

JIM ALLAN - (Goalkeeper) Born Inverness. Now Swindon's longest serving player, he came to the club in 1970 from Scottish Junior Football and made his debut in September 1971 against QPR. Has since made 363 league appearances for the club to the end of last season.

KEVIN BADDELEY – (*Defender*) Born Swindon. Served his apprenticeship with Bristol City and made his league debut against West Ham Utd in August 1980. That was his only appearance for City but he established himself in Swindon's First Team shortly after his transfer in July 1981. Had made 65 league appearances to the end of last season and likes to overlap when he can. Can play in either full back position but usually on the left.

COLIN BAILIE – (Defender) Born Belfast. A former apprentice he made his league debut at Oxford United in April 1982 and established himself in the first team last season with assured displays in both full back positions. Had made 27 league appearances to the end of last season.

LEIGH BARNARD – (*Midfield*) Born Worsley. Served his apprenticeship with Portsmouth and after making his league debut against Exeter City in September 1977 went on to make 79 league appearances for Pompey. He also played 4 matches on loan to Peterborough but moved to Swindon in June 1982. Was ever present last season and is seen to best advantage on the left of midfield.

PAUL BATTY - (Midfield) Born Edlington. Paul served his apprenticeship at Swindon and made his league debut against Crewe Alexandra in September 1982. He went on to make 39 league appearances last season and is a very promising player who makes up for his lack of height with all round determination.

GARY EMMANUEL - (Midfield) Born Swansea. Gary began with Birmingham City making his debut at Stoke City in January 1975. He played 71 First Division games for the Blues, moved to Bristol Rovers in December 1978 and added 65 league appearances there before his transfer to Swindon in the 1981 close season. A hard working player who was held back by injury last season but had made 69 league appearances for the club by its end.

SCOTT ENDERSBY – (Goalkeeper) Born Lewisham. Former Ipswich apprentice who moved to Tranmere Rovers for whom he made his league debut against Hereford United in September 1981. Spent two seasons between the posts for Tranmere before joining Swindon in May 1983.

MIKE GRAHAM – (Defender) Born Lancaster. Mike began with Bolton Wanderers making his debut at Mansfield in March 1978. He made 46 appearances for Bolton before signing for Swindon in July 1981. Had made 76 league appearances for Swindon to the end of last season mainly playing beside the centre half but can also play in midfield or at full back.

NIGEL GRAY - (Defender) Born London. A tall centre half who signed for Swindon in July 1983 having previously played all his football for Orient with whom he had made around 230 league appearances since his debut against Bolton Wanderers in April 1975 to the end of last season.

CHARLIE HENRY – (Defender) Born Acton. Former apprentice who signed professional in February 1980 and made his league debut as substitute at Reading in September of that year. Most of his 93 league appearances to the end of last season have been at right full back, but he can also play in the centre of the defence.

DAVE HOCKADAY - (Forward) Born Sedgefield. Dave's only previous club was Blackpool for whom he made his league debut in September 1976 at Notts County. He went on to make around 140 appearances for Blackpool before joining Swindon in the 1983 close season. Fast and tricky winger.

ALAN MAYES – (Forward) Born London. Now in his second spell with Swindon, Alan began with QPR but his league debut came after a move to Watford and was against Port Vale in November 1974. He made 133 league appearances for Watford plus 10 on loan to Northampton Town before signing for Swindon in February 1979. Although at Swindon for less than two years, he made 89 league appearances and struck up a good partnership with Andy Rowland. He joined Chelsea in December 1980 and made about 70 league appearances for them before re-joining Swindon in July 1983. Mobile forward very quick in the penalty area.

GARY NELSON - (Forward) Born Braintree. Joined Southend United from school and made his league debut as substitute against Colchester United in October 1979. He made around 100 appearances for Southend before his move to Swindon in August 1983.

JIMMY QUINN - (Forward) Born Belfast. Signed from Osurestry town in December 1981, he enjoyed a rapid rise from parks football to his league debut as substitute against Walsall in March 1982. A tall forward who is good in the air his opportunities have been limited but he has made 18 league appearances by the end of last season.

PAUL RICHARDSON - (Midfield) Born Nottingham. Paul joined Swindon in July 1983 as player-coach. He was an apprentice at Nottingham Forest and made his league debut at Liverpool in May 1968. There followed 221 league appearances for Forest before a move to Chester in October 1976. After 28 league appearances he moved on to Stoke City in July 1977 and played in the promotion winning season 1978/9. Moved to Sheffield Utd in August 1981 and made around 50 appearances there.

