and in particular its after effects.



recent severe weather conditions. Football has been out of the question for most clubs and besides losing our fixtures, training becomes curtailed.




From a personal point of view it allows me to go on a scouting mission the previous day.

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No, it's not a misprint! The heading to this article says 'Cups' in the plural because, although it isn't widely known, there have in fact been three Challenge Cups in the history of the FA Cup competition!

THE FIRST CUP

The original Cup of 1872 was made of silver but it certainly wasn't a very impressive trophy, and although it was suitably inscribed 'The Football Challenge Cup it Association quickly gained the nickname of 'the little tin idol' because its size (it stood barely eighteen inches high) was dwarfed by much more imposing cups that were awarded for much lesser competitions. Indeed, we have seen such a trophy this season in the shape of the Littlewoods Cup. which comes from the same period, - it was formerly the Viscountess Furness Challenge Cup and stands no less then three feet tall although it was only played for by dock teams on the Furness peninsular!

In view of this it is no surprise to learn that when Blackburn Olympic won the Cup in 1883, to take it to the north of England for the first time, a broad Lancastrian voice was heard to cry as Olympic's skipper, Alf

Warburton, held it aloft, 'Is that t'coup? Why, it's like a tea kettle!' However, in fairness to those responsible for acquiring the original, modest Cup, it should be remembered that there were only 15 entries for the first FA Cup competition, so that a more substantial trophy would not have been appropriate, but anyway it was probably felt that to have anything bigger was quite unnecessary, for the FA Cup was born in the days of amateur sportsmen from the public schools for whom the game was the thing and vastly more impor-

tant that the prize.

After the greatest of the amateur sides, The Wanderers, won the Cup for the third time in succession (and for the fifth time in seven years!) in 1878, the first FA Cup was awarded to the club, but Charles Alcock their former captain and Secretary of the Football Association returned it to the FA with the proviso that no other club should ever be allowed to keep the trophy no matter how many times or how frequently they should win it - and thus when Blackburn Rovers Blackburn Olympic's triumph with another three consecutive victories of their own, they were not given the Cup but instead were presented with a most handsome shield to commemorate their trio of victories.

SENSATION!

However, sensation was to follow, for the original Cup was stolen, and it has never been recovered! Aston Villa beat West Bromwich Albion in the first final to take place at the Crystal Palace in 1895 and, in an early example of 'public relations' the Villa put the Cup on display at a local football and football-boot shop for all their fans to see and admire: but on the night of September 11th 1895 it disappeared – and was never seen again!

The Villa were fined a nominal £25 for the loss and a new Cup was purchased, identical in size and design to the original, for the ideals of the sport were not very much different in 1895 than they had been in 1872 even though the game had embraced the idea of professional players.

The second FA Cup was played for – at the Crystal Palace – until 1910, when it was decided by the Football Association to award it to Lord Kinnaird to mark his 21 years as President of the Association. The noble lord was a fitting recipient – he had played in no fewer than nine Cup Finals and won five winners' medals.

THE PRESENT TROPHY


Another reason for changing the trophy in 1910 was that the design of the existing Cup had been copied and the FA was quite unable to stop the production of hundreds of duplicates! So, a new Cup, to cost precisely fifty guineas, was chosen from the myriad of designs that were submitted. The successful commission was that of Fattorini and Sons of Bradford, and it is their handywork for which clubs large and small strive season after season to obtain. Interestingly too, the third FA Cup proved a good omen for the city

Bonus 25 — Home and Contents Insurance Hill House Hammond. Telephone which produced it, for in 1911 the first winners of it were Bradford City. and yet neither Bradford Club. before or since, has ever got past the quarter finals!

Certainly, the third and present FA Cup is vastly superior to its predecessors - its style is that of an antique votive urn, it weighs 175 ounces and stands 19 inches high even without its plinth. The flutings which decorate the body of the Cup embody grapes and vineleaves, while the lid is similarly decorated and has a knob which is virtually a modest replica of the Cup itself.

