CHAIRMAN'S NOTES

One could hardly imagine a more intriguing situation at this stage of the season than the current jostle for positions at the top end of Division Three. Despite the 2–1 defeat at Colchester last week, the Mariners still lead the pack whilst behind them at least eight other clubs sustain a realistic hope of contending for a promotion place.

A number of clubs have games in hand – though they would probably settle for having a percentage of the points available already "in the bag". And another vital factor which will help to resolve the issue in the weeks ahead is the number of games which the leading teams have to play against each other.

One such match, which might well be regarded as a 'four-pointer', is this afternoon's meeting with Swindon Town. Our visitors have been rather left behind, as a result of fixtures postponed because of the weather and because of their success in this season's Cup competitions. But, quite rightly, their claims to a place in Division Two next season have been quoted by managers of other clubs in the fight and Swindon have maintained promotion as a priority throughout their run of Cup success.

In that respect they have adopted a similar attitude to Town this season and we are assured of a keen and spirited contest between two sides with their sights firmly set on a move to a higher sphere of the Football League.

In the hope that Manager George Kerr has a fully fit squad from which to choose his side, we shall look for the Mariners enhancing their prospects in the Third Division's Match of the Day. Once again the Blundell Park 'roar' could play a vital part, so come on and cheer the lads to another vital step along the promotion road.



Third Division Scene

In-form sides at the moment are Chesterfield and Blackburn Rovers. Both teams recorded their fifth consecutive victory last Saturday and are very much involved in the challenge for promotion.

At Saltergate, Chesterfield demolished near-neighbours Rotherham with three first-half goals. Those who watched the incisive finishing on T.V. will realise The Mariners defence will have to be on form to keep Arthur Cox's boys at bay

next week when Town go to Derbyshire.

Walker, Moss and Geoff Salmons with a superb thirty-yarder scored the goals that made it an unhappy afternoon for three ex-Chesterfield players. The trio playing at Saltergate for the first time since being transferred were Ken Tiler, Rodney Fern and Billy McEwan. Chesterfield went off the boil a little in the second half but their unbeaten home record

was never in danger.

In the Lancashire derby at Ewood Park, Blackburn Rovers had a comfortable 2-0 win over Blackpool. Noel Brotherston and player/manager Howard Kendall were on target before Rovers' biggest crowd of the season – over 14,000. A larger gate than that is expected this afternoon when Aston Villa and Terry Donovan visit for a fifth round F.A. Cup tie. Having the best defensive record in the Third Division – just 25 goals conceded in 30 games, Rovers with the unpredictable Duncan McKenzie must have a chance.

Swindon, usually so sure when taking goalscoring chances were strangely out of touch in their home game with Sheffield Wednesday. Though generally dictating play in midfield, the Wiltshire team could not push home the advantage. Johnson and Turner scored the goals that gave the Owls their second victory in four days. Earlier in the week they had crushed lowly Bury 5–1 at Hillsborough. Wednesday are another side enjoying a good spell at the right time but something will have to give this afternoon for Jackie Charlton's side entertain Chesterfield. Anxious ears will be close to the radio at 4.40 this evening when the results start coming through.

Millwall dropped a home point to Barnsley in a 2-2 draw at the Den. Stuart Parker, the Yorkshiremen's recent signing from Southend, scored early in the first half and though the Londoners fought back to take a 2-1 lead, Trevor

Aylott earned Barnsley a share of the spoils ten minutes from time.

Reading with two goals from Kearney beat Chester 2-1. Ironically the goalscorer once played for the Cheshire outfit. Luckless Bury who are at Anfield this afternoon in the Cup went down 2-1 at home to Oxford. Hardly the best preparation for a visit to Liverpool.

Carlisle scored four goals for the second week in succession when Exeter were beaten 4-1 at Brunton Park. Rumours are abroad that manager Bobby Moncur may be leaving to take over at Hearts, which would be sad for Cumbrian supporters who believe there is the basis for a promotion push next season.

Wimbledon recorded a badly needed win at Brentford. A first half goal by Parsons did the trick and gave the Dons

hope for the future.

POINT OF CONTROVERSY

The recent ITV exposure of Manchester United highlighted a Football League regulation that is one of the most breached in the game. As with so many rules it may be well intentioned but regrettably is artificial and unworkable in the modern world.

Of course schoolboys should be protected from over-zealous scouts determined to secure their signature with the odd £1,000, or down payment on a new car for dad. Unfortunately the modern game has no place for such high-minded sentiments, no matter how laudable.

If every guilty club were expelled, as United could well be, the League fixture list would be very thin indeed. What purpose can be served by a law that almost everyone ignores?

'Children must not be subject to barter', shouts the English Schools F.A. But that is exactly what is happening. The moral climate is hardly elevated when deceit is a boy's introduction to professional football as the kitchen table groans under the weight of 'sweeteners'. Surely the image of the game would be greatly improved if these payments were put on a proper footing.

