SECRETARY'S NOTEBOOK

In using the same programmes as were originally published for January 1st, most items of which are still topical, I'm sure our supporters will realise that had we scrapped them then we would have sustained a loss amounting to well over £500. It has been decided therefore to insert this update sheet.

With regard to my own column and my notes on the new ground, the following statement was issued by the club Directors last week:-

"The developers and Oxford United Football Club had a meeting with the South Oxfordshire District Council this week to put outline planning suggestions about resiting the Football Club to a new location. The site would be on land adjacent to the Northern By Pass. The S.O.D.C. expressed views that they are opposed to any large development of this sort in the vicinity of the city. Formal outline planning permission will be submitted however within the next two or three weeks since we feel the whole project would be beneficial to the populous of Oxford City and the surrounding areas. Should this be turned down by the S.O.D.C. then we are prepared to go to appeal."





SECRETARY'S NOTEBOOK

For many years now Oxford United Football Club have been involved in proposed moves to new sites and it is no secret that the people of Headington would rejoice if we could be relocated in a less residential area.

Our first serious effort to move came several years ago with the proposed Horspath Road site but this met with much serious opposition.

Then, some five years ago, the Brasenose Driftway project looked a reasonable proposition but again many stumbling blocks became apparent with the residents of the adjacent area being very strong objectors.

REDEVELOP

With what looked like a long drawn out battle in front of them the Directors of the day decided it would be far better to redevelop the Manor.

So, under an ambitious plan, known as the 'Rosser Plan' (Tony Rosser was the club chairman at the time), a model was made which included a large underground car park and offices on top of the stands. It was envisaged that the rent acquired from the offices would repay the total financial outlay within seven years.

This scheme never really got off the ground for again it was learned that it was extremely unlikely the City Council

would even consider such a scheme in Headington.

Now the club find themselves in a position where the people of Headington would dearly love to see them away while the various Councils are unable to find a site where they could allow the Commercial backing needed by the club to finance such a large undertaking.

COMPLICATED

In fact at this stage it is not the club that does not know what it wants. It is in fact the local authorities who do not know how to tackle such a complicated problem.

The Planning Officer, in a recent letter to the club, is of the opinion that it is difficult to say whether or not the Council would wish to see the club relocated in simple terms.

He goes on to say that the Council's attitude would depend on the extent of problems being caused, on the one hand by the operation of the Manor Ground, and on the other by the actual nature of any proposals involving a relocation. Clearly a relocation to overcome whatever present problems exist and the greater problems which could arise, would be regarded as a planning gain as would any improvement in the City's recreational facilities which might arise in such an undertaking.



However, there must be limits to which such planning gain might be regarded as over-riding other planning problems possibly arising from any new siting of the stadium. Or, more particularly, from its combination with other commercial development which would be generating the capital to finance the relocation.

Continuing his letter the planning officer says: "The Council must ensure that problems are not merely transferred from one area to another and that the total level of problems are not actually increased by such a development. From what has been seen of the extent of other commercial development which seems necessary to finance a wholly new stadium, it seems that there is a real risk that the problems created might well outweigh the benefits inherent in a relocation."

I think you will agree that is faily non committal and of little help to Oxford United. We had previously received many adverse comments from several sections of the community when Associated Dairies announced they were prepared to build a stadium and super store on land at the Pear Tree Roundabout.

This scheme was dropped however not because of outside pressure groups but because A.S.D.A. were unable in the end to finance the sort of stadium we would require to encourage us to

Unless the new stadium is very much better than what we have at the moment then there is no point in moving.

Because the A.S.D.A. were unable to fulfil our wishes we looked for other financial backing and eventually this was found. At this point in time we are not prepared to announce who are the backers but we are confident further plans will be deposited with the Planning Officer in the very near future.

It must be obvious to everyone that Oxford United cannot finance a new stadium without a commercial interest being involved and this means that unless the Councils of this County are prepared to help in achieving this then I'm afraid the good people of Headington will be stuck with us.

Welcome to Swindon Town

In welcoming the Directors, Officals, Players and supporters of Swindon Town to the Manor this evening may I on behalf of everyone at Oxford United congratulate them on their fine achievement in reaching the semi-final of the Football League Cup. It is no mean achievement and something for which they can justifiably feel proud.

Tonight it is a different ball game and no-one, least of all Swindon Manager Bobby Smith, will think otherwise. Is it possible it's United's turn tonight?

GETTING TO KNOW U

KEVIN BROCK

He had the pick of nearly every club in the country when it came to leaving Bicester School. But Kevin Brock chose United and it was a decision which he has since never had cause to regret.

While still an apprentice professional and eight days short of his 17th birthday he made his League debut as substitute

against Barnsley.

On November 10 he played his first full game, at home to Chester, and showed in that match that he has skill in abundance. Chief scout Fred Ford once said of Kevin: "He has more potential than any other player I have ever signed."

The next couple of seasons will reveal whether Kevin will go a long way towards

realising that potential.

