

BUMPER GATE FOR WALSALL DERBY

Supporters are advised to 'come early' for the next Barclays League match at The Hawthorns — the eagerly-awaited local 'derby' against newly-promoted Walsall, back in the Second Division after 25 years in the lower divisions of the League, which takes place in two weeks time, Saturday 17th September, kick-off 3pm.

With the interest arising from the Saddlers' elevation and the extra local rivalry therefore now existing, it is confidently predicted the attendance will easily exceed the 9,605 crowd at last year's Littlewoods Cup-tie here.

Stand tickets are on sale in advance from the Ticket Office in Halfords Lane. Prices: Halfords Lane and Rainbow £6; Family Section (G-Block) £5 adults, £2.50 juniors/senior citizens.

Spectators using the Rainbow Stand are advised Q and R Blocks will be reserved for Walsall supporters and, as X-Block is restricted to members only and their guests, non-members wishing to watch from the Stands must go to either F or K-Block turnstiles in the Halfords Lane Stand.

Terrace spectators using the Smethwick End are advised that P-Block will be allocated to Walsall followers and Albion fans should use L-Block. This will be the standard division of home and away supporters on that terrace throughout the season.

Julian Worrall, our new Club Shop manager, reports business is booming this season with the many new lines proving very popular with supporters.







NOT THE TIME FOR DESPONDENCY


Our return to League duty this afternoon, following Wednesday night's Littlewoods Cup tie against Peterborough, completes a tough first week of the season for us.





"Glenn has more skill and ability in his little toe than most footballers have in their entire body. He is a real superstar," added Don.





Fraser was playing in the youth team when I was a first-teamer at United so I did not see a great deal of him.


But he certainly seems to have come on in leaps and bounds under Lou at the County Ground and has broken onto the England scene recently.



CANNY LOU ADOPTS CAUTIONS APPROACH .

One man who is hoping Swindon will not be promoted to the First Division this season, remarkably enough, is their manager Lou Macari. After leading the Wiltshire club from the Fourth to Second Divisions in successive seasons Swindon found last season more of a struggle as they were forced to settle for a mid-table position.

But Marcari was far from unhappy: "Personally I was delighted we stayed up," say Macari, "although we did find the going a little bit tough. "I'm aware of our weaknesses and we are definitely not in the First Division bracket. There would be no point at the moment of us getting there and finding that we don't have the resources to get by," says the former Manchester United star who takes us through his squad . . .

Fraser Digby. Goalkeeper. I got him from Manchester United for £32,000 and since he's been here he's become an England Under-21 'keeper. A bright future ahead of him.

Dave Hockaday. Right back. Has had six or seven seasons with us and has proved a very reliable full back.

Phil King. Left Back. Signed for £15,000 from Torquay two years ago and was an ever-present last year. Improves year by year.

Tim Parkin, Central Defender. Signed from Bristol Rovers and was our Supporters Club Player of the Year last season. Now in the twilight of his career but should give us a few more years service. Colin Calderwood. Central Defender. Came to us

Colin Calderwood. Central Defender. Came to us from Mansfield and is now our club captain. A scot with a bright future.

Ross McClaren. One of my two summer signings £150,000 from Derby. A lot of experience and I'm hoping he will add some solidity to our defence.

John Gittens. Central Defended Has developed into an outstanding utility player since signing from Southampton two years ago. Has a vicious shot with either foot.

Bobby Barnes. Winger. A tricky player who has scored his fair share of goals since moving from Aldershot.

Steve Foley. Midfielder. Signed from Sheffield United but has a lot of experience with Liverpool, Fulham and Grimsby. Another ever-present last season.

Paul Boding. Midfield. Signed from Newport last year. A left-sided player with an eye for a goal who has slotted in well here.

Peter Coyne. Striker. I signed him from Non-League

Peter Coyne. Striker. I signed him from Non-League Hyde United and he's scored a lot of important goals for us in his three seasons here.

