More recently, the Owls have lost big central defender Mick Lyons who has taken the player-manager's job at Second Division Grimsby Town.

Wednesday inflicted upon leaders Manchester United their first defeat of the season the weekend before last and will provide another big test for us.

Last season we beat Wednesday 3-2 in a thrilling F.A. Cup, fifth round tie, but the Yorkshire side got their revenge in the League meeting here later in the season.

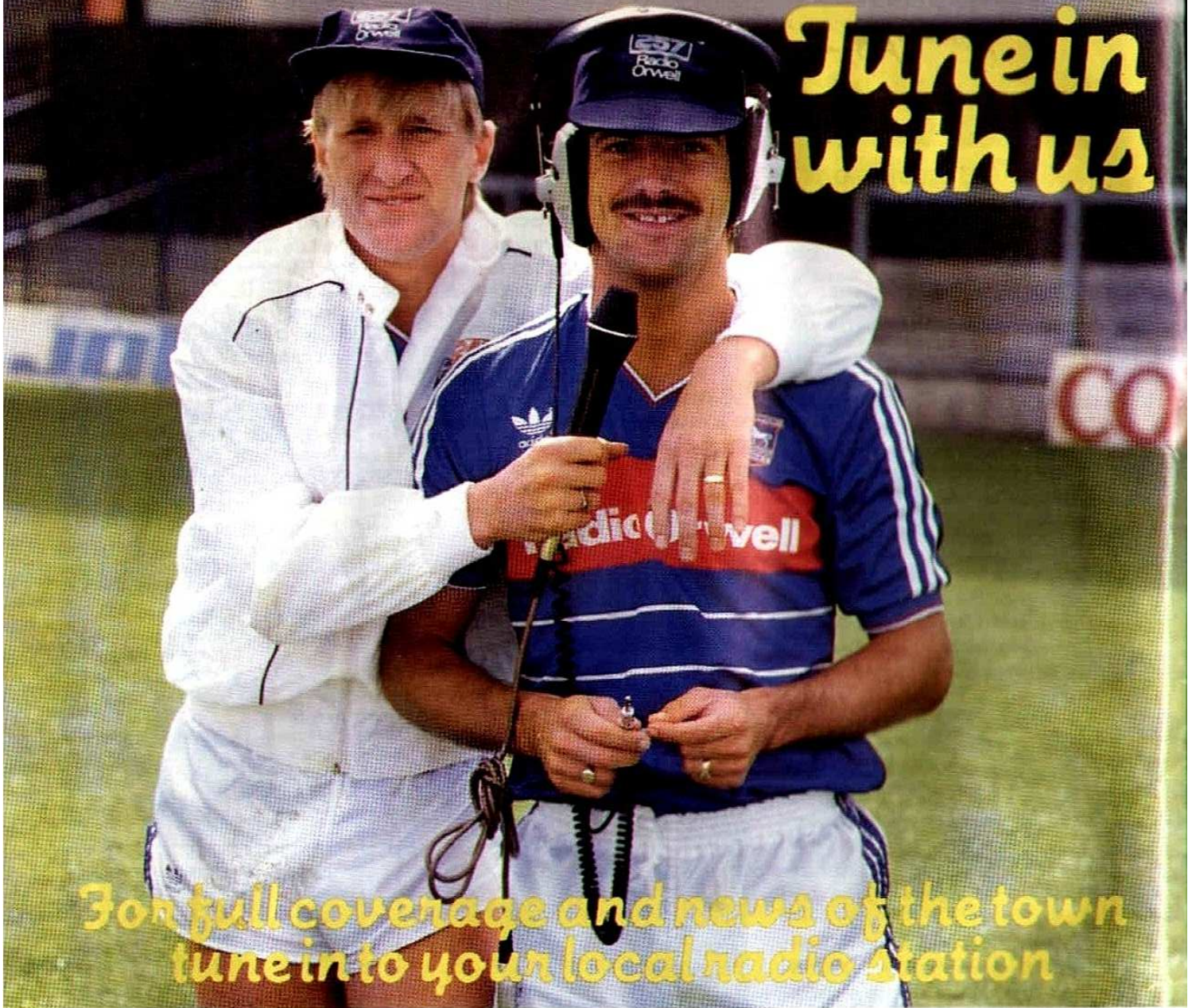

It was another fine campaign for Ipswich Town in the 1979-80 season with Bobby Robson's side having another crack at the League Championship, but finishing third behind winners Liverpool and runners-up Manchester United.

But Town did have the distinction of beating the Old Trafford club, then managed by Dave Sexton, 6-0 at Portman Road and could even afford to miss twice from the penalty spot.

There was not a great deal of joy, however, in the cup competitions. In the UEFA Cup, after beating the

Norwegian minnows Skeid Oslo 10-1 on aggregate, Town went out in the second round on the away goals rule to Grasshoppers of Zurich.

