


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Talk of the Town by the Chairman

After a long trip away to Burnley last week we welcome to the County Ground today, the Players and Officials from Carlisle United. Carlisle is our longest trip away, but as we only have this journey once in a season, Carlisle have many such journeys to make.

The recent disclosure in the newspapers that the Football League Management are considering a restructuring of the third and fourth divisions has brought forth a lot of criticism of the suggested methods. Carlisle could be one club that can be said to benefit from regionalised grouping of clubs to save the cost of this long distance travelling, but in my view apart from a little saving in the travel cost, the new scheme has nothing else to offer that will benefit the supporters who keep our clubs in existence. The suggested scheme would abolish the present third and fourth divisions and at the same time eliminate the chances that we now have of promotion to a higher grade of football.

The new suggestion is that the third and fourth division clubs who now number forty-eight would be joined by six non-league clubs from the Alliance Premier league which could be such teams as Trowbridge Town, Bath City, Worcester City and Yeovil Torn from our area, and then divide the fifty-four clubs into three leagues. At the end of each season one club would be promoted to the second division from each of these three leagues and the three clubs relegated from the second division would be split up between the three new leagues. At the present time we, at Swindon, have three chances of promotion into the second division and under the suggested scheme, only one chance. The second division clubs on being relegated have had three chances of an immediate return to the second division and under the new scheme, only one. I can imagine the hue and cry from such clubs as Chelsea, Derby County, Newcastle United, Sheffield Wednesday, just to mention a few from the second division, having to visit Trowbridge or some such club. There must be some advantages from this scheme to benefit us, but try as I have, I can only see an advantage in not having to travel from one end of the county to the other.

There are many clubs in our present fourth division that are only commanding gates of approximately two thousand people and the expense of having to travel these long distances is obviously a point to be considered. It may be argued that more local derbies will attract more spectators, but I wonder for how long and, of course, against this is the fact that local derbies generally call for greater crowd control, hence extra police costs. The fact that our league programme is so heavy, prevents the structure of our International side playing together as much as some countries are able, but to reconstruct the lower divisions will not help this problem. We have a meeting of all third and fourth division clubs on the subject of reorganisation next week, but I cannot see these suggested changes taking place.

Our trip to Burnley was a pleasant one and I am sure to for our regular supporters, whose faces we are always pleased to see. Our players appreciate the welcome that they always receive when they are playing away.

We are also pleased to welcome Ron Morse back to the County Ground after his illness and he, I know, will be pleased to be back.

Our young Reserve team continues to score goals regularly, but are finding it difficult to pick up points as yet, but our reserve team must be composed of our young players if they are to get the experience necessary for league football.

Mrs Coppock is leaving us shortly to take up another position and I would like to take this opportunity to thank her for all the work that she has done for the Football Club in running the Rendezvous Club for the past three years. Mr Coppock has also done stirling work behind the scenes in the Rendezvous Club.

Hoping that we can find our winning ways at home today and thank you for your support.

Goalscorer extraordinary that is Bryan Robson, the man who has rattled in 241 goals and most of them in the top level - in 587 Football League appearances for Newcastle United, West Ham United, Sunderland and now Carlisle.

Nicknamed "Pop" because of his continual habit of popping up in the box to shoot home vital goals, Bryans style has been very much in the mould of the legendry Jimmy Greaves. The similarity between these two great marksmen is the ability to sniff opportunities out and then convert them with uncanny regularity.

Both players would stand in the most remote looking positions, away from the action and when the ball deflected off somebody's head or shoulder they would be there to finish it off.

The habit of turning up in the right spot every time is of course an instinct that all great goal-scorers possess and although the muscles might not respond quite so strongly, the legs become weary and the reactions a little duller with age, that knack for being in the right place is something that never fades.

Even today Bryan is a threat to goal every time he takes the field. His reactions and the ability to strike the ball regularly into the corner of the net are still a danger to Third Division defences.

At only 5' 7" Sunderland born Robson has shown that you don't have to be big to be a top class striker. In fact most goalkeepers find it more difficult to cope with men like him who excell at placing the shot into the remotest corners. They never know what to expect and he will often make a monkey out of a 'keeper by simply bending the ball.

Of course even for great men there can be no escape from reality. Ann'o Domini dictates that Pops playing days are numbered, however his appointment last summer as the clubs assistant manager has indicated where his future lies and paved the way for his next big step.

