

Commented a Police spokesman: "We've not had any other reports on a UFO - but there could be a PC at a station in the sticks still trembling from the after effects of such a sighting."



We allowed Port Vale to pull level through our own caution, rather than their own collective skill. In defence, we always posed Vale problems. Seven goals, numerous thrills and spells amounted to an entertaining evening.


I would like to take this opportunity to explain to you all, why I allowed Martin Ling to leave the County Ground. I originally signed Martin from Exeter City during the close season with high hopes of his future career in football. I believed Martin had the basic skill to eventually find himself at a much higher level, that I still believe he can do.

When I signed Martin from Exeter City, I was not aware that Swindon Town Football Club would be subject to a provision that any on-going transfer would be subject to fifty percent of the fee made payable to his former Club. That decision was made at a later date by a Football League Tribunal Committee.

Martin Ling has a lot of potential, let noone doubt that fact. To realise that potential, a degree of application by him personally and sheer hard work by myself and the staff of Swindon Town Football Club would be required.

I was not prepared to do that and then allow any future transfer to take place. from which Swindon Town would only benefit by fifty percent. Accordingly, when David Webb the Southend United Manager, made the Club an offer, enabling us to recoup our outlay, we felt that there was no alternative but to agree to accept their offer.

The deal with Southend United allowed me to come to a quick agreement with nearby Oxford United and sign Mark Jones, who has been on loan with us for a month. Mark, had impressed me with his ability, awareness and attitude to work hard for the teams benefit. It is impossible to reap the benefit of life without sheer hard work, football is no different. There is no doubt in my mind that Mark will be of considerable value to Swindon Town Football Club as a Player.



My recent trip to Eire, proved fruitless. I went to watch a Striker who had impressed me immensely on a previous visit. On this occasion he disappointed, often the situation, when you watch a player several times, maybe it is better to follow instinct. I then made my mind up - to watch him again at a later date. Following my flying visit to Southern Ireland, it was a case of travelling with the Club Chairman to Manchester to see if it was possible to see Ron Atkinson with a view to persuading him to release Fraser Digby to us, if not permanently, then on loan for a further period.

You now all know the outcome, that Fraser is still with us for a while at least but with the provision that he can be recalled by Manchester United at short

Obviously, that is a situation that is not entirely satisfactory and I will be making moves to come to a situation that is of benefit to all concerned.

How pleasing to see that eight hundred of you turned up at the County Ground for Open Day. I was not able to be here myself due to a scouting mission but from

all accounts you enjoyed yourselves. I am sure that I do not have to stress how important the next two matches are including todays visit by York City. To enable us to retain an interest in the promotion situation it is important that any Club with pretentions of moving up a Division needs to be in close proximity at the completion of the midweek matches. TALK OF THE TOWN



Last Saturday saw Bournemouth cruise to a comfortable home win against Wigan Athletic by 3-1. Goals from Carl Richards, Gary Howlett, and David Puckett were enough to see the Dean Court Club take over the leadership of the Division by two clear points from second placed Middlesbrough and Gillingham. Wigan who scored a consolation goal from Thompson had new signing Bobby Campbell sent off.

Gillingham followed up our recent Vale. Park success by inflicting a second successive home defeat on Port Vale. After first half goals by Phil Sproson and David Shearer had seen both teams level at the interval, a second half goal from former Town winger Howard Pritchard gave the Gills the points.

Howard's former Club, Bristol City, captained by former Town favourite, Brian Williams in the continuing absence of the injured Bobby Hutchinson, wasted an early two goal advantage given them by the reliable shooting power of Alan Walsh against Middlesbrough at Ashton Gate. Goals by Bernie Slaven and Brian Laws settled the score-line before half-time.

City's close rivals Bristol Rovers who visit the County Ground on Tuesday evening next, spent a fruitless journey in travelling to the Today's league furthest outpost Carlisle United. The Brunton Park club's defender Wes Saunders scored his third goal in three games in the second half. Paul Baker had earlier given Harry Gregg's team a half time lead.

Notts County notched their fourth successive home victory against visiting Doncaster Rovers. Two goals from the impressive Ian McParland helped the Meadow Lane club to a 3-1 win.

After losing here at the County Ground the previous Saturday, Chesterfield, watched by the Division's lowest crowd of 1,895 beat Newport County 3-2. Goals by Tony Reid, defender Steven Baines and the former Town on

loan player, Dave Caldwell, proved to much for the Somerton Park club. Former Town midfield player, Roy Carter, in the first half and Mick Vinter with a second half goal kept the Welsh club in with a chance of a point. In fact Chesterfield had to come from behind to win.

