

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#### Talk of the Town by the Chairman

Today we make another page in our Club history with a league match arranged for a Sunday. I know that we have played matches on a Sunday before, but then it was because of national strikes etc. This time it is purely as an experiment to see what the public's reaction is, and to ascertain what advantages, if any, there may be to both the public and to ourselves. We have to thank Exeter City Football Club for their co-operation and we welcome their Players and Officials to the County Ground today.

After the disturbances on our ground during our match with Bristol City, both clubs were called before an Enquiry Board set up by the Football Association. We were cleared of these charges in view of the fact that we had taken every precaution possible to prevent such trouble. Bristol City were held responsible for the conduct of the hooligans that caused all the trouble, because these so-called supporters gathered together in the "pen" allocated to the away followers. I am sure that there must have been hundreds of loyal supporters from Bristol at that game, who were ashamed of the behaviour of the few who brought disgrace on the name of Bristol City Football Club. This kind of behaviour is harmful to our game at a time when football needs every kind of help it can get survive.

These past few weeks has seen several League Clubs going to Press with startling statements of near bankruptcies, and the man in the street must be wondering what is really happening in the football world. One day he reads of Club A buying a player for a million pounds from Club B and the next day he reads of clubs unable to pay their telephone bills etc. What has caused this sudden eruption, and also was it so sudden? Over the years, football clubs have always strived for success that always seems around the corner and to obtain this success will go to any length to reach it. Clubs feel that with just an extra player or two success can be obtained and of course these players have to be persuaded that a change of club will be good for everyone concerned. Promises are made, contracts are exchanged, sometimes with high commitments that only success can pay for in the long run.

Only a few years ago the bonanza of lucrative money making lotteries enabled Football Clubs to reap a new income, which has, I am afraid to say, been spent largely in the transfer market and trying to reach for that success that only a few can possibly win. The day has now come when our National game no longer attracts the numbers that used to follow and apart from just a few clubs that can still draw big crowds, we find league clubs playing before crowds of less than two thousand which, after paying the visitors a minimum sum of six hundred pounds, leaves them with a paltry few hundred pounds after paying the match day expenses faced with the problem of a wage bill of several thousand to meet. With unemployment high and the cost of living rising, football clubs have found that the once bountiful income from both lotteries and gate receipts have dwindled alarmingly, and clubs that have heavy commitments have been caught up in the race for survival.

We at Swindon have been affected obviously through these terms and conditions, and we do not intend to destroy our club by entering into financial contracts that we cannot honour even though this may delay the progress we are all seeking. John Trollope has come into Management at a very difficult time when we, the Board, have had to refuse John the money which would have enabled him to rebuild as he would like to and this in spite of the economies which he has been able to make for the club since taking charge of team affairs. We are grateful for John's efforts and his ability to introduce young players into his team which will help secure the future of our club.

At the time when clubs are crying out for help, we are very grateful to our loyal supporters who are prepared to volunteer their services, wherever possible, to do the work that is necessary to our premises.

We hope that you enjoy today's game. We thank you for your support, which has never been so important as it is today, to enable us to keep league football in Swindon.

Due to the terrible weather we have experienced during recent weeks the last notes I was able to have published were those for the match v Fulham on the 30th December last and of course, this game ended in disaster. Danny Williams and I were away from the County Ground watching a couple of players and therefore missed the game. Looking at it the following day on the Video, my reaction was that we had certainly given them two or three of their goals. The most important task following that defeat was to lift the morale of the team for our visit to Luton in the Third Round of the F.A. Cup Competition.

For those of our supporters who travelled to Luton witnessed probably the best team performance this season. Each player gave everything I've ever asked for, their dedication to football. Their effort, enthusiasm and ability was clear for all to see, and they showed the confidence to take anyone on. They did not lose to a better team, but were beaten by the bad decisions of the referee.

The game away to Wimbledon resulted in our gaining a well earned draw after a lay off of three weeks and we really didn't get into the game for the first twenty minutes during which time our opponents scored. After that we more or less dominated the game although they were always dangerous on the break. We had several near misses, hitting the woodwork twice, the ball being cleared off the line and good saves from their keeper and it wasn't until the last five minutes when we equalised.

There are two additions to my playing staff, Jimmy Quinn who has been at the County Ground for a month's trial, has signed a professional contract. Jim came to us from Oswestry F.C. and has had a number of games in the Reserves and has shown that he is quite capable of scoring goals. Paul Batty, who served his Apprenticeship with us, has also signed a professional contract. Many of you will have had the opportunity of seeing Paul in the Reserve Team.

