley and then a near post save thwarted King after the Owls number 11 had showed up well on the right.

On the half-hour, Wednesday's tale of woe at home continued when Brentford went ahead with a goal that had more than a suspicion of offside about it, but the Owls' protests were in vain.

Shortly before the interval a fine run by Curran very nearly produced the equaliser, Fleming just failing to force the ball home. As against Blackburn in the previous home game, the killer goal came in the 51st minute Brentford finding the defence flat-footed to go two up.

This goal demoralised Wednesday and for a long spell they fell away although defenders Grant and Smith did go near. Focus on Facts

Wednesday's Winning Doubles

Two home wins against Blackpool and Rotherham towards the end of last season brought our only "doubles" of that campaign, but beating any opponent both home and away is never easy at any level.

Since the resumption of League soccer in 1946 we have recorded a total of 77 League "doubles" —and one in both the major English cup competitions as well as one in the Inter-Cities Fairs Cup (now known as the UEFA Cup).

The breakdown reads:

1st Div. 2nd Div. 3rd Div. FA Cup League Cup Fairs Cup Total 37 31 9 1 1 1 80

Those eighty occasions involve 47 clubs—and two of the clubs account for twelve between them: Blackpool and West Brom. have each been on the receiving end six times. Blackpool figure in two unique aspects of these "doubles". In the early 'sixties we triumphed in all six meetings of three consecutive seasons (though a pair of wins this season against Rotherham would equal that record) and Blackpool is the only club we have scored "doubles" over in all three divisions we have played in.

Away wins do not guarantee "doubles", of course—as struggling Lincoln showed last year against us. But our only away successes in 1977-78 gave us two maximums over Rotherham and Hereford.

In 1971-72 our two away wins secured a four-point success over Orient—thanks largely to Brian Joicey netting five goals out of the six we scored. A year later Brian chipped in with another five to ensure two maximum returns from three away wins.

Way back in 1954-55 we were faced with relegation from the First and could only manage seven home wins and one away—but that solitary win at West Brom. was enough for a "double".

The best year for "doubles' was the promotion year of 1958-59 with eight, and two years later we claimed seven maximums in eight First Division away wins. That year we missed out on a "treble" when Burnley drew 0-0 here in a Cup match, but in the year we reached Wembley we beat Blackburn 2-1 in our two League games and won by the same score in the 6th round tie at Ewood Park.

And that FA Cup "double"? That was in 1945-46 when all Cup matches up to the semi's were decided on a home and away basis, with York being beaten 5-1 here and 6-1 on their own ground!
