



Did You Know?

Swindon became the first club to win the Anglo-Italian Cup even though the final was never completed. Twelve clubs, six from England, six from Italy, took part in the 1970 tournament with the most successful from each country playing in the final. In the qualifying rounds, Swindon twice beat Juventus to qualify as England's representatives, Napoli were to be the Italian finalists and the final was held in their home stadium. Peter Noble scored two and Arthur Horsfield got one as Town raced into a 3-0 lead. In the 79th minute the Italian crowd rioted and the game was abandoned. In the circumstances it was decided to award the Cup to Swindon.

Did You Know?

* On 25th September, 1911, Swindon Town, reigning Southern League Champions, played League Champions Manchester United in the FA Charity Shield. The 12,000 Stamford Bridge crowd saw Swindon score first but go on to lose 8-4. Town's scorers were Harold Fleming, Fred Wheatcroft, Billy Trout (pen) and Bob Jefferson.

On February 26th this year Swindon's reserve side lost 10-0 to Arsenal Reserves in a Football Combination match. Raphael Meade got five for the Gunners.

Manager of our visitors is ex-Celtic, Manchester United and Southend midfielder Lou Macain, who was appointed player-manager of the Wiltshire club last summer after he was freed by Manchester United. Shortly after, a Man. Utd. Celtic match, watched by a crowd of 40,140, had raised £85,000 for the midfielder's testimonial fund. Lou played 329 League games for Manchester United, scoring 78 goals. Little Lou still keeps scoring the odd goal, he's got three for the Robins this season.

Details of most of Lou's squad are as follows: Colin Bailie (full back). Born Belfast. A former apprentice, he made his League debut at Oxford in April 1982, but began to claim a regular place in

the side the following season.

Scott Endersby (goalkeeper). Born Lewisham He appeared in an FA Cup the for Kertering aged just 15 (youngest ever player in the competition) but he served his apprenticeship at Ipswich, where he won an England Youth Cap-Moved to Transpere in the summer of 1981 making his League debut in September that year versus Hereford, Played 91 times for Rovers befor moving to the County Ground in 1983, Last season's Player of The Year. Mike Graham (defender). Ex-Bolton player who first appeared in a League game at Field Mill in March 1978. Played over 50 games for Bolton before joining Swindon in 1981. Was given a free transfer at the end of last season but Lou Macari resigned him just before the start of this season. Versatile player who can play at full back, central defender and in midfield. Nigel Gray (defender). Over 250 games for Orient, his only club before joining Swindon Town in the summer of 1983 Played just 16 times last season and he was loaned

to Brentford. Charlie Henry (defender). Acton born Charlie supported Swindon as a boy and he signed for his favourites in February 1980 after completing his apprenticeship. The hard-tackling full back made his League debut in September 1980 at Lincoln. Dave Hockaday (midfield). Dave spent eight seasons will our opponents from last Tuesday, Blackpool, before moving to Wiltshire in 1983 Scored 24 League goals in 147 outings for Blackpool and he's scored five in his 20/months with Swindon, Garry Nelson (forward). Made his League debut in October 1979 for Southend against Colchester and he went on to play 140 times for Southend, where he was a team-mate of our new signing Steve Yates, Another summer 1983 signing, Andy Rowland (forward), Although Andy began with his home town club, Derby County, it was not until he moved to Bury that he tasted League football for the first time, making his debut at Swindon of all places in August 1974. After more than 200 appearances for The Shakers, Rowland joined Swindon, though at the time there was much speculation that he would move to Saltergate. A consistent goalscorer for much of his career. Andy has recently shown his versatility with several appearances in defence and also as an emergency goalkeeper, he replaced Jim Allan between the posts against Rochdale last term after the 'keeper had to go off. Played around 300 first team games for Swindon and he's scored 166 goals. Peter Coyne (forward), Joined Manchester United in 1974 and he stayed at Old Trafford for two years playing twice in Division One, in a 2-1 defeat at Aston Villa (Lou Macari scored United's goal) and in a 2-1 defeat at Leicester in which Peter scored.