During the last few weeks I have been saying that I would like to bring in one or two players to strengthen the side but, if you read the local paper you will have read of the critical financial position of the Club and, as a consequence, the Directors have informed me that there is no money available for new players. This leaves me with one option only and that is a possible exchange of players but, of course, in this present climate, clubs are looking to reduce their playing staffs and my task will therenore not be an easy one.

Finally, a welcome to the team, officials and supporters of Exeter City and of course to you, our loyal supporters. At this time your support is even more vital and on this our first experimental Sunday game I hope that many more people will have joined the regulars, for if we are to progress here at Swindon increased support is the first priority. Thank you all.



#### John Ward talks to Gary Williams

#### Swedish Holiday:

There are a lot of holiday advertisements around at this time of the year. Many of them make extravagant and unusual claims. I have not seen one yet which promised that it would provide you with a gateway to a career in professional football but this is what happened to Gary Williams when he innocently took a holiday in 1977.

That summer Gary went to stay with his mother's sister in Sweden. He had been playing as an amateur with Tranmere Rovers while he was still at school and then as an apprentice joiner. His uncle said that the local club, Djurgarden, one of the two Stockholm sides, was interested in him and would like him to go along. This led to Gary becoming one of two overseas players allowed to each club by the Swedish League. They sent him to school, when he was not training, to learn the language, which he still speaks fluently enough to have talked to a Swedish family he met shopping in Swindon just before Christmas.

#### Back to work at Blackpool:

Gary played for Djurgarden until 1980, in the First Team for two years, then he was signed for Blackpool by Alan Ball who had come on a scouting trip while still with Southampton. At first, everything went well at Blackpool: the season opened with a convincing display at the County Ground where their simple, short passing game was too much for Swindon and Gary had an outstanding match marking lan Miller.

The combination of Alan Ball and Ted MacDougall was particularly effective. Ball in Gary's opinion is a first rate coach whose occasional fiery outbursts were kept in check by the calming influence of MacDougall. In midseason however MacDougall departed and Black-pool found themselves on the slippery slide towards the Fourth Division, which nothing could stop. A new Management pair, Alan Brown and ex-Swindon Manager Bob Smith arrived and they felt changes were necessary. Gary tactfully referred to what he called "one or two differences of opinion" which led to his being placed on the transfer list.

#### Under the landlord's eagle eye:


When he heard that Swindon were interested in him, Gary initially came down to look round more out of a sense of politeness than from any conviction. As soon as he met John Trollope and Danny Williams however any doubts were dispelled. "I just felt it was a club where I could stay", is how he described it. Now twenty-two he

has a girl friend called Karen in Blackpool, also a house which he hopes to sell when the housing market looks up in the spring.

Meanwhile Gary is lodging in a pub at Blunsdon. He was having a drink at the Heart in Hand one evening with his team-mates afte the game when he got talking to the landlord. The question of where he was going to live cropped up and the landlord suggested he move into a spare room there. "It was an ideal arrangement", said Gary. "The landlord is devoted to football and looks after me wonderfully. He is also very strict: even if I had the temptation to have a few drinks later on in the week with a match coming up he simply wouldn't let me!"


Living in a pub enables Gary to indulge in one of his main interests outside football, playing darts. He has already arranged a match between a team from Swindon Town and the Heart in Hand locals.

As for football he prefers playing at full back but is happy to play in mid-field if that's what the manager wants. One of his main resolutions for 1982 is to curb any excessive exuberance on the field, especially as far as referees are concerned. "I still tend to get far too excited!" he admitted.



#### Town through time Wingers

The Boxing Day fixture here in 1921, against Luton, drew a crowd of 12,134 - not far short of the record then - and Swindon had two new players to parade, both on the left side of the attack. Jack Johnson the inside-left came from the Fry's chocolate factory eleven at Bedminster and his wing partner was a Warminster Town product by the name of OLIVER C TURNER, better known by his second name Charlie. It was Turner who had the pleasure of scoring the Town's goal in a 1-1 draw, BERTIE DENYER now displayed his skills on the right flank after starting his Swindon career at centre-forward (see Town through Time 29.11.80) and then having to take an enforced rest during the 1919-20 campaign. Tom Phillipson also featured at outside-right in the spring of 1922. Having commenced the term in the position for which he was bought, leading the attack, the slightly built Geordie found more space in his new role and helped the Town to hit nineteen goals in the closing five fixtures.

