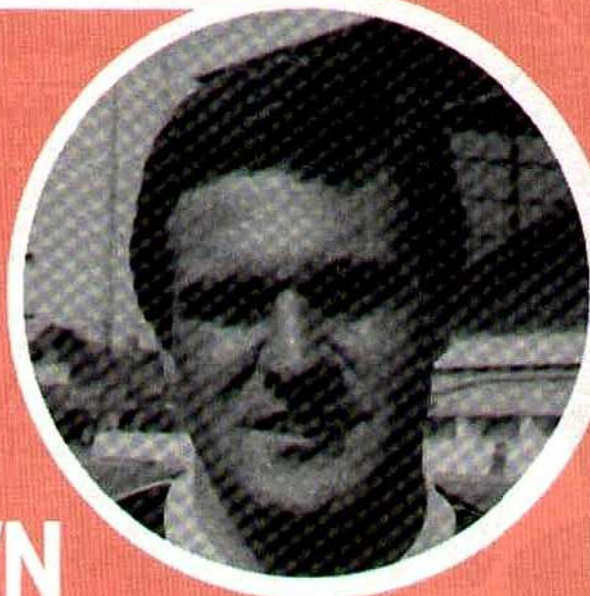

Today we welcome the players, officials and supporters of Hartlepool United after their long journey from the north. We also welcome you, our own supporters and thank you for the terrific support you gave to the team for the game against Hereford United.

What an unpredictable week this last one has turned out to be. In our Tuesday evening game against Hereford we played what I consider to be our best forty-five minutes of football of the season, a standard that would get us success in any one of the Canon League divisions. The 3-0 score line flattered Hereford. However, as so often happens, half time came upon us and put a stop to the flow of our game but, even though we did not add to our score, Hereford caused no problems whatsoever to our defence and it was nice to keep a clean sheet.

This performance should have given the team plenty of fire and confidence for their game at Northampton on Saturday but, typical of our season so far in the way of unpredictability, our performance at Northampton was well below the standards we have set ourselves. Unfortunately our progress up the table was temporarily halted with a 2-0 defeat.

However today, after having had a chat amongst ourselves in mid-week about our standards we are determined to get back on to the winning trail.

I am sure you will all be pleased to hear that Jimmy Allan is progressing nicely although it will be some time before he can even think about playing.

The F.A. Cup draw has paired us with Kettering Town and gone are the days when League Clubs could take these clubs for granted. There have been far too many giant killing acts over the last few seasons for us to become complacent over this game. Looking at their team on paper there is a vast amount of experience in their ranks, including their Player Manager, David Needham. This gives us a good opportunity to progress into the next round providing we set about the task in the right professional manner.

So for our supporters we hope we shall overcome Kettering and get a more attractive draw in the next round.

Lionel Smart, one of our Directors made the Draw but did us no favours — neither did he help the Bristol Clubs who are both drawn away. Just goes to prove the Draw is genuine!

Paul Heath has resigned from his position of Vice Chairman and Director of the Board due to his business commitments. Paul felt he could not give enough time to Club affairs, he has been a great help to us in the past and we are sorry he has taken this step.

I am pleased to say that Brian Hillier has been elected Vice Chairman. Brian was Chairman of Calne Town F.C. and so has a good knowledge of Football affairs and I'm sure will be an excellent Vice Chairman.

Jimmy Allan is progressing favourably and the surgeon who carried out a very difficult operation on his smashed arm tells me that Jimmy is a very nice patient to have, he never complains and when one considers the pain he must have experienced from such a severe injury, he is a great credit to the Club.

Finally, our grateful thanks to the enormous crowd who supported the Swindon Lions Charity Fireworks Display at the County Ground on Sat. 5th November — how I wish we could encourage 12,000 to come and watch us play. Home gates of this size would be a tremendous encouragement to the players and to the finances. I wonder shall we ever see these numbers again? I believe we shall.

This afternoon we welcome the Players and Officials of Hartlepool F.C. Last year at the County Ground we beat them by 3 goals to nil, Rideout (pen.) Rowland (2).

Hartlepool had a poor season last year and are faring us no better so far this season as they are currently bottom of the League with only 8 points and not having won away from home.

However football is so unpredictable — that's why we watch it — and no game this year can be called a certainty but of course we hope we shall win today.

After 3 very good performances against Colchester, Reading and Hereford when we gained 7 points out of a possible 9, our away game last Saturday was a bitter disappointment to all of us at the Club.

