That result will be known by now and the outcome of the tie in the second leg at Home Park will have a great bearing on our immediate prospects. Good Cup runs are the life blood of football at our level, providing excitement for the fans and money for the club.

Meanwhile we welcome Swindon Town for this afternoon's Third Division match. Let's hope for an entertaining game which will be a good advertisement for football here at Sealand Road.

FLYING START

But Seals just fail to hold lead.

Alan Durban's post-match comments on the radio on Saturday must have run true for Chester, travelling back from this see-saw kick-off to the season.

Durban, whose new Sunderland side also squandered a two-goal lead to settle for a draw, found it hard to support the new three-points for a win rule after scoring three goals away from home.

And Chester could sumpathise, after seeing their enterprising start to the season reap the same reward as a full goal-less draw when Rovers snatched their equaliser just five minutes from the

But if Chester can show the same ability and finishing power they turned on in the first half of this game, they will have nothing to fear from the new win-at-allcosts attitude this season will demand.

They had more reason to treat the first League encounter between the two sides with trepidation, with Rovers keen to show their determination to shake off the indignity of their return to the third division.

Yet what a dramatic and unexpected story unfurled in those opening 25 minutes.

Chester, boosted by the return to fitness of striker Gary Simpson and defender Trevor Storton, able to make his 300th League appearance for Seals, attacking Rovers with the fierceness of a cornered animal.

And before they knew what was happening, Rovers' defence began to

look as unsteady as the nearby ruins of the South Stand, seriously damaged in a fire last year.

Player-manager Alan Oakes, far more involved than in most of his pre-season games, played a vital part in turning the game Chester's way in the first half.

His tenth minute corner on the right was flicked on by Simpson at the near post and Peter Zelem moved in unmarked to head his first goal for the club.

Zelem almost added a second from a corner on the other side by Peter Sutcliffe, but with 'keeper Phil Kite beaten, Zelem watched Don Gillies clear his low drive off the line.

Then after 22 minutes Oakes played a one-two with Brynley Jones on the edge of the penalty area from a cross by Trevor Phillips and Oakes sent a low right foot shot into the corner of the goal.

Chester's lead looked safe for the rest of the half as Rovers persisted in longrange efforts that flew within a few feet of the goal, but never forced Grenville Millington into a save.

His only scare came when Gary Mabbutt nodded the ball down to David Williams in the area, only for Williams to hammer his volley straight into Millington's midriff.

But Rovers' player-manager Terry Cooper played a big gamble that paid off at half-time, bringing himself on in place of striker Paul Randall for the second half.

And just as Oakes had moulded the shape of the first 45 minutes, Cooper, at 37, a year younger than Oakes, carved the openings for Rovers to stage a tremendous fightback — emulated by Bristol neighbours City some 350 miles away in Carlisle.

Paul Raynor paid a severe penalty for the freedom he allowed 17-year-old striker Keith Curle on his debut as Rovers made the first breakthrough after 57 minutes.

Curle was left unmarked on the far side of the penalty area when former Swindon player Brian Williams sent in a deep cross from the left wing and Curle guided the header perfectly into the net past Millington.

Then David Williams took a firm hold on the game to prevent Rovers finishing their first home match empty-handed.

He cracked in a dipping 25-year shot that Millington did well to turn round a post and then headed against a post before Zelem made an important clearance from the rebound.

Then with five minutes left Cooper touched a short free-kick to his right and Williams smashed a low shot past the wall of defenders into the corner of the net for a point-saver.

Storton's milestone was marked with a booking from referee Tom Spencer for a late challenge on Gillies and Paul Needham received similar treatment for his foul on Mabbutt.

Bristol Rovers pulled off an eve of season ploy to sign Malmo's Timmy Parkin to stiffen their defence.

But it didn't do them much good against hard-working Chester. The visitors crashed in on some sloppy back play to take a 2-0 lead in the first half, though they had to settle for a point.

Six footer Parkin bought for £15,000 to dominate in the air was beaten as full back Needham out jumped him at Eastville to hit home a right wing corner by Chester player-manager Oakes.

And Rovers' defence was in a terrible mess as Oakes added his team's second from a left wing cross by Jones.

It needed the arrival of 37-year-old player-manager Cooper as a second half substitute to pull Rovers together.

