





It is to everyone's credit connected with Bristol Rovers that they have taken such problems, that have come their way of late, within their stride.


After losing their battle with the local residents and authorities over their proposed move to nearby Stoke Gifford, they were dealt a double blow by the resignations of their former Chairman and Vice Chairman Martin Flook and Barry Bradshaw. Then followed the move to Bath. Many of the wiseacres were forecasting Fourth Division soccer at Twerton Park. They had forgotten the fighting spirit that would be instilled in the players by Manager Bobby Gould.

It must be the aim and desire of Bristol Rovers to eventually return to Bristol in the foreseeable future. They must be hoping that the City Fathers will view their plight with sympathy and help an institution to return to its birthplace.

One aspect of any application to build a new stadium, is now obvious, that any such proposal has to be built away from housing development. It is advantageous to let the housing follow after the proposal has been granted!

You are all now well aware of our opponents in the First Round of the F.A. Cup. Farnborough have progressed to this stage of the Competition previously and must not be underestimated.

After two days of negotiation between our two Clubs, the Football Association and the local police it was eventually decided (that the tie would take place at Swindon



on Saturday November 15th, Kick Off 3 p.m.

Farnborough are members of the Vauxhall-Opel League and last Season finished in third position, behind champions Sutton United and runners-up Yeovil Town.

The F.A. Cup brings an air of exitement that few if any other competitions can match and the air of expectancy that greets the draw of each Round as the Competition proceeds never lessens as the years roll by.

Here at Swindon Town Football Club we are pleased for Farnborough Town that they will enjoy the prospect of meeting a League Club and also boost their finances. Finally may I appeal to the younger element in the crowd for tonights match to respect the views of the Managers concerned, whether in the ground or equally important, outside the confines of the County Ground.

A degree of consternation has been apparent in recent home matches due to the fact that people have had to pass through the turnstiles!

Previously the exit gates had been opened and all and sundry admitted - including those who had no intention of paying for admission. By simply waiting for the gates to be

opened they gained free admission! Those people do not support Swindon Town Football Club, our Manager Lou Macari or our Players. Revenue simply lost, without recourse.

That simple fact is irrelevant with the seriousness of the Bradford City Fire Disaster. The implications have been far reaching. Under the provisions of the Safety Certificate Act, our Football Club is subject to penalties, not the type we prefer to see connected with Football, but restrictions on playing at the County Ground, fines and even kicking off at 2 p.m. or earlier if we do not comply with all the stringent demands.

Swindon Town Football Club are answerable to the Safety Certificate Committee, a meeting of which will be held here at the County Ground tomorrow.

We have to satisfy all of the Authorities that we have completed every item in the mammoth schedule.


Imagine the problem there would be if there was a tragic fire at the County Ground. If it was then found, that a child was among the victims and Swindon



When I first came to this Club, in my first Season I remember the problem and eventual misery that Dagenham inflicted upon us in the F.A. Cup. I do not want a repeat of that, while I am Manager of this Club.

Since I have been at the County Ground we have never made progress into the Second Round of the F.A. Cup. Last Season we lost to Bristol City in a First Round replay at Ashton Gate.

This season I am looking for my players to make some real progress not only to the F.A. Cup but also the Freight Rover Trophy.

Cup success not only stimulates supporters but also the whole Club. The financial rewards can be lucrative and at the end of a Season can literally be the difference between a players livelihood continuing at this Club. Finance is important and lack of it in any sphere can often mean cutbacks, football is no different.

I was personally pleased for Farnborough, can you imagine what a difference it must make to their bank balance and status. I believe this is the fourth occasion they have reached this stage of the F.A. Cup Competition, a tribute to their officials, players and management.

Port Vale striker Andy Jones who has been attracting the attention of several First Division clubs this season, has been recommended by his Manager John Rudge to Wales Manager, Mike England. Arsenal and Manchester United have both been reported to have watched the 23 year old striker who John Rudge describes as equal to the demands made at the top level. Andy who gave up his job as a delivery van supervisor to join Vale, from non-League Rhyl in the Summer of 1985 was on the mark in our recent 4-3 success at Vale Park. Several players from Second and Third Division Clubs have done well in the squads of Wales and Northern Ireland in recent years and why not Andy Jones?

Chesterfield Chairman, the millionaire, Mike Watterson, the target for abuse in recent weeks is reported to be willing to sell his controlling interests in the Saltergate Club to anybody who will guarantee its future.

