The new season is now with us again. Although with the European Championships and the summer transfer activity still fresh in our minds, it seems as though it was only yesterday we finished last season.

MY POSITION!

There is little I can say about the summer conjecture with regard to my personal position. I am still manager of Swindon Town, so virtually little took place. Chelsea approached me about a move to Stamford Bridge but I had never made my mind up to leave the County Ground.

THOSE FEES AND AGES!

There have been playing departures from the County Ground in the close season and in my opinion the fees we have obtained for Dave Bamber, Timmy Quinn and Chris Kamara could not have been obtained in twelve months

Swindon Town obtained £342,500 for three players in the late stages of their playing career. I can assure you that we would not have been able to secure that sum next summer! Although the fee for Bryan Wade and the anticipated sum for Kieran O'Regan pale in comparison. The total sum we collected for all five players enabled me to secure the summer signings of Duncan Shearer from Huddersfield Town and Ross Maclaren from Derby County.

PREVIOUS FEES ARE INCOMPARABLE!

Many of you will have noticed that the transfer fees we have to pay for players of proven Second Division

calibre are considerable compared to what this Club has paid previously.

The days of the £10,000 to £20,000 transfers proving good enough for Swindon Town have almost disappeared At least if this Club wishes to retain Second Division status and look toward First Division soccer. Admittedly we have to look for bargains but fees are exhorbitant. Some First Division Clubs ask £300,000 for Reserve team players!

A TOUGH TIME AHEAD This season will be a tough time. Swindon Town are no longer new-

comers to the Second Division and other Clubs are aware of our strengths and weaknesses.

The coming nine months will be a test of both these characteristics. Our opening two matches have proved this fact. Last season we collected six points from our visits to Barnsley and West Bromwich Albion. This season we collected one solitary point.

PLAYING AWAY AN ADVANTAGE!

With our first match at the County Ground having been postponed I can understand your immediate disappointment.

Personally I always prefer to start with an away match for there is no greater disappointment than to begin with a home defeat and face two away trips. If you win its fine but the first few matches are a lottery.

Enjoy the season and please give the players your maximum support. I am sure the new players will welcome your backing.







'POMPEY' AND 'HORNETS' SET THE EARLY PACE

Town fans have the oportunity of seeing one of the Divisions early pace setters this afternoon with the arrival of Portsmouth.

The Fratton Park Club have already collected maximum points from a 2-1 win at Shrewsbury on the opening day of the season and have since trounced two of the more fancied teams in the Division! Leicester City (3-0) and last week Leeds United (4-0). Both matches being played at Fratton Park. A crowd of 15,263 must have been a pleasing attendance to new chairman Jim Gregory for the visit of Leeds United.

Portsmouth are accompanied in their good start to the season by last seasons fellow relegation neighbour - Watford.

Take the case of Northern Ireland International Jimmy Quinn. Leicester City manager David Pleat left Jim out of his starting line-up for the Filbert Street Club's opening two matches of the season as City drew at home to West Bromwich Albion (1-1) and suffered a 3-0 humiliation at Portsmouth Absence will not increase Jim's chances of increasing his International total of Capped appearances.

In the Bank Holiday fixture at Bradford City he was taken from the field with a severe facial injury which blighted his start to the new season.

COLIN'S FIRST A REAL WINNER! Oxford United's captain Colin Greenall who is former Town player, Dave Bamber's brother-in-law, ruined a good recovery by newcomers Brighton with his first goal for the Club minutes from the end at the Manor last weekend.

It left Brighton without a point and United Manager Mark Lawrenson conceded later:

"We played well in the first half but at the end I thought Brighton were going to win.

"We were frightened to death at half-time to be leading by two goals and that was the way we played in the second half."








TAKING THE OPPOSITE OPPOSITE

PORTSMOUTH

Todays visitors, Portsmouth, have certainly experienced the joys and despairs of football over the past 16 months.

In early May 1987 the famous Pompey chimes rang out over Fratton Park to herald the Club's return to the First Division after a break of 28 years.

Following their relagation from the top section in 1959, Pompey plummeted all the way down into Division Four and are, in fact, the only side who have lifted the First Division Championship ever to plummet into the bottom division and then regain their place back in the top flight.

A year later though, in May of this year the chimes had turned to a toll as Pompey lost their top flight status again. Finishing in 19th place they were relegated to the Second Division, alongside Watford, Oxford and Chelsea. The latter after the controversial play-offs.

So ended a traumatic four years for the partnership of manager Alan Ball and chairman John Deacon.

It seasons 1984/85 and 85/86 Pompey finished fourth in Division 2, but then in 86/87 it all came right clinching the runners-up spot and promotion. But then a year later joy was replaced by sadness.

During the summer Mr Deacon, who had been associated with Portsmouth for many years decided to call it a day through ill health. He stepped down from the chair and sold his major share in the Club to millionaire Jim Gregory, a man who had previously been chairman at Queen's Park Rangers. Gregory changed Ball's title from manager to chief coach, but that has made little difference to the former England players role. The new partnership seems to be working well and it could not have asked for a better start.

