SWINDON TOWN

Today we welcome a Swindon team currently in mid-table in what is only their third ever season in Division Four and for many of our older fans memories will be reawakened of their numerous encounters with us in the old Division Three (South) days. Founded in 1881 Swindon were still members of the Southern League when reaching the F.A. Cup semi final in both 1910 and 1912. Like numerous other Southern League Clubs they formed the new Division Three in 1920. This became Division Three (South) a year later upon the formation of the Northern section and they stayed there throughout its existence. Up to the reorganisation in 1958 they had survived four re-election applications and had climbed to fourth place on three occasions.

1958 saw them moving up to Division Two for the first time ever and though they slipped back down again in 1960 this heralded the most successful spell in their history. With men like Ernie Hunt, Mike Summerbee and Don Rogers in their lineup they pulled off several useful cup feats, reaching a climax in 1968-69 when winning the FL Cup (now the Milk Cup) after beating Arsenal at Wembley. For good measure they also won promotion that season and just a year later they climbed to fifth place in Division Two and also won the Anglo-Italian Cup. They were relegated in 1974 and then came a period of fluctuating fortunes. They just missed promotion in 1974-75 but then came several relegation scares before finally going down at the end of 1981-82, losing their last game at Newport when a win would have kept them up.

In the last two seasons they have finished eighth and fifteenth respectively. Though in mid-table throughout last season they did enjoy an FA Cup run, beating Kettering, Millwall and Carlisle before going down 2-1 to Second Division Blackburn.

THIS SEASON

So far this season they have lost at home to Port Vale and ourselves and also went out of the FA Cup in a replay with non-league Dagenham. On their travels they have won at Tranmere and Rochdale while on New Year's Day they chalked up a fine 4-0 win against Chesterfield. Longserving Andy Rowland and new signing Dale Gordon got two goals each in the Chesterfield game and others needing to be watched today include Peter Coyne (ex-Manchester United and Crew) in his first season and former Blackpool man David Hockaday in his second season. Also capable of snatching the odd goal is that old warhorse Lou Macari in his first season as player/manager while in midfield Paul Batty is a home-grown product. Garry Nelson from Scotland and Nigel Gray (ex-Orient) are both in their second seasons while Charlie Henry and Colin Baillie are one-club men in defence. Chris Ramsey has arrived from Brighton this season and in goal Scott Endersby is the former Tranmere man in his second season.







ODD HAPPENINGS

Wartime games had their own idiosyncrasies with guest players often out-numbering the number of signed-up players in teams as they battled away in the Regional League and Cup competitions that did so much to keep up morale in those dark days. Goals flowed freely, games were often played in conditions that would guarantee a postponement today and one even recalls seeing a left flank defender wearing a flat cap in one Midland game.

Something of the, what one might term, pleasant oddity lingered in the early postwar years. John Oakes captained Charlton to the first postwar final at the age of 41, while on the opposite side Jack Nicholas led Derby to victory at 38. In this selfsame final the ball burst as it did in the following years final between Charlton and Burnley. Not to be outdone New Brighton manager Neil McBain kept goal for New Brighton at Hartlepool a few years later. He conceded three goals but played well in view of the fact that in his heyday he was an 'out' player and not a goalkeeper.

Goalkeepers of that early postwar era seemed to have more remarkable physiques than they do today with tall Frank Swift of Manchester City and tubby Alec Scott tipping the scale around 14 stone for Wolves. Torquay's **Phil Joslin** was quite a big lad, but fairly normal for his day. Phil was a good goalkeeper who later moved to Cardiff City, but one recalls him on a Thursday evening in September 1949 being beaten five times by Walsall's Johnny Devlin as the Gulls crashed to a 7-1 defeat in a game they might have been expected to win.

Then there were the trainers with an assortment of linaments, plasters and fearsome looking knives that could cut a bandage to size or lance a swelling and, for the walking wounded, the all-purpose sponge from which the icy cold water time and again revived a player that had looked to be out for the rest of the game, it was said in those days that a player was in danger of being injured worse by the trainer's treatment than by any opponent, but this is an exaggeration. It was said too that referees leaned to particular sides or needed spectacles. That too is an exaggeration, but one does recall some bizarre decisions, not the least remarkable being the one by a referee at Huddersfield who was struck by a corner kick and allowed the kicker to play the ball again without it being touched by another player. That goal helped to land Huddersfield in Division Two, but there was no question of a replay. The referee then as now was right when he was wrong.



SCENE 4

No fourth division representatives left in the FA Cup, only a handful of games played last weekend and precious few more likely to be played on the day for which these notes are initially being prepared. That is the rather bleak outlook as these notes are being written and yet there is every possibility that the last few weeks of the season will bring thrills galore in Division Four.

Darlington are a team attracting attention up and down the country as they make a really determined promotion challenge, shaking off any hangover from the Telford FA Cup defeat to take both points at Scunthorpe last week with ex-Burnley striker Carl Airey getting his twelfth goal in this, his first season at Feethams, and extending the Quakers remarkable run of success to just two defeats in their last 21 games. What's more their win last week was their first in their last 15 visits to Scunthorpe's Old Show Ground.

Steve Phillips' seventeenth goal of the season helped Southend to end a run of five successive defeats with a 2-1 win over Halifax last week, his being the latter's sixth defeat in seven games as they slip below us in the table with only Wrexham beneath them.


Our win over Rochdale incidentally was our sixth in successive seasons over the Lancashire club and this ended our recent winless spell of 12 games.

What a shock for leaders Bury as Exeter pulled back from a 2 goal deficit to score twice in the last 18 minutes and take a point to end their own run of six successive away defeats and become only the fourth team this season to avoid defeat at Gigg Lane.

Peterborough, meanwhile, maintained their excellent record at Hartlepool with their sixth win in their last eight games there, the other two being drawn. Time for Action

Torquay United supremo Dave Webb has written to the 91 other Football League clubs urging them to support efforts to appoint a professional body to run the game's affairs. Webb, Plainmoor's managing director and team chief, sent off his series of personal letters after a meeting in London last week when soccer chairmen discussed the latest BBC and ITV offers to screen football next season and over the next four years. 'It was a constructive meeting and it's important we take it from there,' said Webb who believes his sport sells itself too cheaply to the small screen.

Webb's letter suggests the Football League take 10% of the £3.8 million which television proposes to divide between the 92 clubs per season. "Then put it in a separate pot and go out and appoint a professional body or organisation to run our affairs," said Webb. "We're not just talking about thousands of pounds, we are talking about millions and therefore football needs the very best people to run its business."

Webb forecasts that soccer will eventually sell its product to cable television. "I think it's inevitable that day will come." he said.

Focus on United


