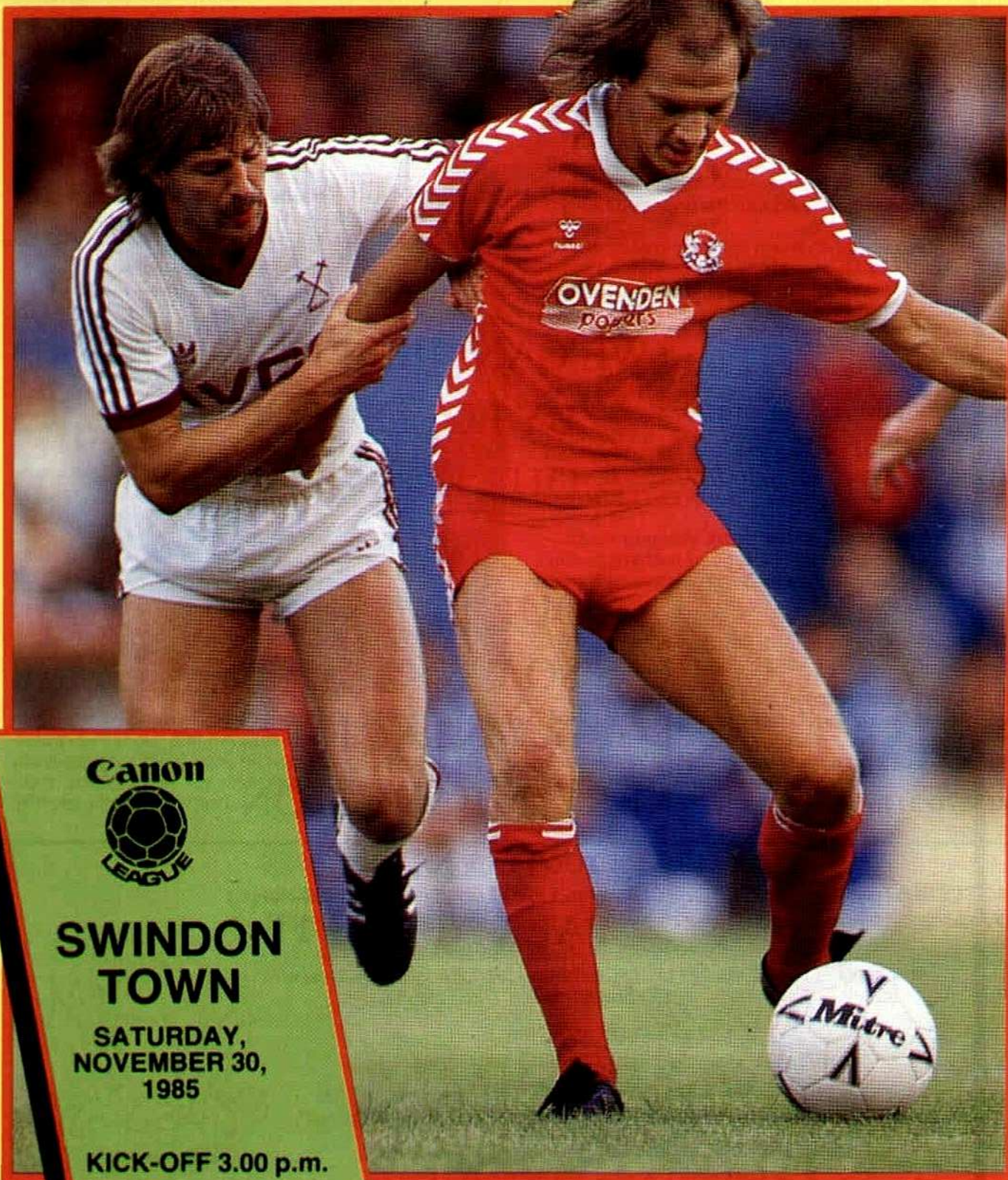



## A WORD FROM THE CHAIRMAN



Recently on this page I attempted to re-assure Orient supporters that the Fourth Division would not be disappearing overnight.

Since then there has been renewed and, if anything, more intensive speculation in the press about the possible future structure of the Football League.

Some of it has again gone so far as to suggest that the Third and Fourth Divisions are to be struck out of existence at a stroke.

On the previous occasion I touched upon this subject I suggested that, constitutionally, this could not happen, although I did acknowledge that it might be necessary for the clubs of the lower divisions to go along with a programme of change and make certain concessions.

So far as I am able to deduce — and hard facts about the various proposals in circulation have been distinctly thin on the ground — that remains the situation.

