






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### SECOND ATTEMPT

This evening we make a second attempt to qualify for the Fifth Round of the F.A. Cup, and after Saturday's hard-fought contest against SWINDON TOWN at the County Ground, we have every reason to anticipate another entertaining match of high quality.

Swindon have never played us here in the past in the Football League or in major Cup competition. The occasion therefore has an air of novelty, and we extend the warmest of welcomes to our rivals from Wiltshire.

Despite the difference in our divisional status, the goalless draw was a satisfactory result from our point of view. We had no illusions about the

severity of the task facing us at Swindon.

The fate of other First Division clubs at Swindon this season was warning enough. In the League Cup defeat was meted out to Stoke City and Arsenal, and only last week Wolverhampton Wanderers lost the first leg of their semi-final tie at the County Ground. Swindon can also point to a highly creditable performance in winning 2-0 on the ground of Luton Town, who are having a good season in the Second Division, in the third round of the F.A. Cup.

### PRESTIGE

We therefore knew we were visiting a club that has this season struck a big blow for the prestige of Third Division football.

The outcome was a match that never slackened in interest from the first whistle, although on goalscoring chances, we felt Spurs should have won. Swindon were quick to demonstrate their mood of determination, and threatened us in the opening minutes.

Spurs then came into the attacking picture, and Jimmy Allan, Swindon's goalkeeper, did well to block a short-range shot by Gerry Armstrong with his feet. Allan then did well to save from Ricky Villa following a corner.

Allan was the busier of the two goalkeepers, and before half-time, he touched over the bar dropping shots from both Terry Naylor and Glenn Hoddle. Naylor, called in to replace Don McAllister, who was under a one-match suspension, was playing his first senior match of the season.

### SPURS APPLY PRESSURE

It had been a fairly even first half, but after the interval, Spurs applied more pressure. It was during the early part of the second half that we felt we should have snatched the goal that could have made tonight's replay unnecessary.

Armstrong headed only narrowly wide from a cross by Hoddle out on the left, and a few minutes later Paul Miller went close. With Spurs continuing to press, Allan did well to save a low, hard shot from Terry Yorath, but Barry Daines in our goal was not idle. He saved the situation when Brian Williams broke away menacingly on the left, and in the closing minutes turned a dangerous long shot by Kenny Stroud aside for a corner.

Between those two saves, Armstrong had headed wide following a good move down the right by Yorath and Hoddle.

All in all, it was a good draw, and we left Swindon with the utmost respect for our visitors tonight. The winners of tonight's replay will be at home to Birmingham City in the 5th Round.

Swindon's team on Saturday was Allan; Lewis, Stroud, McHale, Tucker, Carter, Miller, Kamara, Rowland, Mayes and Williams. Spurs'

line-up is shown on page 12.

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## SPURS MEWS

### DRAWING HABIT . . .

A draw in the F.A. Cup has become quite a habit for Spurs. A replay was necessary before we accounted for Manchester United in this season's third round, and tonight we make a second attempt to dispose of Swindon Town.

Last season we reached the sixth round, a feat necessitating the defeat of three opposing clubs. We needed replays against both Altrincham and Wrexham in the opening rounds, and our own defeat, at the hands of Manchester United, was only in the second match.

In the previous season our only tie in the F.A. Cup involved us in a replay at Bolton.

It's high time we won a match in the F.A. Cup on this ground. The last occasion was in the fourth round in 1972, when goals by ALAN GILZEAN and MARTIN PETERS gave us a 2-0 win over Rotherham United.

### FOUR AWAY . . .

This evening we play a home match after fulfilling four fixtures in succession on opponents' grounds.

Our F.A. Cup replay on Manchester United's ground was followed by League visits to Manchester City and Brighton, and the further Cup match at Swindon on Saturday.

It was the first time we had been called upon to play away in four successive matches in senior competition since December, 1971. In the space of twelve days before Christmas that year, we squeezed a U.E.F.A. Cup visit to Rapid Bucarest between away League matches at Leicester and Liverpool, and then played a first leg of the League Cup semi-final away to Chelsea.