Winners' names are engraved upon the massive silver band which encircles the ebony plinth - and what wouldn't we all give to see the name of OUR club inscribed there next summer

Meeting one of the greatest club sides ever in successive F.A. Cup petitions was the fate which Swindon Town had to contend with at the start of the last decade.

Neither in Wiltshire or at Elland Road could Swindon mount a serious threat against a side managed by the predisgrace Don Revie and widely acknowledged as invincible on their day. Swindon Town's last appearance in the sixth round of this competition in February 1970 also brought the last visit of mighty Leeds to the County

A shock was mooted, but United showed their composure and class to overcome Swindon with two goals from Allan Clarke.

Arriving as League champions and eventual cup runners-up, Leeds soon took control and gained the lead in the 32nd minute as Clarke rounded Downesborough to show his class on a


muddy pitch. Mick Jones, who a year later dislo-cated his shoulder in the Final against Arsenal, surged forward minutes later and laid the ball off to Johnny Giles who found Clarke again who scored with a typical header.

Chances for the home side were rare. but Peter Noble was unlucky with a volley that went just over and Smith had two opportunities but was unable

With Billy Bremner running the midfield, Jack Charlton at the back and Clarke instrumental up front, Leeds displayed just why they were so highly rated, playing like the side of their era, indeed they were.

A year later in the Fourth Round at Elland Road Leeds were even more clinical and efficient despite the absence of Bremner and Terry Cooper. Mick Jones opened United's account after only 15 minutes to lay the foundation stone of an emphatic victory. On the half hour, Allan Clarke scored the second to effectively wrap the game up very early on for the home side. Hesitancy in the "Town" defence twenty minutes into the second half gave Jones the chance to shoot past Downsborough again. The uncompromising forward capped the victory 14 minutes from time as he finished off a header from Norman Hunter to complete his hat trick. Leeds were never in even the slightest danger in a tie which concentrated the mind on their strength as a footballing unit and Swindon's pale lack of class in comparison. The gap between the two sides is closer this time around than it has been in the past and should see a more closely fought encounter, though if Billy Bremner can control his side in the same way that he master-minded their midfield here 17 years ago, Swindon could find themselves with an uphill battle facing them.

It was during the sixties and early seventies that Leeds United were acclaimed as the finest club side in the Football League and one of the best in Europe.

Under the guidance of Don Revie, the Yorkshire Club enjoyed tremendous success and the names of such players as Jackie Charlton, Billy Bremner (now the Leeds manager), Johnny Giles, Norman Hunter, Paul Madeley, Allan Clarke and Mick Jones to name just a few were household names.

Time and time again in this period talk of the 'double' was uppermost, but a hectic league programme and too much success in Cup competitions proved to be the downfall towards the end of the season as fixtures piled up.

From 1964 to 1975 Leeds won three Football League titles - one in the Second Division and two in the First.

They finished runners-up five times in the first, reached four F.A. Cup Finals winning just one of them and took the Football League Cup in 1968 defeating Arsenal by a single goal.

In European competitions, success came twice in the Fairs Cup and three times they had to settle for second place, once in the European Cup, European Cup, Winners Cup and Fairs Cup.

Only two defeats and a then record points total of 67 gave Leeds their first ever Division 1 title in 1968/69.

And in 1973/74 when they won the title again Leeds created a Football League record for the longest run without defeat from the start of a season – 29 First Division games before losing 2-3 at Stoke Only once has the F.A. Cup been displayed in the Elland Road trophy cabinet that came in 1972 with a 1-0 Wembley victory over Arsenal.

1965 saw them lose in the final 2-1 to Liverpool after extra time and to Chelsea in 1970 at Old Trafford in a replay 2-1 after extra time.

The biggest shock though came in the 1973 final when as hot favourites they were beaten by a single goal from Sunderland's Ian Porterfield - the North Eastern side being a Second Division Club at the time.

The departure from Elland Road of Don Revie to manage England heralded the end of a memorable era.

Leeds eventually lost their First Division status in 1982 and now under Billy Bremner, appointed the boss in October 1985, they are hoping to regain a place in the top flight.

