In wet weather, road spray provides what is probably the most dangerous driving condition of all. Particularly on fast roads and motorways.


"SPRAY BREAKER", manufactured by major Commercial Vehicle Mudguard Manufacturers, Boydell & Jacks Ltd., at Burnley, is a system of special mudflaps and valances, designed and developed by the company to reduce road spray generated by trucks and also cars which improves vision for drivers following or overtaking other vehicles.

A tough, lightweight pad is attached to truck and car mudflaps. This catches the water thrown up by the tyre and by using air speed the water is forced out at the bottom of the flap, returning the water to the road in large droplets rather than as fine blinding spray into the air as happens with conventional mudflaps.

The Department of Transport is at this time writing Legislation to reduce Road Spray on our Roads.



Our visitors today, Swindon Town were the team who closed off the 1983/4 season last May here at Gigg Lane when Bury won 2-1 through a goal each from Craig Madden and Eric Potts. Swindon's 17 goal leading scorer Alan Mayes provided the Robins consolation goal. In last season's programme I made the mistake of offering our former player Ken Beamish 'all the best in his future managerial career' which really does appear slightly ironic now! Swindon's final league position of 16th was the lowest in their history and resulted in the sacking of Beamish and his player/coach Paul Richardson.

The Robins signed a sponsorship deal in July with Insurers, Lowndes Lambert reportedly worth £150,000 over a two year spell and a 'nationally known Manager' was immediately made the number one priority. Liverpool's Phil Thompson and Southampton's Mick Mills thought over offers from Swindon before deciding to stay in the first division before Lou Macari was appointed on 23rd July as player/manager. 35 year old Lou is of course well known in this area having been granted a free transfer after ten years at Old Trafford, crowned last May with a sell-out testimonial game against his old club Celtic which yielded a huge £100,000. Another personality with Old Trafford connections followed Lou to the County ground - Harry Greg and as Assistant Manager forms a partnership full of experience both on and off the field.

Transferwise over the Summer, striker Jimmy Quinn joined Blackburn for a tribunal settled fee, Gary Emmanuel signed for Newport County and Kevin Baddeley - freed by Beamish - was re-signed by Macari. Hyde United's Peter Coyne moved south for a £2,000 fee in August and has immediately gained a first team place. Once a haven for ex-Bury management and players, The County Ground houses just one such person nowadays - our former striker Andy Rowland who these days plays much of the time as a centre-half, and even occasionally in goal! KEVIN BADDELEY. Defender. Born Swindon. Served his apprenticeship with Bristol City and made his debut against West Ham United in August 1980. That was, however, to be his only appearance for City before he moved to Swindon in July 1981. Usually a left full back he made 102 appearances to the end of last season when he was given a free transfer but re-signed in August 1984.

COLIN BAILIE. Full Back. Born Belfast. A former apprentice he made his league debut at Oxford United in April 1982. He became an established member of the team last season at the end of which he had made 71 appearances.

LEIGH BARNARD. Midfield. Born Worsley. Served his apprenticeship with Portsmouth. He made 89 appearances for Pompey plus 4 on loan to Peterborough United before signing for Swindon in July 1982. He can play in any midfield position but is, perhaps, best wide on the left.

PAUL BATTY. Midfield. Born Doncaster. A former Swindon apprentice who made his league debut against Crewe Alexandra in September 1982. He quickly became a regular in the centre of midfield and had made 91 appearances to the end of last spason.

PETER COYNE. Striker, Joined Manchester Utd. in 1975 where he played for two years including one full game in the First Team. He then joined non-league Ashton Utd. before signing for Crewe in 1978 for whom he played around 120 First Team games.

SCOTT ENDERSBY. Goalkeeper. Born Lewisham. Served his apprenticeship at Ipswich Town where he won an England Youth Cap. He moved to Tranmere Rovers in the summer of 1981. He made 91 appearances for the Birkenhead club and joined Swindon in July 1983.

