WORLD CUP TRIUMPH FOR FOOTBALL LEAGUE

SO England, Scotland and Northern Ireland have finally made it to the 1982 World Cup Finals in Spain. And there's still just a vague — though sadly forlorn — hope that Wales and the Republic of Ireland might join them.

And, if that's not a triumph for the so often maligned Football League system, then I don't know what is! The three countries who are definitely through to Spain called upon no fewer than 57 Football League players during the qualifying tournament. The entire Welsh team comes from the Football League whilst 99 per cent of the Eire team is similarly based here.

At this particular moment in time, then, the Football League has the chance of providing very nearly five teams out of the 24 finalists. The Scotland team, of course, contains many key players from its own League competition, but manager Jock Stein called upon 13 players from south of the border whilst the Northern Ireland team used 19 men from the Football League.

Ron Greenwood's tally was 25 plus former League players in Tony Woodcock (Cologne) and Laurie Cunningham (Real Madrid).

On the face of it England were exceedingly lucky to qualify, our fate finally being decided by the failure of others. It is being said that we "got in through the back door" or "from the dustbin". But, whichever way you like to look at it, in the end it's results that count and England produced better ones than any of our other group rivals apart from Hungary and go through as the number two team from our group.

Whilst most of us possibly accept that the current England team isn't good enough to win the World Cup, maybe we should cast our minds back to 1966 when, at the same stage, we doubted Alf Ramsey's ability to get together a quality team in the time available to him.

At this stage in the proceedings, Alan Ball was not yet a regular member of the side and neither Geoff Hurst — our hat-trick hero in the final — nor Martin Peters had even been given their first caps! Yet they were all there to play a vital part in our success.

On that basis, it is still possible that three players, whom none of us would consider as possible England stars today, could similarly turn the 1982 event our way some seven months from now. It is an accepted fact in football that a manager can bring his team to the boil *too soon*. It is difficult to keep a team on key over a long period of time, particularly an international side that does not get together too often.

The last time England actually qualified for a World Cup final series — apart from appearing as hosts or winners — was back in 1962 and many older fans will recall how we were all highly excited at our prospects.

In the 18 months prior to the finals England crushed Luxembourg 9-0, Scotland 9-3 and Mexico 8-0. These were world class performances. But, by the time we got to Chile for the finals, the team was jaded and past its peak.

Those who have been criticising the England team over the past year have had ample cause to do so. Neither performances, nor results, have been impressive. Yet, how can anyone argue a case that this country no longer breeds quality players when we have produced three certain World Cup finalists and went within a whisker of also sending Eire and Wales to Spain?

SWINDON BLOW UP

SWINDON, who missed relegation by only one point last season, made a sensational start to this season. After taking ten points — and scoring ten goals — from four games Swindon zoomed to the top of the Third Division by mid-September.

After a brief slump, they went into another winning streak and they kept within a couple of points of the leaders until the end of October.

Then, quite inexplicably, they blew up. They have lost their last four League games and now they languish in the lower half of the table.

Swindon have won three away League games — at Exeter (2-1), Burnley (2-0) and Bristol Rovers (4-1). They drew at Chester (0-0) and Southend (0-0) but went down at Walsall (0-5), Gillingham (0-1) and Huddersfield (0-3).

They were beaten 2-5 on aggregate by Wrexham in the first round of the League Cup.

Manager John Trollope made quite a few changes during the close-season. Midfield men Glenn Cockerill (who returned to Lincoln), Brian Williams (to Bristol Rovers) and Chris Kamara (Portsmouth) all left the club, as did winger In Miller, who joined Blackburn Rovers.

Newcomers include full-backs Mick Graham (from Bolton), Gary Williams (Blackpool), midfield players Gary Emmanuel (Bristol Rovers) and Craig Moores (Bolton).

A disastrous run towards the end of last season doomed Swindon to their first-ever spell of Fourth Division football. With only one win in their closing 13 matches, they were in danger until their final game. By drawing 0-0 at home to Brentford they kept themselves one point clear.

Yet it was very much a transitional season. Swindon called upon no fewer than 25 players in their Third Division side as the sorting out process went on. Now Mr. Trollope has a nicely streamlined squad which, if it can recapture early form, could still make a very serious bid for promotion.

Pen Portraits

JIMMY ALLAN (*Goalkeeper*). Jimmy has been a Swindon professional since July 1971 and he has now played more than 300 senior games for the club.

