FIRST REPORT & PICTURES

WELCOME TO SWINDON TOWN

Swindon's fortunes have changed dramatically since the day last October when they won 4-1 at Bristol Rovers to take over as leaders of the Third Division.

A crashing 5-0 defeat at Walsall three days later signalled the end of their brief stay in top spot, since when a meagre two wins in 17 games has seen them plummet down to their present position as one of the clubs involved in the scramble to avoid the relegation.

It has been an unhappy season all round, with even the two Cup competitions, in which they made a name for themselves a couple of years back, failing to lift the gloom at present sur-

rounding the County Ground.

They fell at the first hurdle on a 5-2 aggregate to Wrexham in the League Cup, and after making hard work of beating Taunton and Sutton, the latter in front of the County Ground's lowest ever attendance, 2,890, Second Division front runners Luton put them out of the FA Cup.

Swindon's average attendance fell to 6,702 last season, and despite holding up well in the early

months of the campaign, crowds have dropped in line with their slide down the table to the present figure of 5,600.

Swindon had a 100% record against us in the six games between the two clubs between December 1977 and the start of last season. However, since then we have more than held our own; Last season's two games ended all square, 1-1 (Kruse) at Griffin Park and 0-0 at the County Ground on the last day of the season, a point which rescued Swindon from the jaws of relegation when it was still mathematically possible for them to go down. Brentford's visit last October resulted in a comprehensive 3-0 win through goals by Bowen, Johnson and Chris Kamara, celebrating his return to the ground where he enjoyed so much success as a Swindon player.

Swindon manager John Trollope has been at the County Ground for well over 20 years, the majority of which were spent on the playing staff. After making his debut in August 1960 he went on to make an all-time record 770 League

appearances, nudging aside the previous one club record held by Portsmouth's Jimmy Dickinson in October 1980.

John, who gained a League Cup winners medal against Arsenal in 1969, formed one half of the youngest full back partnership in the game's history when as a 17-year-old he teamed up with Terry Wollen, also 17, when he first broke into Swindon's first team in 1960, and also holds the club's consecutive appearance record with an unbroken League and Cup run stretching to 368 games without a miss between April 1961 and August 1968. John, a member of Swindon's Third Division promotion sides of 1963 and 1969, was awarded the MBE in 1978. His squad underwent a major overhaul last summer with seven newcomers being taken on the payroll.

EXPERIENCED

The most experienced are much travelled striker KEN BEAMISH. scorer of 158 league goals in a career spanning Tranmere (twice), Brighton, Blackburn, Port Vale and Bury, who was appointed player-coach, ostensibly to coach the reserves, but was drafted into the First Team for the recent games against Reading and Burnley, and former Birmingham and Bristol Rovers midfielder GARY EMMANUEL; The remainder are relatively inexperienced: Goalkeeper MARK STEVENS from Bristol Rovers; defenders KEVIN BADDELEY (Bristol City) and MIKE GRAHAM (Bolton); and forwards CRAIG MOORES (Bolton) and HOWARD PRITCHARD (Bristol City). Then soon after the start of the season former Tranmere and Djurgaarden (Sweden) full back GARY WILLIAMS cost £40,000 from Blackpool, in what could transpire to be Swindon's last big money buy for some time. Like with nearly every other League club, the cash crisis affecting the game has cut deep, and they recently launched a supporters Co-operative which aims to raise £60,000 with 12,000 fans donating £5 apiece towards the purchase of new players.

In a disappointing season the only ever presents have been long serving goalkeeper JIM ALLAN, signed from Scottish side Brora Rangers in 1970 and last season's player of the year, central defender RUSSELL LEWIS.

Leading scorer is ROY CARTER, a member of Hereford's Third Division Championship side of 1976. A genuine utility player Roy has nine goals to his credit at the time of writing.

Swindon's most expensive signing DAVID PEACH, a £150,000 buy from Southampton in March 1980, recently had his contract cancelled after little more than 50 appearances for the club, while two other big money signings are striker ANDY ROWLAND, whose goals have gone a long way to repay the £80,000 he cost from Bury in September 1978, and ROY GREENWOOD, a £60,000 capture from Derby in February 1979.

