


The Robins from Wrexham

The North Wales Club come to the County Ground for our opening League match of the season hoping for a significant improvement on their form of last season when they finished one place above the four clubs seeking re-election. At one stage of last season they lost six successive matches at home which included a 3-0 defeat by us. At the end of last season they gave free transfers to six players, Darren Baker, Steve Buxton, Seamus Heath, Steve Jones, Meowin Evans, and Ian Arkwright. Manager Bobby Roberts, who joined the club in June 1982 after previously managing Colchester United, has made four new signings, Barry Horne (Rhyl), Kevin Rogers (Birmingham City) defender Mike Williams (Chester) and Paul Manns also from Chester who joined the club last week just in time to register for European Soccer, Wrexham will be Wales' Representative in the Cup Winners Cup, having been defeated finalists in last season two legged final with Shrewsbury Town who are ineligible for entry. In their pre-season friendlies Wrexham suffered defeat at home to First Division Chelsea (0-1), away to Northwich Victoria (0-1) and recording a victory at Bangor (0-4). The squad at the disposal of Manager Bobby Roberts includes the following:-Goalkeeper STUART PARKER is 20 years old and joined the club as an apprentice, played in nine League Matches Last Season, ideal build for a keeper, made his debut the previous season at Reading. Former Shrewsbury Town defender JAKE KING is now in his third season with the club, 29 year old Jake a Scot born in Glasgow made fourty four appearances in the Racecourse Club's League campaign last season, scored four goals all at home. Another former Shrewsbury player is JOHN KEAY also a Scot born in Glasgow, also in his third season with the Club after joining them for a fee of £18,000, appeared in thirty eight League matches last season scoring three goals all in away matches. Fellow defender NEIL SALATHIEL was released by the Club three seasons ago, and after making twenty one appearances for Crewe Alexandra in 1982-83 season. He left for South Africa, returning last season rejoining Wrexham playing in twe ty nine of their League Matches. Former Colchester United defender STEVE WRIGHT spent a season in Finland before returning before the start of last season to make thirty seven League appearances in Wrexham's colours. New signing MIKE WILLIAMS from Chester is a former Welsh Youth International, a club apprentice, he was given a free transfer at the end of last season after twenty league appearances, and joined the Racecourse Clubthis summer, scored two League goals last season. Midfield player ANDY EDWARDS, born in Wrexham established a regular place last season. Town fans will remember Andy as the player who spoilt their Christmas with the only goal of the match here on Becember 27th. Last season, in all he netted seven goals in his thirtysix League appearances, Andy is eighteen years old. JOHN MULDOON appeared in thirty nine League matches last season scoring four goals, a former Club apprentice he had made his League debut the previous season at Preston, John is nineteen. BARRY HORNE was signed during the close season for Non-League Rhyl, another summer signing was former Aston Villa apprentice KEVIN ROGERS on a free transfer from Birmingham City, where he played in nine League Matches Last Season, scoring once.
Up front the vastly experienced DAVE GREGOR began his career with his home town Club Peterborough United. Thirty Three year old Dave



THE ROBINS FROM WREXHAM CONTINUED ...

scored nineteen goals in fourty four League Appearances, last season scoring a hat trick in the last home match of the season against Tranmere Rovers which helped to lift the Welsh club clear of re-After starting his career with Peterborough, his goal scoring prowess attracted First Division Stoke City to pay £55,000 for his services. Two £30,000 took him to Bury and onto Portsmouth where our former player Frank Burrows signed him for Pompey when he was manager at Fratton Park. Dave joined Wrexham on a free transfer two seasons ago and his career goal tally in League Matches now stands at ninety two League goals. Dumfries born JIM STEEL joined Wrexham during the second half of last season making twenty one League appearances but he has yet to rediscover the goal touch he showed when previously on loan from Oldham Athletic, scoring six goals in nine matches. Jim was signed from Port Vale whom he had joined from Oldham for a fee of £5,000. PAUL MANNS signed for the Welsh Club last week, 23 year old Paul began his career with Cardiff City but it was only on joining Notts County that he made his League Debut, after only seven first team appearances he was given a free transfer and joined Chester and it was from the Sealand Road Club. He joined Wrexham. Paul appeared at the County Ground in our first home match of last season when we defeated Chester 4-0 and could well appear in our first home match of this season but in different colours, made sixteen league appearances for Chester last season.

10 Years Ago - August 1974.

With Danny Williams starting his first full season as manager after returning to Swindon the previous March, much was being expected of the team in their first season back in Division 111 for five years. Strengthened by the signing of Jimmy Barron and Hugh MacLean, Swindon opened their League programme with a home game against newly - promoted Bury.

A crowd of 6,441 saw Bury, managed by Bob Smith, score an easy 2-0 win with a first - half penalty and a goal late in the game by a certain Andy Rowland. With the Town side lacking in rhythm it was only a brilliant display by 'keeper Barron that kept the score

respectable.

An improved display three days later, on the 20th, saw Swindon unluckily go out of the League Cup to 2nd Division Portsmouth, who won by a single Norman Piper goal, before gaining the first point of the season at Port Vale. Goals by MacLean and Moss saw Swindon gain a 2-0 lead after 16 minutes, but slackness in defence resulting in a

sharing of points.