This much I can say. At a meeting of the Third and Fourth Division chairmen there was re-assuring and total unanimity among us, and it was heartening to receive the unqualified support of Gordon Taylor, as secretary of the Professional Footballers' Association.

This amounted to a guarantee from his organisation that the players would not be prepared to see the Third and Fourth Divisions cut adrift from the rest of the League, and without players there is no football!

The chairmen of the lower divisions did at the same time recognise that there should be some form of promotion and relegation between the Football League and the Gola League, and this is the sort of change that would be both sensible and timely.

As to the future here at Orient, and this is the point I most wish to emphasise this afternoon, I PERSONALLY REMAIN TOTALLY COMMITTED TO THE PRINCIPLE OF THIS CLUB CONTINUING TO EMPLOY FULL-TIME PLAYERS, REGARDLESS OF ANY RE-STRUCTURING OF THE LEAGUE THAT MIGHT COME ABOUT.

Quite possibly there will be Third and Fourth Division clubs that have no other option than to go part-time if revenue from certain traditional sources is curtailed.

I will certainly do all in my power to ensure that it does not happen at this club.

Promotion to the Third Division, and ultimately the Second, will be most readily achieved by a playing staff of full-time professionals, and supporters may rest assured that my commitment to such a basis of operating at Orient remains total.

# WELCOME TO OUR VISITORS

Twelve years have now elapsed since Orient last met Swindon Town at Football League level, this having been the most significant break in continuity in matches between the clubs since season 1929-30 and the first encounters.

Os and the Wiltshire club in fact faced one another during 20 consecutive Third Division (South) seasons, while the more recent parting of the ways came about with Town's relegation to the Third Division in the Spring of 1974.

The last League meeting in fact took place on pre-Christmas Saturday, 1973 — with industrial troubles at the time

**At Chester last Saturday it was very much a case of being beaten by the better side on the day.**

It was nevertheless a match in which, certainly during the first half, we had enough possession in the opposition's half of the field to have avoided defeat by an eventual three-goal margin.

While it was perhaps understandable that some Chester supporters should react the way that they did to seeing Stuart Rimmer assisted from the pitch after scoring their team's second goal, and to blame Peter Wells for the injury that had resulted, the headline that one Sunday newspaper attached to its report was grossly unfair.

Basically, this was a very brave moment of opportunism on Rimmer's part. It was a 50-50 situation in which Peter Wells was clearly required to leave his line and make a challenge. The next day's irresponsible piece of journalism in no way took such considerations into account.

Leaving aside that particular sequel to the Chester match, I will above all else be looking for an improvement in the quality of our performance in playing terms when we meet Swindon Town this afternoon.

I have seen them twice recently, including the night when they beat Sheffield Wednesday in the Milk Cup, and they are clearly a team on a high at the moment.

Swindon come into the category of one of the "sleeping giants" we so often hear about.

There is certainly the potential in the town to support a Second Division club at the very least, and their recent run of improved results has brought about a revival of spectator interest at the County Ground.

In such situations the benefits are two-fold in that players respond to the atmosphere and money comes through the turnstiles.

Because of the potential at Swindon, the town club must start among the pre-season favourites for promotion so long as they remain in the Fourth Division.

That was the case again this year, and after a modest start they are obviously now beginning to fulfil many people's expectations.

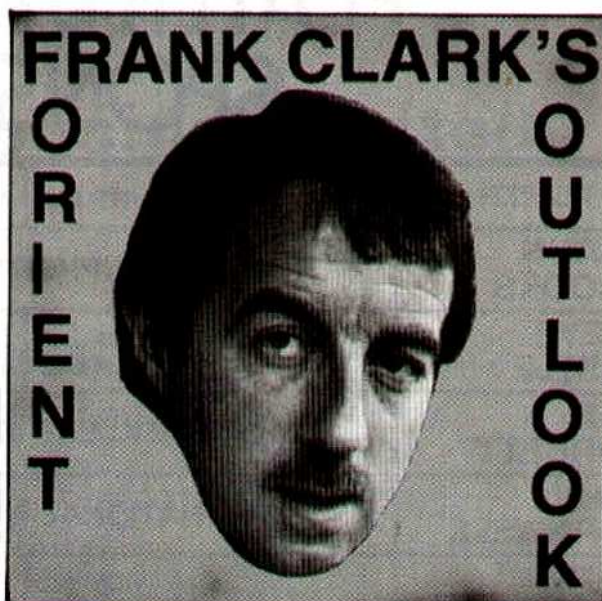
Swindon's visit today comes into the six-point category, while for our part we will be hoping to bounce back after the Chester defeat and look upon last weekend's result as a nowadays rare setback.

