# TOWN THROUGH TIME—Goalkeepers-part eight

SAM BURTON's first extended run in the League side was brought to a halt when he was dealt a nasty blow in a home game with Bournemouth in April 1949. Just six minutes were left when he stooped for a low ball in a crowded goalmouth and for his troubles, collected a badly lacerated hand - which, on closer examination, revealed a compound fracture of a finger bone. This prevented the former Bevin boy from taking part in the remaining six fixtures of the season, FRANK BOULTON thus saw further duty and conceded just two goals in the process. By the following August, although Sam was fully fit, Boulton was preferred. But Frank's career with Swindon was to come to a shattering close in less than three months. The scene was Meadow Lane in Nottingham, where 37, 121 had filed through the gates for the Town's visit. County had led from the 30th minute when Boulton was beaten from the spot by former England leader Tommy Lawton. Seven minutes into the second half the two again confronted each other, but at rather closer quarters - with the result that the Swindon keeper was stretchered off the field with a dislocated ankle. With Boulton prostrate on the floor centre-half Jimmy Ithell was forced to manipulate the ball with his hand to keep it out of the net - so with their keeper en route to hospital, the Town now faced a second penalty. Full-back Albert Young, having taken over, succeeded in pushing Lawton's second kick onto a post - but the centre-forward followed up to tap home the rebound and Swindon eventually came away 0-3 losers. The loss of Frank Boulton posed quite a problem for, with Doug Rylands on forces duty overseas, there was now no cover for Sam Burton. This was soon rectified when NORMAN UPRICHARD was secured from Arsenal. The Londoners had brought him across the Irish Sea from the Distillery club of Belfast and had given the Town followers a chance to eye him up in a friendly here during the previous February. Uprichard (pronounced U-pritchard) made his County Ground debut in a Christmas Eve tussle with Torquay, but after a crushing 0-5 home defeat by Nottingham Forest he was rested in favour of Burton, Sam had the job to himself for virtually the whole of 1950, until the Irishman reappeared on Boxing Day - when again the Devon side provided the opposition. Norman had been back for just a dozen games when misfortune struck him at Home Park, Swindon led by a Garth Hudson penalty when the keeper was laid low with an



injury to the ribs a few minutes before the interval. Those few minutes were all Maurice Tadman needed to put Argyle on level terms. Uprichard continued as a passenger on the rightwing for some time after the change round while his replacement, Jack Froxton, fished the ball out of the net on four further occasions. In the meantime, Frank Boulton, now recovered had led a possee of Swindon players to Bedford Town - Joe Simner and also Eddie Painter subsequently turning out for the Southern Leaguers. In Belfast Norman Uprichard was called upon to serve his country - making his debut against Scotland in October 1951. After that he kept Sam Burton out of the first team spot at the County Ground for almost a year, until Ireland sent for him again. Those twelve months were not entirely without incident for the Irishman inspired the Town to a nine-game F.A. Cup run which brought in much-needed pennies. On the debit side, Swindon crashed to a 0-9 defeat (their worst-ever in the League) in March 1952. Uprichard was lost with concussion in the first half and the Town needed three keepers in total to get through the ninety minutes at Torquay, Norman received a rap on the back of the head in a mid-air collision with Tommy Northcott and Harry Kaye, Swindon's right-half, kept the keeper's shirt warm while he was off the field dazed. The international returned momentarily - but retired with double vision with the score at 0-4. Left -back Harry May completed the trio.

We will try and keep you informed as often as we can of the home fixtures in these Leagues but unfortunately the fixtures are often rearranged to suit both clubs at a late hour. Our next Midland Youth League fixture is away to Luton on Thursday, 25th October and the next home fixture is arranged against the Wolves on Thursday, 1st November, kick off 2.0 p.m. on the Shrivenham Road Ground.

On Tuesday last we took a fully representative team to play against a Trowbridge Town side, this game was arranged to help the Memorial Fund as a token of our respect for the late Police Constable Desmond Kellam who gave his life helping to protect our interests whilst on duty in Trowbridge. The public responded very well and the game attracted a crowd of nearly two thousand people and the fund benefited by over a thousand pounds I am told. Our coach firm, Barnes Travel from Aldbourne generously gave their services for this cause and we were delighted to pass their donation of £50 over to the fund. Professional footballers sometimes get accused of being mercenary but our lads were only too pleased to give their services to such a worthy cause and this we have always found with the players at Swindon. The Trowbridge team included in their side several senior professional players including Terry Paine, the former Southampton International, Bobby Gould of West Ham now with Hereford, Colin Tavener of Hereford and Mick Dennehy of

Bristol Rovers. Vince Stroud, brother of our Kenny Stroud and Roger Smart who will be well remembered at Swindon also played. An entertaining game resulted in a win for us 4-1 and we made several changes at half time to include several of our young players. The officials, who gave their services also free of charge were Police Sergeant David Letts of Basingstoke, a League Referee who officiated here at the County Ground a few weeks ago with Police Constable Barry Weston from Bristol and Police Constable David Grey from Churchdown officiating on the lines.

