## All Our Yesterdays

For those Town fans who can recall Trevor Anderson who played for Swindon Town from 1974 until 1977 following his transfer from Manchester United. We can assure you that thirty-four-year-old Trevor is still going strong. The Northern Ireland International, who made 22 full international appearances and who made 128 full league appearances for the Town during which he scored 34 goals is now playing for Northern Ireland Club Linfield.

In the latter half of last season the outof-touch veteran was fading and seemed
destined for the soccer scrapheap. The
vastly experienced Trevor had other ideas
however and confounded his critics with
some stirring displays for Northern Ireland
Club Linfield. At the end of October,
Trevor was top of the Northern Irish
scoring charts with 14 goals from his
seventeen senior outings!

That impressive early season haul included two well taken goals in European Cup matches against Swiss Champions Servette. Though Linfield narrowly lost 4-3 on aggregate in the opening round of the tournament. Trevor also scored a hat-trick in the 7-0 drubbing that Linfield inflicted on Portadown in the Gold Cup.

Ironically, it was Portadown who sold the stylish Trevor to Manchester United when he embarked on his Football League career back in 1972-73.

At the time Trevor dubbed 'the new George Best', alas the potentially brilliant but unpredictable Irishman never quite fulfilled that early promise.

The youthful Trevor arrived in Manchester when the Old Trafford Club was in a state of disarray which culminated in Manchester United being relegated to the Second Division for the first time in the Post War era.

Trevor became. an accomplished despite professional his limited Old career. Playing 600 over matches in a career spent with Portadown, Manchester United, Swindon Town, Peterborough United and Linfield.

Since joining Linfield in 1979, Trevor has won practically every domestic honour possible including a glittering array of Irish League and Cup Winning Medals.

It was appropriate that Trevor should approach the end of his career with Linfield, for Trevor was born next door to Windsor Park.

He was considering retirement at the end of last season but a series of sparkling displays on Linfield's close season trip to the United States and Canada changed his mind. Now all of a sudden the Northern Irishman is enjoying his football again.

Trevor was one of seven players who have established a Football League record by scoring Post War hat tricks from three penalty kicks. They were:-



## The Town Crier Looks



Southend United Manager Bobby Moore the former England World Cup winning Captain of 1966.

No fewer than seven of the eleven players who appeared in the World Cup Final of 1966 with West Germany at Wembley have since tried their luck at club management.

Those seven players were playing for the following clubs when the Final was played in July 1966. Jack Charlton was at Leeds United, Alan Ball was between clubs for he was set to leave Blackpool, then a First Division Club, for Everton. Norbert Stiles and Bobby Charlton were with Manchester United, while the trio of Geoff Hurst, Martin Peters and Bobby Moore were with West Ham United.

There were mixed fortunes ahead for those seven World Cup winning stars as they entered club management.

None has fared as well as the former Leeds United defender Jack Charlton. The forthright Geordie was to finish his playing career at Elland Road at the completion of the 1972-73 season after a

total of 771 first team appearances. In his first season as a manager with North Eastern Club Middlesbrough he led the Club to promotion as Second Division Champions by a staggering record fifteen point margin! This accomplishment won Jack the 1974 'Manager of the Year Award'. He later took Sheffield Wednesday to promotion from Division Three in 1980. After a short period away from the rigours of club management Jack returned to guide Newcastle United last season, on their return to the First Division. He guit the Tyneside Club on the eve of this season after barracking by the St. James Club supporters who wanted his resignation.

Norbert Stiles, one of the most unlikely looking heroes, with his toothless grin and thick rimmed spectacles, played for Second Division Middlesbrough after leaving Old Trafford in 1971, he completed his playing career during the 1974-75 season after a career of 506 first team appearances. Affectionately known as 'Nobby', he managed Preston to promotion from Division Three in 1978. Nobby was also in charge when the Deepdale Club were relegated back to the Third Division in 1981. He is now Manager at First Division Club West Bromwich Albion.

With the appetite he displayed in the World Cup Final of 1966 for honest endeavour and not a little skill, who could possibly imagine the red haired Alan Ball living without soccer. He virtually covered every blade of grass at Wembley that July afternoon. His enthusiasm for the game is still undiminished. Alan's playing career came to an end in the 1982/83 season. After a total of 851 first team appearances in a career that was spent in two spells with Blackpool and Southampton and five and a half seasons each with Everton and Arsenal. His career came to a conclusion after a short spell with Third Division Bristol Rovers. accepted the dual role Player/Manager in his second spell with Blackpool which ended when he was dismissed in March 1981, two months before they were relegated. Alan is now Manager of South Coast Club Portsmouth, they were to finish in fourth position in last season's

Second Division promotion race on goal difference! The issue in doubt until the final day of the season.