As many sports journalists have been saying since the 'World in Action' disclosures, what is so undesirable in paying children of unusual talent? Does anyone imagine that Lena Zavaroni sings for nothing or that Hollywood had Shirley Temple signed on associate schoolgirl forms?

In many ways the Football League regulations recognise this fact. A club cannot pay for a schoolboy, but they can sell him – although the word used is 'compensation'. That's what they collect when the boy hops off to another club.

If clubs can make money from a schoolboy, so should his parents, or perhaps even more importantly the lad himself. As everyone knows the failure rate among young starlets is high. Only a handful of those signed on at 15 actually make it into the big time. For most the future lies in non-league football, dreams dashed. The odds are 10–1 at least against a schoolboy breaking through to the top. He may pursue football more diligently than his education and so is unqualified when the manager says "Sorry son."

Smart apprentices are now writing compensation clauses into their contracts. Apparently one in the Midlands drew £20,000 on the day he signed as a full-time professional. Even smarter lads have negotiated cash guarantees in case they are not signed.

Those kids who do not make it are the ones that need protecting. The bottom can fall out of a youngster's life when he is told he will not make the grade. It is for lads in this category, that the whole subject of signing schoolboys needs to be examined.

The only loser in the Television disclosures was the game itself. Manchester United, Louis Edwards and all will be O.K. but the image of football suffers.

For the good of the game - and future schoolboys - the Footbell League should put these payments on a proper footing.





IN RETROSPECT SWINDON TOWN

Visiting Manager Bob Smith may well recall a fixture between Grimsby and Swindon at Blundell Park back in April 1967. At the time Bob was turning out for the Mariners, following his transfer from Scunthorpe the previous year. Both sides were in the lower half of the Third Division, anxious for points to keep clear of the bottom four positions.

A paltry 4,473 turned up to see the following Town side in action – Wainman, Taylor, Bloomer, Smith, Rathbone, Cockerill, Collins, Wilson, Moore, Rudd, Martin. The visitors included Peter Downsborough in goal, Welsh international Rod Thomas, and speedy winger Don Rogers. The Mariners roared to a 2–0 interval lead with goals from Gary Moore and Dave Wilson and though the visitors pulled one back on the hour, diminutive Billy Rudd restored Town's two-goal advantage. His was a superb goal, a well judged chip from twenty yards after a Geoff Martin corner had been cleared. Grimsby looked to be cruising to a comfortable victory but incredibly gave away three goals in the final ten minutes to lose 3–4. After playing with composure and confidence the Mariners lost all sense of discipline in that final bizarre finish. Harry Wainman misjudged a centre and big Mel Nurse, a Welsh cap, made it 3–2 in the 80th minute. Straight from the kick-off Rogers intercepted a misplaced pass and made tracks for goal. Town's defence opened up, the usually sound Graham Taylor missed his tackle and Swindon were level. Even so Grimsby looked to be holding out for a point until Bob Smith stepped in. Unfortunatley for the Mariners he committed a foul a minute from time, and from the resulting free-kick Pat Terry scored the winner with a glancing header. Many fans had gone to the 'Imp' ten minutes from time confident that the Mariners had a couple of points. They refused to believe the result until the following day when it appeared in black and white.

All but a couple of the twenty-two league games between Town and Swindon have been played in Division Three. The odd season was 1963–64 when a young Robins side managed by Bert Head took the Second Division by storm. Mike Summerbee, Ernie Hunt and Don Rogers figured in a side of young greyhounds that completed the double over Town — 2–1 in both games. Those fixtures took place on successive Wednesday nights at the beginning of the season. At Blundell Park George McLean gave Town an 8th minute lead and the Mariners dominated the first half. But it was a different story after the interval and goals from Smart and Hunt took the points to Wiltshire. Grimsby's team that night was – Wright, Thompson, Donovan, Cockerill, Jobling, Clifton, Pennington, Foster, McLean, Tees, Hill. A week later at the County Ground Welbourne replaced Cockerill before a crowd 21,866. Brian Hill scored a consolation goal for Grimsby after Bill Atkins and Don Rogers had put Swindon on the path to victory.

The Mariners have a dismal record on their West Country visits. In eleven league trips we have yet to win a game. Our 0-3 defeat earlier in the season was true to form. All in all we have gained just three points from 0-0 draws at the County Ground. Our one visit in the F.A. Cup resulted in a shock. The clubs met in a Third Round Cup tie in January 1938 at Blundell Park. Town were in the top half of Division One while the visitors were in the lower reaches of the Southern Section. Though Town were depleted with injuries, few expected the Third Division side to hold out for a draw. Alec Hall and Harry Betmead were absent and the Mariners' reshuffled defence found found it hard going against the eager Swindon forwards. Still the following side held out for a 1-1 draw. Tweedy, Vincent, Kelly, Dyson, Hodgson, Buck, Bestall, Hinchcliffe, Tomlinson, Craven, Coulter. Still with the famous Hall-Betmead-Buck half back line fit for the replay victory for the First Division side seemed a fair bet. Whatever the odds Swindon provided the shock of the round winning 2-1.

