It is no secret that we need to strengthen our squad of players and I have been actively engaged in trying to achieve that aim.


Along with 'Chic' Bates I travelled to Manchester to cover the Central League match between the two Manchester Clubs. Two players were noted and will remain an option.



THE CHAIRMAN Cpcaking

WE HAVE NO REASON TO EXPECT According to the media English soccer is at the crossroads. Our failure to dominate Europe during the summer brought consternation. The pre-season hype was predictable – where do we go from here?

England won the World Cup in 1966 on English soil and have achieved little else since. We have failed to reach the last four of subsequent World Cups and also the European Championships Our track record shows that our so called prominence on the International scene came from the 'Friendly Internationals' that were the normal fare during the decades immediately before and after the Second World War.

Quite simply we have no proven pedigree of success in Internationals, at least in a competitive role. With the next World Cup qualifying matches looming on the horizon we have reason to be concerned. To qualify for the finals may be enough, we really cannot expect more. It would be a brave man to believe we will qualify for the later stages with ease, let alone return from Italy in 1990 with the World Cup held aloft.

Realistically we all tend to believe that we should perform to a higher standard than we are capable of attaining. Our players are robbed of European competition following the disaster of the Juventus and Liverpool European Cup Final in the Hysel Stadium in 1985 We simply expect more than we can actually deliver.

THE PORTSMOUTH MATCH GAVE US ALL ENCOURAGEMENT

When I returned from my Cyprus holiday I found a certain degree of pessimism surrounding our match with Portsmouth. The Fratton Park Club had taken nine points from their first three matches and we had yet to record our first win of the season.

Certain aspects do not run to patterns in soccer and the costly Portsmouth team certainly did not look a better team than we did on the day. We had numerous chances to win the match but did not capitalise. It was a match where, in my opinion, Steve Foley had the best match of his career at the County Ground. Steve's shot which hit the post just after the interval would have rated as the goal of the season if it had found the back of the net.

WE ALL HAVE TO BE REALISTIC It does not require an expert to see how difficult life will be in this seasons Second Division. Most people forecast a highly competitive Division and I am sure that at the end of the season they will have been proved correct.

There are some Clubs who will always be prominent in the championsip race but I believe it would be foolish to dismiss what are regarded as some of the lesser Clubs With respect, Bradford City and Oldham Athletic are probably in this category but both will figure in the final say if they can maintain their early season form.



PALACE...PALACE...PALACE It would appear that Crystal Palace have to figure prominently in our fortunes this season.

They were due to play at the County Ground on the opening Saturday of the season but due to safety work they were unable to be our first opponents.

Crystal Palace were then drawn to be our opponents in the Second Round of the Littlewoods Challenge Cup. We will now meet them four times at least this season. We await the Simod Cup and F.A. Cup draws hoping we avoid the London Club in these competitions!

A.F.C. Bournemouth and Middlesbrough finished ahead of ourselves when we won promotion from Division Three the season before last.

While the North East Club have now regained their position in Division One we both remain in the Second Division. Both A.F.C. Bournemouth and ourselves are both relieved to do so. The Second Division remains our objective at present. The Dean Court Club are welcome visitors this evening. They have made a promising start to their second season in this division and Harry Redknapp's team will be tough opponents tonight.








TAKING THE OPPOSITE OF VIEW

The present day title of A.F.C. Bournemouth was adopted sixteen years ago in 1972, the fourth change of name.

Founded in 1899 as Boscombe St. Johns, the Club quickly dropped the St. Johns tag and became known as Boscombe F.C.

In 1910 they moved from Castlemain Road, Pokesdown to their present headquarters at Dean Court and two years later the Club turned professional.

After a successful time in the Southern League the Cherries were elected to the Football League in 1923 and assumed the title of Bournemouth and Boscombe A.F.C.


From joining the League in 1923, Bournemouth remained a Third Division Club until being relegated to the Fourth for one season in 1970. Their stay of 47 years is a record for any side as a member of the Third Division. Since then they have had one more spell in the Fourth Division, from 1975 until 1982.

Undoubtedly though, the Clubs finest hour came just over a year ago on May 9th 1987.