It was really a case of missed chances that provided the Third Division with its only goal-less match of the day when we visited Feethams, to meet Darlington last Saturday.

Bottom placed club Rotherham United took a first half lead against today's visitors York City at Bootham Crescent. Second half goals from the highly consistant Keith Walwyn and former Aldershot striker Dale Barton gave City their fifth home win of the season.

The Divisions leading goalscorers, Blackpool, were out of action through mumps, their away match at Mansfield being postponed, enabling us to close the gap on the leading clubs.

The days goal action was never more in evidence than at Fellows Park where Walsall entertained Brentford in a high scoring affair. The midland club taking the points with a spectacular 5-2 triumph in front of Chairman Terry Ramsden. Nothing unusual in that, you may enquire, but it was actually the first time that he had seen 'The Saddlers' in action. It was an exciting and nervejangling experience for him though. Twice he saw his team enjoy a two goal advantage but each time they allowed Brentford back into the game with defensive errors.

The Saddlers opened the scoring in the 39th minute when Craig

Millen pulled one back for Brentford before David Kelly notches his second goal for the match and then new signing Trevor Christie from Manchester City scored in the last minute.

Two of todays matches may allow the clubs in the close proximity of the leaders to close the gap. Avresome Park should see its highest crowd of the season so far when League leaders Bournemouth travel to the North East to meet Middlesbrough. Blackpool entertain Bristol City at Bloomfield Road in what should be another keenly contested affair. Any slip ups by the two leading clubs would be ideal for Gillingham who on paper look to have a relatively easy task when they entertain Chesterfield at Priestfield Stadium.

The battle between the two Countys at Somerton Park, New-port and Notts will be of significance to the leaders. It would come as no surprise if some of todays draws are not amoungst at least one of these three fixtures.

For the second home game running, today sees a battle of recent Fourth Division champions. York City won the title in 1983/4 a year before our last home visitors Chesterfield and of course two seasons before our success of last year.

In a year of dwindling home gates for Swindon Town, they entertained the "Minstermen" in front of only 2,528 spectators on 15th October 1983. The game resulted in the narrowest of victories for Swindon by three goals to two with Gary Emmanuel, Colin Bailie and Leigh Barnard scoring for the "Town"

Only two of the present Swindon squad played that day, emphasising the tremendous changes that have happened at the County Ground over the past three seasons.

Those two players were goalscorer Leigh Barnard and right back Charlie Henry. David Hockaday also appeared as sub. that afternoon, with Andy Rowland playing a defensive role.

The departees from that side are gaining fairly varied success elsewhere. Scott Endersby achieved his ambition for a higher grade of football by joining Carlisle last season. Colin Bailie tasted success with last seasons sensation Reading. Paul Batty's fortunes however took a downturn at the end of last season when the club he joined after leaving the "Town", Chesterfield, gave him a free transfer. Swindon centre back for the York game, Mike Graham took part in the match which saw Swindon clinch their first ever league Championship, as a full back for Mansfield. Gary Emmanuel also faced the "Town" recently for 4th Division Swansea in a pre-season friendly at the Vetch.

Jimmy Quinn has probably been the most successful of those who left but possibly also the most unlucky. Joining Second division Blackburn saw his international career with Northern Ireland go from strength to strength, until the World Cup in Mexico and an injury which prevented his appearance, the European Championship game at Wembley bringing a substitute appearance and steps on the way to an international recovery.


Alan Mayes, finished leading scorer in the 1983/4 season with 17 goals and has since moved to Blackpool via Carlisle, his move has already made quite an impact on the Seasiders including a goal in their biggest win of the season on that awful night here in September.

Gary Nelson appears to have gained a degree of success he could never attain at Swindon and established himself as a credible second division player with Plymouth.

With York well on the way to Division 3 a similar "Town" side went down 2-0 at Bootham Crescent, one of their 13 defeats in a season which brought our lowest ever football league position, 17th in Division 4.

It would be nice to think that one of todays sides could go on to be champions again, Denis Smith and Lou Macari are two young managers who have the potential to make it happen.

This will only be the sixth time that York have visited the County Ground. And a quick look at the previous meetings will show that, the last four have produced very high scoring encounters, and full value for the spectators.