### ANOTHER LANDMARK . . .

Providing he is in his usual place, tonight's match marks another career milestone for STEVE PERRYMAN.

Our skipper will be making his 200th successive appearance in League and Cup competition. He has been ever-present since missing a League match away to Sheffield United in December, 1975.

His 199 successive senior appearances prior to tonight's replay comprise 174 League matches plus 15 in the F.A. Cup and 10 in the League Cup.

CONGRATULATIONS, STEVE.

### YOUTH CUP . . .

We have been drawn at home to WATFORD in Round 4 of the F.A. Youth Cup and this match will be played here at White Hart Lane next Tuesday evening, 5th February, kick-off 7.30 p.m.

### DAVE LISTER . . .

Since the appointment of Robin Stepney to our full-time scouting staff earlier this season, the supervision of our junior team has been in the hands of DAVE LISTER, who also spends two evenings here each week in a coaching capacity.

Although Dave's is a "back-room" job, it is vital to the development of our young players, and therefore the long-term interests of the Club.

Dave was born at Hartlepool but was brought up in the Lowestoft area. He returned to the north-east, where he took up a teaching post in Newcastle-upon-Tyne, and played as a full-back for both Durham City and Cramlington.

Dave, who is a fully-qualified F.A. coach, now lives at South Woodford and is Physical Education Adviser with the London Borough of Waltham Forest. He has had extensive coaching experience with the Essex County and Waltham Forest Boys teams.

### FOUR FOR BROOKE . . .

GARRY BROOKE scored all our goals in the 4-3 win by the Reserves over Oxford United here last Wednesday evening. It was the first time a Spurs player had scored four in a match at League or Combination level since COLIN LEE'S feat against Bristol Rovers in the Second Division in October, 1977.

The last player to score four in a Combination match for us was MARTIN ROBINSON in a 6-0 home win over Bristol Rovers — that's a coincidence! — in August, 1975.

### NEW DATE ...

Our home League match with WOLVERHAMPTON WANDERERS, postponed on New Year's Day owing to the unfit state of the ground, has been rearranged for Wednesday, April 23rd, kick-off 7.30 p.m.

### LEE'S TRANSFER . . .

As the programme for our last home League match had gone to press before the completion of Colin Lee's transfer, this is the first opportunity we have had to refer to his move to Chelsea.

We were sorry to lose his services but the prospect of joining Chelsea appealed to Colin. Regrettably, he felt that a section of our crowd was against him, and for this reason he would be better off with another club.

Colin joined Spurs from Torquay United in October, 1977, and will be remembered for his amazing debut, when he scored four goals in our 9-0 win over Bristol Rovers on this ground.

In all, including substitutions, Colin played in 71 League, League Cup and F.A. Cup matches for Spurs, scoring a total of 21 goals.

We wish him luck and will follow his progress at Chelsea with interest.

### SWINDON WERE WINNERS . . .

The only time Spurs and Swindon had ever previously met in the F.A. Cup prior to Saturday was in the old third round way back in 1910.

On that occasion Swindon, then in the Southern League, emerged winners on their own ground by 3-2. The great HAROLD FLEMING, their England inside-right, played a big part in the victory over Spurs, whose goals were scored by BILLY MINTER and BOBBY STEEL.

We guote from our following match programme -

"We are not going to begrudge Swindon their victory for no one could help but admire the splendid way in which they rallied after they looked like a beaten team. In this winter of varied weather, we have played on some wretched pitches but never one quite as bad as that of Swindon's last Saturday. It was ankle deep in mud in almost every part and water stood on it in pools. The ball played all manner of pranks, Sometimes when caught by the wind it travelled at a great speed but more often than not it stopped almost dead upon touching the surface. It was a most difficult matter to know how to gauge the passes."

### SEMI-FINAL HERE . . .

After knocking Spurs out of the Cup in 1910, Swindon went on to reach the semi-final, which was played here at White Hart Lane. A crowd of 33,000 saw Newcastle United defeat Swindon 2-0, and it's interesting to note, in the light of present-day custom, that Spurs played Sunderland here in a First Division match on the previous day, which was Good Friday!

