Howard will be under no illusions that is what is expected of him and I believe he eventually will do just this.





### TIM MADE IT ALL WORTHWHILE







# THE CHAIRMAN Ling Lpcaking

### **BRIAN HILLIER**

Swindon Town Football Club are seeking to improve further the facilities that we are able to offer to the disabled. We have appealed to the Football League Trust for a grant that will enable this Club to improve and provide further facilities for this area.

### PERSONAL ATTENDANTS

The County Ground, due to its vacant spaces in front of the North Stand, enables the Club to have extensive scope in this area to make improvements.

With the continuing work on the Stratton Bank almost complete this area will at least be spared the unsightly track marks of vehicles seeking access to the Stratton Bank. We have a current membership of fifty people who seek entrance to the disabled area. No charge for admission is made to this area and we also allow a personal attendant to accompany each person. They are immediately on call to tend to any requirements. The Chib also ensures that at least two stewards are on call to supervise this enclosure.

### VISITORS ALLOWED

When we receive a grant for the Disabled Enclosure we hope to extend the current facilities and to incorporate a concrete ramp to allow wheelchairs to move more freely to gain access for cover.

It has always been our policy to allow visitors to use this area and watch the game without being confined to just watching their Club in home matches only. COULD SPONSORSHIP HELP?
Without doubt, available cash enables the Club to improve all facilities and conditions for a second sec

areas such as family enclosures, junior enclosures and sponsorship enables these needs to be met.

Panini with family enclosures have enabled an admirable step to be taken on some grounds. Such a facility is well promoted at Southampton. We hope to introduce such an area in Shrivenham Road soon and I am sure our Commercial Manager Doug Buswell will be actively seeking sponsorship when we are ready.

The disabled area, if given a grant, will see a big improvement. Sponsorship could also be a help as we seek to improve one of the largest disabled memberships in the Football League.

### FOR THE BLIND

I am also pleased to announce that this Club has also recently applied to the Football Trust to have made available a grant to enable Swindon Town to improve its hearing facilities for the blind.

It is obviously more advantageous to be able to absorb the atmosphere of match days than to have to stay at home listening to a commentary. No disrespect to Vic Morgan who does a great job for GWR. Vic would be the first to agree with me I am sure.

### ST JOHNS AMBULANCE

The progress we have made on the Stratton Bank area enabled the Club to build a new facility for the St Johns Ambulance contingent who



attend our League and cup matches.

These serving members of the brigade are invaluable to the community when public gatherings take place and we all owe them a great debt of gratitude. I am sure they will be relieved to take leave of their present cramped facility.

This afternoon we are giving each person who enters the disabled area a matchday programme so they can read of how Swindon Town Football Club aims to improve their well being at matches. Once we receive our grant, and perhaps with a little help from other sources, we can make our facilities the best for our membership at the County Ground.

To all of these people I hope you enjoy todays match and I can ensure you that you are prominent in the immediate list of improvements we shall be making at the County Ground when the Stratton Bank work is complete.

I would like to extend a warm welcome to our friends from Leeds United. A great Club who are experiencing a difficult time by their own standards.

If you compare their problems with those of over half the Clubs in the Football League they don't have any. It is only by comparison with the times the Northern Club experienced under Don Revie. Obviously the consistent success of Liverpool and Manchester United is held in awe by Leeds fans but I am sure they will eventually return to winning ways. I just hope they don't do so today.

Those feelings were also shared by the bookmakers, who were offering very cramped adds against Leeds.

To date, though, the opening two months of the 1988-89 season have proved disastrous for the once proud Yorkshire Club.


In nine League games, when these notes were penned, Leeds had recorded just one victory – a 2-0 home win against Barnsley on September 21.

The poor run led to the parting of the ways for Manager Billy Bremner, a former player and captain of the Club.

At the beginning of this week, Sheffield Wednesday Manager Howard Wilkinson was named as the surprise successor. At Hillsborough, Wilkinson had blended

At Hillsborough, Wilkinson had blended together a fine side and Wednesday enjoyed one of their best seasons for some time last year in the First Division.

The Leeds Directors will now be hoping that Wilkinson, the eighth Manager in 14 years since the end of the Don Revie era, can restore the Club back to the top flight once again.

Formed in 1919 as Leeds United after the disbandment, by a F.A. decree of Leeds City, who had been founded 15 years earlier, League status was gained the following year. Since 1920 the Peacocks have, in 68 years, always been members of either the First or Second Division. Undoubtedly though the finest period in the Club's history was that under the leadership of Don Revie in the mid 60's and early 70's.

Leeds United became not only the best Club in England but one of the finest in

Europe as well.

Two First Division titles were won in the seasons 1968–69 and 1973–74, and on no fewer than five occasions the Club were just pipped for the title. The finished as runners-up in 64–65 and 65–66, then in 69–70, 70–71 and 71–72.