This week we have been selling Cup Tie Tickets for the game at Wimbledon and you will no doubt be surprised by the charge of £2, £3, £4 and £5 for the seats. We at the County Ground keep our charges as low as possible but on such occasions as this at Wimbledon it brings to ones notice the ever increasing costs. This game is not all ticket although with only a seat capacity of two and a half thousand, all seats will be sold.

Their normal attendance of four to five thousand leave room for another ten thousand on their terraces and they are selling ground tickets to try and allocate visitors to separate areas from the home supporters.

Millwall earned their first away win of the season at Oxford with first-half goals from John Mitchell and Phil Coleman. Joe Cooke made a last-minute reply for United but it came too late to save the home side a point.

It was an unhappy ending for Chester playermanager Alan Oakes in his 700th League games at Exeter. Although City's Steve Neville missed a 68th minute penalty, top scorer Keith Bowker popped up seven minutes later to give the Devon side both points.

Alan Cork's brace against the Town last weekend doubled his goal count for the season. He had not scored since the Don's opening League game with Chester on August 18.

Rotherham slipped from the top of the table with home defeat against the two Sheffield clubs in consecutive weeks. But gates of 20,355 (for United and just under nineteen thousand have more than doubled the figures for the Millers

first five home games. Richard Finney, currently on eight goals, has just scored in each of Rother-ham's last five matches.

Another man to score in five consecutive games recently was, of course, Alan Mayes. He is the first Town man to achieve this feat since Peter Eastoe almost five years ago.

Brentford registered their biggest League score away from home for just over two years - and still lost at Blackpool!-With less than ten minutes to go, the score stood at 3-3 - but Tony Kellow and Derek Spence netted for the Seasiders before Jim McNichol's last-minute effort made it 5-4.

Plymouth fell to their seventh consecutive away League defeat at Blackburn when Noel Brotherston got Rovers' only goal six minutes from time. Argyle have managed just two points from sixteen trips since last winning - here at the County Ground last January!

# Southend slip after great start

Southend United made one of their best-ever starts to a season by winning their opening five League and Cup games --- in spite of the fact that the entire club was disrupted by a bout of food poisoning on the eve of the big kick-off!

Indeed, the Football League agreed to postpone their first game to enable the players to recover. But the Shrimpers showed absolutely no illeffects as they defeated Brentford 2-1 at home and 4-1 away in the League Cup and then set up League victories over Carlisle (1-0 home), and Wimbledon (1-0 away).

Southend then won a League Cup tie away to First Division Bolton (2-1) before suffering their first reverse — at home to Rotherham (0-2).

Though they subsequently put up some fine performances in the League Cup — taking West Ham to a third game before losing in the third round — they slumped dramatically in the Third Division. They come to the County Ground today with only one win in their last eight League games. That was at home to Plymouth (4-1) in mid-September. They haven't won away in the League since their success at Wimbledon in their first away game. Subsequent away results have gone: Blackburn (1-1), Reading (1-1), Brentford (0-2) and Bury (1-1).

Southend returned to the Third Division last season, following a two-year spell in the Fourth, and once they had found their feet the Shrimpers moved into top gear by November. For some weeks they kept on the fringe of the promotion group and, thus encouraged, manager David Smith invested a total of £100,000 in two players — defender Mike Stead, from Tottenham, and midfield Anton Otulokowski, from West Ham.

Stead made more than a dozen appearances in Tottenham's League eleven and was loaned to Swansea City in 1976/77. Otulokowski first made an impression with Barnsley and the Hammers paid £60,000 for him in 1977. He didn't get many first-team opportunities at Upton Park, however, and he was happy to make a fresh start with Southend.

Southend moved into late April on an unbeaten run of 11 matches. Then came their slump .... and a drop into the final middle-ofthe-table position.

Stead now plays in the middle of Southend's defence, alongside Steve Yates, with Phil Dudley and Alan Moody filling the full-back positions. When Yates was unavailable, John Walker came into the middle.