### Looking Ahead

Qualifying for the fifth round of the F.A. Cup is the issue that occupies our attentions this evening. If we had managed to defeat Swindon at the County Ground on Saturday, we would now be in the happier position of knowing we were through to the last sixteen clubs in the knock-out competition, and with nothing more pressing on our minds this week than the visit of SOUTHAMPTON in the League on Saturday.

Instead, we face another tussle with Swindon, and we hope our players will finish off their task successfully. With the events of Saturday fresh in mind, they know the nature of the job ahead of them this evening.

### ATTRACTION

Keen as we are to do well in the Cup, we cannot afford any slips in the League. The match with Southampton on Saturday should prove a big attraction, and we have, of course, something to wipe off the slate.

When we visited the Saints last September, we were crushed 5-2. Southampton have therefore scored more goals against us in one match than we have conceded to any other club in the current campaign.

That result is warning enough, but their last away performance has, perhaps, even greater significance. They visited Liverpool and held the powerful Anfielders to a 1-1 draw, the home club saving a point only by a second-half penalty converted by Terry McDermott.

### WORTHY OF ATTENTION

The rest of Southampton's away record in the League is worthy of a little attention. Of the other twelve matches played, they have won three and drawn three. They defeated Manchester City 1-0, Middlesbrough 1-0 and Bristol City 1-0.

The three drawn games, apart from Liverpool, were on the grounds of Crystal Palace (0-0), Brighton and Hove Albion (0-0) and Wolverhampton Wanderers (0-0).

Their six away defeats were at Bolton (2-1), Aston Villa (3-0), West Bromwich (4-0), Manchester United (1-0), Norwich (2-1) and Ipswich (3-1).

Saturday's will be our twelfth home League match of the season. We had a bad start with a 3-1 defeat by Middlesbrough, but our home record soon improved with League wins over Manchester City and Brighton.

### **HELD TO DRAW**

We were then held to a draw by West Bromwich Albion, and that has proved to be the only home League match we have drawn this season. After the West Bromwich match, we won four home League matches on the trot against Norwich, Derby County, Nottingham Forest and Bolton.

Then came successive defeats at the hands of Manchester United and Aston Villa before we regained the winning path with that narrow win here over Stoke City on the last Saturday of December.

A win over the Saints on Saturday would therefore give us 17 points from the twelve home matches played.

Southampton's visit last season was scheduled originally for New Year's Day, but weather conditions caused a postponement. The game was rearranged for a Wednesday evening at the end of March, and it ended in a goalless draw.

It was a disappointing performance from Spurs that evening and we could not begrudge Southampton their point. The gate figure was 23,570.


### **RESERVES AWAY**

The Reserves were without a Football Combination match on Saturday, but this coming Saturday they will be away to Southampton.

We have won our last two away Combination matches, beating Leicester City 5-0 and Hereford United 4-1. A similar result from Saturday's visit to the Dell would further improve our Combination record.

When Southampton's reserves were here last September, the match ended in a goalless draw.

On Saturday Spurs Juniors play their first match away to Peterborough United in the South East Counties League, Division 2 Cup. The other club grouped with us in the qualifying section is Cambridge United.

The aircraft will be circling at 4,000 feet at 2.20 and the last two parachutists plan to arrive on the pitch at 2.40.

This is the first time this has been done here in London. It will be well worth watching.

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
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
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### OUR WISHTORS



### SWINDON'S CHIEF BOBBY SMITH has been Swindon's manager since May, 1978. Previously he was in charge of Port Vale and Bury.

A Manchester man, he started his playing career with Manchester United, and after five years at Old Trafford he wore the colours of Scunthorpe United, Grimsby Town, Brighton, Chester and Hartlepool.

A wing-half, he gained England honours at schoolboy and youth level.

### WELCOME

SWINDON TOWN have a great reputation as Cup-fighters, and after Saturday's draw at the County Ground, we know what we are up against this evening.