Swindon Town's last ever visit to Eastville, was of course, in last seasons Freight Rover Trophy competition where a 2-1 defeat came in the middle of our marvellous unbeaten league run. Our last league encounters with Rovers were in 1981/2, Swindon's memories of that relegation season are not all bad though, putting nine goals past the Bristolians in their two meetings providing rare pleasure in a miserable season.

On 17th October 1981 at Eastville, Swindon were in charge from the start. After twenty minutes of relentless pressure the "Town" went ahead when a Charlie Henry cross found Andy Rowland who lifted the ball into the net.

A Roy Carter flick on for Andy Rowland to shoot past Phil Kite put the "Town" 2-0 up and emphasised Carter's class and Rowland's finishing, neither of which were ultimately enough to halt relegation.

Early in the second half, Swindon scored their third with Andy Rowland involved again, heading on a Gary Williams corner for Charlie Henry to score his first ever league goal. Then came another rarity with the booking of Jimmy Allan for apparent time wasting. A clumsy challenge on David Williams by Russell Lewis brought a free kick which went to Archie Stephens who pushed the ball past Allan.

To complete a hectic five minutes, Paul Rideout followed up after Brian Williams had hit a post to give the "Town" a 4-1 win. The following March a crowd of 6,689 could celebrate again as Swindon trounced the Rovers 5-2. It was not until thirty minutes had

passed though that the deadlock was broken. A goal at each end by Tim Parkin within two minutes made the score 1-1 at the end of the first half. Eight minutes after the break Swindon went in front for the first time. Roy Carter crossed behind the Bristol defence for Paul Rideout to ghost in and head home. Six minutes later, it was Carter himself who scored, from a penalty after Brian Williams had felled Kevin Baddeley in the area. Rovers were quick to strike back though, two minutes after Carters goal the ball stuck in the mud enabling Archie Stephens to round Jimmy Allan and slip the ball into the empty net. The goal seemed to make Swindon all the more determined, their efforts paid off in the 67th minute when Paul Rideout headed a Brian Hughes cross past Kite to finally put the game beyond Rovers reach. Six minutes from full time, former Swindon midfielder and Rovers captain for the day Brian Williams was sent off following one of his all too familiar 'competitive' challenges. To complete a duo of fine performances for the "Town" Charlie Henry scored their ninth goal of the season against Rovers to bring brief cheer in a wholly depressing season.

Season 1986/87 sees Bristol Rovers embarking on another new chapter in their colourful history - they have moved 12 miles from their traditional Eastville Stadium home to share non-league Bath City's Twerton Park ground.

It's a brave experiment which will be watched with avid interest by the rest of the football world.

For years Rovers had been handicapped by having to pay high rates to a commercial landlord at Eastville. Their efforts to obtain a new stadium in the Bristol area having to date proven fruitless, the directors boldly decided to uproot the club and try to create a new base in Bath.

Rovers insist they will one day return to Bristol, so have kept their offices and training ground in the city, moving lock, stock and barrel into Twerton Park on match days only.

Manager Bobby Gould has been charged with the task of creating a winning team to lit the new surroundings. That will be quite a challenge, for like so many other. Third Division clubs these days, Rovers have to operate on a tight budget.

Effervescent Bobby is back at the club that gave him his first managerial break in 1981. It will be recalled he did so well in his 18 months at the helm then, that he was invited to succeed Dave Sexton as boss of his home town club, First Division Coventry City.

Bobby has recruited one of his former Wolves playing collegues, Kenny Hibbitt, as his right-hand-man. Evergreen Kenny, who was also signed by Bobby during his spell at the helm of Coventry, is now Rovers' player-coach – helping guide their young squad on the field during games as well as on the training pitch.

Rovers were originally founded in 1883 as the amateur Black Arabs F.C. when they wore black shirts with a yellow sash. It was not until 1897 that they turned professional and a year later adopted their present title. They joined the Football League in 1921 on the creation of the Third Division (South) and twelve years later started to wear their distinctive blue and white quartered shirts.

During the 1950's they enjoyed an exciting series of giant-killing F.A. Cup feats and won promotion to Division Two for the first time in season 1952/53 with a record-breaking run of 27 consecutive games without defeat. And promotion to Division One was narrowly missed in 1956.

Second Division status was lost in 1962 but the 1970's witnessed a sparkling revival, with the Watney Curbeing won in 1972 and promotion back to Division Two following in season 1973/74 as another 27-game unbeaten run was put together.