As Rovers grew in confidence 17-yearold apprentice Curle celebrated his debut by heading his team back into the game. And Williams bagged the other goal following a free kick pass.

JOHN TROLLOPE (Manager). Born at Wroughton near Swindon, he joined the club as an apprentice and made his debut in 1960 against Halifax Town. He played in the promotion winning teams of 1963 and 1969 and at one stage played in 368 consecutive first team games. The height of his playing career came when he played in the side that beat Arsenal in the 1969 League Cup Final. In March, 1978 he made his 832nd first team appearance (727 in the league) and retired to become the club's youth manager. He was however, recalled to first team duty later that season and in the following season. It seemed that a game at Blackpool in May, 1979 would be his last but another recall in September, 1980 saw him make a new appearance record for a single club of 770 league games. If cup games are included he has played 878 matches for the club nearly all of them at full back.

The Manager's job became vacant in October, 1980 and after considerable thought John decided to accept the position in November even though there was a real threat of relegation.

He was awarded the MBE in 1978.

MARK STEVENS (Goalkeeper). Young goalkeeper who served his apprenticeship with Bristol Rovers and signed for Swindon in the 1981 close season.

JIM ALLEN (Goalkeeper). Born Inverness. Experienced goalkeeper who has been with Swindon since signing from Scottish junior football in 1970. He made his debut against Q.P.R. in September, 1971 and has been the regular first team 'keeper for several seasons. Had made 272 league appearances at the end of last season.

DAVID PEACH (Defender). Born Bedford. The most experienced player in the present squad he began his career with Gillingham making his league debut in September, 1969. After 186 league appearances he moved to Southampton for whom he made 220 more such appearances. Whilst there he won an F.A. Cup winners medal, scored in a League Cup Final, won representative honours for the Football League and as an over-age player in the England under 21 side. Although he usually plays at left full-back he has also played in midfield. He signed for Swindon in March, 1980 making his debut that month at Millwall and had made 42 league appearances for the club at the end of last season.

CHARLIE HENRY (Defender). Born London, Joined the club from school as an apprentice signing full professional forms in February, 1980. Although his first team debut was at centre forward in a league cup game at Lincoln City in September, 1980 he is normally a defender and quickly settled into the right back position where his determined play made him popular with the supporters. He made 31 league appearances last season.

KEVIN BADDELEY (Defender). Born Swindon, Young defender who served his apprenticeship with Bristol City and made his league debut for that club last season. He was unable to claim a regular first team place and moved to Swindon in the 1981 close season.

KEN STROUD (Defender). Born London. Served his apprenticeship with Swindon, signing professional forms in 1970 and is now the longest serving player with the club. He made his debut against Q.P.R. in September, 1971 and had made 272 league appearances at the end of last season. Much of his early career was spent in midfield but he is now established as a central defender.

RUSSELL LEWIS (Defender). Born Blaengwynfi. After being spotted playing part time football in the Welsh league, he signed for Swindon in September, 1976 making his league debut against York City in April, 1977. He had to spend several seasons as reserve centre-half but in August, 1979 had the opportunity to play at full back which resulted in him holding down the right back position for the rest of that season. Last season he reverted to centre-half and was voted Player of the Year by the supporters for his tireless efforts in defence. He had made 89 league appearances at the end of last season.

MIKE GRAHAM (Defender). Born Lancaster. Began his career with Bolton Wanderers and played his first full league game in September, 1978. His chances were limited at Bolton



but he made about 30 league appearances mostly at full back before moving to Swindon in July, 1981.

ROY CARTER (Midfield). Born Torpoint. Played Western League football with Falmouth before joining Hereford United in the summer of 1975. He made 64 league appearances there and was a member of the Third Division Championship side in 1976. He signed for Swindon in December, 1977 making his debut against Carlisle that month. He had made 147 league appearances for Swindon to the end of last season and when not required elsewhere plays in midfield. A genuine utility player he can play on either side in midfield and in all back four positions. He has also made the occasional appearance at centre forward.

GARY EMMANUEL (Midfield). Born Swansea. Began his career with Birmingham City making his league debut in January, 1975 and playing in 61 first division matches before his transfer to Bristol Rovers in December, 1978. He made a similar number of league appearances for Rovers and joined Swindon in July, 1981.