Ian Baird (forward)

United top scorer last season with 12 goals. He was signed from Southampton in March 1985 and immediately established himself as a first team regular. First appeared in the Football League for Southampton in 1982/83 and before joining Leeds, spent loan spells with Cardiff and Newcastle.

Russell Doig (forward)

Following impressive displays on loan in United's Reserve team at the end of last season, he was signed in this summer from East Stirling where he played part-time football. A lively character on and off the field.

Keith Edwards (forward)

Probably the Manager's biggest signing so far. This prolific goalscorer signed for Leeds in August 1986, having consistently scored goals for his previous clubs, Sheffield United and Hull City.

Brendan Ormsby (defender)

Captained the England Youth team during his early days with Aston Villa. He made his League debut against Derby in 1979 and made well over 100 League appearances for Villa before joining United at the end of February 1986. He scored Leeds opening goal on his debut against Huddersfield at Elland Road.

David Rennie (defender)

Joined United in January 1986 from Leicester City, the club where he served his apprenticeship. A former Scotland Youth International he made his League debut during 1983/84 season, and following his move from Leicester formed a formidable partnership in the Centre of defence with Brendan Ormsby.

Andy Ritchie (forward)

He started his League career with Manchester United, making some 80 appearances in their first Division side. Brighton signed him in 1980 and he went on to be their top scorer in 1981/82 but moved on to Leeds in an exchange deal, the following season. Finished last season in style, scoring 8 goals in the last 9 games.

John Sheridan (midfield)

He is a former Republic of Ireland Youth International who developed in the Junior teams at Eliand Road. He got his chance in League soccer during 1982/83 and was an ever present during 1984/85. A fine midfield prospect whose appearances were restricted last year due to injury.

John Stiles (midfield)

Known to his team mates as 'Nobby' for obvious reasons, as he is the son of the famous Manchester and England. Like his father he also plays in Midfield, and since joining Leeds in April 1984, has settled in well as an established member of the first team squad. He also had spells with Shamrock Rovers and Vancouver Whitecaps.

John Pearson (forward)

He signed for United in January 1987 from Charlton Athletic. Was Charlton's top scorer with 14 goals in their promotion winning side, having joined them from his home club Sheffield Wednesday in the summer of 1985.


Micky Adams (utility)

25 year-old utility player signed from Coventry City for a fee of £110,000 in late January 1987. Up to beginning of this season had made 79 league appearances for the Sky Blues. Previously with Gillingham.

This is the day that we have all been looking forward to for several weeks! Leeds United, at home in the F.A. Cup, despite the fact that they are now a Second Division club, the name has been enough to attract a capacity crowd to the County Ground this afternoon.

I must admit that I hardly know any of the Leeds United team playing today. What I do know is that they like to play good football. The recent transfer of Ian Snodin to Everton has given their manager Billy Bremner the scope to buy John Pearson and Micky Adams recently. John Sheriden their midfield player is apparently quite an influential player for them and I can recall Russell Doig being involved in Scottish schoolboy football although he was a year older then me.

One thing we can all be sure of today is that Leeds United will work hard, any match with Doncaster Rovers was always a most competitive affair when Billy Bremner was the manager and there is no reason to assume that Leeds United will be any different. You probably wonder if the players attitude is any different for a Cup tie, really it is no different except you feel more keyed up inside, we all know that this is a big game for the Club and also for us as a team. The fact that there will be a bigger crowd creates tension and atmosphere. So the lads will be geed up and there will be no lack of effort trying to reach the

Fifth round. This is the furthest that I personally have been in the F.A. Cup and I should like to go further. The players at the County Ground were all pleased when they heard we were to meet Leeds United at home, a match here at the County Ground, gives us a chance and it is not as though we were meeting Liverpool or Everton.

What I must emphasise to you all. is that we would prefer to be meeting Leeds United in a league match. That is what we are striving to achieve this season by gaining promotion.

My first recollection of Leeds United is their F.A. Cup epic with Arsenal when I think Mick Iones scored for United. I was a wee bonny lad then.