The arrival of Denis Smith as then the player/manager in May 1982 has been the turning point for the minstermen's fortune. In his first season he produced a fine team to finish seventh, and that potential was fully realised a year later during the 1983/84 campaign.

York ran away with the 4th Division title and in the process became the first club ever to top a hundred points in the league.

That 101 points record stood until May of this year when it was surpassed by Lou Macari's Swindon side.

York have always been regarded as Cup fighters and under Smith they have reached the last sixteen twice.

However, their best performance by far in the F.A. Cup came in 1955, when as a 3rd Division side they caught the whole footballing world's imagination by reaching the semi-finals.

Formed in 1922, York were elected to the football league seven years later, and remained in Division 3 North until 1958 when the 3rd & 4th divisions were formed. Within a year they were promoted to Division 3 but alas slipped back again a twelve months later.

And that was to be the pattern for the next decade – promotion & relegation between the third & fourth divisions. At the beginning of the seventies, at last, York established themselves in the third; and in 1974 gained elevation to the second.

It was only to be a brief stay of two seasons and the last time the club were to be seen amongst the more elite.

A rapid decline in fortunes followed within two years of relegation from the second division, York had become numbers of the fourth again.

And that is where they remained until the upsurge in results upon the arrival of present manager Denis Smith.

This season, York made a good start and were amongst the 3rd division leaders early on.

But a run of five games in the league & cup in October without a win has had its toll. Last Saturday, though, they returned to winning ways with a 2-1 victory over Rotherham. York also had the distinction of removing Sunderland of the 2nd division from the Littlewoods Challenge Cup and then gave Chelsea a real fright in Round 2. At Bootham Crescent a goal from Tony Canham sank the Londoners, but there was to be no fairy-tale ending – defeat by three goals to nil at Stamford Bridge in the second leg.

Denis Smith (Manager)

Now in his 5th season at Bootham Crescent having been appointed Manager in May 1982. In 4 successful campaigns he has guided the Club from 85th in the Football League, the position they occupied at the end of 1981/2, to 51st last term plus two successive appearances in the last 16 of the FA Cup. In 1983/4 he was voted Division 4 Manager of the Season" when City finished runaway Champions. Had an outstanding playing career with his home town club Stoke City and in almost 20 years of loyal and stalwart service made over 400 league appearances. In 1971/2 he won a F.L. Cup Winners medal.

Viv Busby (Coach)

Appointed at the same time as Denis Smith and has proved to be an invaluable right hand man. Viv. was a talented and skilful forward in his playing days which started at Luton Town and then on to Fulham (FA Cup runners-up medal 1974/5) Norwich City, Stoke City and Blackburn Rovers.

Dale Banton (Forward)

Signed from Aldershot in November 1984 for a Club record fee of £50,000. A Londoner, who joined West Ham United from school and made a number of senior appearances before moving to Aldershot in 1982. A consistent marksman for "The Shots", he was the 4th Division's leading socrer in 1982/3. Netted 13 goals last term and at the start of the present campaign had made 81 league/cup appearances - 26 goals for City.

Martin Butler (Forward)

After a very successful start to his professional career midway through the 1984/5 campaign, last season was a frustrating one with injuries. The son of former City and Hull winger Ian Butler, he had 42 senior appearances – 7 goals to his credit at the start of the season.

Tony Canham (Midfield/forward)

15.10.1983 W3-2 Emmanuel, Bailie, Barnard

Made his Football League debut as an amateur in March 1985 and scored in his opening game. He signed professional terms in the summer of 1985 (previous Club was Harrogate Railway Athletic) and had a very successful first season finishing 2nd top scorer with 14 goals. At the start of this campaign had made 57 League/Cup appearances — 15 goals.

Gary Ford (Midfield)

Local born Gary is the Club's longest serving professional having been at Bootham Crescent since June 1977 when he became an apprentice professional. He made his League debut in October 1978 and during the course of last season became only the 10th player in City's history to make 300 league appearances for the Club. Still only in his mid 20's, he started this season with 380 League/Cup games to his credit and 60 goals.

Marco Gabbiadini (Forward)

Powerful young local player who has come through the apprentice ranks. He made his full league debut on the opening day of last season and marked the occasion by scoring. He went on to make 26 senior appearances a number of them as substitute and scored 4 goals.