In an attempt to strengthen the defence Colin Prophett was signed on a months loan from Norwich, but he didn't play in the first win of the season on the following Saturday, against Blackburn. Two first - half goals by Dixon and Eastoe saw Swindon climb into eleventh place with the following team: - Barron, McLaughlin, Trollope, Hubbard, Potter, Butler, Moss, Dixon, Eastoe, MacLean, Jenkins.

20 Years Ago - August 1964.

Trying to emulate the previous seasons start, Swindon travelled to Bury for the opening Division II game of the season on the 22nd. After making an excellent start through a Bill Atkins first minute goal, the Town eventually crashed 1-6 after goalkeeper Norman Oakley had been injured trying to prevent the equaliser. With the use of substitutes still a year away Owen Dawson was the unfortunate one to conceed a further five goals.

With Tony Hicks taking over in goal for the first home game three days later, 17,446 saw the following team beat Crystal Palace 2-0:-Hicks, Dawson, Trollope, Morgan, McPherson, Smart, Summerbee, Hunt, Large, Atkins, Rogers. A goal in each half by Ernie Hunt was enough to secure both points, but Palace were lucky to get away so lightly.

For the third and final game this month Leyton Orient were the visitors. Intent on at least a point, Orient played the game with a packed defence which didn't help the Town's forwards who were having an off - day. It was typical of the game that the only goal, scored by Rogers, took a deflection on the way in, as the Orient keeper would have saved it had remained true.

30 Years Ago - August 1954.

The month of August started as usual with two annual events - a cricket match against Swindon C.C., and the Reds v Blues public practice match. This was the total preparation, apart from normal training, for the first match of the season - away to re-elected Colchester on the 21st. With only one new signing, Henry Williams from Bury, in the side. The result was a goal-less draw; the game being noted for the safe displays by keepers Burton and Kirk, although both sides had their fair share of goal attempts.

In the opening programme of this season we will take a look at the career of our New Manager former Glasgow Celtic, Manchester United and Scottish International Lou Macari. Born on June 4th 1949 in Edinburgh, Lou was educated at St Michael's, Kilwinning. schoolboy level he was capped several times and soon attracted the attention of Scotland's premier team Glasgow Celtic, managed by Jock

Joining Celtic as an apprentice during the period when Glasgow Celtic became the first British Club to win the European Cup in 1967, he was playing alongside a fellow apprentice by the name of Kenny Dalglish. Such are the names that crop up during Lou's career that it's like reading a soccers Who's Who. It was in 1969 that Lou made his debut for Celtic in a team boasting such famous Scottish names as Billy McNeill, now the Manchester City Manager, Tommy Gemmell, Jimmy Johnstone, his career at Parkhead was relatively short but during that time he collected three League Cup Runners-up awards.

Lou made 49 SCOTTISH LEAGUE appearances with eight as substitute scoring 26 goals in his Celtic career along with the following appearances in other competitions: SCOTTISH F.A. CUP appearances 8 goals 8, SCOTTISH LEAGUE CUP appearances 19(3) goals 14, EUROPE appearances 13 goals 9.

The International career of Lou in the blue shirt of Scotland began in 1972 in an Under 23 International victory over Wales by 2-0 at Aberdeen, on January 26th, this was quickly followed by another Under 23 International at Derby on February 16th in a 2-2 draw with England, the teams on that evening make interesting reading. ENGLAND Parker, Mills, Robson, Hudson, Booth, Blockley, Keegan, Channon, MacDonald, Currie, Thomas. Scorers: Channon (2)

SCOTLAND Hunter, Brownlie, Donachie, Jardine, Connelly, Buchan, Carr, Hartford, MACARI, Dalglish, Bone. Scorers: Dalglish (2)

That same year Lou tasted full International Honours on May 24th at Hampden in a 1-0 win over Wales when he came on as a substitute for John O'Hare, Scotland's goal coming from Peter Lorimer. His first full match for his country came in the 1-0 defeat at Hampden on May 27th at the expense of England.

A few months later Tommy Docherty, who gave Lou his first international cap, took him to Old Trafford after a transfer battle with Liverpool's Bill Shankly for his signature for a fee of £200,000, and so began a relationship with United which was to last eleven years. Debut day for Lou at Old Trafford came in a First Division match on January 20th 1973 in a 2-2 draw with West Ham, making a dream start by netting a second half equaliser after United were trailing 1-2 at half-time in front of 50,878 Old Trafford faithfuls, the United team that day:- Stepney, Young, Forsyth, Law, Holton, Buchan, Morgan, MacDougall, Charlton, LOU MACARI and Graham. SECOND DIVISION

Gloom was to descend on Old Trafford the following season when along with Norwich and Southampton, United were relegated to the Second Division. Under the guidance of Tommy Docherty they soon bounced back and the thirty five appearances of that season in Division Two were until this season the only matches in which he has appeared outside of First Division football in 311 appearances for United, with eighteen as substitute, scoring 79 goals.

To follow that Second Division Champhionship Medal in 1975 was an F.A. Cup Winner Medal in 1977 when United defeated Liverpool at Wembley 1-0; it was Lou's drive ricocheting off Jimmy Greenhoff which sealed United's triumph. That success was sandwiched between two Losers Medals when United were beaten by Southampton in the 1976

Wembley Cup Final and Arsenal in 1979 Final.