**Until 4.50 pm today FA Cup matters remain strictly secondary consideration to our 20th Canon League match of the season with Swindon Town.**

Next weekend we do, of course, face non-League opposition in the FA Cup for the third time in little more than 12 months.

Our games with Buckingham Town of the United Counties League last season, and more recently and in particular those with VS Rugby from the Southern League make it hardly necessary to say that Slough Town will command our fullest respect.

It is no secret that we approached the first round FA Cup tie with VS Rugby on the same



basis that we faced Spurs in the two earlier Milk Cup games, and it is fair to say that we will show a similar regard for next Saturday's visitors from the Vauxhall-Opel-League.

Having made a point of watching VS Rugby, I was in no way surprised at the quality of the football they displayed in the first match when they could well have reached the second round for the first time in their history at our expense.

They were a credit to Jimmy Knox, their manager, and to their sphere of the Southern League.

Personally, I cannot believe that there can be a superior side in terms of pure football in the Midland Division of the Southern League, although I fear that their heavy backlog of matches could well tell against them when it comes to proving the point by winning promotion to the Premier Division.

For the replay we were down to our last 12 available senior players, and in such circumstances it was pleasing to complete the task facing us so emphatically.

Whereas in the first match at Rugby we allowed our tempo to slacken after scoring the first goal, in the replay we maintained it up to half-time and were deservedly 3-0 up.

A fourth goal early in the second half killed the occasion as a contest, yet as conditions underfoot deteriorated our non-League visitors coped impressively and often put together some useful football.

I am sure that for all of us at Orient the results and achievements of VS Rugby will continue to catch our eye for some time to come.

**Orient's run of six Canon League games without defeat was brought to an emphatic halt at Chester last Saturday, when there could be no begrudging the Fourth Division leaders their 3-0 victory.**

After surviving an early scare when goalkeeper Peter Wells had to save bravely at the feet of Chester striker Stuart Rimmer following an indiscreet back pass, Orient seemed to be coping with subsequent pressure, and indeed began to take the play to the opposition, only for Chester to take a 31st minute lead.

City right winger John Kelly was the scorer. After turning up on the opposite flank, the former Preston player finally found the net after a clever run that carried him across the edge of Orient's penalty box to "inside right" territory.

Rimmer, Division Four's leading scorer, in the 61st minute and Kelly again, after 77, added Chester's subsequent goals.

In Rimmer's case, his 16th league goal of the season proved to be his last part in the match as a result of a collision with Wells.

Orient's goalkeeper was target for some mindless barracking for the rest of the match, and these more voluble supporters might have been interested to hear the observations of their own club's manager, Harry McNally on the incident.

No way blaming Wells, he said, "Stuart Rimmer is so quick and so often sets off on that sort of run, there is always the possibility of an injury. Hopefully, he has only jarred his leg."

For Os, it was a disappointing result to the club's first-ever League visit to Sealand Road, if only for the fact it was the first time this season we had not scored in a League game away from home.

While Orient played a League Cup match at Chester in 1960, the fulfilling of a Fourth Division fixture in the city means that Orient have now visited all the other 91 clubs currently holding membership of the Football League for such games.

**Injuries and a suspension left this club with just 12 available senior players when VS Rugby visited Leyton Stadium for a first round FA Cup replay last week.**

As we were only too well aware of our Southern League opponents' capabilities from the 2-2 draw shared with them at Rugby three days earlier, it was of immense relief when skipper-for-the-night Chris Jones gave Orient an 18th minute lead.

## AWAY RUN HALTED AT CHESTER

Equally well-struck goals from Steve Castle and Ian Juryeff made it 3-0 by the break and Shaun Brooks followed up his brace from the first meeting by making it 4-0 with the second period only minutes old.

Although facing the worst of the sleet and snow that fell for much of the game VS refused to be unsettled by either the deficit or the conditions. Indeed, they pulled a goal back through skipper Tommy Gorum's near post header from a corner, while six minutes from the end it needed a fine penalty save by Peter Wells from the same opponent to prevent them further closing the gap.

With our central defender ranks much reduced, Stephen John came into the side to form an emergency partnership in this area with John Cornwell. For John it was his competitive debut at this level, although supporters may recall he served notice of his capabilities in a pre-season friendly against West Ham when he faced the likes of Messrs. Cottee, McAvennie and Goddard.

Detailed to mark Steve Norris, Rugby's distinctly useful striker, John carried on where he had so effectively left off — through injury cutting short his involvement — against West Ham those many weeks earlier!

**Although not featured among today's visiting players in the customary profiles elsewhere in today's programme, former Orient goalkeeper Richard Key is apparently a possible for inclusion in today's Swindon line-up. Richard, assisting Town on loan from Brentford, has played for them in recent Milk Cup games.**


