All the rain had left the pitch dead and it was indeed difficult to get any pace on the ball. Our game is about passing and movement and the condition certainly didn't help.

The replay saw us make far too many mistakes. In fact, Wimbledon must have thought that Christmas had come early. We had enjoyed the majority of the ball at the start of the game when we needlessly gave away a corner that resulted in their first goal. Danny Westwood and Ken Price combined to immediately get us an equaliser. Again, we held the upper hand only to give away an unnecessary free kick on the edge of the box from which they scored their second goal. Two goals to one down at half time we badly wanted an early goal to make it anyone's game especially as we had the advantage of the

The only consolation is that it wasn't two points thrown away but I know how supporters look forward to a run in the Cup. To be realistic, we never had a chance of winning the F.A. Cup but we have a chance of getting promotion. I don't think anyone can look at Division Three and name, with any certainty, the teams that will go up. Cup matches for a Third Division side can only bring glamour and money but on the debit side it can also give injuries and suspensions. I feel sure a side involved in Cup ties can often forget their first priority - the League.

Today's game with Swindon is of course vital, two points for us bring us nearer our realisation of Division Two football; there is, however, a long way to go. It will, today, be a hard fought affair but I hope players and spectators will concentrate on today's game and forget the problems that we had last season. Our supporters must make the home advantage tell for us and so must my players.

The pre-season tips for promotion this season where undoubtedly looking at last season's final League table. Whereas Gillingham had their admirers, Swindon Town were reckoned the team that everybody had to beat.

With the seasons programme nearly halfway through, Swindon are looking good bets to make sure that nobody has any doubts about their potential.

Not only are they looking good in the League, but they have also reached the last eight of the League Cup and last Saturday clinically disposed of Brentford in the F.A. Cup.

Swindon's team this afternoon will be selected from the following:-

Steve Abbley (Forward). A young winger who will challenge for a place in the first team this season, but he had not made his debut at the beginning of the season.

Jimmy Allan (Goalkeeper). Born Inverness, was signed from Scottish Non-League football in October 1970. Although he made his debut in September 1971, he had to wait for a first team place. Had made 183 League appearances to the end of the last season.

Chick Bates (Forward). A native of West Bromwich. Started his League career with Shrewsbury Town in 1974. Signed for Swindon in January 1978 and had made 52 appearances to the end of last season.

Roy Carter (Midfield). The 1979 'Player of the Year' at Swindon. Born at Torpoint, Cornwall. Signed for Swindon in December 1977 and had made 66 appearances to the end of last season.

Andy Ford (Defender). From Minehead. He signed for Swindon during the 1977 close season and had made 74 League appearances to the end of last season.

Paul Gilchrist (Forward). A native of Dartford. Played for Southampton with whom he won an F.A. Cup Winners Medal in 1976. In September 1976, he moved to Swindon on a free-transfer. He made 15 League appearances last season.

Bryan Hamilton (Midfield). From Belfast, he is a Northern Ireland International with 46 caps to his credit, his first English Club was Ipswich from where he was transferred to Everton and Millwall before a move to Swindon as player-coach in November 1978.

Chris Kamara (Midfield) comes from Middlesbrough. Transferred to Swindon in the summer of 1977 after 56 League appearances for Portsmouth. Has since made 74 more for the Wiltshire Club. He usually plays on the right hand side of midfield, but can also operate on the wing.

Russell Lewis (Defender). From Wales, he was signed from Welsh League football in the early part of the 1975/76 season.

Ray McHale (Midfield). A native of Sheffield he made his League debut for Chesterfield in the 1971/72 season. He signed for Swindon in September, 1976, and had made 130 appearances in the League to the end of last season. He usually plays in the centre of midfield.

Alan Mayes (Forward). From London. Signed for Swindon in February 1979. He played 22 games for Swindon last season and had the unusual distinction of scoring a hat trick on his debut in a game at Rotherham. A mobile player who normally operates beside the centreforward.

Ian Miller (Forward). From Perth, signed for Doncaster in August 1975 and had a regular first team place before his transfer to Swindon in the summer of 1978.

Chris Ogden (Goalkeeper). Chris comes from Oldham and made 128 League appearances for Oldham Athletic. Signed for Swindon in August 1978. Played 22 League games last season.

Kevin Roberts (Goalkeeper). From Bristol. Joined Swindon in March 1977. He has made 3 first team appearances.

Andy Rowland (Forward). From Derby. Made 166 League appearances for Bury in the 1973/74 season before his move to Swindon in September 1978. A strong tradidional centre forward.

Ken Stroud (Defender). Originally from London Ken is one of the longest serving players at the Club having joined from school. He signed professional in 1970 and made his League debut in 1971/72 season. He had played 200 League games to the end of last season, many of them in midfield, although more

recently he has settled into his favourite position playing beside the centre half in the middle of the defence.

John Templeman (Defender). Comes from Yarton, Sussex. Made his League debut for Brighton in the 1966/67 season. He was a member of the side which won promotion to the Second Division in the 1971/72. Signed for Swindon in the 1979 close season.

Billy Tucker (Defender). From Hereford he played at Hereford United until they eventually reached the Second Division. He moved to Bury in December 1976 before moving to Swindon in June 1979.

Brian Williams (Midfield). Another of Swindon's former Bury players. He signed for Swindon in the 1978 close season and made 23 League appearances last season, very competitive player.