CHARLIE HENRY (*Defender*). Charlie served his apprenticeship with Swindon and made his League debut at Reading in August 1980 as substitute. He made such a good impression that he has been holding the right-back position for most of the time since.

RUSSELL LEWIS (*Defender*). Russell is a Swindon discovery who can play in both full-back positions and centre-back. He won a regular place two seasons ago and has been settled in the middle of the defence this term.

MICK GRAHAM (*Defender*). Mick joined Swindon from Bolton this summer. He made his League bow for the Trotters in 1978 and became a regular member of their Second Division side last season.

DAVID PEACH (*Defender*). David, who appeared in two Wembley Cup finals for Southampton, joined Swindon for £150,000 two seasons ago. An England under-21 international, he began his career with Gillingham and moved on to Southampton for £50,000 in 1974.

KEVIN BADDELEY (*Defender*). Kevin's first club was Bristol City but he didn't get into their League eleven. Swindon signed him this summer and he has turned out on several occasions at left-back.

BRIAN HUGHES (*Midfield*). Brian served his apprenticeship with Swindon and turned professional in July 1980. He made his League debut against Reading a month later and has now won a regular place in midfield.

ROY CARTER (Midfield). Roy joined Hererord United from Falmouth in 1975 and quickly established himself in League football with the Edgar Street club. He moved on to Swindon during the 1977/78 campaign and has now played well over 200 League games for the club.

GARY EMMANUEL (Midfield). Gary is another of Swindon's 1981 summer signings, joining them from Bristol Rovers. His first club was Birmingham City and he made around 70 League appearances for the Blues before signing for Bristol Rovers for £50,000 in 1979.

GARY WILLIAMS (Midfield). Gary, who can play in midfield or at left-back, was signed from Blackpool for £40,000 this summer. He began his career at Tranmere and, though he never turned professional with them, he made one League appearance for them in 1976/77. He later signed for Swedish club Djurgarden but returned to England in 1980 to win a regular place in Blackpool's team.

CRAIG MOORES (Midfield). Craig developed with Bolton but he got only one outing in their League eleven, as substitute, last season. Swindon signed him this summer.

KEN STROUD (Midfield). Ken is now one of Swindon's longest-serving players. He first played in their League eleven in 1972 and has now completed more than 300 first-team appearances for the club.

STEVE ABBLEY (Midfield). Steve completed his apprenticeship at the County Ground and, though he has made several League appearances since his debut two seasons ago, he has not yet won a regular place.

ANDY ROWLAND (Striker). Andy topped Swindon's scorers with 13 goals last season and once again leads the way with six. Two seasons ago he hit 28 goals for them. He didn't get into Derby's League eleven, but thrived after signing for Bury in 1974. He topped the Shakers' scoring list three times and Swindon paid £80,000 for him in 1978.

PAUL RIDEOUT (Forward). Paul scored on his League debut against Hull City last November and recently scored in two successive games. He is now striving to establish himself as a regular member of the attack.

ROY GREENWOOD (Midfield). Roy, who joined Swindon from Derby two seasons ago, was introduced to League football by Hull in 1972. Sunderland paid £140,000 for him in 1976 and sold him to Derby for £50,000 three years later.

SPORTS REPORT

TWO cup matches inside four days, and a replay coming up at Port Vale on Monday have served to remove the spotlight from the Third Division table as far as Lincoln City are concerned.

But it is back to the bread and butter fare of League football this afternoon, when Swindon Town visit Sincil Bank in search of the points.

City, against Port Vale last Saturday, did not play quite so well as they did the week before, but I believe that Swindon will take more notice of the Chesterfield result than of a one-off Cup display.

Though Swindon's last visit to Sincil Bank was last season, when they drew 1-1 with George Shipley scoring for City, it was a League Cup fixture, and they went on to win the replay 2-0.

The last time City met Swindon in the League was on their way down into the Fourth Division in the 1978-79 season. Swindon won 3-0 at Sincil Bank and 6-0 at the County Ground. In between those two matches came an event which had a long-term significance for Lincoln City . . . the appointment of Colin Murphy as the manager.

Indeed, Murphy's arrival also had an impact on Swindon Town, for about a year later he broke the two clubs' record transfer fees by selling Glenn Cockerill to them for £110,000.

