Wrexham will be all out for revenge today having "unluckily" lost to Swindon on the opening day of the season. Amongst the scorers that day was Lou Macari, the ex-Celtic and Manchester United Scottish International who has taken his first steps in management at the County Ground. Their mid-table position reflects the fact that the team has lacked consistency, making promotion very difficult to achieve although not impossible.

HISTORY

Swindon Town were formed in 1881 and they spent their early years playing at the Croft, which was also the home of Swindon Rangers Rugby Club. The football club eventually moved to the County Ground in 1895, having firmly established themselves in the Southern League.

In 1910, the Robins reached the semi-final of the F.A. Cup having eliminated Burnley, Tottenham Hotspur and Manchester City on the way. They were beaten by eventual winners Newcastle United but their taste for Cup football had only just wetted. The following Woolwich season Arsenal succumbed to the challenge of Swindon and it was left to Chelsea to halt their challenge in the quarter finals. In 1911, it was back to the semi-final stage where they lost to Barnsley in a replay, having earlier beaten West Ham United and Everton.

Such consistant performances made admittance to the league a formality when the Third Division (South) was established in 1920. They could not have wished for a better start beating Luton Town 9-1 in their opening game. Their English International Harold Fleming scored four of the goals that day and his association with Swindon Town only came about because of a breakdown in health. On Docotr's orders, Fleming was advised to take up an outdoor occupation. He chose football and was instrumental in Swindon's F.A. Cup giant-killing victories.

Swindon remained in the Third Division until 1963 when they finally won promotion to Division Two. Throughout this spell it always seemed to be a case of their league form suffering from their exertions in the various cup competitions.

Relegation followed in 1965 but within four years they had regained their place in the Second Division as well as winning the League Cup Final. Indeed, 1969 proved to be the most historic club's year in the 88-year

existence.

On the 15th March 1969, their supporters arrived at the Twin Towers of Wembley to find the hallowed turf barely visible amongst a mixture of sludge and sand. Arsenal could never master the conditions as well as their Third Division counterparts. Thus, it was no surprise when Roger Smart gave Swindon the lead after Ian Ure's backpass had stuck in the mud. However, with just four minutes left, Town goalkeeper Peter Downsborough made his only mistake of the match allowing Bobby Gould to equalise for the London side. In extra time, Don Rogers

wrote his name into the history books with two sparkling goals which thoroughly demoralised their famous opponents. Swindon

manager, Danny Williams, called it "A triumph of fitness and attacking football."

For once they managed to harness their cup exploits with league points and they finished runners-up to Watford on goal-average. This time their stay in the Second Division lasted six years and in recent years the gloom was only lifted during the reign of Bobby Smith as manager.

THE MANAGER

Suffice to say that Lou Macari hardly needs an introduction. However, for those of you who have been living on a different planet for the last 14 years, the statistics of his career bear testimony to the "little man's" - 24 Scottish Interability national Caps between 1972 and 1978, three Scottish League Championship and two Scottish F.A. Cup winners medals with Celtic. At Old Trafford, Lou helped Manchester United to two F.A. Cup Finals and indeed scored the winning goal against Liverpool in 1977. A Milk Cup runners-up medal in 1983 and a Second Division Championship medal in 1975 also found their way to the Macari household. In all competitions,up to August 1984, he had made 478 appearances, plus another 46 as substitute, scoring 160 goals.

LINKS

Born in Chester in 1904, Gordon Gunson holds the distinction of having been the first Wrexham player to score a goal in the 4th Round of the F.A. Cup. Following a brilliant schools career, Gunson joined Nelson, then a Football League team, at the age of 18 before moving on to Wrexham in 1926. Indeed, he nearly became a Welsh International as he later recalled. "It was in 1928, and I had just received a letter informing me of my selection for the Welsh team, which was quite surprising as I was born in Chester, but instead of just 'cracking on' and joining the squad, I told the club secretary about my selection, and he in turn had to tell the Welsh F.A.

That same year he scored a 30 yard goal against Birmingham in Wrexham's first ever match in the 4th Round of the Cup. He later moved to Sunderland and then on to Liverpool and Swindon before rejoining the Reds in 1935.