Yates played First Division football for Leicester, making his first appearance as substitute in 1973/74. He never quite made it as a regular at Filbert Street, though, but has thrived since signing for Southend two seasons ago.

Dudley came through from the junior teams to make his senior bow two seasons ago. Moody won England schoolboy caps and his first club was Middlesbrough. He played his first League soccer with the Borough in 1968/69 and completed some 50 games in their first-team. He joined Southend in 1972 and has been a permanent member of their defence since.

Walker made his initial appearance in the Southend side as substitute in 1977/78 and is not yet a regular senior player.

Goalkeeper Mervyn Cawston was usually the second choice in his Norwich days and he was previously with Southend on loan in 1974/75. He also spent loan periods with Leicester, Newport and Gillingham before leaving Carrow Road to join Chicago Stings in 1977. Southend paid £20,000 for him last season.

Midfield players are usually Otulokowski, David Cusack and Terry Gray.

Cusack got his chance in League soccer with Sheffield Wednesday in 1975/76 and made more than 100 senior appearances for the Owls before his transfer to Southend last season. Gray, a summer signing from Huddersfield, was once with Chelsea as a schoolboy. Huddersfield gave him his professional chance and he was their top scorer with 19 goals in 1975/76. Then a broken leg interrupted his career.

Colin Morris, Micky Tuohy and Ron Pountney will probably form the attack.

Morris, currently top scorer with six goals, has been the subject of transfer speculation in recent weeks. He played several League games for Burnley prior to his 1976 transfer to Southend. He scored 13 goals in 1977/78 and added seven more last season.

Southend paid non-League Redditch £15,000 for Tuohy this summer and he celebrated his first League game for them by scoring the winning goal against Carlisle. He was previously with Walsall and has now scored five times for Southend.

Pountney made his League bow for Walsall in 1972/73 but spent the following season with Port Vale. Southend signed him in 1974 and he has scored three goals for them this season.

# SOCCER SCENE by Tony Pullein

Though Alan Mayes has not scored in any of our last three games, he is still only one behind the country's leading scorer. Indeed, but for a fantastic recent scoring burst by Southampton's Phil Boyer, Alan would still have been level top.

Boyer scored hat-tricks for the Saints in successive home games against Derby and Crystal Palace and his goal last Saturday in their shock 2-3 home defeat by Coventry took his total to 12. Coventry had previously lost all their away games this season and Southampton's defeat can only have been put down to complacency.

Now that they have completed the signing of England centre-back Dave Watson --- from West German club Werder Breman for £200,000 -the Saints can be expected to maintain their Championship challenge. Watson is expected to make his debut for Southampton at West Bromwich today.

Southampton now have three proven goalscorers in Boyer, Mike Channon and Charlie George and with the skills of Steve Williams and drive of Alan Ball in midfield they certainly have a very impressive all-round team.

Yet manager Lawrie McMenemy is realistic enough to appreciate that his side cannot yet match the likes of Liverpool and Forest and concedes that his major hope is to finish high enough to earn a place in Europe next season.

"Our main problem is when we have two or three players injured," he said. "Don't misunderstand me --- we have some very good players in the reserves who will do a good job but it's not the same as having about 14 or 15 internationals on your books as clubs like Liverpool have. Their sort of situation also keeps the pressure on the players currently in the first-team."

Derby County have already used 22 players in their first-team this season. Manager Colin Addison's latest recruit is centre-back Keith Osgood, a £150,000 signing from Coventry. He went into the side as replacement for the injured Roy McFarland. Osgood's Derby debut corresponded with the club's best win of the season -- 4-0 at home to Bolton in a game in which Paul Emson, making his first appearance of the season, scored two goals.

This has been a season of contrasting fortunes for Crystal Palace forward Ian Walsh. He lost his place in the Palace side when they signed Mike Flanagan during the summer but he has still managed to hold his place in the Wales' team. Over the first couple of months of the season, lan didn't make one full appearance for

Palace and, though he was actually on the field for little more than an hour on some occasions as substitute, he still managed to score three goals. One of his most vital was the equaliser in their home encounter with Tottenham.

Portsmouth's unbeaten record finally came to grief at Torquay where they went down 1-2 but, before that, they set up a new record for Fourth Division football. Since the Fourth Division was founded 21 years ago, only Mansfield (in 1972/73) and Wimbledon (last season) had managed to take 19 points from their opening 11 games. Pompey went one better with 20 points from 11 matches and then went down in their next match.