Leicester-born JOE NORTON, a former Bristol Rovers forward, played a few games as the 1922-1922-23 season began but Denyer, nicknamed 'Twinkle Toes', was soon back to claim his place - while the other Bertie, Mr Davies, was the now regular occupant of the outside-left position. The discarded Norton soon moved on to Kettering Town. While centre-forwards and inside-forwards came and went, it was very much a case of 'status quo' with wingers until Davies lost his place in 1926 and the partnership was broken up. GEORGE PURCELL, an insideright purchased from Stockport, was another of the few who did manage to get a game on the wing during this period, making a mere trio of appearances in August/September 1925. It was not until after joining Exeter in the following summer that George was to gain regular firstteam football. He was one of the City stars who battled their way through to the F.A. Cup semifinals in 1931. Early in 1926 there was briefly a new face at outside-left, that of JIMMY THOMP-SON. Next to him in the Town attack was

Charlie Petrie and thus an old scoring duo were re-united. The two had five years earlier taken part in Stalybridge Celtic's foreshortened Football League career. Celtic played just seventy-six games, with Petrie being their top goalscorer in 1921-22 and Thompson having the dubious honour of scoring a hat-trick in their very first match. Since then, Oldham-born Jimmy had drifted into Cheshire League football, but it wa was from Accrington Stanley that he eventually came to the County Ground.

The arrival of ALEC THOM in the 1926 close season signalled the end of the road for Bertie Davies, who made just eight further appearances before trying his luck with Luton. Born on the Ayrshire coast at Stevenston, Thom started with Yoker Athletic, the Scottish junior club, before being taken on by Morton in 1920. After just a year with the Greenock club, Alec spent a similar period with the Airdrieonians and then commenced a four-year association with Hull City. His Swindon career began with three goals in four matches - and in his first full season contributed eight, apart from setting up countless chances for the new Town goal-machine Harry Morris.





#### Colin Benson spotlights

#### Unquestionably the hot shot of West County soccer right now is Exeter City's 5' 11" striker Tony Kellow, who this season has reached a major milestone with his 100th League goal.

Kellow might not have experienced the dizzy heights of the First Division - although why he hasn't remains a mystery - for he has enjoyed a career which has been consistently productive, as the statistics of his trade show only too clearly.

It is well known that goalscorers are born and not made, the mechanics of tucking the ball away regularly are the product of a natural gift and in short Tony has that knack. But to tell the truth he is not too worried that his assets have not been fully realised by the moguls of the First Division, for Tony is a home loving boy and Exeter just suits him fine.

And any way he is used to being overlooked when it comes to talent spotting. He had to score 240 goals for Falmouth and Penzance before Exeter City sat up and took notice, by which time he was 24 years old.

It is not easy for late starters in the Football League but Tony did not let that deter him and soon, bridged the gap between the Western League and the Fourth Division. Indeed his impact was instant with both goals in a 2-2 draw at Hartlepool on his League debut in the opening game of the 1976/77 season.

Another goal in his second outing, against Cambridge United, earned Exeter a valuable point and confirmed the promise shown in that first game. Tony had knitted in well and formed a brilliant partnership with Alan Beer and between them they scored well over half the 70 goals which brought Exeter promotion.

Tony had scored 19 League goals in his first season and added another three in the cups and he was enjoying every minute. That following season in the Third Division he continued to find the net. As Beer only made three appearances the onus on scoring was firmly placed on Tony's shoulders and he handled it well with 14 League goals to become the club ace Marksman in only his second season.

The goals kept on flowing and Tony netted another nine by the middle of October 1978, which was enough to persuade demoted Blackpool that he was the man to help them regain

their lost status. Exeter banked their record transfer fee - £105,000 that November in Exchange for their goalscoring sensation.

He made his debut on November 18, in the home game against Rotherham which Black-pool lost 2 - 1. Tony for the first time was finding it difficult to settle although he managed to score in his third outing against Chester and finished the season with II League goals from 25 games which was a creditable start.

Even so Tony was not happy as he commenced the following season in Blackpool's colours and confessed: "I simply couldn't settle down at Blackpool. I'm a West Country lad and I found the north alien to me." Nonetheless he was a regular in the Seasiders line-up, but when Exeter made enquiries about getting him back he "jumped for joy."

Ironically Tony played his last game for Black-pool here at the County Ground on March 8, 1980 and helped his team to a 2 - 1 victory. The following week he was back at Blackpool only this time in Exeter's colours, his career with the Lancashire side terminated after 57 League games and yet he still finished up as Blackpool's leading scorer for that season.

Such is the quality of this player who was resigned by Exeter for a give away £70,000. He scored five times in Exeter's remaining ten matches. . . . the prodical striker was back where he belonged.


"Coming home was like a breath of fresh air" he says. "It made all the difference to my game." That is true, and last season he proved it with a personal record 33 goals, 25 of them in the League.

This season Tony is still producing the goods and had 14 strikes to his credit so far. "I set myself a target of 20 goals every year," he says and he should reach that figure quite comfortably although I wouldn't be surprised if he isn't secretly chasing Fred Whitlow's club record of 34 League goals in a season and Alan Hanks' record aggregate of 105 . . . . Tony Kellow could just write his name into the record books!