The F.A. Cup was won in 1972 when Leeds beat Arsenal 1-0 thanks to a goal from Allan Clarke, and also during this period they were beaten finalists three times – 1965, 1970 and 1973.

For the only time in the Clubs history they were successful also in the Football League Cup during the 1967—68 season

League Cup during the 1967-68 season.
On the European front, Leeds twice carried off the European Fairs Cup. They won it for the first time in 1968, ample consolation for being beaten finalists the previous year. The other success came

three years later.
In the top two Eurpean competitions, Leeds were runners-up in the European Cup in 1974–75 and in the Cup-Winner's Cup in 72–73.


Steeped in tradition, Leeds are undoubtedly a sleeping giant. Will Wilkinson be able to awaken them once more? . . . Only time will tell.

### MEET THE PLAYERS

Jack Ashurst (Defender). Experienced defender who has missed just 4 games in 2 seasons joining Leeds from Carlisle in July 1986. Began career at Sunderland (debut 71–72), joined Blackpool early in the 79–80 season and subsequently moved to Carlisle in summer of 1981.

Vince Hilaire (Forward). Winger who cost United £190,000. Followed former Pompey colleagues Ian Baird and Noel Blake to Elland Road. Began career with Crystal Palace making over 250 League appearances before moving, very briefly, to Luton and then on to Portsmouth for whom he played over 150 times. Has won nine England Under-21 caps.



Noel Blake (Defender). Experienced central defender who was signed on a free transfer from Portsmouth in the close season. Began with Walsall, but made his League debut with Aston Villa. He had a loan spell with Shrewsbury before crossing the city to join Birmingham early in the 82–83 season. Signed for Portsmouth in summer 1984.

Gary Williams (Defender). Made his debut for Villa in 78–79. Had a loan spell with neighbours Walsall late the following season. Was a member of the Villa side which won the League in 1981 and the European Cup a year later. A £235,000 buy in summer 1987 Gary scored his first League goal on New Years Day 1988 in the 2-0 home win over Bradford City.

David Batty (Midfielder). A local lad who fought his way into the side in November last season. He made an immediate impact in midfield and quietly claimed a regular place. International recognition soon came his way – he won an Under-21 cap against Switzerland in May.

John Pearson (Forward). Former England Youth International who started his career at Hillsborough, helping Wednesday to promotion in 1983. Won promotion to Division One for a second time in his first season (85-86) with Charlton Joined Leeds for £70,000 in January 1987. Lost his scoring touch in the first half of last season but enjoyed better fortunes in 1988 with his first

hat-trick against Sheffield United.

Bobby Davison (Forward). Experienced striker who was Billy Bremner's most expensive signing. He cost £350,000 from Derby in November 1987. Scored five goals in first seven League games for United including debut v Swindon. Huddersfield first signed him from Seaham C.W. and after two appearances he joined Halifax scoring 29 goals in 63 League appearances. Moved to Derby in 1982 where he maintained his near goal every other game average scoring 83 times from 206 outings.

Neil Aspin (Defender). An apprentice who quickly fought his way into the Leeds first team squad. The defender who has made over 200 appearances for United since making his debut as a 16 year-old against lpswich Town on 20th February 1982.

Glynn Snoth (Midfielder). Left-sided full-

Glynn Snodin (Midfielder). Left-sided fullback/midfielder who scored seven goals in 35 League appearances last season, his first at Elland Road under his former boss at Doncaster Bremner. This matched his goal every five games average from over 300 outings with Doncaster though he managed only one goal from 59 games during two seasons (85-6 and 86-7) at Sheffield Wednesday.

lan Baird (Forward). Started career at Southampton but found chances limited by more experienced former Leeds forwards, Joe Jordan and Frank Worthington. Had loan spells with Cardiff and Newcastle before joining Leeds in March 85. Was United's leading scorer in 85-6 and 86-7. Moved to Fratton Park in summer 87 but it didn't work out at Portsmouth and Ian returned to Elland Road for £185,000 (£100,000 less than Pompey paid) scoring on his 'second debut' against Plymouth. Peter Swan (Utility). Made his League

debut against Oldham on New Years Day 1986. Has now established himself as a member of the first team squad with over 50 appearances, either as centre half or a forward. Scored 10 goals in League and cup last season.

Peter Haddock (Utility). Versatile player who joined Leeds from his home town Club, Newcastle, for £45,000 in summer 1986. His first season at Leeds was hampered by injury, but he missed only a handful of games last season when he was one of United's most consistent performers. Had a loan spell with Burnley (85–6) during his St James' Park

John Sheridan (Midfielder). Highly rated midfielder upon whom many United hopes lie this season. Has won four Eire caps and was in the squad for the European Championships. United's leading scorer last season and has made over 200 appearances since his debut against Middlesbrough on 20th November 1982.