The weather has been a problem in recent weeks, not only as far as matches being postponed but also for training. Funny really, but we had two full practice matches on the County Ground, despite the fact that one corner was six inches deep in snow!

We had a couple of days off during the bad spell and we have also played Queens Park Rangers on their artificial surface losing 2-1.

You have to admit that during the bad weather these artificial surfaces come into their own. Mind, I would not like to have to play on them every week, they are good for training and there is a good run of the ball. Personally, I do not think that they are good for the game overall. The surface is skiddy and there is no real control over the bounce, the ball tends to spin back on you.

A night of humiliation proved to be a one-off thankfully. We recovered sufficiently to take our place among the promotion hopefuls which include Blackpool.



Bryan Wade has been missing from the Town line-up in recent matches, while Chris Ramsey, Colin Calderwood, Chris Kamara, Mark Jones, Steve White and Leigh Barnard, will be intent on putting the record straight on their visit to Bloomfield Road. A crowd of 6,622 watched that defeat, it will be interesting to see if as many watch the return fixture

Blackpool have lost only one league match at Bloomfield Road, but have drawn four of their twelve matches. They have one of the tightest defences in home matches, conceding only eight goals at Bloomfield Road. This will be another vital top of the table encounter for the Town as we have played two more matches than Blackpool.

We are back at the County Ground the following Saturday, February 14th, when we entertain the Divisions big spenders, Walsall, The West Midland club have spent an amazing amount on transfers this season, since their millionaire chairman Terry Ramsden took over the club during last summer. Although there were a lack of goal scoring chances in a mainly midfield tussle at Fellows Park in our single goal defeat, the County Ground match, is expected to be a much more open affair.

It would be fair comment to say that Walsall defender Kenny Mower's first minute tackle on Peter Coyne restricted our attacking fluency on the night. We were denied a blatant penalty in the dying minutes of the

match when a Walsall defender handled in the penalty area! Matches are won and lost on such events.

The visit of Walsall could be one of the most attractive matches of the season at the County Ground and following their big money signings they do attract a substantial following and they will probably bring quite a large gathering of support with them.



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
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






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INTERVIEW



The visit of Leeds United to the County Ground for todays F.A. Cup tie evokes memories for Town Assistant Manager, John Trollope. For John was a member of the Town team that played against the Northern Club when they were managed by Don Revie in the late 60's and early 70's.

Todays match brought the memories flooding back for John, 'Leeds had a fantastic side in those days, just think of the names, Paul Reaney, Billy Bremner, Paul Madeley, Jack Charlton, Peter Lorimer, Johnny Giles, Gary Sprake, Allan Clarke, Eddie Gray, and of course the present Bristol City manager Terry Cooper'.

John paused, before continuing, 'They were a big name in those days, we were then a Second Division team, a good side but they had the experience, were better organised and on the crest of a wave.'

Town fans can probably recall those halcyon days as John readily did, 'We played them in successive seasons losing 2-0 here at the County Ground and 4-0 at Elland Road. They were more or less the same team two years running and they gave nothing away. One thing always stuck in my mind about the match at Elland Road. We simply could not get the ball, they kept retention and it was almost impossible to get in the game.'

John reflected, 'They were World class players, they were hard to play against

and they proved to us how difficult it was to play at that level and in my opinion players in the 60's and 70's were of a better quality. I believe that our team at that time were good enough to play in todays First Division. Playing staffs in those days were larger. Liverpool and Manchester United had some really good players in those days, Tommy Smith, Chris Lawler, Ian St John etc. Manchester United had George Best, Denis Law and Bobby Charlton, there are no players of that quality today'.

John had some thoughts on the Don Revie managerial success, 'He made them a ruthless and professional outfit and he knew how to deal with the players he had with him at that time. He was probably too faithful to them and kept them together for too long. Liverpool for instance would wheel and deal a year or so before players were over the top.


It is probably true that some of his players were going downhill and he kept them playing too long'.




Dave Bamber (left) sets up Swindon's second goal as he heads goalwards for Tim Parkin to head home against Newport.



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