A crowd of 11,310 packed into Dean Court to witness Bournemouth's last match of the season against Rotherham.

Needing just one point to clinch the Third Division title the fans went wild when goals from Trevor Aylott and Carl Richards gave them a 2-0 victory. It heralded the Clubs first ever League title and the advent of Second Division football at Dean Court for the first time in their 64 years of Football League membership.

The success had all been achieved by the

shrewd investments of Manager Harry Redknapp. He had sold his starman, Colin Clarke, to Southampton for £400,000. With the proceeds of the sale he completely re-vamped his squad adding strength and experience. His policy had turn up trumps.

Last season in the Second Division Bournemouth made a fine start collecting seven points out of the first nine, but then were dealt a savage blow with the injury to summer signing David Armstrong.

The Cherries struggled for a long period but eventually rallied at the end with three victories out of the last four matches to alleviate feats of relegation and finish in 17th spot.

On the cup front, Bournemouth have enjoyed several giant-killing feats, but their most successful campaign came in the Associate Members Competition. They were the first winner of the competition, now known as the Sherpa Van Trophy, in 1984, defeating Northern Section winners Bull 2-1 to lift the trophy.

MEET THE MANAGER AND PLAYERS

Harry Redknapp (Manager). He has become one of the Clubs most popular Managers. As a player, spent much of his career with West Ham United, before joining Bournemouth. He then gained coaching experience with North American Soccer League side Seattle Sounders. London born, is now in his fifth season as Bournemouth Manager, after being put in charge in January 1984. The same month he guided the team to a memorable F.A. Cup victory over Manchester United. Later that season the team won the Associate Members Cup (now Freight Rover Trophy). The highlight of his management career without a doubt was achieving the honour of being the first Manager to take Bournemouth to the Second

Gerry Peyton (Goalkeeper). A Republic of Ireland international of considerable experience. He joined Bournemouth in July 1986 after ten years with Fulham for whom he made 345 League appearances. Born in Birmingham, he made his League debut with Burnley in 1975 after a short spell at Aston Villa. Wis ever-present in his first season with Bournemouth.

Paul Morrell (Full Back). One of the Club's longest serving players. Born locally in Poole, he was signed from Weymouth in 1983. Due to injury he missed a couple of games last season leaving him with a total of 49 appearances. In total for Bournemouth has made over 200 League appearances. Previous to Weymouth, he played for Bath City.

John Williams (Central Defender). Liverpool born, began his career with Tranmere Rovers for whom he made almost 200 senior appearances before joining Port Vale in 1985. In December 1986 joined Bournemouth for £30,000. He has maintained his place in the first team ever since and now recognised as one of the best central defenders outside the First Division. Appeared in 39 League matches last season.

Mark Newson (Central Defender). A well respected, captain and player since his move from Maidstone United in 1985. Whilst with the Kent side he was capped five times by the England Semi-Professional XI. Born in London, he joined his local side Charlton Athletic as an apprentice, but could not break into League football. A rather unfortunate injury kept him out of action mid-way through last season, although he did manage to appear in 29 League games.

Mark Whitlock (Central Defender). Portsmouth born, he started his professional career along the coast with Southampton Made his Saints League debut in 1982 and went on to make 60 Division 1 appearances. He then spent loan periods with Grimsby and Aldershot before joining Bournemouth in 1986. Only missed one game in his first season with the Club. Last season made 47 appearances.

Ian Bishop (Midfield). Born in Liverpool, he joined Everton in 1980 as a 15 year old apprentice. Two years later signed pro with the Club on a two year contract. During that time he spent a loan spell of four appearances with Crewe. After returning to Goodison Park made his one League appearance against Manchester United in October 1984. Left Everton for Carlisle United for a fee of £15,000. He made over 135 appearances for the Cumbrians before leaving in August 1988 to join A.F.C. for £35,000.

Tony Pulis (Midfield). Newport born, he started his career with Bristol Rovers in 1976. Five years later he went to Hong Kong to play for Happy Valley, but a year later returned to Rovers. Newport County signed him in 1984 and he then moved on to Bournemouth in the summer of 1986. Last season made 36 appearances scoring two goals.