League Cup progress was brought to an abrupt halt with a 1-0 aggregate defeat by Coventry City, but there was some compensation in the FA Cup with Town reaching the sixth round. Preston, Bristol City and Chester were all beaten before defeat at Everton.

Paul Mariner was the leading League goalscorer with 17 goals and three other players reached double figures, Eric Gates, Alan Brazil and John Wark.

There are lists of players scoring three or more goals in a match, debut goalscorers, oldest and youngest players, first and last

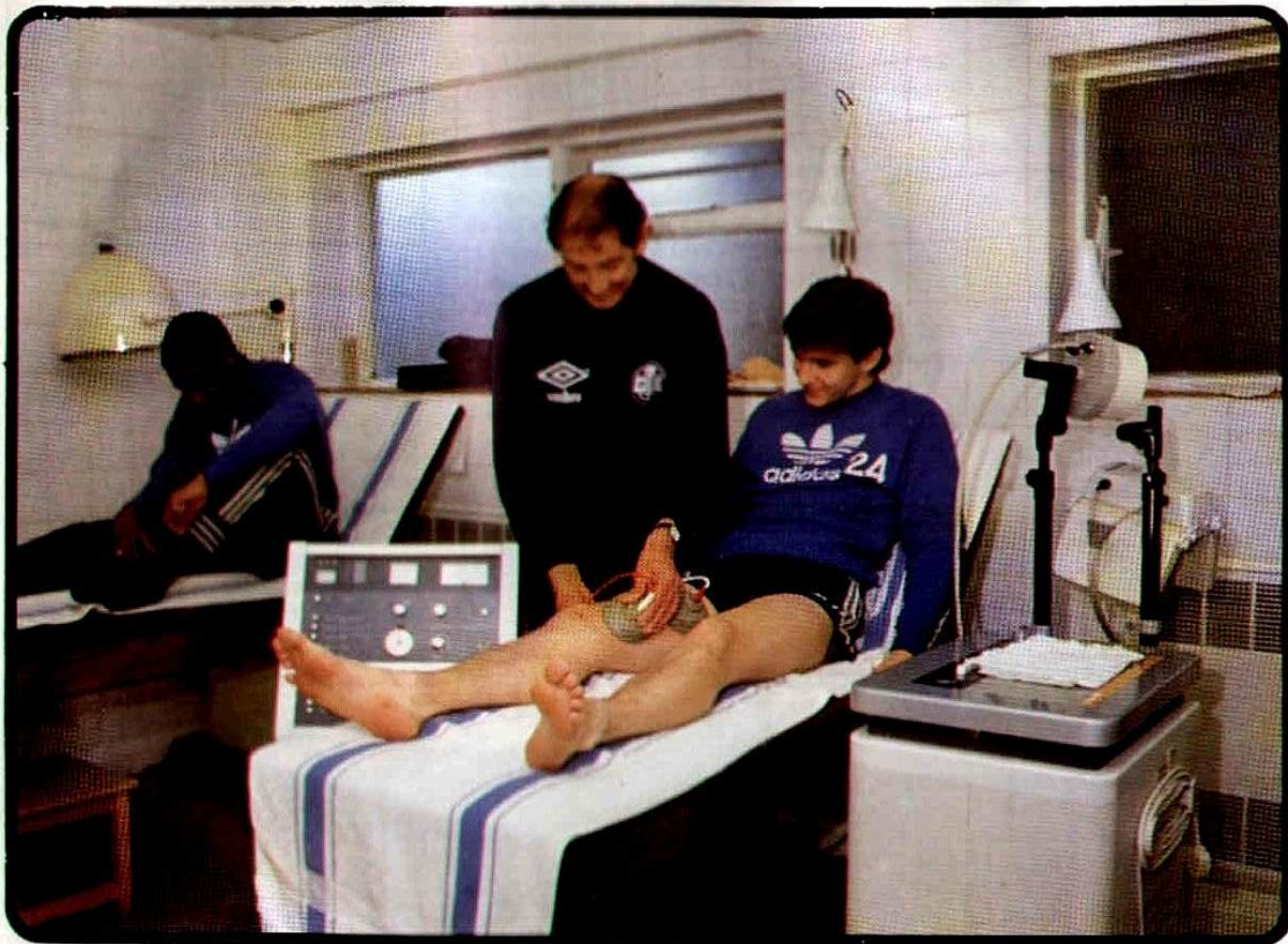
matches, penalties scored and missed and players sent off.

OFF THE PITCH



THE treatment room at Portman Road is usually a busy place, every day of the week. With about 40 professional and apprentice players, covering the three teams, training and playing regularly, injuries are bound to occur. Everything from blisters to major injuries have to be looked after.