BRIAN HUGHES (Midfield). Born Ludgershall. Served his

apprenticeship with Swindon and made his first team debut at Lincoln City in a league cup tie in August, 1980 only a few months after signing professional. He usually takes up the central position in midfield and made 18 league appearances last season.

HOWARD PRITCHARD (Forward). Born Cardiff. Began with Bristol City working his way through the junior sides to make his league debut in August, 1978. He made only one appearance that season but began to appear fairly regularly over the next two seasons mainly as an orthodox winger. He made around 40 league appearances for City and signed for Swindon in August, 1981.

PAUL RIDEOUT (Forward). Paul signed pro forms on 14 August last but appeared in the first team last season as an apprentice. He scored on his debut against Hull City in November, 1980 and made 12 full league appearances last season. A former England Schoolboy International he scored a hat trick against Scotland Schoolboys in May, 1980.

ANDY ROWLAND (Forward). Born Derby. Andy was an apprentice with his home town club but his league debut came after a transfer to Bury in the summer of 1974. He was three times leading scorer and made 169 league appearances before his move to Swindon in September, 1978. He made his debut for the club against Blackpool that month and has been a consistent goal scorer throughout the 114 league games that he had played for the club up to the end of last season.

STEVE ABBLEY (Forward). Born Liverpool. Signed from local football in season 1978/79 a winger whose opportunities have been limited in the first team. He made his debut at Exeter City in April, 1980 and had made 4 full league appearances at the end of last season.

CRAIG MOORES (Forward). Born Macclesfield. Young winger or central forward who served his apprenticeship with Bolton Wanderers and made his league debut for them last season. He signed for Swindon in July, 1981.

KEN BEAMISH (Forward), Born Birkenhead, Joined Swindon in July, 1981 as player/coach. He began his career with Tranmere Rovers making 175 league appearances before moving on to Brighton (86 games), Blackburn Rovers (86 games) Port Vale (84 games) Bury (49 games) and finally back to Tranmere Rovers. A consistent goal scorer wherever he has

played.
ROY GREENWOOD (Forward). Born Leeds. First club was Hull City where he broke into the first team in 1971. He made 118 league appearances for Hull and moved to Sunderland in January, 1976 in time to help that club win the second division. After 45 league games there he moved to Derby County in February, 1979 and made a further 20 league appearances before moving to Swindon in March, 1980. He made his debut against Carlisle the following month and had played 27 league games to the end of last season. Although originally an orthodox winger he now plays as a central forward.





Will all members note that seats are sold on a first come first served basis — if the travel committee know well in advance they can order larger seater buses or even arrange for extra coaches to travel.



After a week in which City had suffered two home defeats to Oxford then fourth division Swansea in the League Cup, and the resignation of manager Ken Roberts, City travelled to Selhurst Park for Alan Oakes' first game as player-manager. A disastrous start after eight minutes when Storton's back-pass sailed over Millington's head and Swindlehurst Storton's managed the final touch. City's attacking policy was left to long-range shooting but this paid off in the 61st minute - a throw from Hammond was intercepted by Oakes who gave Crossley the opportunity to equalise from 25 yards. With four minutes remaining City snatched a dramatic equaliser — a cross from Raynor, who was making his debut, was misjudged by Ian Evans and Mason ripped in to score from the narrowest of angles. The force of Taylor, Walsh, Cannon and Swindlehurst had been foiled to give Alan Oakes a memorable start to his managerial career.

Any Chester fans at this match would remember the bizarre refereeina decisions, rather than the football. Within ten minutes both Kennedy and Dean were booked for tackles, shortly followed by Walden before half-time for a foul on Purdie. Players became frustrated and boiling point was reached in the 71st Edwards and Sydenham skirmished on the touchline and Nigel Edwards was sent off for retaliation, to the amazement of everyone. Chester appeared more composed throughout the match and the Hampshire side's only effort was tipped over by Luisey. Gurr was kept busy at the opposite end saving well from Loyden and Edwards. Draper stamped his authority on the midfield from the early stages, given the confidence of a superb Pountney and Cheetham behind him. This was City's first goalless draw in a sequence of three, the remainder against Workington and Barrow.