The versatile Martin Peters was involved in an exchange deal with Tottenham Hotspur and West Ham United for his World Cup team mate Jimmy Greaves in 1969. Martin later played for Norwich City and Sheffield United. His playing career came to a close in the 1980/81 season after a total of 880 first team appearances. He was appointed Manager of the Bramall Lane Club when they were relegated to Division Four in 1981. He left the Club after only a few months in office.

The hat-trick hero of England's World Cup Final win was Geoff Hurst who left West Ham United in 1972, to play for Stoke City for three seasons. He completed his playing career with Bromwich Albion in 1975 after a career which included 635 first team appearances. After a short spell

with Seattle Sounders, Geoff entered football management with non-league Telford United. He was eventually appointed Manager of Second Division Club Chelsea after serving the Club as Assistant to Danny Blanchflower. Geoff Hurst lost his position with Chelsea in April 1981.

Bobby Charlton had made a total of 708 first team appearances at Old Trafford before he joined Preston North End as Player/Manager for the 1973/74 season. Bobby was in charge when Preston were relegated in 1974, he left the club the following season. Bob is now a Club Director of Manchester United.

Captain of the World Cup winning team was Bobby Moore who left West Ham United in 1974 to play for Second Division Club Fulham. He was to complete his playing career with the Craven Cottage Club at the end of the 1976/77 season. Bob made a total of 794 first team appearances during his career. He was appointed Manager of Oxford City shortly after, his first Club management in the Football League came in May 1984 when he was appointed to a similar position with today's visitors Southend United.

# THE TOWN CRIER WITH JUNIOR ROBINS

The postponment of a number of matches over the Christmas period set me thinking about the large number of indoor games that have been devised to try and reproduce the thrills of football.

I suppose the simplest of all is Blow Football. This is a game which may be a useful time filler at a party (not to mention a good way of developing a thirst) but it has little relationship to the game of football itself.

Perhaps the nearest one is ever likely to get to proper football, that can be played on a tabletop is Subbuteo. This game has minature teams of eleven players and the ball is moved by flicking the players' bases at the ball so that they actually "pass" the ball to one another. Teams can be obtained in the colours of all the famous League and continental teams and with extras, such as floodlights and fencing, it creates a very realistic effect. One word of warning if you decide to go in for all the extras: they may look very pretty but they can create problems when you actually start playing. A number of "players" have been severely injured when floodlights have crashed down on them.

For those who possess the Spectrum Computer there is a most enjoyable programme for would be football managers. You have a squad of players to select from (you can type in your own player names providing they are not too long) and highlights of each match flash up on the screen. The Computer prints out the results of other matches in your league and the League Table. The chance is given to you to purchase players in the transfer market but beware, the Computer keeps a record of the money you spend and your bank overdraft is limited. You start off in Division four but with skill and patience you can progress all the way to the First Division and an F.A. Cup Final.

There is a box game called Soccerboss which puts you in a similar situation of

being a manager trying to build a winning team. This game gives you less control over your own destiny however with Chance Cards turning up where your directors sell three of your best players just when you think you have a winning combination.

Penalty is a card game played on a squared pitch. Directions on the cards enable you to move the ball and a number of cards feature aspects of the game, such as free kicks (give you an extra turn), goalkeepers (save shots going into the square area representing your goal), corners and penalties.

What football games have you played and enjoyed? Why not write in and tell me so that other Junior Robins can share your knowledge. Next time bad weather strikes we all might be able to enjoy some "football" even if it is not the real thing.



The Southend midfield section comprises of former Arsenal apprentice. DANNY O'SHEA (22) who joined Southend from Exeter City last summer, the experienced BARRY SILKMAN (33) who in over 300 League matches has played for Hereford United, Crystal Palace, Plymouth Manchester City, Brentford, Queens Park Rangers and a brief loan spell with Luton Town before his move from Orient summer. GLENN last PENNYFATHER who joined Southend as an apprentice has now made over 160 League appearances for Southend. These three have contributed eleven goals this season, primarily through Danny O'Shea and Glenn Pennyfather who have scored five goals each.

Goals in attack have come mainly from RICHARD CADETTE (20) a £5,000 summer signing from Orient who has scored fifteen League goals to date. ## THE TOWN CRIER BACKTRACKS WITH MIKE SKINNER

This afternoon, with any luck, should see Swindon equal the sequence of 13 straight home League wins established in 1924. The present squad, though, could already be considered as having bettered this, having accomplished the feat in a single season where as their counter-parts of sixty-two years ago did so over two campaigns.