"I am delighted to get the position and the extra responsibility that goes with it," says the man with the golden boots. "I enjoy working with players and helping them develop, and the boss, Bob Stokoe, is a great character and the experience I am getting under him is invaluable. We are both ambitious for the club and will try and build a team which will bring success back to Brunton Park."

Successful, in terms of medals and cups won, is probably the one thing missing from Robson's career. A prolific scorer of the highest calibre he just does not seem to have been around when they handed out the prizes.

Pop somehow missed international recognition and will finish his playing days without having gained the rewards his undoubtable talent, ability and consistency has deserved.



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








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John Ward talks to Howard Pritchard

Howard Pritchard is twenty two and until he joined Swindon Town a few weeks before the beginning of this season Bristol City had been his only club. Born in Cardiff, he played football for Cardiff Schoolboys and trained with the Cardiff City Apprentices. Then he had a trial with Bristol City and this led to him being taken on as an apprentice there.

When he was nineteen he played two games in the Bristol City first team in the First Division. The following year, when Bristol City were relegated, he played nineteen First Division games. Last season in the Second Division he played twenty games in the first team with seven more appearances as substitute as a more or less orthodox winger, either on the left or the right. He classes himself only as an occasional goal scorer, managing two last season.

The Bristol City manager made it clear to Howard at the end of last season that he was not part of his plans for the first team even though he still had two years of his contract to run. He was not taken on the club's pre-season tour of Sweden and had little hesitation when Swindon approached him.

Howard was still puzzled about Bristol City's rapid and dramatic decline. "In the season when we were relegated," he said "at Christmas we were in the top five in the First Division. With the same squad we should really have gone straight back. One problem was that there did not appear to be any money available to plug one or two weaknesses. Also we found that Second Division football was different; in the First Division you are allowed time on the ball, allowed to play in certain areas of the field; then when you get near to goal the pace becomes a lot quicker. In the Second Division on the other hand they tighten down on you all over the park."

How did Howard relish playing in the Third Division, I wondered. "Obviously you will not normally be up against the same class of player," he replied. "But in addition to skill, maybe it will require more hard work to stay in the team. I suspect that anyone who shows a lack of effort

simply won't get in. I would have thought that in the Third Division work rate counts for about 75%. If it's a bit more aggressive that won't bother me. I like it that way."

Off the football field Howard is keen on playing tennis and goes back to see his family in Cardiff most weekends. He has a house in Clevedon, while that was fine when he was playing for Bristol City it would now make a lot of sense to move to Swindon, but his fiancee, Mandy, a Bristol girl lives there and is reluctant to give up her job as a nursing assistant in a local mental hospital. The solution may be for Howard to become a weekly commuter.



Town through time Wingers

PART TWO

In 1901 the nation lost a Queen and Wiltshire football almost lost its premier club. A loan was to save Swindon Town from immediate oblivion, but it was a number of seasons before the club again graced the upper reaches of the Southern League. Thirty men were called upon in the same number of league games in 1901-02, experience being the chief ingredient sought with potential newcomers to the County Ground staff.

ALBIE EDWARDS, who had first pulled on a Town shirt in December 1895, returned to the outside-left berth - whilst on the right touchline could be found HARRY OAKDEN. Derby born, Oakden was one of those privileged to have played next to the legendary Steve Bloomer in a County side which appeared in F.A. Cup semifinals with monotonous regularity, yet never actually managed to win it. Injury prevented Harry from making the 1899 trip to the Palace, after which he spent an ignominious period on the south coast with Brighton United (long since extinct) and then across the Irish Sea with Belfast Distillery.

In March 1902, Oakden dropped back to the right-half position where he was to provide Swindon with good service until retiring in 1906. TOMMY DAVIES took over on the wing. The elder brother of Bertie - who is perhaps better remembered - Tommy promptly followed other Town players to Nottingham Forest, enabling the directors to slowly repay the club's creditors. The name of JACK COWLEY featured at lefthalf and outside-left throughout the 1903-04 term. John Bennett Cowley, to give him his full name, was born in Burton-on-Trent in 1877 and came to Swindon along with centre-half Charlie Bannister in 1902. LEN RICKETTS, a Londoner whose previous experience was with Worcester, SAM PEERS (ex-Coventry) and local amateur. ERNIE TOOMBS also made brief appearances on the left side of the attack. Another part-timer who put in several fine performances on either wing was the REVEREND REID of Kempsford, later to transfer his ecclesiastical residence to Exeter and assisting the City club on many occasions.