That Cockerill did not make the grade with his new club is past history. He is now back at Sincil Bank, playing well and looking as sharp as he ever did . . . and out this afternoon to prove to Swindon that they were right to sign him in the first place, and sadly wrong to discard him in the second.

The Cup replay with Watford promised to be an exciting affair — these notes were compiled before that match but if City have won it, they can look forward to another splendid match in the next round, for the winners meet Queen's Park Rangers, at home.

Monday sees the Red Imps seeking to rectify the things in the FA Cup when they visit Port Vale in a replay of the first round draw at Sincil Bank last Saturday.

Port Vale were close to springing a surprise result when they led with seven minutes left, but it is a new ball game at Vale Park on Monday, and Lincoln's away form gives rise to the belief that they can win at the second attempt and go through to meet Stockport in the second round.

Local Soccer Scene

BIRCHWOOD Colts registered their first win over **Sleaford Rangers** since promotion to the Premier Division of the Sunday League three years ago . . . and to complete a bad day for the Sleaford side, they also had two players booked.

Rangers were 1-0 up within a minute of the kick-off following a defensive mix-up that allowed Dave Holmes to head his side into the lead after Tonge had flicked on a Carter free-kick.

This was the half-time score, but after the break Birchwood hit back strongly and were back on level terms within 10 minutes when Jenkinson rifled home a 30-yarder with his right foot.

Six minutes later the winner came when a strong challenge on the Rangers' keeper resulted in him dropping the ball, and Melvin Reed continued his good scoring form by heading home the loose ball.

In the Lincoln League Division One, Newark Athletic coasted to their sixth successive win . . . 10-0 against their second from bottom opponents Old Lincolnians, and only four players, including the keeper, failed to score. From the kick-off the pressure was all one way, and after 10 minutes Bonbroffe opened his account with Joynes making it 2-0 minutes later. Goals from Chamberlain, Wood, Reid and a second from Bonbroffe gave Newark a well-deserved half-time lead of 6-0.

Although the Lincoln side never gave up trying, they could do little against the free-scoring Newark who added further goals through Bonbroffe, Chamberlain, Lowe and Wood.

In Division Three, Monks Road had by far their toughest game of the season on Saturday when they met Birchwood Colts on the West Common winning 3-2 . . . but not before going 2-0 behind despite the 11-point gap between the two sides.

A goal from Fagg and an own goal put the home side in front, but Monks Road fought back and equalised with goals from Foster and Evans shortly before the break. In the second half Foster grabbed his second to earn both points for Monks Road, who remain on top four points clear of Aubourn.

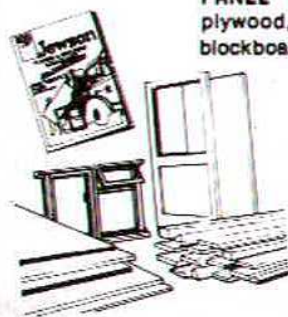

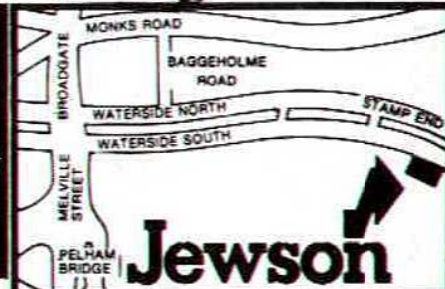

IN RESERVE...

SINCE my last programme notes concerning results there have been several games played at Reserve and Junior team level. The Reserves have played twice, against Doncaster and Chesterfield (both away) and won 1-0 both times, with Steve Cammack scoring the only goal on each occasion.

This leaves the Reserves in the unusual situation of having won all five of their league games away from home and lost their three home league games.

Finally, last weekend, the Juniors went down 1-0 away to Newcastle, again through a penalty, and we progressed through to the second round of the Lincolnshire Intermediate Cup on Sunday, beating Nettleham 2-0 in a replay, with goals from Stuart Hall and Gary Chapman (penalty).

We have been drawn at home to Wolves in the second round of the F.A. Youth Cup and that match will probably be on Thursday, 3rd December, kick-off 7.30 p.m., or Saturday, 5th December, kick-off 2.00 p.m., at Sincil Bank.

On Tuesday our Reserve side had a very impressive 5-1 away win against a strong Grimsby Town side who included a number of first team players.

Our FA Youth Cup 2nd Round home tie with Wolverhampton Wanderers will be played at Sincil Bank on Thursday, 3rd December, kick-off 7.30 p.m.