It all started on Easter Saturday, April 19th 1924, when Brighton were beaten 4-0, the previous home game having been a goal-less draw with Bristol Rovers some two weeks earlier, and ended when Swansea inflicted a 2-0 defeat on the Town on December 27th 1924. It is perhaps fitting that the great Harold Fleming made his last senior appearance in the game that started the run, scoring to mark the occasion.

A few interesting facts emerge from those games, such as Arnold Broadhead's appearance in the Gillingham game was his one and only senior outing for the Town...The Luton game in May was the closest Swindon came to a defeat, the visitors led 2-1 with three minutes remaining and Swindon down to ten men, Danny Bew having been injured off. Rogers got the Town's equaliser and a shot from Bert Benyer went in off Luton's Anderson for a last minute winner...Danny Bew and Luton didn't get on - in the October game he played for 50 minutes with a fractured shoulder without realising it...During this run of home wins Swindon only had two away successes - 2-1 at Millwall on September 27th and 5-1 at Merthyr Town on 20th December...The biggest win, 5-0 over Northampton, was also the biggest surprise. The 'Cobblers' were 3rd and Swindon 4th. The win took the Town to the top spot... Swansea went top as a result of ending our run, and finished there at the seasons close...Swindon went on to win seven of the remaining ten home games of that season to finish in fourth spot.

There is however, still a long way to go before beating Rotherham's record of 22 consecutive home League wins (1938-39 and 1946-7). If my calculations are correct then the record will be ours following our first home win of next season - in the Third Division!

## **Looking Ahead**

Following this afternoon's match with Southend United we travel to North Wales next Saturday to meet Wrexham. The match will provide the Town with an opportunity to reverse the only defeat that we have encountered at the County Ground this season.

Despite that opening day win here on August 17th, it was not a victory that was to be the forerunner of a sustained promotion challenge by Dixie McNeil's team. Just a mere hic-cup in our most impressive home form of this season. Nevertheless Wrexham have had the satisfaction of taking maximum points from our last two meetings. A comprehensive 4-0 victory at the Racecourse Ground last season was a prelude to their victory of August.

Only two Clubs have managed to win at Wrexham in League matches this season. Orient who won 2-1 in September and Hereford United at the commencement of November have taken maximum points from their travels to North Wales. Only Chester City of the leading ten Clubs in the Division, apart from Orient have visited the Racecourse Ground to date. They were forced to share the points in a one all local Derby fixture.

Former Sheffield United midfield player Steve Charles who scored the seventy-third minute winner here at the County Ground last August is the Wrexham leading marksman with eleven goals. Steve is looking forward to the Town's visit for he also scored the opening goal in our heavy 4-0 defeat last term.

The following Tuesday enables all to take a break from consuming League action. When we travel the relatively short distance to Bristol to meet Rovers in the Freight Rover Trophy. Once again it provides an opportunity to test our ability against opposition from a higher Division. The Eastville Club have produced a mixed bag of results at home this season. With the following Third Division Clubs having left Bobby Gould's team pointless after their visit to Eastville Stadium -

Brentford, Walsall and York City by a single goal margin. While runaway Third Divison leaders Reading went one better by producing a 2-0 winning margin on the last Saturday of 1985. A local Derby always provides exciting action and few Rovers and Swindon encounters in recent seasons have failed to produce that. Another difficult away match for the Town, but it is difficult to find one that is not, until the match has been played.

The following Saturday January 25th we have an opportunity to put right what was undoubtably our worst display of the season when we lost 3-0 to Peterborough United at London Road in mid-September. That was a match that provided no joy for the Town Their performances were below players. par in a defeat which could have been much heavier. The London Road Club won their opening day fixture at Preston but have failed to win an away match since! Included in their seven away defeats is the widest margin of victory recorded in this season's Fourth Division. A 7-0 defecit at the completion of October, provided Tranmere Rovers with an unexpected bonus. With Ian Muir once on Ioan here at County the Ground from Brighton providing inspiration to his manager Frank Worthington as both strikers notched hat tricks before a meagre attendance of 1.310 at Prenton Park. John Wile's team have suffered defeat at Hartlepool and Chester City on visits to promotion contending teams, losing 2-1 at both venues.

Other Clubs to inflict defeat upon 'The Posh' have been Hereford United and Rochdale by a similar scoreline. Their two other defeats have been at Cambridge United (3-1) and a single goal defeat at Aldershot.