Western League side Bristol East supplied the Town with two left-wingers during 1905 -OLIVER BOLWELL and Billy Tout, Bolwell very quickly faded from the scene, losing his place to ALF DEAN, whilst young Tout, after one or two mediocre displays on the flank, was slotted into the half-back line - and from there scored over fifty League goals in a span of ten years! He soon became the club's penalty expert, but in 1905-06 that task fell to Dean and four successful spot-kicks were included in his nine goal tally - sufficient to make him top scorer that season. Alf's departure to Millwall Athletic in May 1906 brought TOMMY BIRTLES, later a Yorkshire county cricketer, to the County Ground. A native of Higham, just outside Barnsley, Tommy had joined the Oakwell staff in 1903 and was to finish his career there as a guest during the Great War. Following his one season with Swindon, he linked up with Portsmouth for three years before returning north to Rotherham Town. Birtles, in turn, gave way to JIMMY JOHNSTON from Third Lanark, who joined fellow Scots Johnny Kidd and Jock Walker in the Town line-up. The outside-left had considerably less distance to travel, this being Bristol City's FREDDY FENTON. The latter soon found his position threatened by FRANK HEPPINSTALL, from Denaby United, while Johnston was temporarily removed during October 1907 by a triallist suffering from ill-health!

Is the new points system making a difference in our game? I think perhaps it is to teams such as ours who prefer to play open football hence our improved form away from home. Teams playing at home are perhaps opening up their game more than they did in the hope of gaining the coveted three points, allowing our players more freedom than they get at home. I would now like to see some incentive given to clubs to reward them for winning or drawing away from home, for the present system still encourages away teams to play a defensive game as was witnessed here at the County Ground against Reading and Chesterfield. The chairmen are to hold another seminar from the 20th to 22nd February and perhaps this is a matter they will consider.

There is a strong move afoot to regionalise reserve team football. Many clubs have no recognised league in which to play their reserve sides and others are concerned at the costs involved, and understandably so. Our receipts from Football Combination matches are insufficient to pay the expenses of the referee and it must be accepted that reserve team football will always be a drain on a club's resources. Notwithstanding these circumstances I am sure that the board of directors will resist the proposed changes in an endeavour to retain our status in the Football Combination for, if reserve

teams are necessary as we think they are, what better standard of competition could we have than the one in which our young players can play and gain experience from players of First and Second Division sides.

One of those clubs unable to gain admittance into a Reserve Team League is Swansea City and they are relying upon arranging a series of friendly games for their players. John Trollope has agreed to play them in such a game and this will be staged on the County Ground on Monday, 26th October, kick off at 7.30 p.m.

On Wednesday next, 14th October the Football Association has asked us to stage the match F.A. XI v The South West Counties and this we have agreed to do. The Football Association were most impressed with the arrangements and support given for the Under 21 match last season and I hope we shall see many more of their games here in the future. I hope that a good number of you will turn up to see this match which I am sure will be very interesting and worthy of your support.

On Wednesday, 4th November we are holding a Centenary Dinner Dance at the Blunsdon House Hotel with dancing to the Gordon Talbot Band. Most of the players will be present at this function and, although tickets are selling very well indeed, we still have room for a few more. If you are interested, please drop me a line and I will arrange for an invitation to be sent to you.

As we are now a little way into the league programme I would like to offer Season Tickets in the North Stand for the reduced price of £40, £27 for Juniors and Senior Citizens. For those of you who will attend every match remaining throughout the season this special price presents a saving of £8.60 on the match day price x 18 matches. For your information we have facilities for you to buy these tickets with your Barclaycard if you so wish.

I notice that a number of people queue up at the match day ticket office on match afternoons to purchase tickets for the North Stand and then wait in line again to enter the stand. This, of course, is quite unnecessary as you can purchase your ticket at either the orange or green turnstiles as you enter the stand, saving an unnecessary wait at the ticket office.

Thank you for your valued support this afternoon - without you there would be no football at the County Ground and if you are able to bring a friend next time we shall be very grateful.