Rovers' second spell in the higher sphere ended in 1981 and although they have three times gone close to winning promotion again – finishing 7th, 5th and 6th in 1983, 1984 and 1985 – they will testify for the fact it's far easier to lose Second Division status than it is to regain

Over the years the Club has unearthed a long string of players who have risen to become stars of the First Division and England - such famous names as Gary Mabbutt, Larry Lloyd, Roy Bentley, Phil Taylor, Ronnie Dix, Cliff Britton and Eddie Hapdood all began their illustrations careers with unfashionable Royers.

And eight Rovers players have earned full international honours while at the club -Neil Slatter (Wales, 1964), Wayne Jones (Wales, 1970), Joe Havery (Eure, 1965), Dai Ward (Wales, 1959), Geoff Bradford (England, 1955) Matt O'Mahoney (N. Ireland, 1939), and Jack Liewis (Wales, 1906).

The financial restraints that have been put on the Rovers with their move to Bath were seen during the summer when many of their experienced staff departed, and now the team comprises of many youngsters.

And recently former England Captain Gerry Francis and old Stalwart Harold Jarman also joined the exodus A further complication to ground sharing has also arisen last week, both Rovers and Bath have been drawn at home in the first round of the F.A. Cup.

Also 18, currently on a 3-month loan from Arsenal where he is coached by T.V. pundit Bob Wilson. Halls from Essex and has been given the opportunity of sampling League soccer when Tim Carter has been injured.

A 19-year-old Yorkshireman from Harrogate. Released by Leeds United two summers ago, he had established a regular place for himself within three months of joining Rovers.

Nick Tanner (Defender)

from school and won Welsh youth and under-21 caps. Released four summers ago, he spent two seasons at Newport County and six months at Cardiff Cith before returning at Rovers late in 1984.

Geoff Twentyman (Defender)

Son of ex-Liverpool chief scout of the same name. This 27-year-old ex-Preston North End player joined Rovers at the beginning of the season. Spotted by Preston playing in Chorley in the Northern Premier League.

Darren Carr (Defender)

Eighteen-year-old Bristolain who joined Rovers after being rejected by Watford as a schoolboy. Made his first team debut whilst still an amateur at the end of last season. Turned professional this summer.

Lee Portch (Defender)

Aged 19, another Bristolain who made his debut last season but whose progress has been hampered by serious knee injuries.

Ian Weston (Defender)

Eighteen-year-old from Bristol and product of Rovers' youth scheme, expected to push hard for first team recognition this season. Can also play in midfield.

Gary Penrice (Midfielder)

Another local lad recruited from Mangotsfield United. Aged 22, he turned professional in the autumn of 1984 and last season established himself as a regular first choice.

Kenny Hibbitt (Midfielder)

This veteran 34-year-old ex-Bradford, Wolves and Coventry City campaigner provides the experienced fulcrum around which Rovers' young side revolves. This is the third time the talented Yorkshireman has linked up with Bobby Gould - they were playing colleagues during Wolves' First Division days, and Bobby also signed whilst in charge at Coventry. One of the player/managers interviewed for the Swindon vacancy that was filled by Lou Macari in the summer of 1984.



Stan Harland

In the previous articles of this series I've concentrated on Town players of the seventies, my first choice from the sixties happens to be arguably the best Captain Swindon Town ever had – Stan Harland. Why Stan Harland? Well there are several reasons, the main one being that he was my wifes favourite player and if I didn't include him, certain things too terrible to relate may happen to me. Another reason is that he was one of the most popular players ever to wear a red shirt and my final reason is that he was one heck of a good footballer.

Stan Harland is a scouser, he was born in Liverpool in 1940 and started on his professional career in the merseyside area with New Brighton. A move to Everton was his first association with a league club, although he failed to appear in the toffeemen first team.

The next move proved to be the turning point for Stan as far as the Football League (or is it the Today League?) is concerned, transferring to Bradford City in 1961. In three years with city he notched twenty goals, quite prolific, for Stan was never noted as a top marksman operating as he did in the back four.

Following his stay in Yorkshire, he tried the distant North West for the next stage in his career, joining up with Carlisle United during the summer in 1964.

Two years later he'd moved on again, this time to Wiltshire to link up with Swindon Town and so began a wonderful era for both player and Club alike.

It was on July 29th that Stan put pen to paper at the County Ground, the fact may have been misled by the National Dail who were pre-occupied by some other football matter down at Wembley the day after.

What was it? Ah Yes.... England 4 West Germany 2. Surely that was secondary in importance to Stans signature on that Swindon Town contract.

But no Stan had to wait before the papers were full of his name, that was to come three years later - more on that in a moment.