At the end of the 1975-76 season he was freed and he joined non-League Ashton United before moving back into League football with Crewe. Spent three years at Gresty Road before he again moved into the non-League scene, this time with Northern Premier League side Hyde United. Joined Swindon last summer and he's top scorer for our visitors this season. Colin Gordon (striker). Scorer of two goals against us on New Years Day, Colin joined Swindon earlier this season from Southern League side. Oldbury and he seems to have adjusted well to the rigours of League football having scored 10 goals to date. Chris Ramsey (full back). Another early season signing, Chris is best known for his days at Brighton, he appeared for them in the 1983 FA Cup Final against Manchester United, though he was unlucky enough to get injured and he was substituted by Gerry Ryan, and the coloured defender was not fit enough to line-up in the replay which Brighton lost 4-0. Played just four games for the Seagulls last term and the lack of first team opportunities at The Goldstone Ground led to a loan move to Swindon. Joined Town on a permanent basis just before Christmas. Sent off twice this season.

A Clergyman, the Rev. W. Pitt, founded Swindon as an amateur club in 1881. They flourished so rapidly that there was one season when the final of The Wiltshire Cup was between the club's first and second teams. By 1894 professionals were being engaged and Swindon became one of the original members of Division One of The Southern League. There they remained until 1920 when they became founder members of Division Three. Their first ever League game was on 28th August 1920 and it must constitute the best start to a League career over, they beat Luton Town 9-1.

Back in their Southern League days a breakdown in health had forced a local man. Harold Fleming, to take an "outside job" and it was he, together with another local. Archie Brown, who guided non-League Swindon to two FA Cup semi-finals in those pre-First World War days. Fleming played 11 times for England while a Southern League player.

in Swindon's first nine League seasons they never finished outside the top ten in Division Three (South), but during the 1930's they rarely got out of mid-table, in fact in 1933 they finished bottom of the section.

Promotion was won for the first time in 1963 when they finished runners-up to Northampton in Division Three. The team was managed by Bert Head and the side was made up of the classic mix of youth and experience. Maurice Owen was the most experienced player that season. He made over 550 League appearances for Swindon, the climax coming in that 1962-63 season, after which he hung up his boots and became trainer.


The youth was in the form of John Trollope (who went on to play well over 700 League games for Swindon). Mike Summerbee, Ernie Hunt and Don Rogers.


Two seasons were spent in Division Two, they were relegated in 1965, but in 1968-69 they enjoyed their most successful season ever. Again they were promoted from Division Three, as runners up to Watford, but it was in the League Cup that they captured everyone's hearts by beating Torquay, Bradford City, Blackburn, Coventry, Derby and Burnely on the way to Wembley and a match with mighty Arsenal, 98,189 people paid £104,000 to watch the Third Division minnows beat the Gunners 3-1, Smart and Rogers (2) getting the goals. The team of Downsborough, Thomas, Trollope, Butler, Burrows, Harland, Heath, Smart, Smith, Noble, Rogers and substitute Pennan has gone down in the annals of Swindon's history, and deservedly so.

Did You Know?

Previous managers of Swindon include Danny Williams, Dave Mackay, Les Allen and Bobby Smith.

Jimmy Cookson, who scored 44 goals for Chesterfield in 1925-26 scored 31 goals in 50 games for Swindon in the 1930's, Former Spireites manager Tony McShane played 41 matches for Swindon.



KEN FOSTER LOOKS BACK TO 1973-74

Swindon have been regular visitors to Saltergate since the mid-1970's when they dropped into the Third Division, and they also visited us in their relegation season of 1973-4 for a second round League Cup tie. Our record in that competition is modest compared with the Robins', for they won the cup as a Third Division club in 1968-9 and, again while in the Third Division, reached the semi final in 1979-80, where despite winning the first leg 2-1 they lost 3-4 on aggregate to First Division Wolves.

Our League Cup run in 1973-4 started with a disappointing 1-1 home draw with Mansfield. Ernie Moss gave us a 54th minute lead against the Stags but a brilliant volley from Mick Laverick earned our rivals a draw six minutes from time. In the replay at Field Mill the following week our defence withstood a tremendous first half battering but we came more into the game as time went on. With just a few seconds left Ray McHale broke clear down the right wing and his low, hard cross was completely mishit by Ernie Moss. Amazingly, the miskick was enough to confuse the Mansfield defenders and as goalie Graham Brown dived one way the ball trickled into the opposite corner of the net.