Sean O'Driscoll (Midfield). One of the Cherries longest serving players. Born in Wolverhampton he first joined non-League Alvechurch. Started his League career with Fulham in 1979. After making over 140 League appearances for the Cottagers and capped 4 times by the Republic of Ireland, he joined Bournemouth in 1984. At the start of this season, he had made over 200 appearances for the Cherries.

Shaun Brooks (Midfield). Son of former Spurs player Johnny Brooks, the Londoner began his career with Crystal Palace. Made his League debut for them in 1980. Three years later he joined Leyton Orient where he was a regular in the first team for four years, making over 140 League appearances. Joined Bournemouth in the summer of 1987 and on his League debut he achieved the distinction of scoring Bournemouths first ever Second Division goal, the winner at Sheffield United. He went on to score five goals in 33 appearances.

Kevin Bond (Defender). Son of the former Bournemouth Manager John Bond, he began his career as an apprentice at Deam Court. Born June 1968 the six foot defender has served Norwich City (142 League appearances, 12 goals), a spell with North American League side Seattle Sounders and Manchester City (107 League appearances, 10 goals). Has also represented the England 'B' International XI in matches versus Australia and New Zealand. In

September 1984 left Manchester City for Southampton where he was to make in total 140 League appearances. In August 1988 returned to where his career all began by leaving The Dell for Dean Court for a fee of £50,000.

Richard Cooke (Winger). Born Islington, North London, began his career with nearby Tottenham. As expected, competition was tough for first team selection. He did make 11 League matches whilst with Spurs and also achieved England Youth and Under-21 Caps. After a loan spell with Birmingham joined Bournemouth for £30,000 in January 1987, scoring on his League debut at home to Notts County. Last season he appeared in 29 League games, and in all the various Cup matches, scoring a total of 6 goals.

Mark O'Connor (Winger). Although born in Rochdale, he has spent his playing career in the south. Began at Q.P.R. for whom he made 3 appearances. Then a move to Exeter City on loan in the summer of 1983 developed into a whole season when he played 38 times for the Devon side. Having become an established League player, Bristol Rovers signed him for £20,000. In both League and Cup he made almost 100 appearances before joining Bournemouth in 1986 for £25,000. Has made over 100 appearances for the Cherries.

Trevor Aylott (Striker). Born London where he began his varied career with Chelsea (29 League appearances). Moved to Barnsley in 1980 for £60,000 and made 96 League appearances and 20 in the Cup competitions scoring in total 34 goals. He returned to London in 1982 joining Millwall for £150,000. After 32 appearances a £65,000 move took him to Luton Town where, coincidentally, he played the same number of matches. In 1984 he joined Crystal Palace (53 League games). before two years later Bournemouth signed him for £15,000. In his first season with the Club scored 12 goals, then last season was the leading scorer with 11 goals in 49 appearances.

Shaun Close (Striker). Another London born player. He began his career with Tottenham under the Governments Youth Training Scheme and made a couple of first team appearances. Wanting to achieve more League experience he joined Bournemouth in February 1988 after a successful loan period for a fee of £70,000 equalling the Clubs record fee previously set in 1972. In 16 appearances last season he netted six goals.

WHY ALWAYS WEMBLEY?


Well I believe now is the time for the 'Wembley only' policy of the Football Association should be looked at and the northern hotbeds of football should be given a chance to show their support for England.


POLITICS UGH!







EXCUIEWPOINT 333

NO NIGGLING DOUBTS NOW Following the injury I suffered at Crystal Palace last season I must admit it left me with several niggling doubts about my recovery.

Thankfully I now feel that I am over those self doubts and back to feeling natural in training and playing . . . for a professional footballer there are always the confidence factors when they have been injured.

OVER AGE!

Unfotunately I believe I am now over age for a call-up for the England Under-21 team. When I reached 21 years of age last April it put me four months outside the age qualification.

I believe that the rule states that the qualification for inclusion is that you have to be Under-21 on the first day of August. Ah well, it was good while it lasted. Kevin Pressman the Sheffield Wednesday goalkeeper is one year younger than me and will still be in contention. Keyin was one of my England rivals.

