

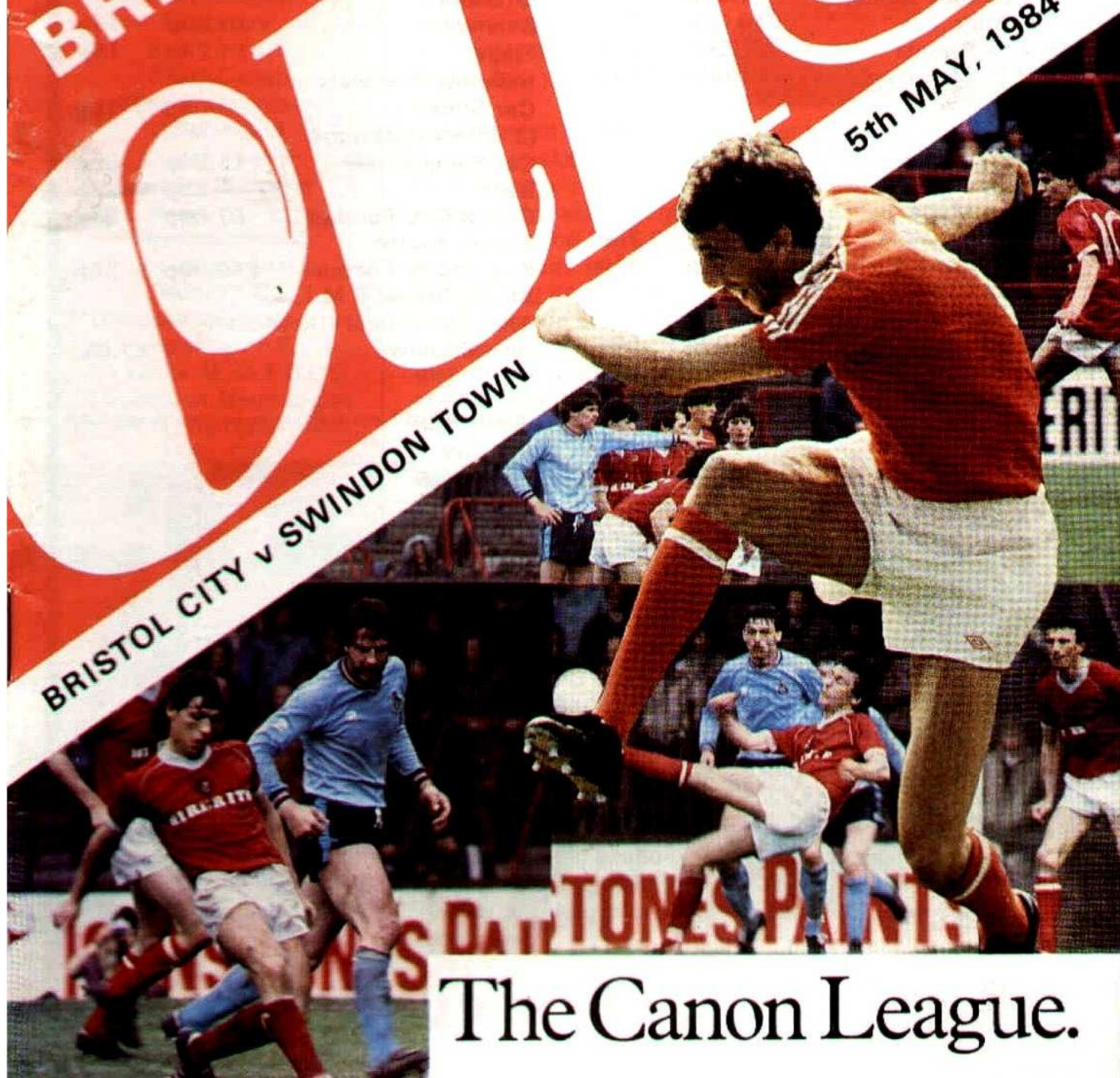

OUR VISITORS



Swindon Town by David M. Woods

We have pleasure in welcoming to 'Ashton Gate' today old rivals Swindon Town who were the opposition in our first ever match on the 1st September 1894, when we lost 2-4 on our old enclosure at 'St. Johns' Lane'.

Our visitors who are popularly known as the 'Moonrakers' after the old Wiltshire legend, the 'Robins' after the colour of their shirts or the 'Railwaymen' due to the development of Swindon as a Railway town, were formed in 1881 and became original members of the Southern League in 1894 finishing bottom of the First Division with the following record:-

Since then their principal achievements have been:- Football League Cup Winners 1968-9, beat Arsenal 3-1 after extra time at Wembley, F.A. Cup Semi-Finalists 1909-10, 1911-12, Quarter Finalists 1910-11, 1923-4, Football League Third Division Runners-Up 1962-3, 1968-9, F.A. Charity Shield Finalists 1911-12, lost to Manchester United 4-8, Anglo Italian Tournament Winners 1970, Southern League Champions 1910-11, 1913-14, Runners-Up 1908-09, 1909-10, 1912-13, F.A. Youth Cup Finalists 1963-4 lost 2-5 on aggregate to Manchester United.