Portsmouth have won their opening three games in the Second Division and before yesterday's matches (Saturday), they sat proudly at the top of the table. Their best result to date being the 4-0 home win over Leeds United last weekend.

Original members of the old Division Three South, Pompey reached Division One in 1927 – a place they were to retain for 32 years.

This period was the golden era in the south coast Club's history – two First Divison Championships in seasons 1948/49 and 1949/50 and three FA Cup final appearances. Unfortunately they only lifted the Cup once by defeating Wolves 4-1 in 1939. They were beaten finalists in 1929 and 1934.

One player in particular stands out in Portsmouth's history since the end of the Second World War - Jimmy Dickinson.

The brilliant wing-half made 764 League appearances for the Club between 1946 and 1965 – a once Club record until surpassed by Swindon's John Trollope with 770 – and was capped by England 48 times.

Meet the Players and Manager

Alan Ball (Chief Coach). A member of England's triumphant 1966 World Cup team. He was capped in total 72 times at full international level, six of them as captain, and eight times for the the Under-23's. The all-action midfielder began his playing career at Blackpool before moving to Everton in August 1966 for a British transfer record fee of £110,000. He also appeared in the colours of Arsenal, Southampton (twice) and Bristol Rovers. Had a short successful time as player-manager at Blackpool in between his two spells at Southampton. Joined Pompey as youth team coach in 83 and a year later became manager of the first team. Received a title change during the summer of 1988 from manager to chief coach.

Alan Knight (Goalkeeper). Served his apprenticeship at Fratton Park making his League debut away at Rotherham on April 29th 1978. He established himself in 1982/83 and has since played in each Division of the Football League, missing just five League games between 1982 and 1986, and celebrated his testimonial last year. Was forced to miss the last four games of last season following horrific facial injuries suffered in a collision with Wimbledon's Eric Young. A former England Youth International, and capped twice at Under-21 level he has made over 300 League appearances.

Warren Neill (Defender). Served his apprenticeship with QPR, making his League debut for Rangers on August 30th 1980 in a 1-1 draw at Stamford Bridge. He played a major role in helping QPR gain promotion from Division Two in 1982/83, before helping them to become established in Division One during 1983/84. Joined Pompey in July 1988 for £110,000. Made 181 League appearances for OPR.

Paul Hardyman (Defender). Now 24 years old, he joined Pompey from Southern League Warterlooville in 1983, making his League debut as a substitute for Steve Aizlewood in a 0-1 home defeat by Crystal Palace on March 24th 1984. His progress since although has been hindered by a series of injuries. However, he won an England Under-21 cap versus Eire in march 1985, and played 33 League games when Pompey were promoted from Division Two in 1986/87, and in total has made 92 League appearances.

Billy Gilbert (Defender). A member of Terry Venables' Crystal Palace team of the eighties. Lewisham born, he is the holder of 11 U-21 caps, and made 237 League appearances for Palace before joining Pempey for £100,000 in 1984. Forming an impressive partnership with Noel Blake in the centre of the Pempey defence, Billy was a member of the Pempey team that conceded the fewest goals (just 28) in the entire Football League during 1986/87.

Graeme Hogg (Defender). The 24 year old defender began as an apprentice with Manchester United making his League debut for the Red Devils in January 1984 in a 1-1 draw at Loftus Road. He played in 83 League games before spending a short spell on loan with WBA during the close season signing when he joined Pompey for £150,000 in August.

Kevin Ball (Defender). Although born in Hastings he served his apprenticeship with Coventry, but soon moved onto Pompey. Made his League debut on January 2nd 1984 when Pompey lost 0-2 at Shrewsbury. He found it difficult at first to break into the League side, but last season he made the number six shirt his own with a string of outstanding First Division performances. Has made 55 League appearances and scored one goal – against Oxford in January of this year.

Clive Whitehead (Midfield). Began with Northfield Juniors before signing for Bristol City as a winger in 1973. Made a scoring League debut for City on October 13th 1973 in a 2-0 win at Millwall. He spent eight seasons with City before joining West Bromwich Albion in November 1981 for £100,000. In the summer of 1987 he signed for Pompey on a free and played in 33 First Division games last season. Has made in total 432 League appearances and scored 18 goals.

Mick Fillery (Midfield); A schoolboy international before joining Chelsea as an apprentice in August 1978. Made his League debut for Chelsea as a substitute in April 1979, and in the following season made 41 appearances scoring eleven goals. In August 1983 he joined QPR for £200,000, but after his contract expired in the summer of 1987, he joined Pompey on a free transfer. Made 18 First Division appearances last season.

Barry Horne (Midfield). After gaining a chemistry degree at Liverpool University, he was playing part time for Rhyl when he was signed by Wrexham. Made his League debut on August 15th 1984 at Swindon, and immediately became established in the side. Scored the last minute goal which knocked FC Porto out of the first round of the European Cup Winners Cup in October of the same year. In the summer of 1987 he joined Pompey for £60,000 and made an impressive step up from the fourth to the first division. Played 39 games last season and was capped by Wales for the first time against Denmark. Now the holder of five caps, he was voted the Pompey Player of the Season for 1987–88.