We need no reminder that Swindon knocked Arsenal out of the Football League Cup earlier this season after first holding our North London neighbours to a 1-1 draw at Highbury. Moreover, the goal that earned Swindon a replay in that tie was headed home by Billy Tucker in the 87th minute of the match, a fact not without significance if we are holding a narrow lead at a late stage tonight.

On Tuesday evening of last week Swindon further enhanced their reputation by defeating Wolverhampton Wanderers 2-1 in the home leg of their League Cup semi-final, and they therefore start the second leg next month with a goal advantage.

Arsenal's defeat was not their first by Swindon in the League Cup. Back in 1969 the two clubs met in the final of the competition at Wembley, and Swindon, then as now, a Third Division club, won by 3-1.

In the long ago Swindon made two appearances in the semi-finals of the F.A. Cup. The first occasion was in 1910, when after knocking us out in the old third round at Swindon, and defeating Manchester City in the next round, they lost 2-0 to Newcastle United, here at White Hart Lane.

Two years later Swindon reached the semi-finals a second time, when after a goalless draw at Chelsea, they lost 1-0 to Barnsley in a replay on Notts County's ground.

Swindon were then members of the Southern League, but it is obvious that in those early years of the century, they were as powerful as many clubs in the Football League, then consisting of only 40 teams, split into two divisions.

Swindon have never played above Division 2 of the Football League. They were last relegated in 1974, but their present position in the Third Division suggests they have a good chance of winning promotion this season.

### THE PLAYERS

JIMMY ALLAN (Goalkeeper). Has played here in the past for Swindon's reserves. Born in Inverness, but brought up at Balintore, and played in the Highland League for Brora Rangers. Played for Ross and Cromarty as a school-boy and worked as an apprentice joiner before joining Swindon as a professional. Fishing and speedway are among his other interests.

RUSSELL LEWIS (Defender). Born at Neath in South Wales, and signed as a contract professional for Swindon in October, 1976. Made his League debut in the No.3 shirt in a Third Division match away to York City in April, 1977. Has this season established himself as a regular senior player.

ANDY FORD (Defender). Born at Minehead, and played for the local Minehead club before signing as a professional for Bournemouth. Transferred from Bournemouth to Southend United in May, 1973, and made his League debut on the opening day of the following season away to Blackburn Rovers. Made the further move from Southend to Swindon in August, 1977.

KENNY STROUD (Defender). Born here in London but has been a Swindon player since leaving school. Signed for the Wiltshire club originally on Associated Schoolboy forms, and became an apprentice in July, 1970. Upgraded to full professional rank in March, 1971, and is now well past the 200 mark in League appearances.

BILLY TUCKER (Defender). Signed last June from Bury after making 96 League appearances for the Lancashire club. Born at Kidderminster and played in the Hereford United team, then in the Southern League, that took West Ham United to a replay in the fourth round of the F.A. Cup in 1972. Was a regular in the Hereford team that gained election to the Football League in the next season, and remained with them until December, 1976 when he joined Bury on a temporary transfer, and completed the signing a month later.

ROY CARTER (Midfield). Born at Torpoint in Cornwall, and made a name for himself with Falmouth Town in the Western League. In April, 1975 he was signed by Hereford, and he made his League debut for them in the No.8 shirt in the final match of that season away to Halifax Town. Stayed with Hereford until December, 1977, when he was transferred to Swindon. Voted Swindon's "Player of the Year" last season.

RAY McHALE (Midfield). Born in Sheffield and a player who has given yeoman service to his three League clubs. Started with Chesterfield, who gave him his League chance in season 1971-72. Made 124 League appearances for Chesterfield before moving to Halifax, where he added a further 86 to his total. Swindon signed him from Halifax in September, 1976.

CHRIS KAMARA (Midfield). A well-built player who was born in Middlesbrough. Started his career with Portsmouth, for whom he made his League debut in the No.7 shirt at home to Luton Town in a Second Division match in September, 1975. Joined Swindon from Portsmouth in August, 1977.