Micky Adams (Defender). Left sided fullback who began his League career with Gillingham where he gained England Youth honours. After four seasons he moved to Coventry where he made over 100 appearances in 3½ years. Joined Leeds for £110,000 in Janaury 1987.

Mark Aizlewood (Midfielder). Welsh International with 10 caps to add to earlier Under21 and Youth honours. Can play in defence or midfield. He was a £200,000 buy from Charlton in February 1987 but missed over half of last season because of injury. Started career with Newport, joined Luton in 77-8 helping the Hatters into Division One in 1982. Soon after he joined Charlton where he made over 150 appearances in just over four years.

Mervyn Day (Goalkeeper). Youngest keeper to win an F.A. Cup winners medal since the war when he played for West Ham in the 1975 final v Fulham. Made over 200 appearances for the Hammers before joining Orient in the summer of 1979. After four seasons at Brisbane Road he moved to Aston Villa for a year and a half. He joined Leeds in February 1985 since when he has missed few games and was United's only ever-present in 87–88.

Bob Taylor (Forward). He was signed from non-League Hordon Colliery Welfare in December 1985. Had to bide his time until start of last season when he began as one of the front two. Scored 12 times in League and cup in 87–88.

John Stiles (Midfielder). A midfielder who has also played a full-back, John is an established member of the first team squad at Elland Road. Somewhat unfortunate with injuries in 87-8, he has made over 50 appearances since his debut at Middlesbrough in March 1985. Son of the former England International Nobby Stiles, who was a member of the 1966 World Cup winning side.

David Rennie (Utility). A former Scottish Youth International who started career at Leicester. He was signed for £55,000 in January 1987, since when he has made over 70 appearances for United.



### HOW DO YOU DO IT LOU?



The incident had happened when home striker Craig Morrison jumped in the area with Ken competing for a long clearance from Dorchester keeper Martyn Jones.

Referee Chris Topliss adjudged that Ken had fouled Morrison and pointed to the penalty spot. Ken, 36 was Vice Chairman of the Players Football League Association last season when he was with Torquay United.

### THE LATEST NEWS OF MARK

Out of sight, but not forgotten by Town fans is injured midfield player **Mark Jones**. We asked the Town's experienced physic **Kevin Morris** to tell the complete story and treatment that Mark has undergone in his attempts to regain fitness.

Kevin had this to say: "Mark's real problem began in training on the 13th November 1987 when he twisted his left knee. Mark made strenuous efforts to return to action but he kept breaking down. This was obviously frustrating for Mark and following consultation with Dr. John Nicholas, the Club Medical Officer, an appointment was made for Mark to see Mr. G. K. Sefton, a Consultant Orthopaedic Surgeon at Harrogate General Hospital in Yorkshire.

"The outcome of that consultation resulted in Mark entering Harrogate General Hospital on January 18th of this year for surgery to his left knee. In medical terms Mark underwent what is termed at leed-keio-anterior cruciate ligament replacement with extra articular reinforcement. The posterior cruciate ligament and collateral ligaments were found to be intact.

"Mark was discharged from Harrogate General Hospital on January 30th with his left leg in a plaster cast cylinder from the toes to the top of the thigh. The next step for Mark was another appointment with Mr. Sefton at Harrogate on February 22nd, when the plaster cast was removed and a knee brace fitted. On April 18th Mark reported to the Football Association Rehabilitation Centre at Lilleshall in Shropshire where intensive physiotherapy and rehabilitation is carried out from Monday to Friday eight hours a day."

Kevin continued, with his admiration of the centre quite evident. "It is a good centre, especially for Mark because he was in the company of other professional footballers from other League Clubs with serious injuries."

"To update you on the present situation, I cannot stress how hard Mark Jones has had to work, believe me, very, very hard to build up the group of muscles around the left knee and hip. . -

"Mark still spends two weeks at Lilleshall alternating with myself at the County Ground. I liaise with the F.A. Centre when he is up there and they give me a regular progress report.

"We have set a target for Mark's return to full time training and at present it is looking realistic. All we can hope is that Mark carries on where he left off before that unlucky Friday the 13th of November."



# A LOT OF SATISFACTION My equalising goal against one of my former Clubs, Chelsea, obviously gave me a lot of satisfaction.

I was signed for Chelsea by a former Swindon Town player! I have learnt this fact since I came here, for John Neal was Manager at Stamford Bridge in my early days. Although it was Ian McNeil, now Manager of Shrewsbury Town, who I feel helped my career along. It was Ian, a fellow Scot, who I came into most contact with at Stamford Bridge.

## STAR NAMES IN FRONT OF ME I have never considered that I should have done better at Stamford Bridge than I did.

It was difficult to break into the Chelsea line-up with two Internationals, Kerry Dixon and David Speedie holding down the striking positions. 
### THANKS A LOT