Our last fixture of the month sees the return of Hereford United to the County Ground in a Freight Rover Trophy match. The Edgar Street Club will be hoping to avenge their pre-Christmas defeat when a late effort by Charlie Henry gave the Town part compensation for their 4-1 defeat last August.

# The Town Crier takes a look at The Freight Rover Trophy

Delighted by last season's successful sponsorship, Freight Rover, the Birmingham based manufacturer of the Sherpa range of Light Commercial Vehicles, will continue it's support of the Football Leagues Knockout Competition for Third and Fourth Division Clubs.

Last season's Wembley Final, won by Wigan Athletic, was promoted as the 'Family Final'. It was attended by almost 40,000 and featured Wembley's first family enclosure. A concept which has since been copied for International matches.

After agreeing a new four year sponsorship deal worth £350,000 with Freight Rover Limited during the summer. The Football League feel that the Freight Rover Trophy will now provide the additional means to secure the future of the Third and Fourth Divisions. The-Football League Secretary, Mr. Graham Kelly says, 'Ata time when the financial structure of the Football League is undergoing change, Clubs in the lower Divisions are coming under increasing pressure. The popularity of last season's Freight Rover Trophy indicated that the competition can provide a lifeline for many Clubs as well as a realistic opportunity to Wembley Final. Last experience a season's competition produced aggregate receipts of more than £500,000 from only 75 matches. To put this in perspective, a total of 1,104 Third and Fourth Division League matches generated £8,086,938 including season ticket sales'.

'The Prize Fund for this season has been almost doubled and both finalists will again win a 15 seater Sherpa Minibus delivered in their respective Club colours. The structure of the Competition has, however, been revised in order to produce a more

equitable format'.

The revised format for this season,

briefly, will show this structure:

The North/South Division will be retained throughout the Competition. There will be a Preliminary Round consisting of sixteen Mini-Leagues, each containing three Clubs, i.e. 8 x 3 Clubs in the Northern Section and 8 x 3 Clubs in the Southern Section.

Each Club will play two matches, one at Home and one Away. Three points will be awarded for a Win, one for a Draw. The top Clubs will qualify for the area Quarter-Finals. In the event of two or more Clubs having the same number of points, goal difference will apply, followed by the highest aggregate number of goals scored.

The successful Clubs (eight North, eight South) will contest the area Quarter-Finals. Matches will be played on a knockout basis with extra time, if

necessary, then penalties.

Eight Clubs (four North, four South) will then compete the area Semi-Finals on

the same knockout basis.

The area Finals will be contested by four Clubs (two North, two South) on a two leg basis with extra time at the end of the second leg, if necessary, then Penalties.

The National Final will be played at Wembley. The scheduled dates for the

Competition are as follows:

Preliminary Round (Mini-Leagues of Three): January 15th, 22nd and 29th. The Area Quarter-Finals will be played on February 19th and the Area Semi-Finals on March 12th.

The Area Final played in two legs are scheduled for April 9th and 16th. With the Wembley Final to be played on May 24th.

There is a £47,500 Prize Fund for the participating Clubs which will be allocated as follows:

WINNER - 15 Seater Minibus plus £4,500 LOSING FINALIST - 15 Seater Minibus plus £3,000



Since Colin joined Swindon Town, nearly fifteen months ago, he has provided several instances, where his personal contribution of being the only Town goalscorer on a particular day has brought vital points to the County Ground Club.

Remember his League debut for Swindon at Rochdale last season? Colin came on as a substitute for injured Town Boss Lou Macari. It was his seventy-third minute effort that ensured that the Town returned South with maximum points from their single goal win on a rainy and freezing cold afternoon of November 3rd 1984.

Colin's two goals, one in each half, settled the return fixture here at the County Ground on February 23rd 1985. Despite Shaun Reid, brother of Peter, of Everton and England fame, producing an intervening effort for Rochdale.

Two goals in the space of four minutes during our home match with Exeter City, ten days later. Saw the Town collect three more points, when Colin's sixtieth minute effort was followed by another goalscoring contribution a few minutes later.

The most memorable moment in Colin's short League career to date came on April 17th 1985. When Colin hit a hat-trick against Hereford United at Edgar Street. Which saw the Town record a welcome 3-0 away win against John Newman's Team.


This season Colin was once again on the mark with his own version of his solo act when the Town upset the odds on their visit to Chester on October 19th. When his thirty-eighth minute goal inflicted the only defeat the Sealand Road Club have endured at home.

No one can deny that when they do, they are often crucial efforts. Heavier grounds may assist last season's leading goalscorer, for most of Colin's goals came in the second half of last season. Interesting to see if they do! If so, those same scouts and managers who were attracted to the County Ground last season, will be back.