Swindon were founder members of the Third Division back in 1920 and at the end of that initial season visited Blundell Park for the first time. They included in their team Harold Fleming, capped nine times for England, and one of the heroes of the side that reached the F.A. Cup Semi Finals twice as a Southern League club in 1910 and 1912. April 1921 saw Swindon emerge as the main challenger to Crystal Palace for the one promotion spot. However, the Mariners destroyed those aspirations with what has proved to be our biggest winning margin over the Robins. The following side won 3–0: Whalley, Affleck, McEachran, Gillow, Deacey, Bradford, Collier, Morralt, Clark, Macauley, Smith. The victory was masterminded by the elegant Wilf Gillow but Town's first goal was shrouded in controversy. A centre from Deacey was palmed in to the net by Clark, on the referee's blind side. Despite the justified protests of the visiting defenders the goal stood. Two further goals from winger Albert Smith settled the issue.


Swindon last visited Cleethorpes in May 1977. It was the Mariners' last home game before relegation was suffered to the Fourth Division. Details of games that season were:

WELCOME TO SWINDON

By the time Swindon trot on to Blundell Park this afternoon, the footballing world will know whether or not the Wiltshire side have a date at Wembley for The League Cup Final. Whatever the outcome of last Wednesday's cup tussle with Wolves, Bobby Smith's boys have captured the Country's acclaim with the incisive quality of their football.

Many would say they are certainties for promotion to Division Two, but some critics feel the fine cup runs will have an adverse effect on their league form. Cup commitments and postponements have resulted in Swindon having a backlog of fixtures and March will prove to

be a hectic month.

Swindon were unbeaten at The County Ground until Boxing Day when Exeter City took the points in a five-goal thriller, and then last Saturday another home reversal was suffered at the hands of Sheffield Wednesday. Though dominating midfield The Robins' finishing let them down – something that has rarely happened this season. Apart from those defeats the only other points surrendered at the County Ground were in goal-less draws with Reading and Hull City. Bury were thrashed 8–0, Brentford 4–0 and other victories have been recorded against Chesterfield, Chester, Southend, Plymouth, Sheffield United, Blackburn and The Mariners. Our 3–0 defeat last September was fairly convincing and Town supporters had no reason for complaint.

Their away form has improved in recent games and they are undefeated in their last five away fixtures. Wins have been recorded at Barnsley, Brentford, Blackpool, and Colchester, while draws have been gained at Mansfield, Gillingham and Oxford. Defeats have been suffered at

both Sheffield clubs, Rotherham, Reading, Wimbledon and Plymouth.

Major signing by manager Bobby Smith was Glen Cockerill from Lincoln City for a reputed £100,000. But such is the strength in depth at Swindon that the Cleethorpes youngster, who played with Terry Donovan for Louth United, has yet to establish himself in the first team.

Bobby Smith of course had a season at Blundell Park as a hard tackling wing-half in the mid-sixties. Signed from Scunthorpe for £8,000, Bobby made 48 League appearances for The Mariners, scoring one goal. A former Busby babe, he went on to play for Brighton, Chester, Hartlepool and Bury before retiring. After a spell at Gigg Lane as manager, during which time he guided The Shakers to promotion from the Fourth Division, Bob took over at Swindon in May 1978.

Last season the Robins missed out on promotion by just three points and are obviously hoping to do better this term. However it is their cup performances that have brought them to the attention of the media. Round One of The League Cup paired them with Portsmouth, and a 3–1 aggregate win earned them a tie with Chester. As might be expected Alan Oakes' outfit proved a tough nut to crack but goals from Alan Mayes earned a trip to Stoke City. Following a 2–2 draw in the Potteries, Swindon won the replay 2–1. Wimbledon away proved no problem and so the Fifth Round draw took them to Highbury. The Mariners' performance in holding Wolves to a draw at Blundell Park was completely overshadowed by the news that Swindon had shared two goals with Arsenal. In a thrilling seven-goal tussle at The County Ground, Brady, Stapleton, and Co. were beaten and the prospect of an all Third Division semi-final with Grimsby was on the cards. Alas it did not happen but whatever the result of last Wednesday's fixture both Swindon and The Mariners have done the reputation of the Third Division proud.

Swindon's F.A. Cup run came to an end in that memorable replay with Spurs a few weeks ago. To reach that stage, Brentford, Torquay and Second Division promotion contenders Luton had

been accounted for.

Despite losing their last two home games Swindon surely should claim one of the promotion places. Off the field the club is well organised and the Cup games pulled in gates of over 20,000. League attendances are on a par with those at Blundell Park and likewise there is little doubt the area could support a Second Division side.

It will be one of the major upsets of the season if Swindon do not have cause for celebration

next May.