The second round saw Swindon visit Saltergate for the first time since 1961. Torrential rain kept the attendance down to only 4,639 but the loyal fans who braved the elements had their money's worth with a superb Chesterfield performance which had everything except the goals our dominance deserved. Ernie Moss set the tone for the evening when he fluffed two early chances and for most of the game it was a story of incessant Chesterfield pressure being soaked up by the Swindon defence. The only goal of the game came after 26 minutes when a Ken Tiler cross was met at the edge of the goal area by Ray McHale, who blasted an unstoppable shot past Jimmy Allan.

McHale, incidentally, went on to give several years excellent service to Swindon, and he was a member of their League Cup semi final team of 1979-80. In the third round Chesterfield visited the Dell to play First Division Southampton, who had won six and drawn one of their last seven games. The Blues defended bravely with Eric Winstanley outstanding, but as an attacking force were restricted to a five minute spell in the first half when Moss, Winstanley and Steve Downes all went close. The tie was decided by two moments of magic from Mike Channon, then at the peak of his career After 20 minutes he hit a 30 yard pass across the face of the Blues goal and Hugh Fisher drove firmly home, and just after the hour he killed the Blues' hopes off by hooking in from close range. Bobby Stokes completed a slightly flattering 3-0 Saints win when he intercepted a McHalé back pass with seven minutes left.



Own Goal

Paul Comstive's own goal from Phil Walker's cross against Wrexham in our last home match was the first goal scored for us by one of our opponents since Wigan Athletic's Colin Methven put through his own net in February 1983 in a 2-2 draw at Springfield Park. Methven obviously didn't like playing us that season, in the Saltergate game he was sent off!

Consecutive Wins

Our win over Wrexham gave us our 5th consecutive league victory, the first time we've achieved such a feat since January and February 1980, when wins over Sheffield United, Brentford, Colchester, Exeter and Rotherham United lifted us from 12th place to 3rd in Division Three. The last time we won more than five straight games was in November/December 1967 when we won seven consecutive league matches, scoring 22 goals in the process.

Today's Visitors

Swindon have won three away games this season in the Canon League, at Tranmere, Rochdale and Peterborough. They also won at Third Division Bristol Rovers in the Milk Cup first round, though they had already lost the first leg 5-1 at home. Top scorers for The Robins are Peter Coyne (13), Colin Gordon (10) and Allan Mayes (11). Swindon, who in their last home game attracted their lowest crowd of the season, 2.215 against Hartlepool, are averaging gates of around 2,900. Their biggest win of the season is 4-0, they've won by that score twice this term, on October 27th against Stockport and on New Year's Day against us of course, so we'll be all out for revenge tonight.

Eight Years Ago

On April 19, 1977, a Chesterfield team struggling in 18th position in Division Three met a Rotherham side which included ex-Spireites Alan Crawford and Dave Pugh, which were sitting in 2nd place and looking good for promotion. A headed goal from Alan Jones, the smallest player on the pitch, gave us victory and ended The Millers 10 game unbeaten run. They went on to miss promotion on goal average. On the same day a Swindon team including Prophett and McHale also lost a 10 match unbeaten record when they surprisingly lost 4-0 at home to Peterborough.

They Served Us Both

Colin Prophett

Crewe born central defender who started his career with Sheffield Wednesday, he signed profor them in 1968, and in five years at Hillsborough Colin played in 117 league matches. Joined Norwich City in the summer of 1973 and he stayed at Carrow Road for just over a season. signing for our visitors in September 1974. Colin no doubt remembers his first full game for The Robins, they lost 6-2 at Crystal Palace after being 5.0 down at half-time. Stayed at Swindon for four years during which he was an almost permanent fixture in the team, an injury which kept him out of the side for four months in 1975-6 being his only major absence, in fact after returning from that injury in January 1976. Colin appeared in 116 consecutive league games for Swindon.

Arthur Cox signed him for Chesterfield in September 1978 for £15,000, a 0-0 draw at Hull was Colin's first appearance in Chesterfield's colours. Played 35 league matches for us that season, scoring one goal, a late equaliser in a memorable 3-3 Saltergate draw with Sheffield Wed, in front of a 13,322 Boxing Day crowd.