Poor Oxford United must be sick and tired of their form in F.A. Cup ties in recent years - in fact United have not progressed into the Second Round since 1972. Two seasons ago, the "U's" travelled to Southern League Nuneaton and crashed 2-0. Last season, they were again drawn away, this time at Colchester and, despite twice being a goal in front, succumbed to intense pressure finally losing 4-2. Last week, Oxford were again away in the first Round tie. This time the opposition were Isthmian League Champions Barking who were so confident of beating their Third Division rivals that they didn't even bother to have Oxford watched. United were only eight minutes away from forcing a replay when Tony Brothers scored the only goal of the game to give Barking the chance of further Cup glory - and Oxford yet anoth Cup headache.

Reading goal-blitz

Reading were given a good opportunity to atone for their recent 7-1 drubbing by Chesterfield when drawn at home to Alliance League side Kettering in the First Round of the F.A. Cup. Obviously, the Royals defence was still suffering the effects of such a mauling as Peter Phipps put the visitors in front after just nine minutes. Although Reading equalized after 18 minutes (Mike Kearney) it was Phipps who scored his second just a minute later to give Kettering a 2-1 lead at half time. In the second half it was a different story as Reading blitzed their way into the draw for the Second Round with three goals in just four minutes. Firstly Ollie Kearns scored after 54 minutes, then Kearney grabbed his second a minute later and then Gary Heale made it safe at 4-2 after 58 minutes.

Ouick to score

It was quite surprising to note just how many Division Three sides virtually sealed a Second Round place by scoring early goals in last week's F.A. Cup ties. Mansfield's John McClelland scored after nine minutes to cut short Blyth Spartans Cup-run with Russ Allen making sure after 36 minutes. Second-half goals by Speight and Matthews followed John McPhail's third-minute header as Sheffield United comfortably disposed of Burscough. Bury's Craig Madden took just 51 seconds to put his side into the lead away to Burton Albion - Paul Hilton making it safe at 2-0 just 19 minutes later. Henderson scored the quickest goal of the day after only 38 seconds as Chester romped home 5-1 against Working-

ton. Blackburn Rovers' Paul Round scored his first goal of the season (3 mins.) and Joe Craig added number two as Rovers moved comfortably into the next round at Kidderminster. Mark Smith was once again 'spot-on' as he successfully converted his sixth consecutive penalty after six minutes at home to Lincoln City, further goals from close-season signings Jeff King (formerly from Walsall) and Andy McCullough (ex-Brentford) giving the Owls a welldeserved 3-0 win, Ian Miller scored twice as today's opponents Swindon ripped Brentford's defence apart in the first 45 minutes. Miller's first goal was after just five minutes, with his second coming seven minutes before the interval. In between Chris Kamara (21 minutes) and Roy Carter (25 minutes) completed the rout before the Bees had realized what had hit them. Dennis Smith getting some respectability to the scoreline with his sides only goal after 59 minutes.



F.A. Cup First Round

Coming so quickly after a drab goalless match at Priestfield, the supporters were treated to six goals and plenty of excitement before 4612 spectators at Plough Lane.

The home side went in front after fourteen minutes when John Leslie rose above the Gills defence to head home. Gillingham replied immediately with a spectacular bicycle kick from Ken Price, following a cross from Danny Westwood on the right.

The home side regained the lead after twenty five minutes when Charlie Young was adjudged to have pushed a Wimbledon player on the edge of the box. From the resultant free kick the ball was touched on by Mark Dziadulewicz to Ray Lewington and Steve Parsons hammered the left foot shot into the net.

In the sixty seventh minute the Gillingham cause took another step back when Micky Barker was caught in possession on the left, the ball winner, Dziadulewicz curved the shot around the advancing Ron Hillyard into the net. Wimbledon went further in front in the eighty fourth minute when John Leslie finished a move that was brought about by John Overton losing possession just inside the Gillingham half. Ken Price notched his second goal five minutes from time when he outpace the Wimbledon defence to score with his left foot.

ROYAL AIRFORCE POLICEDOG DEMONSTRATION TEAM

We welcome today The Royal Air Force Police Dog Demonstration Team from R.A.F. Newton in Nottinghamshire. Almost every weekend throughout the football season they are to be seen performing on a league ground somewhere in England.

Strong, robust, intelligent, adaptable to training and to climatic conditions, loyal, faithful and dependable — in a word, the Alsatian.

Basically, a German sheep-dog, an Alsatian can be used as tracker, hunter, guard, guide for a blind person, or be trained to the gun. But his most famous role in this country is that a police-dog, especially with the Royal Air Force Police.

The appearances of the RAF Police Dog Demonstration teams at the Royal Tournament and at various shows throughout Britain are well known, but the precision of obedience work and the amusing tricks they perform do belie the immense contribution they make to the security of the Royal Air Force.

Night after night, in all weathers, the lone handler and his dog patrol airfields and important installations. The dog is trained to scent the intruder on the wind. However, much we might resent the suggestion that we smell, if the dog could speak he would tell us that we all smell differently; to him that scent is as good as a fingerprint is to a detective. The handler is trained to "read" his dog so that he can tell instantly when the animal has made a "pick-up". Thereafter, he will set the dog to follow the scent and will "run-in" with his dog.



All the dogs received into the Royal Air Force are gifts from the public, and since dogs were first introduced into the Service in 1941 many thousands of Alsatians have been accepted and trained. Dogs are eligible for acceptance provided that they are over fifteen months old and have the right physique and temperament for the exacting training they will be required to undergo. Specialists from the RAF Police Depot will examine the dog and any relevant papers, and if the dog is acceptable, will take him there and them.

The new recruit, just like his human counterpart, will find things strange at first in his new surroundings. For a short period, he will be 'quarantined' and looked after by devoted kennelmaids. He will then be moved to the training kennel "ranges" and be teamed up with a handler returning, perhaps, from overseas, or a new recruit like himself. Considerable care is taken in matching the handler with the dog, as it is important that the team be psychologically "attuned" to each other.