Leigh Barnard. Striker. In his sixth season here and a reliable club man who has given good service.

TOWN DIGEST

- * It's one of Lou Macari's ambitions to eventually lead unfashionable Swindon Town to the First Division for the first time in their 107-year history.
- * If he succeeds, it will complete a remarkable transformation for when Lou was appointed in the summer of 1984 Town were really struggling in the basement of the Fourth Division.
- * Indeed, two years earlier, such were their financial straits, but for the six-figure sale of Paul Rideout to Aston Villa, there probably would not be a Swindon Town in existence today.
- * Lou's own arrival at the County Ground was due entirely to a generous £200,000 sponsorship for local insurance company Lowndes Lambert, who stipulated the windfall should be used by the then impoverished Wiltshire club to attract a 'star' name.
- * Still then an active player, the former Celtic, Manchester United and Scotland goal ace fitted the bill perfectly – and Town's achievements under his guidance has brought rich dividends on that original investment.
- * In his second season Town stormed to the Fourth Division title with a record 102 points, the following campaign they qualified for the Third Division play-offs and eventually won a deserved place in Division Two, and last season they more than established themselves as a force to be reckoned with in the League as well as producing a series of shock wins in all three Cup competitions.
- * The other halcyon period for Town came in the Sixties and early Seventies when they had two spells in the Second Division (1963-65 and 1960-74), won the League Cup in 1969 and the Anglo-Italian Cup in 1970.
- Previously they had led a relatively quiet existence as first prominent members of the Southern League and then from 1920 onwards in the Third Division (South).



LAST TIME WE MET

John Kelly (42 mins) gave Swindon the lead, Martyn Bennett equalised 50 seconds later but Mick Duinn popped up in the second-half to give Swindon all three points.

JEFF ASTLE'S FIRST HAT-TRICK

IN SEPTEMBER 1965, in the space of six days, Albion ran up three successive wins, scored a total of eleven goals and went to the top of the First Division.

Of their opening four games of that 1965/6 season — the first campaign when substitutes were allowed for League matches — Albion won two and lost two. But then they began to get their rhythm and style, and all of a sudden went to town, beating Sheffield Wednesday 4-2 at home, Everton 3-2 at Goodison Park and newly-promoted Northampton Town at the County Ground 4-3, and it was after this victory over the Cobblers than the Baggies leapt to the head of the League table.

Jeff Astle scored seven of those 11 goals, including hat-tricks against the Owls and Northampton.

Just over 15,200 saw that six-goal encounter against Wednesday; there were 43,468 at Everton and 18,528 at Northampton, and in the latter game Albion used their first-ever 'sub' when Graham Lovett replaced the injured Kenny Foggo.

JEFF ASTLE heading Albion's first goal against Sheffield Wednesday on the way to the first hat-trick of his illustrious Albion career.

CHAMPS WHIPPED

IN SEPTEMBER 1950, the reigning League champions, Portsmouth came to The Hawthorns to take on Albion. Some 34,460 fans came along too, and it was all worthwhile, especially for the home supporters as Albion whipped Pompey 5-0.

Albion were in terrific form and made the champions look second-rate. Arthur Smith was outstanding, leading Jimmy Dickinson a merry dance all afternoon.

It took the Baggies 42 minutes to break the deadlock, Dave Walsh scoring with an overhead flick from Billy Elliott's centre. Then 45 seconds later Cyril Williams cleverly set up Elliott for number 2.

Three minutes after the interval a perfect cross from Ronnie Allen was headed home by Williams and then Smith weighed in with two beauties in the 61st and 87th minutes to round off a splendid performance.

Portsmouth incidently were going for a hat-trick of League championships, having lifted the trophy in successive seasons of 1948-9 (when Albion won promotion from Division 2) and in 1949-50.