It is difficult to understand how the same players who played such sparkling football against Hereford and scored 3 goals against a team whose defensive record was the best in the League, can be so ineffectual just 4 days later and frankly never looked like scoring against a Northampton side that showed little skill but lots of honest endeavour.

Nevertheless we go forward to today's game full of hope that we can be more consistent,

# Behind the scenes

It appears that not everyone knows of our family concessions in the seating areas. Last season, realising the difficulties that some parents experience in finding the money to bring their families to football we decided that we should reduce our prices for those who wished to bring their children to the County Ground. For instance, Dad or Mum can now bring one child to our games for just £3.00 or two children for £4.00. When the full seating price for an adult and a junior is calculated the saving is instantly apparent, a reduction of £1.40 over the full price of £4.40 and this saving increases to £2.00 if two children of a family attend. If both parents bring along one child then they can save even more, paying £5.00 and saving £2.60 and by bringing two of their children they save £2.80 paying just £6.00 for entry for four people.

We are very anxious to make football at the County Ground family entertainment as it once used to be before the canker of football hooliganism brought it's ugly presence into most grounds. For those of you who are still worried about this worrying aspect of the game I can assure you that we are no longer plagued with this problem, not one incidence has occurred here this season. I suppose one of the reasons for this is that all hooligans are cowards who hide in large crowds in order that they are not recognised and with our fallen gates this they can no longer do. Anyone who does misbehave can be assured of no sympathetic ear, they will be taken to court and also banned from our ground.

I make this appeal to all families, bring your children along to a match at prices most can now afford. It is important to us that we increase our gates and I think it is important for the kids that the magic of live soccer is not kept out of their lives for they will miss a lot.

Next week we play at Kettering Town in the Football Association Cup Competition. I am informed that they have a new cantilever stand and two thousand seats for which they do not sell tickets in advance. I am sure there will be ample accommodation for any-

one who wishes to travel and purchase a seat for the game as their gate averages only a thousand, including standing supporters. For those not knowing the location of Kettering it is north of Northampton on the A43 road. This is an important match for us and the players will need all the support they can get so hopefully you will travel to Kettering in large numbers.

I would like to welcome Doug Buswell back to the club in his former position as Commercial Manager. Doug was very successful in his previous employment in the lottery field and his contribution in the future will be of vital importance in bringing in much needed finance that we are unable to raise from people coming through the gates on match days. Doug cannot do it on his own of course, he needs the help of as many of you as possible. It amazes me that, in these days of high unemployment, we are unable to find enough people to sell lottery tickets and, in doing so, make themselves a welcome bob or two in commission. Most spare time money making schemes involves the person concerned in some financial outlay but if you help Doug it costs you nothing. He will arrange for your tickets to be delivered and the money collected and you take out your commission at source - you do not have to wait for it. I promise you that no one gets hurt if they return a few tickets unsold. Go on, give it a try and earn yourselves a little extra for those Christmas presents. By the way, if you sell a ticket for one of the bigger prizes you receive a very nice bonus but Doug will tell you the details if you get in touch with him.

I expect you all enjoy Les Large's cartoons that he is kindly donating to the Club and to cheer us all up a bit I would like to start a football joke series in this publication. But the jokes must come from you. An example: 'Heard about the player who hurt his back on his wedding night and sent on a substitute?' No folks, I did not write it. 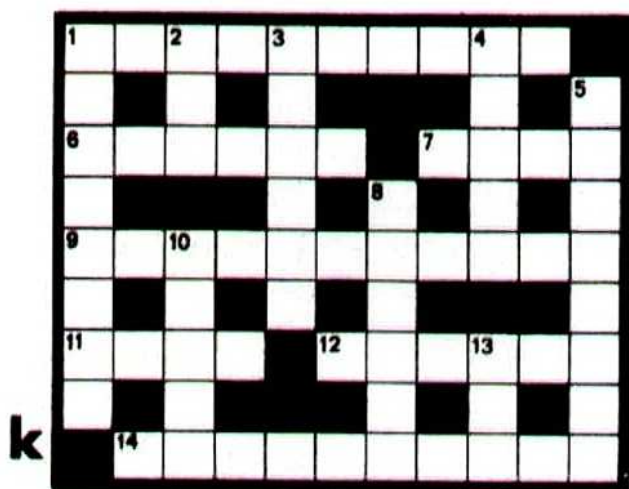

# A DECADE OF APPRENTICES AND NON-LEAGUE SIGNINGS TO MAKE THE LEAGUE GRADE by Dave King

How successful is our record of signing young apprentices and players from non-league clubs in the past decade who have played at League level? It is somewhat surprising how many have appeared, some to be quickly forgotten, others struck by the misfortune of injury, and the lucky ones who have been fortunate to carve a career spent mainly with this Club and to reach the echelons of a higher Division.