Came on as substitute on two occasions at the start of 1979-80, but a couple of months into the season Colin moved to his home town club, Crewe Alexandra. Played 79 consecutive games for Alex before moving into the non-league scene with

Matlock, Heanor and now Alfreton Town where he is player-coach,

Ray McHale

Started his career with Chesterfield, 1971-72 was his first league season, and the powerful midfielder from Sheffield went on to play in 124 league matches for us, scoring 27 goals mostly either from the penalty spot or from long range shots. Ray's last match for Chesterfield was on September 28, 1974, at Hereford. A Dixie McNeil hat-trick helped Hereford to a 5-0 victory. Along with Albert Phelan. McHale then moved to Halifax Town in the deal which brought Terry Shanahan to Saltergate. The pair teamed up with Dave Pugh, Alan Jones and Steve Downes at The Shay. Stayed almost two years in Yorkshire, in that time he never missed a match for Halifax. Carried on his remarkable appearance record after signing for Swindon, he missed just one match between joining them in September 1976 and April 1980. Played in Swindon's 1979-80 League Cup run when they reached the semi-final (lost 4-3 on aggregate to Wolves). Moved to Brighton for £100,000 in May 1980 but he played just 11 times for them, all in Division One. In March 1981 he moved back north to Barnsley, playing in The Tykes' last 13 matches during which they lost just once to clinch promotion to Division Two, he spent a spell on loan at Bury and earlier this season 34-year-old Ray has joined Swansea City.

CAREER CHECK Steve Yates

Burton-on-Trent born Steve joined us on loan from Doncaster on March 28, transfer deadline day. The 31-year-old defender started his career with Leicester City, his league debut coming on as a substitute in a First Division match at Newcastle

just over 11 years ago.

Match details: March 23, 1974. Newcastle 1 (McDermott pen), Leicester 1 (Waters), 30,390. Newcastle: McFaul, Craig, Kennedy, McDermott, Clark, Moncur, Barrowclough, Robson, MacDonald, Cassidy, Hibbitt, Leicester, Shilton, Whitworth, Rofe (Yates), Earle, Munro, Cross, Weller, Sammels, Worthington, Waters, Stringfellow.

Steve came on as substitute once more that season, and in 1974-75 he played 13 league games, mostly at left back. The following season the six-footer didn't make the first team, his next game being in

March 1977 at Stoke City.

On November 17, 1977, Steve Yates joined Southend United. On the same day Terry Curran moved from Forest to Derby and Brian Pollard, who had a spell with us earlier this season, joined Watford from York. Steve, along with another new signing Gerry Fell, made their Southend debut against Watford at home in front of a 10,990 crowd. Watford went on to win the championship and Southend finished runners-up. During the course of that season, Steve scored his first goal in a 4-0 home win, ironically against Doncaster.

Yates missed just four league matches in Division Three in 1978-9, his only goal that season coming in another 4-0 win (v Blackpool). He started the 1979-80 season in the heart of Southend's defence alongside Dave Cusack, but after playing in the first eight matches of the campaign Steve missed over two months through injury, returning to the

side in December at left-back, but by then United were in the bottom four and they stayed there, dropping back to Division Four at the end of the season.

Promotion was the order of the day in 1980-81, and Steve played a major part in Southend's record breaking championship season. In that campaign the Essex club created 17 club records, including most wins (30), most doubles (10), 18 successive home wins and 982 minutes without conceding a

home goal.


The Staffordshire defender was again a regular in 1981-2, he scored three goals from the left-back position that term in 38 games and in 1982-3 he again scored three goals, one of them in Southend's 2-0 home win over Chesterfield, During the 1982-3 season Steve played his 200th league match for The Shrimpers in a 4-2 home victory against Brentford.

Steve's last game for Southend was in November 1983 against Bournemouth, the following month he joined Doncaster Rovers making his debut for the Yorkshire club, as a replacement for John Breckin, at Crewe, Rovers drew 1-1. Ernie Moss scored for them and Andy Kowalski was also in their line-up, Rovers fans must have regarded their new signing as some sort of lucky omen, after that Crewe game they set off on a 15 match unbeaten run which took them into 2nd place in the table. Steve's only goal that term? In Rovers' 2-1 win at Belle, Vue against Chesterfield!

This season Yates has played in around half of Doncaster's matches and his acquisition will no doubt keep our current back four on their toes.