THIS SEASON

Swindon's 4-0 win over Chesterfield on New Year's Day was undoubtedly their best result of the season to date and suggests that we are in for a hard match

today.

The Robins away form has been erratic this season with only two wins, at Tranmere (2–0) and Rochdale (1-0). Draws have been obtained at Hartlepool (2-2), Mansfield (0-0)and Exeter (1-1). Their five defeats on their travels have been at Bury (0-2), (2-3), Northampton Crewe (0-4). Darlington (0-1) and Southend.

The last line of defence for Swindon is Scott Endersby. Born in Lewisham, he appeared in an F.A. Cup tie for Kettering Town at the age of 15 but served his apprenticeship at Ipswich Town where he won an England Youth Cap. He moved to Tranmere Rovers in the summer of 1981 and made his league debut against Hereford Utd. in September 1981. He made 91 appearances for the Birkenhead club before joining Swindon in July 1983. Scott made 40 appearances last season and was voted Supporters Player of the Season.

The two full-back berths are filled by Colin Bailie and Nigel Gray. Bailie was born in Belfast and joined the club as an apprentice. He made his league debut at Oxford United in April, 1982 but began to claim a regular place in the side the following season. Colin is now approaching a century of games for the club. Gray was born in Fulham and is

an experienced defender with 262 appearances for Orient, his only other club, plus 3 on loan to Charlton Athletic before joining Swindon in July 1983. Gray made only 16 appearances last season and indeed had a spell on loan to Brentford. The central-defensive pairing is Andy Rowland and Mike Graham, Rowland began his career with Derby County but had to move to Bury in August 1974 to taste league football. Arrived at the County Ground in September 1978 and in recent seasons has made the successful move from goal-getter to goalstopper. Graham is a former Bolton Wanderers player who made his debut for them at Mansfield in March 1978 and went on to appear 51 times for that club. He joined Swindon in July 1981 and had made 125 appearances at the end of last season when he was given a free transfer under the Freedom of Contract rules but re-

signed in August 1984.

In midfield, Lou Macari is using his experience to guide his team. He is joined by Paul Batty, Henry and Charlie Hockaday. Batty is a former apprentice who made his league debut against Crewe in September 1982. He quickly became the centre of midfield and had made 91 appearances to the end of last season. Although short for a professional footballer he makes up in determination for his lack of inches. Henry is another former apprentice and he made his debut for the club at Lincoln in 1980. Born in Acton, he is a popular and hard tackling player. Dave Hockaday spent eight seasons at Blackpool before moving to Swindon in July 1983. Born in Billingham, he is a versatile player whose best position is on the right wing although he can also play as a central forward. He made 39 appearances last season.

Up front, Peter Coyne has been regularly amongst the goals this season. Peter joined Man-chester United in 1975 where he made only one full first team appearance, scoring in a 1-2 defeat at Leicester City. He then joined non-league Ashton United before signing for Crewe in 1978 for whom he played around 120 First Team games. In 1981 he joined Hyde Utd. before signing for Swindon in August 1984. Gary Nelson joined Swindon from Southend Utd. in July 1983. He is basically an old fashioned left-winger who likes to get past his full back; he made 43 appearances last season. Colin Gordon has made a number of appearances in recent weeks and scored a brace of goals in Tuesday's win over

Chesterfield.

Major F. E. Soames was prior to the 1914-18 War, a regular affect with the Royal Welch Fusiliers and after services in France during that War, spent some years in Kenya in British East Africa, returning to this country in 1923 to take over the management of his father's Beewery business-F. W. Soumes & Co. This business was later amalgamated with Island Green Brewery and is now known as Border Breweres (Wrex ham) Ltd., of which Major Soames is Chairman.

Major Soames has followed his father's interest in the welfare of Wresham AFC, and is a frequent attender at Wresham Home Marches.





It's always nice to welcome old friends back to the Racecourse, and over the holiday period we saw **Simon Hunt** returning from Sweden.