Swindon joined the Football League with the majority of the other Southern League Division One clubs in 1920 on the formation of the Third Division (South) and the 'Moonrakers' playing record for their first season in the various Divisions of the Football League since then is as follows:-

Most points achieved, under the old system, is 64 out of 92 in 1968-9, least 25 out of 84 in 1973-4 and 30 out of 92 in 1955-6. Best scoring season was 1926-7 when 100 league goals were notched up in 42 matches and the Club's best defensive season was 1968-9 when only 35 goals were conceded in 46 matches. Highest league score was achieved on the very first day of the Third Division in 1920 when they beat Luton Town 9-1 but the Club's record win is 10-1 versus Farnham United Breweries in the F.A. Cup, Season 1925-6, and record defeat 1-10 versus Manchester City in the F.A. Cup of Season 1929-30. Most league goals in total aggregate was achieved by Harry Morris with 216 between 1926 and 1933 and the same player holds the Club record for the most goals in a league season with 47 in 1926-7 when he was also top scorer in the Third Division (South) a feat which he repeated the following season when he was again top scorer in the Division but this time with 38 goals and in season 1938-9 the Club again produced the Third Division (South) top scorer when G. Morton notched 28. Most league appearances were made by John Trollope with 770 between 1960 and 1980 and the Club's most capped player was Rod Thomas who made 30 of his 50 appearances for Wales while at Swindon and in regard to international players it is worth recalling that

in the period before the First World War when the 'Moonrakers' were in the Southern League, Harold Fleming who operated on the wing for the Club played 11 games for England. Swindon's highest position in the Football League was achieved in 1969-70 when they finished in 5th place in the Second Division and their lowest was in twice finishing bottom of the Third Division (South) in 1932-3 and 1955-6 together with their Fourth Division placing of 8th last season. On three occasions Swindon have had to apply for re-election.

Swindon play at the 'County Ground' where they have been since moving from the 'Croft' in 1896. Record attendance at the ground is 32,000 for an F.A. Cup 3rd Round match which was lost 0-2 versus Arsenal on the 15th January, 1972 and Record Receipts are £56,024 for an F.A. Cup 4th Round game versus Tottenham Hotspur on the 26th January 1980 which resulted in an 0-0 draw and thereby led to a replay which Spurs won 2-1.

The highest attendance for a meeting between our two teams was achieved at 'Ashton Gate' on Saturday, 12th March, 1927 for a top of the table clash when City put paid to Swindon's promotion challenge by winning 2-0 in a Football League Third Division (South) game with goals from Martin after 30 minutes and Tot Walsh after 67 before a crowd of 31,800 who had paid receipts of £1,833. The City went on to win the Championship with 62 points which, whilst being a new record total for the Division, was only 2 points in front of second placed Plymouth Argyle who around this time were almost perpetual runners up, and Swindon finished in fifth position with a points total of 51. The City in this Season also topped the Third Division (South) goalscoring charts with 104 and Swindon were second best with 100. City's total was, however, only the joint fourth best in the Football League as Middlesbrough and Manchester City both in the Second Division notched 122 and 108 respectively and Rochdale managed 105 in the Third Division (North). In this high scoring Season two other clubs scored over a century of goals as Nelson obtained 104 and Bradford Park Avenue 101 in the Third Division (North) so making a total of seven clubs who obtained a century of goals or more this Season.



Profile...

JIM ALLAN, Goalkeeper. Born Inverness. Now Swindon's longest serving player, he came to the club in 1970 from Scottish Junior Football and made his debut in September 1971 against QPR. Has since made 363 league appearances for the club to the end of last season.

KEVIN BADDELEY, Defender. Born Swindon. Served his apprenticeship with Bristol City and made his league debut against West Ham Utd. in August 1980. That was his only appearance for City but he established himself in Swindon's First Team shortly after his transfer in July 1981. Had made 65 league appearances to the end of last season and likes to overlap when he can. Can play in either full back position but usually on the left.

COLIN BAILIE, Defender. Born Belfast. A former apprentice he made his league debut at Oxford United in April 1982 and established himself in the first team last season with assured displays in both full back positions. Had made 27 League appearances to the end of last season.

LEIGH BARNARD, Midfield. Born Worsley. Served his apprenticeship with Portsmouth and after making his league debut against Exeter City in September 1977 went on to make 79 league appearances for Pompey. He also played 4 matches on loan to Peterborough but moved to Swindon in June 1982. Was ever present last season and is seen to best advantage on the left of midfield.

PAUL BATTY, Midfield. Born Edlington. Paul served his apprenticeship at Swindon and made his league debut against Crewe Alexandra in September 1982. He went on to make 39 league appearances last season and is a very promising player who makes up for his lack of height with all round determination.

GARY EMMANUEL, Midfield. Born Swansea. Gary began with Birmingham City making his debut at Stoke City in January 1975. He played 71 First Division games for the Blues, moved to Bristol Rovers in December 1978 and added 65 league appearances there before his transfer to Swindon in the 1981 close season. A hard working player who was held back by injury last season but had made 69 league appearances for the club by its end.