The treatment room work follows up the 'on the field' and immediate post-match treatment and apart from the various therapy machines includes a carefully graduated remedial programme before a player can return to full training.

Since Tommy Eggleston's retirement to a part-time capacity the overall responsibility for the organisation of the treatment room is

now with John Chandler, seen here administering interferential therapy to youth goalkeeper Martin Young with Dalian Atkinson awaiting his turn.

It is the responsibility of John Chandler, Brian Owen and Tommy Eggleston to get players back to match fitness as quickly as possible and this usually takes three or four sessions of the appropriate treatment and exercise routines every day — including Sundays.

Treatment room work is under the general supervision of club physician Dr. Steve Lazar and he in turn, when he thinks fit, can call upon the expertise of our orthopaedic surgeon, Mr. Andrew Gibbs.

ALTHOUGH having a modest season so far in the Fourth Division, League form counts for little when it comes to Cup competitions. Swindon Town have proved this conclusively with their exciting run in the Milk Cup so far this term.

Victories in the last two rounds over Sunderland and Sheffield Wednesday have made the Wiltshire club this season's giantkillers, but Ipswich will be hoping to put them in their place tonight.

Although some of the players will be unfamiliar to Ipswich supporters, there is a Portman Road connection in the Swindon camp. **Scott Endersby**, a former Town youth team goalkeeper, has made his name at the County Ground in more ways than one.

Last season he played in every match following his transfer from Tranmere in the summer of 1983. Holds the distinction of being voted "Player of the Year" at both Tranmere and Swindon.

A few weeks ago, however, Scott walked out on the club, but has since made the peace. Whether he will be on duty tonight remains to be seen.

Swindon have two other goalkeepers in long serving **Kenny Allen** and former Luton and Aston Villa custodian **Jake Findlay**. The powerfully-built Scot became Lou Macari's fourth close season signing.

Right-back **Chris Ramsey** is perhaps Swindon's best known player and last season was voted joint player of the year with **Colin Gordon**. Started his career with Bristol City, he moved to Brighton and made his First Division debut in April, 1981.

Although he made only 30 League appearances, the highlight of his career came when he played for Brighton in the 1983 FA Cup final against Manchester United. He sustained a serious leg injury in the final and missed the replay as a result.

Joined Swindon initially on loan, but eventually agreed to a permanent move for a nominal fee last December. It was an eventful first season for Chris because he was sent off twice, scored his first goal for the Robins at Cochester and then voted joint 'Player of the Year'.

Nicky Coleman, a youngster, has recently claimed the left-back spot while at the heart of the defence **Colin Calderwood** and **David Cole** are the men in possession.

Calderwood was signed during the close season from Mansfield Town for a £27,500 fee set by a tribunal. Mansfield manager Ian Greaves wanted £100,000 so highly was Calderwood rated.

Cole came from Swansea on a free transfer last February and has

established himself in the side. Had spells with Sunderland, Crewe and St. Mirren without making his debut.

Leigh Barnard was a former Portsmouth apprentice who came to the County Ground on a free transfer in the summer of 1982. He made 72 first team appearances with Pompey and also had four months on loan to Peterborough.

Dave Hockaday was signed from Blackpool in 1982 where he made 147 appearances during his eight seasons at Bloomfield Road. Last season his Swindon appearances were restricted by injury.

Colin Gordon made an immediate impact in his first season of League soccer after making a goalscoring debut a year ago when coming on as substitute for Lou Macari. He went on to score 17 goals in 33 appearances and attracted the attention of several First and Second Division clubs last season.

A £5,000 fee brought **Derek Hall** from Torquay last July. The 20-year-

He joined Swindon as player-manager in July, 1984, and although he was dismissed by the club in April of this year, he was reinstated five days later.

This season he has put the Fourth Division club on the map by guiding them to victories over Sunderland and Sheffield Wednesday, and he will be hoping to make it a hat-trick tonight against Ipswich.

Manchester United as an apprentice on leaving school. Although he made his League debut for the Reds at Aston Villa when he came on as substitute for Stuart Pearson, he was unable to establish himself at Old Trafford.

He scored on his full debut at Leicester City in April, 1976, but was given a free transfer at the end of that season. Peter joined non-League Ashton United before returning to League football with Crewe Alexandra in 1977. In four years with the club Peter scored 47 goals in 134 appearances.

Crewe gave him a free transfer, however, in 1981 and Peter again went back into non-

League football, this time with another northern club Hyde United.

At the start of last season Swindon plucked him from Hyde for a small fee and he repaid the Wiltshire club with 15 goals.

Now the Manchester-born Coyne has hit the headlines again with his goal that gave Swindon another big scalp in the Milk Cup.

Robbins David made 230 appearances and scored 60 goals in seven seasons. He joined Luton in 1978 for a £110,000 fee and won a Second Division

Championship medal with the Hatters in 1982.