Hunt left Wrexham last summer, but returned last week with his Swedish wife Lena to stay with his parents in Saltney — and he took the opportunity to drop in at the Racecourse and look up some old friends at the club.

"I've kept in touch with a number of the lads since I left," he said, "and even though I wanted to leave Wrexham when I did, I wouldn't have missed visiting the ground while I was over here."

His first contact with Sweden came when he met Lena on holiday in Ibiza. After a whirlwind romance they got married in Lena's home town, and the newspaper there published a 'local girl marries English professional footballer' feature.

Neighbouring first division club Elfborg picked up the story and asked Hunt to train with them.

"I said I couldn't as obviously I was still on contract with Wrexham," he said.

"They decided they wanted to buy me, Wrexham wanted to sell — and after a little haggling over the price, Bobby Roberts actually flew out to clinch the deal.

"I was delighted. It offered me a new start,

and gave me the chance to show what I can do in a completely different style of football."

Hunt's being paid as a student while he learns Swedish "I can hold a conversation now" — and he's playing continental football in a side he feels could more than hold their own in the English second division.

"Most of the clubs in this league could," he said, "while Malmo and Gothenburg could probably make a go of it in the first. And to gauge our standard, we played Manchester City in a friendly in October and beat them 2-1."

He missed out on Wrexham's glory-run in Europe this season after helping them to the Welsh Cup final the previous term, but he feels he's been more than compensated for that.

"I'm on a 2½-year contract at Elfsborg playing an exciting brand of continental football. I've just turned 22, and I've got a far better chance of being spotted by a big-name European side there than I would have done at Wrexham.

"I'm aiming for the top."

"But ," I said, "don't forget they're WELSH pigeons here!"

Club Profile

To continue from where we left off in the Colchester programme, today we feature the 'engine-room' behind the Wrexham reserve set-up, George McGowan. George, who is now in his seventh season with Wrexham, has seen the gradual slide of our fortunes from second division days back in the late 70's.

Even though George was born in Scotland, he did play most of his football south of the border, this after giving up his career as a boxer (he was runner-up in the British Championships), taking his father's advice to choose football. He joined Motherwell 'juniors', however his big break into professional football came at Preston North End. As an outside right George went on to play for Chester and Stockport, where his pro-career was curtailed by ligament damage in his left knee.

To take this kind of blow at the age of 23 must have been heart-breaking for George who then dropped into non-league football, spending eight happy years under Tommy Jones at Bangor before moving on eventually, after a number of transfers, to Porthmadog.

It was here that George McGowan's coaching career took off, for whilst he was at Porthmadog, George attained his coaching badges under, then Wales manager, Mike Smith and was invited to join the Wrexham set-up by Arfon Griffiths, who asked George to supervise the

At that time the Youths were known as Wrexham 'B' and were in the Welsh National League; the reserves being in the Lancashire League under the guidance of Ken Roberts and Mickey Evans. Of course, when Wrexham fortunes changed as they slithered down the tables, Ken and Mickey had to go, as financial cutbacks were enforced and George McGowan found himself as Reserve team coach.

However, he is still dealing with Wrexham's Youth, because our reserve side has an average age of no more than 17, simply because our first team squad is so small. So does George feel happy with the present reserve set-up? He replied:

"I'd like to see the reserve side in a higher grade of football, but I think that we should keep a side in the Welsh National League. It is this stepping stone to league football that has been missing lately, and I think the 'step' into league soccer is too great at present. Our players need this professional step to prepare them for a league career.

Does George feel that better times are ahead with the present 'crop' he's got to deal with? "Oh, yes. Obviously they are a good bunch of lads and I'm confident that given time we'll make it through."

Confidence from George who, with his assistant Brian Prandle, must get extremely frustrated telling players that they'll have to go, simply because there's no chance of them making the grade under the present set-up. One thing is certain, however, this bubbly Scot is making every effort to maintain the excellent standards of youth teams of the past here at Wrexham and one feels that George McGowan will be a key figure in the future of Wrexham F.C. However, I don't think anyone is envious of his task!

Well, we've reached the halfway point of the season, with most clubs having played 23 games out of the 46 in total.