Sean Haslegrave (Midfield)

Now in the 4th season at York, having been signed from Crewe Alexandra in July 1983. He started his career with home town chib Stoke City in 1968 and has also seen service with Nottingham Forest and Preston North End. At the start of the season he had 131 League/Cup appearances under the belt for City but has still to score a goal for the Club.

Derek Hood (Defender/midfield)

Has been a regular member of the 1st team since signing from Hull City in February 1980. A wholehearted 100% player, he has filled a number of different positions for City and was "Clubman Of The Year" in 1982/3 Born in the North East he served his apprenticeship with West Bromwich Albion and at the start of the season had made 281 senior appearances for the Club - 27 goals.

Andy Leaning (Goalkeeper)

Local lad who signed professional terms in the summer of 1985 after playing for Rowntree Mackintosh in the North Counties East League. Following as injury to Mike Astbury he made his first team debut in November 1985 and went on to make 39 consecutive League and Cup

appearances up to the end of the season.

David McAughtrie (Defender)

Central defender signed from Carlisle United in the summer of 1985 for £7,500. Born in Scotland he started his career with Stoke City for whom he made 50 1st Division appearances. Was a virtual ever present in his first season at Bootham Crescent with 52 League and Cup appearances – 2 goals.

Simon Mills (Midfield)

Simon had a very successful first season with City and was voted "Clubman Of The Year". A former England Youth Player he was signed from Sheffield Wednesday in June 1985 for a fee of £21,000. He made 46 League and Cup appearances last term scoring 1 goal.

Mike Pickering (Defender)

Following the departure of John MacPhil to Bristol City, he was signed from Rotherham United during the close season. Huddersfield both, he started his career with Barnsley before moving to Southampton and then Sheffield Wednesday. An experienced central defender he had been at Millmoor 3 years had last season was an ever present for United when he skippered the side.

Steve Senior (Defender)

Born in Sheffield Steve joined City as an apprentice in August 1979 and made his League debut in the last game of the 1980/81 campaign shortly before signing professional terms on his 18th Birthday Broke his leg in April 1984, but made a complete recovery and commences this term with 160 senior appearances to his credit and 7 goals.

Keith Walwyn (Forward)

Signed from Chesterfield in the Summer of 1981 for a mere £4,000. Has proved one of the Football League's most consistent marksmen in the last 5 seasons. Last term he scored 29 League and Cup goals and during the season became only the 4th player to score 100 League goals for the Club. At the start of the season West Indian born Keith had netted 115 goals on 239 league and Cup appearances for City and now has in his sights the Club record held by Norman Wilkinson.

Alan Whitehead (Defender)

Alan joined York City from Scunthorpe United recently for a £15,000 fee, hence the 'Irons' interest in our own David Cole. Alan was previously with Brentford before moving north for a substantial fee.



we relaxed and allowed the home team back into the game. We just have to be more determined to hold onto our lead in future.

The same type of thing happened in our previous match against Chesterfield here at home - coasting along and before we knew where we are, the opposing team have pegged us back.

Both matches were affected by high winds and rain, admittedly not gale force, but it did add to our problems.

Looking at our record, the goals that we have conceded, can be accounted for in mainly two matches, at home to Blackpool, when we conceded six goals and at Port Vale where we let in three goals. Our record in away matches before we visited Port Vale was as good as anyone in the Third Division.

Although from your point of view it is exciting and entertaining to witness a 4-3 scoreline, from a defenders angle it is more satisfying to win 1-0. It looks more convincing. Still, we played reasonably well and battled and two of Port Vale's goals came from terrific shots from the edge of the penalty area.

There can be no excuses for the fact that we are conceding nearly two goals each match and that is not good defending. The only way to prevent this becoming a custom is by developing a more determined attitude at the back. We simply must get more bodies in front of shots.

Before this Season began I did not think we would get away to such a flying start in our away matches. In fact, I thought we would draw a lot more. I do not mind admitting that I have on occasions been somewhat nervous and then suddenly I realised that if we applied ourselves in the right manner, the problems were not as great as I had imagined. We can do well in this Division and when we are on the attack we are as good as anyone. I really do have to emphasise, we must defend better and I think we probably have, following that sickening home defeat to Blackpool. The whole team needs to work hard to prevent crosses coming in and that means a lot of that spade work has to be done outside the penalty box.