Chester continued to drop valuable home points at the start of the season. The side was again re-shuffled with Davies, Morris and Cooper together up front. From Carlisle's second free-kick in the first two minutes, they took the lead Hardie failed to cut out Walker's Cross and Scurr headed home. City retaliated and Thompson saved superbly from Morris. Heavy rain made handling difficult for the 'keepers and Ron Hughes cleared off the line from another mistake. Morris and Davies fumbled chances to equalise as the fans had value for money in excitement. For today's lookback on old programmes involving Chester Football Club the editors go to the distant days when the Sealand Road club was operating in the Cheshire County League.

The teams page opposite is taken from a Tranmere Rovers programme dated 28th August, 1926 — Yes over 55 years ago Chester travelled to Prenton Park for the opening game of the season having the previous season won the title against opposition which including teams like Manchester

North End, Hurst, Eccles, Sandbach Samblers etc.

The Chester team that August day was featured as (numbering from goalkeeper to outside-left in positional order) 22 PUGH; 21 CRITCHLOW; 20 RIGG; 19 RICHARDSON; 18 JACKSON; 17 DUCKWORTH; 16 PEERS; 15 ROTHWELL; 14 BURLEY; 13 PETERS; 12 BINGHAM.

In those days the numbers were shown in the programme for the benefit of alterations and players did not carry shirt numerals until many years later. The 1933 F.A. Cup Final Everton v Manchester City was the first game ever; but it was in 1939 when it was passed as compulsory at league level.

Reverting back to the programme which was unusually large (10ins. x 7½ins.) and sold at 2d was introduced as "Entertaining the Champions"....and read "For the opening game of the campaign here we have a reserve tit-bit, for our second string have a 'Derby' game with Chester. The 'Cestrians' last season carried off the championship of the County League, and in doing so revealed themselves a fine all round side. Few changes have been affected in the personnel of the eleven, and our visitors are hopeful of repeating the victory against us last year.

How many Chester supporters here today remember that team — or how many were present at the particular game.

Just for the record Chester Football Club went on to win the Cheshire County title for the second consecutive season and within 4 years were making a successful application to join the Football League following their record in what was a very competitive league.

SCENE THREE

At this time of the season officials, players and supporters of every club all have the same high hopes and ambitions, that their team will become champions or gain promotion. Come Christmas only a small number will have realistic hopes of reaching their goal. The editors thought it might be interesting to have a look at the prospects of some of the teams in the third this season.

There has been a lot said about whether the new system of three points for a win will have any affect on the way the game is played. Only time will tell, but it is interesting to note that the same teams would

have been promoted in the Second, Third and Fourth Divisions.

After the success of Rotherham and Barnsley last season, Huddersfield and Doncaster will be carrying the flag for Yorkshire in the promotion race. The Terriers who missed promotion by three points last season look strong enough in all departments to be chasing honours again this season. Doncaster who scored fewer goals and conceded more than the three other promoted teams will rely on Billy Bremner to emulate the success of other members of the Don Revie Academy of Management.

Fourth Division champions Southend have been regular commuters between the two divisions over the last ten years and if they can maintain their form of last season at home where they conceded only six goals and dropped only four points, a reasonable away record might see them chasing one of the

promotion spots.

Chesterfield just missed out on promotion for the second successive season after spending a lot of cash, and manager Frank Barlow will do well if he can maintain his club's challenge for a third season running.

Carlisle had a poor season last term but under Bob Stokoe and aided by goals from veteran "Pop" Robson and another former Sunderland man Bob Lee the Cumbrians could surprise a few people this

time.

Despite being one of the best supported sides Portsmouth so often fail in the big games at Fratton Park. Away from home Pompey won eight games, only bettered by promoted Charlton and look likely to finish well up amongst those chasing the prizes.

HOW WILL THE PEPSI GOLDEN GOALS SCHEME WORK?

Points will be awarded for all goals scored in League matches as follows:-

Each Home Goal — 1 point Each Away Goal — 2 points
A three point bonus for three or more goals scored in any
League match — Home or Away.

Clubs

League tables will be issued on a weekly basis. The top team overall in each of the four divisions will receive a trophy and £5,000 at the end of the season.