BRIAN WILLIAMS (Midfield). A former London player who was with Queen's Park Rangers from July, 1977 until June, 1978, when he was transferred to Swindon. During his spell with Rangers he made 19 League appearances. Born in Manchester, and started his career with Bury, from whom he was transferred to Rangers.

IAN MILLER (Forward). Played against Spurs on this ground for Doncaster Rovers in the fifth round of the Football League Cup in December, 1975. Born in Perth in Scotland and started his career with Bury. Left the Lancashire club for Nottingham Forest and made the further move to Doncaster in August, 1975. Left Doncaster for Swindon in July, 1978.

ANDY ROWLAND (Forward). Yet another player who has worn the colours of Bury. Born in Derby and started his career with Derby County. In August, 1974 he signed for Bury and in the course of 174 League appearances for the Shakers, he scored 58 goals. Swindon signed him from Bury in September, 1978.

ALAN MAYES (Forward). Another former London player. Born here in the capital, and signed a full professional contract with Queen's Park Rangers in July, 1971 after graduating through the apprentice ranks at Shepherd's Bush. Was never given a League game by Rangers but made his mark after moving to Watford in November, 1974. Scored 31 goals in 133 League appearances for Watford before moving to Swindon last February. During season 1975-76 he was loaned to Northampton Town from Watford and scored four goals in ten League appearances for the midland club.

### GREATEST SEASON

It was the greatest season in the Club's history, Spurs winning the "double" of League and F.A. Cup for the first time this century. Spurs set up a new record by winning the first 11 League matches, and also winning 31 First Division matches, and by picking up both points in 16 away games. Our total of 115 League goals was the highest in our history, and our 66 points equalled the record at that time held by Arsenal from 1931.

### EVER-PRESENT

Four players were ever-present in the League, namely LES ALLEN, DANNY BLANCHFLOWER, RON HENRY and JOHN WHITE. PETER BAKER, BILL BROWN and MAURICE NORMAN missed only one League match.

### CUP TRAIL

The successful Cup trail started with our 3-2 defeat of Charlton Athletic on this ground. In Round 4 we were again at home, beating Crewe Alexandra 5-1. Our next victims were Aston Villa by 2-0 at Villa Park, and in Round 6 we defeated Sunderland in a replay here by 5-0 after drawing 1-1 at Roker Park. We then defeated Burnley 3-0 in the semi-final at Villa Park and ran out winners by 2-0 against Leicester City in the final at Wembley.

### CUP SCORERS

Our goalscorers in the Cup were Terry Dyson and Bobby Smith 5 each; Les Allen and Cliff Jones 4 each; Dave Mackay 2; John Neal (Aston Villa) own goal.

### FIRST DEFEAT

Our first defeat came as late as November 12th by 2-1 away to Sheffield Wednesday, who were second in the League. Our goal was scored by MAURICE NORMAN, who equalised just before half-time.

### GATES

Our biggest gate for any match on this ground through the season was 65,251 for Arsenal's visit in the January. In March, Chelsea drew a crowd here of 65,032, and the biggest Cup gate was 64,797 for the Sunderland replay. The smallest crowd for a League match here was 35,743 for the visit of Nottingham Forest on a Wednesday evening in April.

### TBILISI BEATEN

In the November Spurs were at home to Tbilisi Dynamo, the Russian club, on a Monday evening. A crowd of 38,649 saw Spurs win 5-2 with goals from DAVE MACKAY and TERRY MEDWIN 2 each and TERRY DYSON. This match was a "friendly".

### UNDER 23s

In the March an Under 23 international was held on this ground between England and West Germany. England won 4-1 and a crowd of 15,632 watched the match.

### TRANSFERS

It was in October of this season that inside-forward TOMMY HARMER was transferred from Spurs to Watford. After the season had ended, centre-half JOHNNY RYDEN made the same move.

### RESERVES AND "A"

While the first team were making history, Spurs Reserves finished runners up in the Football Combination, and the "A" team we then ran were champions of the Eastern Counties League.

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