You are probably entertaining thoughts that once again we can

gain promotion. Personally, I think we must make sure that by the time the Christmas programme begins we need to be in the top eight positions. If you are adrift of the top positions by twelve to fifteen points it is difficult to make it up. Having said that, we did it after our poor start last Season, but, of course, that was early Season with mid-week matches still to come. The Season has to some extent followed the same pattern, a postponement and then we make up lost ground - one big difference, we lost at Port Vale last Season! The "Gaffer" had told us before we went out to play Port Vale that as long as we played football we would cause them problems. He was right, we did. The last away match at Fulham it was a case of battling against them, a different approach.

I don't think anyone would disagree with me when I say that we have a good enough squad of players here at the County Ground to do well.

Although I come from Scotland, I among all the players will be eagerly looking forward to next Tuesday evening's match with Bristol Rovers. One advantage to being in the Third Division is that we have four matches this Season as local derbys, two with Rovers and two with City.

I would like to take this opportunity to appeal to the younger people who will be watching both Clubs in action here and in Bristol. Players don't like to be associated with crowd problems and when you are a player it can often be distracting. If that happens a players attention can be diverted and costly. We want you to be proud of us and we of you.

How do others see Swindon Town? Below is an account of the match published in the "Southern Evening Echo" on Thursday October 9th 1986 written by Bob Brunskell who follows the fortunes of Southampton for the local evening newspaper.

"LITTLE SWINDON TOWN were glorious in defeat last night. They hit Saints with everything but the kitchen sink, miraculously failing to cut back a three goal deficit from the First Leg of this

Littlewoods Cup tie.

Saints passage into the Third Round of the competition looked comfortable enough on paper. But for the brilliance of Peter Shilton and the woodwork surrounding their goal they would have been out on their ears.

Swindon Manager, Lou Macari described it as a "goaless annihilation" and that summed up perfectly a turbulent night for Saints at a noisy, emotional County Ground.

Rarely can a side have dominated a game so much and hit so many shots yet still

have finished without a goal

Macari's impressive Third Division outfit attacked from the first whistle to the last, hitting the woodwork three times, missing a penalty, forcing two goal-line clearances and demanding non-stop excellence from England's best Goalkeeper. Even when it became impossible for them to get back into the tie, they still came forward, richly earning a standing ovation from disappointed but vey proud

hoarse.

Saints were never allowed to get going. They were repeatedly hustled off the ball, they surrendered possession carelessly and it rebounded on the defence who had to scrap with their backs to the

supporters who had shouted themselves

This was the real test for Mark Wright, playing his way back after a broken leg. He held out, often grimly, as did his

colleagues at the back.

They were as tight and disciplined as they could be, but sometimes that was not enough. It was often left to Shilton to rescue them and when even he capitulated, the post and the bar were to thwart the Swindon raiders.

Swindon's positive approach to the game was predictable. What shook the Saints was the fury of their attacks and the relentless manner in which they tried to retrieve a tie which had seemingly slipped beyond their grasp at the Dell.

No-one battled harder to give the underdogs hope than the lanky Dave Bamber, whose career is bubbling after lanquishing in the shadows of Fratton Park.





Bamber plagued Shilton more than anybody, forcing him into three breathtaking saves before slamming a header against the bar.

It was another former Pompey player, Chris Kamara, who squandered the best chance of setting up what would have been a famous victory for the Wiltshire

Just eighteen minutes into the game Wright tripped Bamber in the penalty area and Kamara stepped up to make a complete hash of the spot kick, sending the ball bobbling tamely past Shilton's right-hand post.

When the game slipped into its final ten minutes, Macari sent on another forward in Steve White and within seconds he had driven a shot past Shilton and against the

underside of the bar.

It was perhaps the final proof to Swindon that they were never going to score. Ironically George Lawrence looked as though he might break the deadlock when he swept onto a cross from Clarke in the last minute.

But the shot went over and in Swindon's eyes it was the only justice of the night. Despite being forced into all manner of desperation, Saints suffered only one booking - Forrest for a foul on Kamara? Chris Nicholl described Peter Shilton's performance last night as "one of his best for Southampton". The Saints' boss said: "Shilton had a magnificent game in the same round of the competition at Millwall last year.


But this one against Swindon was near enough to what he achieved at the Den. If anything, Swindon put us under more pressure last night".

Nichol elaborated, "We needed strength of character, a strong will and a lot of determination and we got it from a few. Swindon threw men forward, threw the ball forward and First Division players have problems coping with that. We certainly did.