SCOTT ENDERSBY, Goalkeeper. Born Lewisham. Former Ipswich apprentice who moved to Tranmere Rovers for whom he made his league debut against Hereford United in September 1981. Spent two seasons between the posts for Tranmere before joining Swindon in May 1983.

MIKE GRAHAM, Defender. Born Lancaster. Mike began with Bolton Wanderers making his debut at Mansfield in March 1978. He made 46 appearances for Bolton before signing for Swindon in July 1981. Had made 76 league appearances for Swindon to the end of last season mainly playing beside the centre half but can also play in midfield or at fullback.

NIGEL GRAY, Defender. Born London. A tall centre half who signed for Swindon in July 1983 having previously played all his football for Orient with whom he had made around 230 league appearances since his debut against Bolton Wanderers in April 1975 to the end of last season.

CHARLIE HENRY, Defender. Born Acton. Former apprentice who signed professional in February 1980 and made his league debut as substitute at Reading in September of that year. Most of his 93 league appearances to the end of last

season have been at right full back, but he can also play in the centre of the defence.

DAVE HOCKADAY, Forward. Born Sedgefield. Dave's only previous club was Blackpool for whom he made his league debut in September 1976 at Notts County. He went on to make around 140 appearances for Blackpool before joining Swindon in the 1983 close season. Fast and tricky winger.

ALAN MAYES, Forward. Born London. Now in his second spell with Swindon, Alan began with QPR but his league debut came after a move to Watford and was against Port Vale in November 1974. He made 133 league appearances for Watford plus 10 on loan to Northampton Town before signing for Swindon in February 1979. Although at Swindon for less than two years, he made 89 league appearances and struck up a good partnership with Andy Rowland. He joined Chelsea in December 1980 and made about 70 league appearances for them before re-joining Swindon in July 1983. Mobile forward very quick in the penalty area.

GARY NELSON, Forward. Born Braintree. Joined Southend United from school and made his league debut as substitute against Colchester United in October 1979. He made around 100 appearances for Southend before his move to Swindon in August 1983.

JIMMY QUINN, Forward. Born Belfast. Signed from Oswestry Town in December 1981, he enjoyed a rapid rise from parks football to his league debut as substitute against Walsall in March 1982. A tall forward who is good in the air, his opportunities have been limited but he had made 18 league appearances by the end of last season.

PAUL RICHARDSON, Midfield. Born Nottingham. Paul joined Swindon in July 1983 as player-coach. He was an apprentice at Nottingham Forest and made his league debut at Liverpool in May 1968. There followed 221 league appearances for Forest before a move to Chester in October 1976. After 28 league appearances he moved on to Stoke City in July 1977 and played in the promotion winning season 1978/9. Moved to Sheffield Utd in August 1981 and made around 50 appearances there.

ANDY ROWLAND, Forward. Born Derby. Andy served his apprenticeship at Derby County but his league debut (which was actually at Swindon) came after a transfer to Bury in August 1974. He was three times leading scorer at Bury and played 174 league games for them before his transfer to Swindon in September 1978. A consistent goalscorer (but also the club emergency goalkeeper) he had made 186 league appearances for the club at the end of last season.

SIMON GIBSON, Defender. Born Nottingham. A rugged centre-half signed from Chelsea on loan on 20th October 1983. After one month, transferred to the County Ground on 17th November 1983.

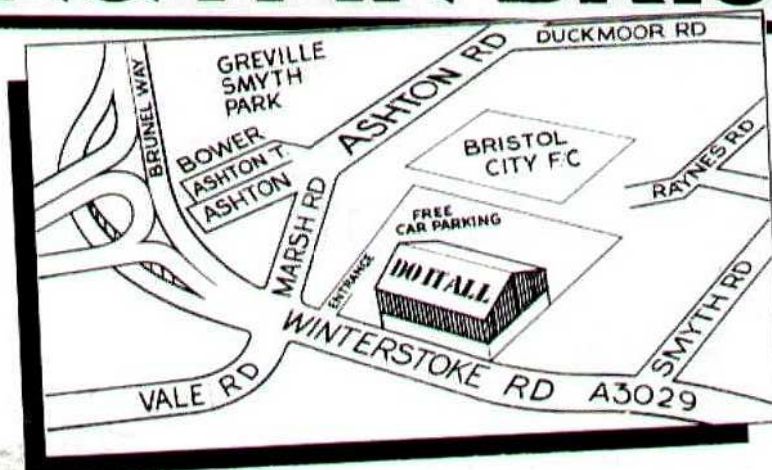
KEN BEAMISH, Manager. Appointed Manager in April 1983 after a spell as Caretaker Manager. He joined the club in the summer of 1981 as player/coach after a career as a centre forward that took him to a number of different clubs. He started and finished his playing career at Tranmere Rovers, but also played for Brighton, Blackburn Rovers, Port Vale and Bury and made 2 league appearances for Swindon in the 1981/2 season. A prolific scorer as a player, he starts his first full season as Manager with a number of new players of his own choosing.