Graduates from the club's Youth Scheme are defender KEN STROUD, who signed professional forms in 1970 and is now the club's longest serving player; defender CHARLIE HENRY; midfielder BRIAN HUGHES and forwards STEVE ABBLEY and PAUL RIDEOUT, scorer of a hat-trick for England Schoolboys against Scotland in May 1980.

BRENTFORD SOCCAPROGOLOGY

PART 1: BRENTFORD COLLECTORS

It is doubtful if you will have heard the term 'Soccaprogology', since the word does not exist and cannot be found in any dictionary, however the derivation of this hybrid word produces a suitable title for this series of articles; viz. 'Socca' — Soccer, 'proga' — Programme, 'ology' — specialising, hence 'Collecting football programmes!

Collecting football programmes is by no means a new hobby, as evidenced by the many collections dating back to the 1920's or even before, however in the last few years it has really taken off as can be seen by the Programme shops that are now present at all League grounds (additionally the many non-League clubs); the number of full and part-time dealers (now with their own Association), the number of programme fairs (on average one per week) and even publications on the subject as well as a monthly magazine.

The supporter of a specific team will of course look to his own club for his own specialised collecting (no serious collector retains every programme that appears, remember that over two thousand are produced per season in the football league alone!) However it would appear that the number of Brentford programme collectors is out of proportion to the Bees 'status', and once again the charisma that surround the club would seem to have spread to the programme world. It could be argued that since 1946, Brentford have played against every league club (except Hereford United and Wigan Athletic) and most non re-elected clubs in league games thereby offering the greatest variety of opposition, although I personally feel that the interest goes back to prewar days when their meteoric rise to fame in the '30's earned them a respect that is still appreciated today.

So what 'Brentford' programmes are collected? This can vary considerably, whilst the young collector will content themselves with home programmes from the 70's to date, my own collection is nearly complete (home and away) back to 1950, however even the latter is almost insignificant when compared to a few collectors who are now filling in the odd 'gap' during the 1930's! So who has the oldest Brentford programme and who has the most complete collection? The former question can at least be partially answered by determining at least the date of the first Brentford programme; 1902 was probably the year, this information coming from a programme itself (Brentford v Exeter 1975-76).

This leads us into examining the reason why do fans collect programmes. All manner of collecting appears to have reached a peak in Britain, when even the most humble old tin or packet can only be discarded after careful inspection in case it should prove to be a 'collectors item'. Postage stamps have been collected for well over a century, and any philatelist will confirm the excitement and satisfaction that is felt when a specific set is completed; however football programmes go one giant step further surely, since the whole history of the club can be evolved (especially Brentford since the match programme has always been factual) and memories of past matches or players of yesteryear can be recalled or visualised. Let it also be remembered that whilst football programmes do not fetch the vast sum of money that a rare postage stamp will realise, interest in the hobby is such that certain prewar programmes can change hands for one or two hundred pounds, or more. Whilst any Brentford programme is unlikely to fetch such a large sum, a full season of programmes (home and away) will cost up to two hundred pounds back to the war years and considerably more (if obtainable) before that. Therefore any collection can now be considered a positive investment, and yes it is even possible to insure your collection.

This first article has served as a broad introduction to 'Soccaprogology' and future articles will deal with particular individual programmes, seasons and aspects of collecting, connected specifically with Brentford.

'DATBEE'

TEAM MANAGER'S VIEW

Once again, the printer's deadline prevents me from commenting on our immediately previous results. I thought this would be a useful opportunity, having already covered our home preparations, to talk about the

events in respect of our away games.

The majority of our away travel is covered by coach, leaving from Griffin Park at whatever hour is necessitated by the journey involved. For the northern trips, generally speaking, we stop near Toddington, where we usually pick up our vice-Chairman, Mr. Radley-Smith, Jim McNichol, Barry Tucker, Alan Whitehead, and Dave McKellar, who also live in that area. In addition to the vice-Chairman and the playing staff, the Chairman, Mr. Lange, and the life vice-President Frank

Edwards, usually travel in the team coach.