MIKE GRAHAM. Defender. A former Bolton Wanderers player, he joined Swindon in July 1981 and had made 125 appearances at the end of last season when he was given a free transfer under the Freedom of Contract rules but re-signed in August 1984. Most of his appearances have been alongside the centre-half but he has also played at full-back and in midfield.

LOU MACARI. Midfield. Born Edinburgh. Swindon's Player/Manager appointed in July 1984 after a distinguished career with Celtic, Manchester Utd. and Scotland. He also gained 24 Scottish caps. Originally a forward he has played more in midfield in recent years but continued to score goals regularly.

ALAN MAYES. Forward. Born London. Alan's in his second spell with the club having re-signed in July 1983 after 76 appearances for Chelsea. A mobile striker whos skills enable him to make as well as take chances. He made 43 appearances last season.

GARRY NELSON. Forward. Born Braintree. Garry's only previous club was Southend Utd. He made 140 appearances for Southend and joined Swindon in July 1983. Basically an old fashioned left winger who likes to get past his full back he made 43 appearances last season.

ANDY ROWLAND. Forward. Born Derby. Although Andy began with Derby County it was not until he moved to Gigg Lane that he played first team football, making a total of 203 appearances for Bury before moving to Swindon in September 1978.

## SEASON 1926/1927

1926/1927 season is undoubtedly one which is looked back upon and summed up as a year of disappointment and frequent upsets. After reaching the Club's greatest achievement – a league position of fourth in Division One, the Manager J. H. Thomson had kept on 29 of the previous season's players and decided that no new signings were necessary to improve further the team's fortunes.

Early results appeared to point to a repeat push for the league title, as Champions Huddersfield were held 2-2 on the opening day of the season. Norman Bullock cracked home a hat-trick in the 5-2 victory against Everton followed by a further 2 goals in the 7-3 demolition of West Brom – a game which saw the Shakers hit 4 first half goals in a 14 minute purple patch. Ironically after this emphatic win Bury managed to win just one of the following 7 home games and by the time Christmas approached, the Shakers lay down in 17th position. Norman Bullock's goal supply had dried up somewhat although when capped once again for England on 20th October against Ireland in a game played at Liverpool, he did manage to notch a goal in a 3-3 draw. The Club had decided to grant benefits to four of the longest serving players during the summer and when Bury lost 2-3 at home to Cardiff in late October (one of 8 home defeats) the gate receipts were split equally between Fred Smith, Billy Stage and David Robbie.

With the decline in fortune - and a broken leg sustained by full-back Fred Heap at Derby, the Club signed a new right-back on 22nd December Sam Wynne from Oldham. The fee involved was a club record at the time – £2,250 and Wynne made his Gigg Lane debut against Sheffield Wed. A further player was signed in January, Alex Massie from Ayr United. The problems on and off the field continued though and on February 10th, Manager John Thomson resigned due to what the Bury Times described as 'a slight disagreement with the Club's Directors' – perhaps bad results during the previous 2 months? Shortly after, Thomson was appointed as Manager of Swansea Town, the team who had knocked Bury out of the F.A. Cup and he returned to Gigg Lane to sign 'keeper Davies and half-back Seymour. Club Secretary Frank Hamer replaced him as Manager on a temporary basis until the end of the

season.

Throughout the months of February, March and April, Bury lay in 18th position with poor results threatening the Shakers continued safety in the top division and further tragedy struck on 30th April in a game against Sheffield Utd. at Bramall Lane. Bury's crowd favourite and record signing Sam Wynne collapsed after 38 minutes when trying to place a ball for a free kick and was stretchered into the dressing room where the player died, apparently of a cerebral haemorrhage. The news was broken to the 22,000 crowd and the game abandoned at halftime. For the rearranged game on 5th May Sheffield United donated the total receipts to Wynne's widow and along with a subscription fund £1,400 was raised.

Therefore under trying circumstances, a final position of 19th had earned the Shakers at least a further 12 month long stay in Division One. Gates averaging around the 15,700 mark resulting in a working loss of £1680-17-7d for the season and the Club's credit balance now stood at £10,329-16-2d.