A BIG GAP

There is a big gap left for players when they leave the Under-21 age group. Unless you reach the Senior International squad you have little chance of representative honours.

For outfield players that is not such a problem. The fact that England manager Bobby Robson included six or seven younger players in his recent squad for the International friendly with Denmark shows the problem is not so highlighted in their position. For a goal-keeper you have to be outstanding to be included.

No. 2 FRASER DIGBY

YES, I WOULD LIKE TO JOIN A BIG CLUB, BUT . . .

When I left Manchester United it was a good move for me. I was leaving Old Trafford to perhaps realise any potential that I had.

So I left a big Club and I make no secret that, like every ambitious player, I would like to re-join a really big Club. That does not mean I am looking to leave Swindon Town for I honestly believe this Club has untapped potential.

THE SWEEPER SYSTEM Last season 'The Gaffer', introduced a sweeper system to help improve our defensive record. This season we have continued with the same format.

In my position it adds a little bit of security and as a goalkeeper I am not relied upon to cover for the defence quite so much, if the 'sweeper' is really doing his job. Before we adopted this system, I was probably having to cover far more of my penalty area.

HELL OF A LOT TO LEARN I am often asked if I believe I have definite strengths and weaknesses. The answer is that I simply have a lot to learn about all aspects of the game.

I must admit my overall fitness has improved since I joined Swindon Town. I try to work at everything and improve my general game and form.

For the first time buyers it is an horrific problem and for players moving down it is a nightmare. A problem that managers must face when they try to sell their Club to northern lads.


Houses are an investment but it is difficult to begin the investment!



Inside twelve months winger Anthony McNamara played for Everton (Div 1), Liverpool (Div 2), Bury (Div 3) and Crewe Alexandra (Div 4) in the 1957–58 season).

With the departure of the evergreen Ernie Moss from the League scene this now leaves Keith Edward standing with 209 goals to his credit as the League's leading scorer.

Wembley will be unable to attract 100,000 crowds again following the installation of seats in the upper terracing at both ends. The new capacity is 87,000.

Swindon Town Came to Their Aid!

Merthyr Town played 61 away games (from 1972) without a win until their 2-0 success here at the County Ground on 19th September 1925! Following in the wake of Keith Edwards is Tommy Tynan of Plymouth Argyle with 202, followed by John Aldridge with 174. Ian Rush entered the English League scene again on 153. Queens Park Rangers, who pioneered plastic surfaces seven years ago are back on grass with a £250,000 cell-system pitch similar to Fulhams.

Swindon Town - The Record Number of Points

The change to three points for a win (in 1981) enabled Swindon Town to set a new record of 102 points in a season in 1986.

When Oxford United defeated Hull City 1-0 on August 29th

it was their first victory of 1988! Their last success in a League match was a 1-0 win at home to Coventry City last November When Millwall began the season on August 27th they became the 59th Club to play in the First Division since the League was founded with one division in 1888.

Father and Son

On the 5th May, 1971, Alec and David Herd were the two inside forwards in the Stockport County team which beat Hartlepool United 2-0.

The 4-2-4 formation was pioneered by Brazil in the 1958 World Cup. The Pools Panel will sit even if only one coupon match is postponed from November through to April.

Scunthorpe United have the Football League's first new ground for 33 years. They are now playing at £2.5 million Glandford Park.

In 1966 Sir Alf Ramsey introduced his 'wingless wonders' – a 4-4-2 line-up. England won the World Cup. Barnet recently sold defender Nicky Bissett to Brighton for a non-League record £115,000. Barnet could make £50,000 if Brighton sell Bissett at a profit and he plays for England.

When former Town midfield player Glenn Cockerill's brother John joined Grimsby Town for £21,275 he completed a family double! John, 27, follows Glenn in their fathers footsteps. Ron actually played 300 games for the Blundell Park outfit.

As Manager of Watford, Graham Taylor took them to the First Division in 4 seasons. Swindon Town membership stood at the figure of 15,325 before our first home match of the season against Bournemouth.