Played for Both Clubs

PETER EASTOE'S COLOURFUL CAREER

PETER EASTOE, who has spent the last three seasons in Portugal with FC Farense, enjoyed a varied and colourful career in English League Football, serving no fewer than eight different clubs over a period of fifteen seasons.

Born at Dorden, near Tamworth, Staffs, on 2 August 1953, Eastoe was educated at Polesworth High school and played junior football for Glascote Highfield and Warton Hatters.

In 1970 he was taken on by Wolves as an apprentice, signing professional forms in June 1971, playing initially as an out-and-out centre-forward. In 1971 and 1972 he won eight England Youth caps and broke into Wolves' League side in January 1972 against Manchester United at Old Trafford, as sub for Derek Dougan.

Having had six League outings for Wolves he was transferred to Swindon Town for a fee of £88,000 in March 1974 after a brief loan spell at The County ground which began in November 1973.

Peter did will at Swindon, although the club suffered relegation at the end of that 1973-4 campaign. He made 106 first-team appearances and scored 50 goals before moving to O.P.R. for £80,000 in March 1976.

SEMI-FINALS

At Loftus Road he continued to be an asset, scoring frequently, and when he left Rangers, for Everton in March 1979, he had amassed a total of 83 senior outings and had netted a further 20 goals — and he had played in all three League Cup semi-finals against Aston Villa in 1977.

Peter made his debut for Everton, as sub, against Albion, later playing for the Toffees against West Ham in the 1980 FA Cup semi-final.

His stay on Merseyside ended in July 1982 when he joined Albion in a player/exchange deal involving Andy King, who thus returned to Everton.

As a Baggie Eastoe did not reach the heights he had done with his previous clubs and hit just nine goals in 34 outings before being on loan to Leicester City (twice), Huddersfield Town, Walsall and Wolves, his former club.

At the end of his 'English' career, Eastoe departed with a fine record in his bag: 381 senior appearances and 114 goals, 95 in the League.

'TEMP' DAVID STILL GOING STRONG AFTER 27 YEARS

Albion kit man David Matthews could be a candidate for inclusion in the Guinness Book of Records, under the heading 'Longest ever temporary job'.

He joined the Albion straight from school in 1961 and hoped to be an apprentice groundsman. Unfortunately there was no opening on the ground staff, but David was made one of the club's three kit personnel.

He was told the job would be temporary, until a vacancy occurred on the ground staff. 27 years later David is still a kit man—though he is no longer waiting for that groundsman's apprenticeship to come up!

These days he is solely in charge of Albion's kit, covering the first, Reserve and Youth teams and also taking responsibility for all of the players' training gear.

APPRENTICES

He also oversees several of the duties undertaken by apprentices — boot cleaning and dressing room tidying, for example.

David's job entails long hours, and quite often he works seven days a week. Last Sunday, for example, he was busy preparing gear for Monday's home match against Watford.

"When we have a Monday match", David says, "Sunday becomes like a Friday before a normal Saturday game".

His unsociable hours bring him some 'stick' (affectionate, of course) from his family, with



daughters Alison and Claire sometimes calling him 'Uncle' and wife Carol also joking about the stranger who occasionally appears in the family home at Halesowen.

"Actually my wife and daughters are very patient and understanding about the long hours I sometimes have to work", says David. "Unfortunately I don't get to see as much of them as I would like, but that's about the only drawback of my job".

One aspect of his work which takes David well away from home is travelling to away matches with the first team.

Having the kit man along on away trips was introduced to Albion by Don Howe, who had found it a beneficial exercise at Arsenal. David usually breaks away from the main party on away days and gets to the opponents ground ahead of everyone else.

He says, "I get to the ground as early as possible, to lay out all the kit in readiness for the players and also to walk out on the pitch to get a feel of just how hard or soft the playing surface will be.

"I can then advise our players on what studs to wear, though the final decision on that is always taken by each individual player".

11 MANAGERS

In his 27 years at the Hawthorns David has kitted out hundreds of players and served under 11 managers, starting with Gordon Clarke and including both stints which Ron Atkinson has had at the club.