Taking a close scrutiny of the players who were appearing in the Club colours of 1972-73 we find that some players were already well established or nearing the end of their careers whilst for some opportunity knocked. Former apprentices or juniors appearing that season were the well established John Trollope and Don Rogers, Welsh born Terry Hubbard, and Roger Smart, also Jimmy Allan, former England schoolboy cap David Dangerfield and Ken Stroud. Signings from non-league Clubs who appeared were Rod Thomas from Southern League Gloucester City, Richard Legge from Western League Chippenham Town, David Moss from Witney Town and Chris Porter from Western League Bridgewater Town. Of these John Trollope, Don Rogers, Roger Smart, Jimmy Allan and Ken Stroud were to have long and prosperous careers in terms of appearances whilst a knee injury curtailed the promise of Terry Hubbard. Richard Legge and Chris Porter were to drift back onto the non-league circuit.

The following season new names to appear were Dave Syrett who played for England at Youth International level, joined by fellow apprentices Franco Sperti and Paul Fiocca alas neither of whom were to enjoy more than a handful of appearances. Dave Syrett was to eventually move around several of the lower League Clubs and is currently with Northampton Town.

It was not until two years later that three more apprentices were to make their debut at League level, John Gilligan, Ian Farr, and Geoff Chalklin were those to add their names to their predecessors on the League roll.

The following season 1976-77 saw the briefest of appearances by Phil Harris who appeared as a substitute at Portsmouth. A recommendation by former Town player Mel Nurse was to launch a League career for an unknown Welshman from Welsh League Club Everwarm, Russell Lewis.

In 1977-78 apprentice Gus Gilligan made 3 appearances and Kevin Roberts signed from Western League Club Welton Rovers made a solitary League appearance.

In 1979-80 Steve Abley signed from local Swindon League football made the breakthrough to be joined the following season by apprentices Charlie Henry, Brian Hughes and Paul Rideout.

1981-82 saw the emergence of our present full back Colin Bailie and from Northern League Club Oswestry Town Jimmy Quinn.

Last season 1982-83, Ray Baverstock, Paul Batty and Martin Blackler were to make the difficult transition from the ranks of apprentices.

It is obviously a matter of opinion to say whether the flow of apprentices and non-League signings are fruitful in terms of appearances and careers. Very few bright-eyed young players when they sign for their Clubs imagine the heartbreak that is before them, but there is more dismay than joy for many. A look at the appearances the mentioned have made for this Club gives a clear indication of the value the Club has gained in the search at the lower end of the financial scale of footballs spiralling costs.

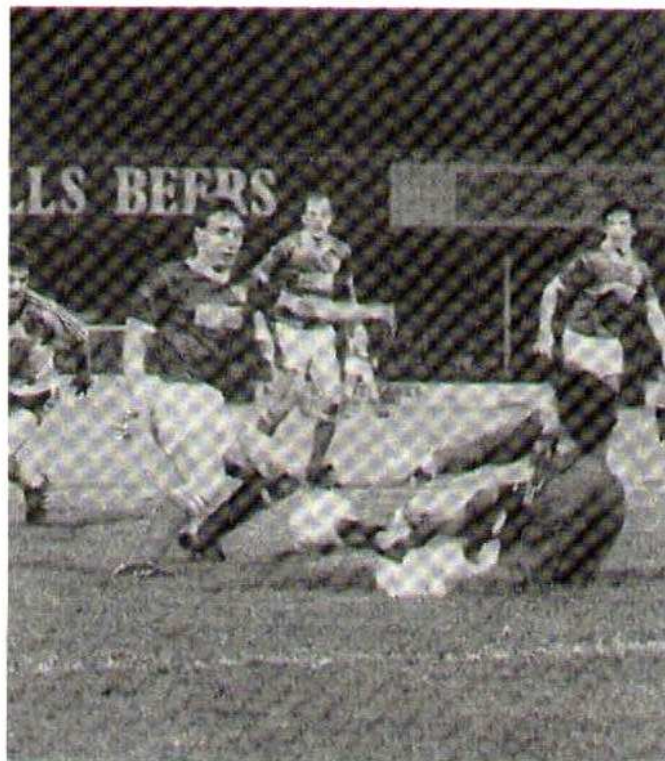