• Kevin Dillon

Kevin Dillon (Midfield). Sunderland born, he joined Birmingham from school and made his League debut when just 17 years old on September 10th 1977 away at Middlesbrough. After gaining England Youth and U-21 honours, he remained at Saint Andres until March 1983, when he joined Pompey for £200,000. Scoring five goals in eleven games, he helped Pompey claim the 1982–83 Third Division Championship. In 1986–87, 28 year old Kevin scored a hat-trick of penalties in 3-2 Full Members Cup victory over Millwall. Last season he made 32 First Division appearances.

Lee Sandford (Midfield). The 20 years old was born in Basingstoke and served his apprenticeship at Pompey. Made his League debut on October 26th 1985 in a 4-0 win at Millwall, but his breakthrough only came last season. Forced out of the team for five months with a spinal injury, he returned to the team in February 1988 and found himself as goalie in April when he had to deputise for Alan Knight, after only two minutes, against Wimbledon.

Mick Quinn (Forward). Born in Liverpool, he started as an apprentice at Derby. However, he soon moved to Wigan and made a scoring League debut in April 1980. Two years later he joined Stockport County on a free, and after scoring 39 League goals in 63 games joined Oldham Athletic midway through 1983—84 for £52,000. Signed for Pompey in March 1986 for £150,000. Scored, in 86/87 season, 22 goals in 39 League games to finish top scorer as Pompey were promoted to Division One. Last season he grabbed 13 to remain top scorer. With six hat-tricks to his name, he has scored 47 goals in 94 Pompey appearances.



• Mick Ouinn

Mark Chamberlain (Forward). Began his career as an apprentice at Port Vale. Four years later, in 1982, the winger joined Stoke City, and during his three and a half seasons at the Potteries gained eight England caps. In 1985 after 112 appearances for Stoke, he moved to Sheffield Wednesday, However, he never settled at Hillsborrough, and in July 1988 he signed for Pompey for £200,000.

Terry Connor (Forward). Born in Leeds he joined his home town club as an apprentice. The 27 year old went on to make 96 appearances and scored 19 goals. In March 1983 he went to Brighton in a deal that took Andy Ritchie to Elland Road. Top scorer at the Goldstone Ground in three of his four seasons, he added to his England Youth caps by playing for England U-21 v Yugoslavia in November 1986. In the summer of 1987 he joined Pompey for £200,000.

Mark Kelly (Forward). The 19 year old winger is regarded as a fine prospect for the future. Made his full League debut on May 7 in the final First Division League game of the season at Old Trafford. But by then he had already been capped by the Republic of Ireland, nine days earlier, in the 2-0 win over Yuqoslavia.

Warren Aspinall (Forward). Began his career at Wigan as an apprentice. Made his League debut in the 1-1 draw v Orient on March 2nd 1983. Warren found himself at Everton for the start of the 1985–86 season, but after just one First Division appearance though, he returned to Wigan on loan. He stayed at Springfield Park for the remainder of the season, scoring 21 goals in 41 matches. The next season he was back at Goodison, but after six games he transferred to Aston Villa. Last season, his second year at Villa, he scored eleven goals as Villa gained promotion to Division One. Joined Pompey for a Club record fee of £315,000 on August 17th 1988.



But their success did Wiltshire proud and we should not forget their efforts.


WISHING FOR A RETURN



RESULTS TO-DATE



Dear sir.

I am writing to ask if you could give some publicity to the FSA's activities concerning the governments proposed legalisation of Identity Cards. We are opposing the government proposals because we feel that they will have little effect on the problems of football violence, but will impose severe financial burdens on many football Clubs.

We are particularly disturbed that the government, after agreeing to a system of 50% membership schemes, now intended to abandon this idea despite the fact that it apparently achieved the objective set out for it.


The ID cards are being brought in as a response to the problems that occured in Germany, yet the government have yet to explain how they would have prevented it. It is also worth pointing out that for every 3 England fans they arrested in Germany, there were 8 Germans arrested. The official UEFA report on the championships stated that the amount of violence was on a par with a normal weekend in a town where a League game was taking place. There are no proposals from the German government to introduce such a system.

We think that the government are mistaken and we have discussed the matter with MP's of all parties, who tend to agree with us. We have persuaded some MP's to support ammendments to the governments legislation that will make it more workable, or vote against it. However, we need as many people as possible to write to their own MP's to tell them their views on the subject. (Most MP's know nothing about football). If you could do this as often as possible throughout the next season we would be most grateful.







Penalty kicks were introduced?

In 1891. The very first penalty was scored by J. Heath for Wolves who beat Accrington 5-0 on the 14th of September!

The Longest Throw-In

Was measured in 1966 when former Swindon Town player Bobby Woodruff, then with Wolverhampton Wanderers threw the ball at a phenomenal 40 yards!

Most Goals in a Career

In 1965, Arthur Rowley retired with 434 League goals in his 20-year career with West Bromwich Albion, Fulham, Leicester City and Shrewsbury Town.

When was the Second Division Formed?

In 1892, with twelve Clubs. With Division 1 having 16 Clubs, promotion and relegation was introduced.

The Least Number of Players Used in a Season