Though, diplomatically perhaps, he will not commit himself to naming a favourite player or manager during those 27 years, David reckons that "If you took the best points of each manager and put them all into one individual, you'd have one helluva boss!"

David is far more definite about his greatest memory at the club — and it's not the 1968 FA Cup final victory.

He says, "The match at Oldham when we won promotion under Johnny Giles was my greatest thrill. We had to win the game, and the support we got was fantastic. The motorway was just chocabloc with Albion fans wearing their colours, and the journey alone was a great memory in itself".

FAR FROM DISGRACED

Defeated but far from disgraced — that has to be the verdict on the Reserves' 2-0 home reverse in their first game back in the Central League's First Division against mighty Liverpool on Thursday evening.

The game attracted a crowd of 1,252, the best gate for a Reserve game at The Hawthorns for several years — and our lads impressed the crowd with their spirited and, at times, skilful display.

It is important that we do not expect too much from Albion's young side this season — there's a massive difference between the Y.T.S. — dominated Second Division and the First Division of experienced squad members from some of the country's most powerful clubs. That could not be better illustrated by the fact that last season three of the four promoted clubs were immediately relegated and the other only escaped by the margin of a solitary win.

The prime object at Reserve level this season is to allow out promising youngsters to gain invaluable experience which can only come by playing against the best possible opposition. At the same time it is important for the team to retain its newly-acquired status in order to provide a good platform for the general strengthening of the club at all levels.

It will be possible to have a slightly better idea of how Albion's youngsters will cope after their next two Central League games — at Coventry on Tuesday and at home to Sheffield United on Wednesday week, kick-off 7pm.

Last week at a Press Conference they launched a scheme called "Football Watch" — and they are appealing to YOU, the decent-minded soccer fans, to help them root out this cancer from our great national game.

The Police, quite rightly, think there has been a lot of talking about this problem, but not enough action. Action is needed — Now!

Most especially, the Police want to stamp out: obscene chanting, obscene gestures, racist remarks, racist chants, throwing missiles, and threatening or violent behaviour at matches.

In this they seek the active support of the public, especially genuine football followers like YOU. They will rely heavily on the information YOU may be able to provide.

Well it will certainly be there one way or another at The Beeches where the winners have the reward of any away tie in the next round . . . At either Brackley Town or Spalding United.

And when they make the draw for the first round proper on November 19, you never know who might appear.

Corinthian Casuals could be there if they get over their first hurdle today at home to Hanwell Town.

Peacehaven and Telscombe, Irthlingborough Diamonds, Norton and Stockton Ancients and the Bedlington Terriers are also on the FA Cup trial this afternoon. Not to mention the more likely names of Workington, Leatherhead and Dudley Town.


So to all 240 of them, here's to the twin towers in May . . Or at least the first qualifying round in a fortnight's time.

WELCOME REVIVAL

THE stock tools of the trade for West Midlands soccer fans in recent years have been a season ticket, programme — and jar of anti-depressant tablets.

Even accounting for the Merseyside monopoly, few other footballorientated regions have experienced such a steep decline.

But as a new season dawns it is clear that the long-overdue revival is beginning to gather momentum. Though it is far from comparable to the West Midlands' halcyon days, the overall standard of soccer in the region is rising.

Last season Birmingham and the Black Country could not muster a First Division club. There were three in the Second Division and one apiece in Divisions Three and Four.

Now Aston Villa fly the flag in the top flight, Walsall have joined Birmingham City and Albion in Division Two and Wolves have moved up to Division Three.

COMBINED SUCCESSES

Last season's combined successes comprised the Second Division runners up spot, the Third Division promotion play-off winners, the Fourth Division championship and the Frieght Rover Trophy.

None in themselves are earth-shattering milestones. But one of the hardest jobs in football is to halt a slide. And the West Midlands managers appear to have won that vital first battle.