The coach itself is arranged with normal seating to the front, complete with a television/video which the players enjoy as a means of relaxing on the journey. The rear of the coach is taken up with seating and tables, and quite often there is a small card school involving Barry Tucker, Dave McKellar, and Jim McNichol, with one of the other players making up the four. Invariably an apprentice travels with the team and it is his job to help Eddie Lyons with the kit, and also to brew up the tea or coffee for those travelling on the coach.

Most journeys involve a short stop at the half-way stage, at which time the players have a light meal, which usually consists of cornflakes, poached eggs or boiled chicken and toast and honey. Journeys are timed so that we arrive at the away ground approximately one hour before kick-off, to give plenty of time for the pre-match presentation. for the pre-match presentation.

We usually leave the away ground about 3/4 hour after the completion of the game, and on the way back the

players generally enjoy a pre-packed meal. The mood on the coach is generally measured by the result. Because of financial constraints it is very rare for us to actually stay away the night before the game, but the distance of the travel for the games at Plymouth and Carlisle does involve an overnight stop. The journey to Carlisle is our longest, and for the recent game there we travelled on the Friday afternoon and stayed at a hotel on the outskirts of Preston, therefore giving us the opportunity of breaking up the following morning with a further two hour journey to Carlisle. During our recent visit to Carlisle, to avoid the players becoming lethargic after the long coach journey, I decided to have a short training session on the Saturday morning on a pitch adjoining the hotel. In order to make this a light-hearted affair and to get everybody in good spirits the Chairman proposed a challenge match. He and I picked out sides on the night before. The sides may give a clue to our tactical thinking, the Chairman's side being himself, Kamara, Hurlock, Sweetzer, Tucker, McNichol and Roberts. My side, including myself, was Bowles, Bowen, Whitehead, Salman, Rowe and Eddie Lyons. A ten minute each way game ensued after a very light training session. This was ably refereed by our Vice-Chairman, Mr. Radley-Smith, despite the fact that there was no pea in the whistle, and honours were shared 7-7. All we need to do now is to repeat that kind of goal scoring at Griffin Park!

Our opposition tonight is Swindon Town, whom we beat earlier in the season 3-0 on our visit to their ground. I am sure Chris Kamara will hope to repeat his goal scoring act on that night against his old club, and I am sure everybody will be going all out to complete the

double.



PLAYER PROFILE

TERRY ROWE



Our young full-back, Terry Rowe, who is still an apprentice, has created quite an impression in his early games for the Club. He is not 18 until June 8th, but is delighted that he has broken into the League side so early, and feels that he justifies his decision in moving across from Fulham to Brentford in the 1980 close season.

Terry followed John Griffin when he left Craven Cottage to follow Fred Callaghan to Griffin Park, and was surprised that he got a run almost immediately in a pre-season friendly with Chelsea. Terry admits that he felt very nervous on that occasion, but felt that it did him good, and although he spent most of his first season either with the junior side or in the reserves, he benefited from the close season tour of Yugoslavia and made another first team appearance against Dubrovnik.

Terry comes from a family with a strong sporting background. Although born in this country, his family come from Barbados. His father was a cricketer of considerable repute, being chosen for Barbados, and had he not come to England could well have got into the West Indies side.

Terry is useful with the bat and it was a thin decision as to whether he should take up soccer or cricket. In fact he trained at Lords under Roland Butcher and could have got a South of England trial, but he preferred instead to play for the London Schools in the Junior World Cup in Canada.

Terry also captured the eye of the England selectors, being called up for training with the Youth Squad. He now lives almost outside Queens Park Rangers' ground, but is delighted that it is at Brentford he has made his early strides in League football. A slight disappointment to him is that Ricky Marshall, a fellow apprentice and good friend, has left the Club and is now playing for Wimbledon. Their paths crossed recently in the Mid-Week League and he hopes that they will meet up again in the Third Division.