His League career with the Town began at the Goldstone Ground in Brighton, a 2-2 draw was the result in front of just over 10,000 people. Eric Weaver and Dennis Brown were the men on target for Swindon on the faraway August day.

Stan made his County Ground debut in the League Cup. A 2-1 win over



Bournemouth was the result and somebody else who may be familiar to you, dear reader, scored one of the goals – John Trollope – Joe Butler notced the other.

Stan was an ever present that term as the Town finished eigth, a platform for the success to come.

The F.A. Cup perhaps gave us a glimpse into the future, a place in the sixth round was denied Swindon only after three tremendous struggles with Nottingham Forest, second in Division One at the time.

In 1967-68 Stan was once more an ever present, notching his first goal at Walsall in a 3-2 defeat, one of five goals he scored in the league that season. The Town again did well in the F.A. Cup, losing a close fought fourth round encounter with Sheffield Wednesday.

What happened in the next season is well Chronicled elsewhere, the sheer delight of being a Swindon Town supporter during that time in the Clubs history was quite without parallel.

Stan Harland was like a colossus that term, he was an ever present once more, scoring one league goal at Shrewsbury in a 1-1 draw.

The eight of that superb central defensive partnership of Frank Burrows and Stan Harland is a sight I'll never forget and nor will the thousands who flocked through the County Ground turnstiles during the campaign.

March 15th 1969 is a date that is etched on the memory of every Town fan and my abiding image is of Stan Harland holding aloft that glittering Football League Cup – a magical moment.

Promotion was gained at the end of the season and Swindon were back in Division Two. In their first term back they'd lost Danny Williams, architect of that success and Fred Ford took over the reigns. The Town finished fifth in the second division and reached the quarter finals of the F.A. Cup before losing to the powerful, all conquering but extremely boring Leeds United side 2-0 at the County Ground.

Success in the Anglo-Italian Cups followed for that glittering side and the future looked decidedly rosey.

However the 1970-71 season was disappointing and Swindon finished in mid-table. To pep things up the Town made a sensational close season signing – Dave Mackay and that was to signal the end of Stan Harlands career at the County Ground.

Just sixteen appearances were made in the league, all in midfield and the guts of that wonderful Swindon Town side had been torn out.

Stan left for Birmingham City in November 1971 and played in the same side as a youthful Trevor Francis, returning for an F.A. Cup tie in January 1973. City lost that 2-0 but Stan Harland was saluted by the Town fans, deservedly so for he was truly one player who earned the right to be called a Swindon Town Great.

First of all let me say I am pleased to report that TRANSPLANT have very kindly agreed to sponsor the Junior Robins football teams. The TRANSPLANT Organisation have already shown themselves to be good friends of Swindon Town by sponsoring matches at the County Ground and now they have kindly agreed to donate kit and equipment for the Junior Robins.

On the same evening that John Timms and myself spoke to the Transplant directors I also met Jason Prictor. Jason, who regularly watches matches from the Shrivenham Road Family Enclosure, has chosen to do his Social Studies Project at Dorcan School on "How to prevent Football Hooliganism". I talked to him about some of the arrangements here at the County Ground to ensure the safety of spectators. It led me to think that while we hear the views of newspaper reporters, Football League and Football Association members, politicians and directors

we seldom hear the view of the ordinary men, women, boys and girls who come to watch football matches.

A number of schemes have been tried to contain hooliganism.

I mention some of them with my thoughts, they are:

 Banning away supporters - This has been tried by Luton Town and proved very successful. However amputating a leg would cure an ingrowing toenail and it cannot be denied that this scheme deprives many innocent people of watching a football match.

Admission by membership only – The equipment needed to introduce this can be very expensive. It would be nice to think that the Government which seems keen on this sort of scheme would be willing to return some of the money football provides it with from VAT, Surtax on top players and pools money, to finance, even if only on a loan basis, the introduction of such equipment on grounds which would like to try it. After all if gates increased as a result of it the Government would gain by collecting extra revenue. Another problem of this type of scheme is that only so many passes can be issued. This is a problem we are experiencing at the County Ground. Not all 3,500 who have cards for the Family Enclosure come

every week but we cannot issue any more. This costs the Club money, but worse than this it deprives many people who would like to stand and watch a match from a clear viewing position.



3) Video Cameras – These have been a great success in identifying trouble makers and in consequence causing them to desist from their activities. Unfortunately, while these are provided free to the Liverpools and Arsenals of this World the Halifaxes and Rochdales must find the cash themselves.



Atmosphere was not the watchword at Feethams with only 1,800 or so present but nevertheless some exciting action on the pitch made up somewhat for the lack of noise off it.