Graham Taylor's ability to steer Villa back into the first division has been backed up by a million pound summer spending spree. Should that not be sufficient, it is clear another sizeable injection is available to re-establish Villa among the elite.

"The bookies make us 66-1 to win the championship. I envisage a position where we are never more than 12-1," is how Mr Taylor sums up his objective.

Competition, it is said, can be nothing but healthy and that adage bodes well for our three local clubs in Division Two.

None of the trio are expected to pull up any trees by those bookies. But as Walsall boss Tommy Coakley pointed out after the Littlewoods Cup clash with Shrewsbury: "If Walsall and Shrewsbury are relegating favourites it's going to be one hell of a division."

By winning promotion through the back door last season, Walsall have shown the importance of getting the playing side right first and then worrying about facilities.

A new multi-million pound ground move has been approved and with money in the bank from the £600,000 sale of David Kelly it has seldom looked so good at Fellows Park.

Blues and Albion have, by contrast, had the lowest of low-key close season. Transfer activity has been kept to a minimum which may have frustrated fans after last season's struggles.

But column inches in newspapers are not the basis for judging success.

Birmingham, with the sale of their Elmdon training ground, stand to make a £3m killing. And at a time when the purse-strings are threatening to form a noose around the heads of many League clubs that has to be reassuring news.

TIDE WILL TURN

Albion have displayed some impressive football skills in their opening two games without reaping the rewards in points. But if Ron Atkinson can ally the team spirit and application shown at the end of last season with a little more luck then the tide will turn.

Wolves, who sank the lowest of the five clubs, now appear to be hitting the comeback trail the hardest. As they showed at Wembley last season the fanatical support for football in the region is still there.

Just look at the 11,007 at Molineux is midweek who were thrilled by Wolves and Blues in the Littlewoods Cup.



Albion fans will have the chance to assess new Walsall star Alex Taylor for themselves when the Saddlers visit The Hawthorns in two weeks time.

The £90,000 bargain buy from Hamilton Accademicals has impressed with his creative midfield play — and manager Tommy Coakley has had an unexpected bonus in the form of a two-goal blast against Plymouth Argyle last Saturday.

For the gifted 26-year-old was notoriously shot-shy in Scotland, managing just four geals for the Accies during the whole of last season.

"It's been a weakness in my game for a long time," admits Alex, "But I keep telling myself to get into the penalty area and have a go.

"At Hamilton I played on the right side of midfield but there was always a player outside me on the wing. Here at Walsall, I have a bit more room and that encourages me to get forward more," he explains.

Saddler's new star is enjoying life at Fellows Park: "Walsall is a very friendly club. I've been made to feel really welcome. Teams in England are much more organised and the play is very fast," he adds.

lan McNeill, manager of budget-conscious Shrewsbury Town — who Albion visit next Saturday — is aiming to eliminate his club's annual end-of-season relegation worries and to do it in attacking style.



The shrewd Scot, commencing his first full season in charge at Gay Meadow, recalls:

"We had 2,500 for my first home game just before Christmas, but when we played Bournemouth towards the end of the season, 7,000 turned out on a foul night — it shows that the crowds can be won back if you are prepared to attack and entertain."

One of the key figures in the Shrewsbury manager's plans is Bernard McNally (left), the 25-year-old Northern Ireland international midfielder, who just after Mr. McNeill's appointment was set to join Albion in a freedom-of-contract move.

Shrews' new boss pulled off a masterstroke when he persuaded the skillful local-born lad to stay at Gay Meadow and sign a new contract.

Another prominent player is ex-Albion winger Micky Thomas, one of professional soccer's inveterate travellers, who invariably endears himself to the fans because of his unpredictable flashes of brilliance.

In each of their nine previous seasons in the Second Division Shrewsbury have struggled to retain their status — now Mr McNeill aims to have the Gay Meadow faithful showing a keener interest in future in the top half of the table.