EOIN HAND FAREWELL TO EOIN

In June 1964 a eighteen year old Dublin born winger was persuaded to try his luck in the Football League with Swindon Town. It was a move that did not work in favour of both player or club and a somewhat disillusioned Irishman returned home to rejoin Drumcondra. Just over four years later he returned to England to join Portsmouth.

This time Eoin Hand was able to make his Football League debut. The County Ground reject went onto carve out a successful career and appear in 277 League matches for the Fratton Park Club. Those appearances came in two spells with 'Pompey' although the majority - 260 were made in his first spell with the Naval Port Club. A two year interlude in South Africa interupted his final total.

Eoin returned to Southern Ireland at the end of his playing career. His skirmishes with League of Ireland Club management eventually led appointment as the Eire Team Manager. Now his reign as the National Team boss is coming to an end. Several big names have been mentioned including Billy McNeil the Manchester City Manager and Brian Clough of Nottingham Forest. None of course Irish, while among their own, the former Chelsea, Crystal Palace and West Bromwich defender Paddy Mulligan who is currently managing Shelbourne is mentioned. Others to have their name linked with the post include Shamrock Rovers boss Jim McLauglin who played against the Town in the sixties for Shrewsbury Town.

include former Others Scottish International Pat Crerand and Liverpool's Bob Paisley! Whoever takes over from Eoin will have a most difficult task and yet it is difficult to say that Eire have not mismanaged the talent that has been available to them in recent years. The likes of Liam Brady, David O'Leary and Frank Stapleton should have been able to display their talents in a series of World Cup Finals. But Eire never look likely to achieve that aim. Whoever succeeds the former Swindon Town hopeful of the 'sixties' will find the job as frustrating. For Eoin was never able to enjoy the freedom to travel regularly to watch the players at his disposal play in the Football Invariably having to select his League. team on second-hand information.



# The Town Crier on the Touchline

WITH ROBERT STEPHENSON THE TOWN'S MANAGING DIRECTOR



EDITOR: Could you explain to our supporters the reasons for such a dramatic improvement in the Club's recent report to the Shareholders whereby a loss of £114,000 the previous year was reduced to £10,000 last year.

ROBERT: During the past year the Club has reduced it's wage bill and also reduced the staff here at the County Ground. Particularly in respect of management, ground staff and players. The stringent financial restraint that has been imposed on the Club's finances has improved our situation and without doubt this will continue.

The extra revenue that has been generated by the increase in attendances and particularly with regard to sponsorship have been extenuating factors in a marked improvement. However I must stress that last years financial accounts still showed a loss and it is our earnest wish to make next years accounts show an operating profit. We really do have an excellent opportunity of doing this in view of the considerably higher gates that we have enjoyed this season and the further improvement there has been in income with the close control of expenditure.

EDITOR: What do you think of the new format of the Freight Rover Trophy?

ROBERT: It is hoped that a mini-league of three clubs at the commencement of the competition. Will prove to be more attractive, on the basis that supporters will see Swindon Town playing two different teams as opposition. Where as last season we had Torquay as opponents in two matches. Hopefully this will prove to be much more appealing. With sponsorship doubled this season for the Freight Rover Trophy. It certainly shows that the


sponsors commitment which is for the next four years is given with the intent that it is a worthwhile and flourishing competition.

EDITOR: With the Club seemingly having a definite chance of promotion this season. Some supporters have been expressing concern at the wear the pitch is showing. Could it jepardise our chances if we lose a home match or two at a vital time?

ROBERT: We really are at the mercy of the elements and there is no reason for anyone to think that any matches need to be postponed. For instance the week preceding the recent Preston match the ground was used for a schoolboy match and a reserve game. Also it was a case of both matches taking place in the space of 12 hours. It was also a week of heavy rain but the ground coped amazingly well. Therefore I have no reason to envisage problems. Really our supporters should have no fears.

EDITOR: Would you like to expand upon the duties of the Board of Directors which are not always obvious to the Club supporters?

ROBERT: Our Board is made up of a number of two or three sub-committees who have a specific responsibility regarding various aspects of the Club. Such as finances, commercial, which also includes lottery and sponsorship. Also the ground licensing clubs and match day hospitality. In fact any specific matters concerning the operation of any of these areas of the Club. Can then be brought to the fortnightly Board Meeting by the relevant committees. I think it is fair comment to say that my colleagues on the Board are dedicated and hardworking in the pursuit of maintaining and improving our Club for the good of all of us.