Swindon deserved to win - there's no doubt about that!










INTERVIEW



The Swindon Town Centre of Excellence has been fortunate to obtain the sponsorship of ABBEY NATIONAL BUILDING SOCIETY, this is of considerable benefit to Swindon Town Football Club and our thanks and gratitude are expressed to Mr Teague and his colleagues, for their generosity. Many of you may not be aware of its existence and there is no-one better to explain its function and purpose than Town Assistant Manager, John Trollope.

The Centre is run by a Committee consisting of myself as Director, Mr C Green who represents the Board of Directors, Mr M Parry and Mr D Kilford from the Wiltshire F.A. and our own Terry Wollen.

The Centre has been in existence for about two years financed by contributions from the Wiltshire F.A. and our own Club.

There are about eighty to ninety such Centres around the Country. They were devised by the Football Association and eventually the best of the intake are theoretically bound for the School of Excellence at Lilleshall."

John had to be the recipient of a full F.A. Coaching badge to qualify as the Director of

the Centre of Excellence. Although it is possible to have the Preliminary badge and be a Coach.

"We invite lads between the ages of 11-14 years to attend the coaching sessions held once a week to improve their skills of the game."

Where do all these young players of the future come from? "We have recommendations from several leagues," replied John before adding, "They are lads who are no further than one hours travelling distance from Swindon. We held a trial in August for players that had been recommended, about sixty attended from as far afield as Trowbridge, Stroud, Chippenham, Amesbury, Salisbury and Pewsey, Roughly a radius of thirty to forty miles. From the sixty who attended we selected a group of about twelve to thirteen lads. They joined in with the boys who had been with us for the two previous years."

The under 13's are asked to attend from 5.30pm to 6.30pm, while the older age group of 14 to 15 year olds attend one hour later. Acceptance does not mean the boys can take matters for granted as John finalised, "We have a register and lack of attendance means that a boy is disqualified."


ABBEY NATIONAL have made a good investment, one that could help a young hopeful to England Manager Bobby Robsons School of Excellence at Lilleshall. One ABBEY helping another, one might say!" The standard of skill and also the attitude of the boys is of significance especially to someone like John who displayed both during his record run in Swindon Town's league team.

"Each boy is told to go home and practice his skill, I suppose you could almost call it homework, and the following week it soon becomes clear whether the boys have heeded their mentors advice."

Among the boys who attend the Centre of Excellence is the Town Managers eldest son, Michael Macari. John says of Michael "He is making good progress, he has natural skill and a mental toughness which is necessary."

Kit and all the required facilities have been a problem for the Centre, but progress is being made and it is due to people like ABBEY NATIONAL BUILDING SOCIETY that the initial future of Swindon Town Football Club is able to make the required progress.

Swindon Town Football Club would like to convey their appreciation of the help and aid provided by such people as the Wiltshire F.A. and their newly found sponsors ABBEY NATIONAL BUILDING SOCIETY. English football now sets its future standards in the expectation that natural skill will be extended at the Centres spread throughout the country. Swindon Town's centre could not be in better hands than that of John Trollope, a man who cares.

£400,000.00 financed by the sale of adjoining land to the school. If one can avoid the politics surrounding this project, this has to be seen as a major step forward in





The Port Vale v Swindon fixture had the lesser known Henry, Jones, Gilligan and Maguire and produced a spectacle of far more interest.


The top flight seems plagued with snobbery, pose and arrogant ill humour. Slow paced and slow thinking games seem to be a purists delight but mould the game into chess on grass for the average fan.

The Vale Park match was overloaded with enthusiasm, effort and a great deal of ability which in relation to the Wembley game made thoughts of the lower divisions being cut off even more stupid than they already are.

Rainy Vale Park with its tatty surroundings and, on paper at least, average competitors will in future seem like a footballing paradise in comparison to sparkling Wembley and its under achieving prima donnas.

The recently televised Manchester derby is a perfect example of a good game being marred by constant gamesmanship and unsporting behaviour. It would be madness to think that such delays and play-acting do not take place in the lower divisions too, but every incident which brought a dead ball situation seemed to be followed by one of the games so-called elite throwing or kicking the ball away, either to irritate or slow their opponent. This ultimately makes the view from the armchair one of a sport in deep trouble being publicised badly by the very people who stand to lose most by its decline.




A jubilant Leigh Barnard turns after planting the ball in the Chesterfield net for Swindon's goal number two.