A former England schoolboy international he has been selected for the England youth squad this season when he is a year under age. Not surprisingly his ambition is to win a full England cap and there would be few people who would question his chances.

Recently manager Bill Asprey wrote in his programme notes of the dangers of selecting young players week in, week out and Kevin accepts that, if he is to allow his flair to fully develop, then he needs to be free of the increased pressure which

surrounds first team matches.

"I don't mind the pressure and I would much rather play in front of a large crowd but in the reserves there is not the importance placed on winning games and I can feel more able to try things which, in the first team, would be more severely punished if they didn't come off."

His trips to Lilleshall this season to join the rest of the England youth squad have opened his eyes to the skill factor in football and it is one of his regrets that football in England is not more dependent on skill rather than physical effort.

"There are many good players in the Third Division and they are good at basic skills. But it is the way the game is played.

There is a lack of flair.

These may seem outspoken, even arrogant words from a youngster who has



not even a handful of first team games behind him. But to know Kevin is to know a shy, modest person who has a natural football brain and deep, well thought out views about football and his future.

He would like to go abroad some day and play in a country where skill is the dominant ingredient but until that day arrives Kevin knows that he must, in time, develop his all round game and be prepared to win the ball more often.

"Attitude plays a big part. Sometimes my head goes down if things aren't working out right for me. But in the last few weeks I've tried to change all that."



Jimmy Allan (goalkeeper): Jimmy comes from Inverness and was signed from Scottish non-League football in October 1970. Although he made his debut in September 1971, he had to wait for a first team place and had 183 League appearances to the end of the last season.

Andy Ford (defender): From Minehead he did not make the League side at his first club, Bournemouth, but after a move to Southend in 1972, he made 135 League appearances for that club. He signed for Swindon during the 1977 close season

Russell Lewis (defender): From Wales, he was signed from Welsh League football in the early part of the 1975/76 season and had mace 14 League appearances at the end of the last season all as a central defender.

Chris Kamara (midfield): Chris comes from Middlesborough, but made his League debut for Portsmouth in 1975, Transferred to Swindon in the summer of 1977

Ray McHale (midfield): A native of Sheffield he made his League debut for Chesterfield in season 1971/72. He signed for Swindon in September 1976

Brian Williams (midfield): Another of Swindon's former Bury players having made 148 League appearances for that club in midfield and attack from 1971 until 1977, when he then moved to Queens Park Rangers.

Alan Mayes (forward): Alan comes from London and his first professional club was Queens Park Rangers In 1975 he moved to Watford and played in their Fourth Division championship side of 1977/78.

Billy Tucker (defender): From Hereford he played at centre half for Hereford United in their Southern League days.

lan Miller (forward): lan comes from Perth, but his first League Cup was Bury for whom he made nine League appearances. He moved to Nottingham Forest, but he did not make the first team there. A move to Doncaster in August 1975 brought a regular first team place and he played 124 League games before his transfer to Swindon

Ken Stroud (defender): Originally from London Ken is one of the longest serving players at the club having joined from school. He signed professionally in 1970 and made his League debut in 1971/72 season. He had played 200 League games to the end of last season.

Andy Rowland (forward): From Derby he joined his home town club. A move to Bury in season 1973/74 gave him first team football and he made 166 League appearances before his move to Swindon in September 1978. Scored the winning goal against Arsenal in League Cup quarter final last month. Glen Cockerill (midfield): The club's record signing. Manager Bobby Smith paid Lincoln £130,000 for Cockerill's services.

TODAY— SWINDON

Their history . .

Swindon were formed in 1881 and turned professional in 1894. They played at the Croft until 1896 when they moved to the County Ground. The Robins (or Railwaymen) reached the FA Cup semi-final in 1910 and 1912, losing to Newcastle and Barnsley respectively.

Before World War I, while Swindon were still a Non-League side, Harold Fleming was capped 11 times for England. Since then Rod Thomas, who made 30 appearances for Wales between 1967 and 1974, has become the club's most capped player.

Swindon were promoted to Division II in 1963 but were relegated in 1965. In 1969 they won promotion and the League Cup, in the latter game beating Arsenal 3-1 after extra time, with goals coming from Smart and Rodgers (2). In 1970 they won the Anglo Italian trophy, beating Napoli in Naples. The match was abandoned after 79 minutes when the score was 3-0 because Italian fans threw missiles onto the pitch.

Swindon attracted their record attendance (32,000) for an FA Cup tie against Arsenal in 1972. They received a club record fee (£150,000) from Crystal Palace for Don Rodgers in 1972, and in November 1979 paid a club record £130,000 to Lincoln City for Glen Cockerill.

Between 1960 and 1979 John Trollope made a League and club record of 756 appearances for one club. Under Bob Smith, Swindon are having a good season in both the League and League Cup.

United first met Swindon in a League game at the County Ground on their Division III debut on August 21, 1965, drawing 0-0.