Last season's winners would have been:

Division 1 — Ipswich (145 points) Division 2 — West Ham (138 points)

Division 3 — Chesterfield (131 points)

Division 4 - Southend (144 points)

Monthly Awards

In addition, in order to give clubs a monthly opportunity to win an award, prizes of £1,000 will be awarded to the top club in each division every month for their goals performance

during that month only.

It is interesting to note that if Pepsi Golden Goals had been in operation during season 1980/81, the monthly awards would have been won by a large number of different clubs. In the First Division, for example, Southampton alone won more than one monthly award, the other monthly winners being Liverpool, Aston Villa, Tottenham Hotspur, Ipswich, Wolves and Leicester. Graham writes: "I haven't seen many details in the press about this competition but I understood that it was going to be limited to third and fourth division clubs only but obviously this is not the case. Can you please explain the details for me?"

The Football League Group Cup was introduced this season when teams from "north of the border" decided the Anglo-Scottish Cup was no longer a viable proposition. The teams participating include Notts County from Division 1, seven from Division 2, fourteen from Division 3 and ten from Division 4.

The competition that you seem to be getting confused with Graham is the provisionally titled Associate Members Cup which will be limited to clubs from Divisions 3 and 4. If everything goes ahead according to plan this regionalised competition will begin in February and continue through the rest of the season with the winners of the northern group meeting the winners from the south in early June, hopefully at Wembley - let's hope it goes ahead and that Chester can reach the twin

As you will probably be aware Paul, Brian Lloyd spent the last few months of last season on loan to Port Vale and they were the first club to offer him terms, but they could only do so on a part time basis. Tranmere were also said to be interested in securing his services but eventually he rejoined his first league club, Stockport County, signing a one year contract to replace David Lawson.

Derek Jeffries was believed to be interesting Crewe prior to Tony Waddington's departure but the latest information we have is that he teamed up with Alliance Premier League team Telford against Chester in the recent friendly game and he will obviously be an asset to them.

After spending the summer playing cricket for Shotton, Keith Fear has been training with third division Wimbledon and he scored for them in a recent 40 Group Cup victory against Gillingham. If he doesn't throw in his lot with "The Dons" then the chances are that he may well end up with Bangor City who are also said to be

keen on signing Keith.

Trevor Birch has returned to his native Merseyside and teams up with Northern Premier League side Marine whose manager was quoted as saying that he had waited 13 years to sign Trevor. Of the youngsters lan Edwards, Richie Gendall and David Prestidge we have no definite news. Oswestry were said to be interested in lan whilst Bangor and Telford have bee mentioned in connection with Richie. been

Our final letter this week is from a young lady called Gaynor Jones who, it appears, has taken an immediate liking to new signing Gary Simpson. "He seems to be a hard working player who is improving with each game," she says, "he even impressed some of the Shrewsbury fans in the Group Cup game. Could you please give me some details about Gary's career?"

Certainly Gaynor! 22 year old Gary was born in Chesterfield and worked his way through the youth teams at Saltergate. He broke into Chesterfield's first team in 1977 and by the end of season 1977-8 he had recorded 16 first team appearances and scored 4 goals. The following season he made 11 full appearances with 5 more games in the number twelve shirt. That season he managed only 3 goals but one of those came against Chester when he opened the scoring for "the Spireites". Incidentally in that same game John Cottam scored the third goal in Chesterfield's 3-1 victory.

The last two seasons saw Gary play only 9 full first team games as Chesterfield pushed for promotion but for a lot of the time Gary was sidelined with cartilage trouble. Last season he appeared as substitute in the game against Chester at Saltergate. In 1980-81 Gary scored one goal in the league and one in the FA Cup but last season he showed that he knows how to score goals when he netted 18 times in just 28 games for the Chesterfield reserve side that won a league and cup

Gary was unfortunate during his time at Chesterfield in that Ernie Moss and Alan Birch were scoring goals regularly and several big money signings were also brought into the club rather than the likes of Gary being given an extended run. It's rather ironic that Alan Oakes also tried to sign Ernie Moss presumably to form a partnership with Gary when Moss was the man responsible for keeping Gary out of Chesterfield's first team!

If Gary continues to maintain the promise he has shown so far in a Chester shirt he will be an obvious asset to the club and should provide an ideal target man, something that has been lacking since lan Edwards' departure. I'm sure all Seals fans will join us in wishing Gary and his wife well in their stay at Chester.