ANDY ROWLAND – (Forward) Born Derby. Andy served his apprenticeship at Derby County but his league debut (which was actually at Swindon) came after a transfer to Bury in August 1974. He was three times leading scorer at Bury and played 174 league games for them before his transfer to Swindon in September 1978. A consistent goalscorer (but also the club emergency goalkeeper) he had made 186 appearances for the club at the end of last season.

It may be only our third 1st team home match of the season but here we are playing Cup

Our visitors, Swindon Town have revelled in the magic of Cup Football in the past when they became famous giant killers in beating the mighty Arsenal in the 1968–69 League Cup at Wembley. Swindon really rose to the occasion in this never to be forgotten final against a team full of star names including goalkeeper Bob Wilson (now of the B.B.C.) Bobby Gould now the manager of Coventry City and Scots international Ian Ure.

The week after their famous win they came to Home Park and before the match I remember the two managers Danny Williams of Swindon and Billy Bingham ran around the track waving

the cup to the big crowd.

We took the smiles off their faces at the end of the match by beating them but it couldn't spoil

their wonderful season.

Swindon's new manager Ken Beamish is certainly no stranger to Home Park. He started and finished his playing career with Tranmere Rovers and in between played for Brighton, Blackburn, Port Vale and Bury. A prolific scorer, Ken played in a vital match for Port Vale here during Malcolm Allison's 2nd reign as manager. We won the match, sending Port Vale down to the 4th Division but not before Ken had given us a shock by scoring after only 2 minutes play. I understand that Malcolm had told our players not to give away any silly free kicks in the early stages. Mickey Horswell must have misheard Malcolm's instructions for he gave away a free kick by fouling an opponent just outside the box and bang – the ball was in the net – Beamish had hammered the ball past Martin Hodge our keeper.

Swindon come here tonight with a one goal advantage from the 1st leg.

Let us hope that the 'Greens' rise to the occasion tonight however and progress to the 2nd round which is also played in two legs.

For supporter's guidance, if the teams are level on goals tonight after the 180 minutes play in

the two games, then an extra half hour will be played.

If the aggregate scores are still level at the end of extra time the tie will be decided by goals scored (away from Home counting double). If the teams remain equal after this, the tie will be decided by a penalty competition played in accordance with the laws of the game.

"WALKING AWAY ISN'T THE ANSWER"

Those of you who take the Sunday Times may have read Russell Davies' discourse on how, after 10 years as a football reporter, he can 'no longer stomach the game'.

After over 30 years doing the same job, I can sympathise. I have often shared his disgust at some of the things that have dragged the game down to levels of banality. Once or twice, notably in recent years, I have been close to the sort of clean break that Mr. Davies appears now to have made. But always I am drawn back, once the grass is cut, once the evenings draw in, and a new season begins, full of optimism as they always are, and always must be if the game is to continue to be our national winter pastime.

But that doesn't mean I do not believe that the time is fast coming when, if we do not root out the cankers which make our game a sickly giant, it may be laid low for ever.

I am lucky. I am of an age I can remember, as if it were yesterday, when 60,000 went to a football match and there wasn't a hint of trouble. When there was delicious humour from the terraces instead of bottles.

I feel just as uncomfortable, and more than a little ashamed of my fellow-man when I hear monkey noises when a coloured player moves on to the ball.

I detest back-passing from long distance, players who roll over and over in supposed agony when if they were really hurt, they would be too distressed to move . . . I could go on.

But there are lots of things in life that one abhors and condemns, and walking away isn't the answer. Mr. Davies, much as I understand his reasons, might well not have abandoned the game if he could have recalled 1953 instead of 1973.

Memories I have of the 1948 Cup Final when Stan Matthews thought he had lost the chance of a Cup winner's medal for ever; the 1961 Wembley international when I saw Scotland fans with tears streaming down their faces after England had beaten them 9-3; the 1970 World Cup Final in Mexico City when I saw the incomparable Pele take Italy apart.

Those of us brought up on better times must do our utmost to see that the witless louts of our society don't always spoil it for everyone.

There's nothing wrong with the game just some of the people who run it - and watch it!





The revised ticket which we introduced 18 weeks ago has proved an outright winner with weekly sales increased by over 10,000. Every week well over 40,000 tickets are sold in what must be one of the most successful of lotteries. And a damned good job they are. For make no mistake if 'The Argyle Lottery' closed down tonight Plymouth Argyle Football Club would put up the shutters tomorrow.




