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



Roker Writer!!

And it came, I learned only last week, from a most unexpected source: One with great affection for Sunderland, who often aired this in print and on television and who, indirectly, helped Bob Stokoe's 1973 F.A. Cup win.

It came from the revered legend, Jackie Milburn, whose passing was mourned throughout the country, not only in these parts.

And it showed an aggression rarely associated with such a lovely, gentle man. But it also showed his sense of North-East Soccer history.

Sunderland, you see, won 9-1 at Newcastle in 1908 — a First Division record away win. And it still rankled proud Northhumbrians!

The Milburn derby story was told by former Magpies team-mate Charlie Crowe as we toasted Wor Jackie with a few beers after the magnificence of his funeral service at St. Nicholas's Cathedral in Newcastle.

But I can assure you he always wanted Sunderland to succeed except when they played the black-and-whites.

Indeed, Bob Stokoe, now consultant here at Roker Park, says Jack Milburn and Len Shackleton were a great help to him while he managed Sunderland.

"Their company and re-assurances were really appreciated during our '73 Cup run," says Sunderland's most successful post-war manager. "Mind you, we had a few fiercely contested golf sessions."

Bob, a pall-bearer at Jack's funeral, was Newcastle's centre-half in that 6-1 defeat for Sunderland in the 1955-56 season. Newcastle also won the return derby.

So, as Bob recalls, they were full of confidence towin an F.A. quarter-final at St. James' Park when the clubs were drawn together.

"We were the Cup holders, so we had a clear chance to go back to Wembley again and repeat the successive-wins double we had achieved in Fifty-one and Fifty-two," he said.

"But two Bill Holden goals for Sunderland put paid to that possibility and Jack's chance of a fourth Cup-winners' medal had gone."

Nevertheless, Jack Milburn will always be associated with the F.A. Cup and will be remembered warmly everywhere. His illness had prevented him from attending any match this season, but people around Roker Park were often inquiring kindly after him. And Denis Smith was among the vast funeral congregation.

I had been invited by the Milburn family to deliver the eulogy at the service and cannot imagine ever having an equal honour.

You will have read thousands of words in tribute to him and I don't think I'll need to convince you that every one was more than justified. Apart from being one of the most exciting players of all time, he was an astonishingly nice, modest man.

His passing unwittingly renewed many old acquaintanships. Albert Franks, a Newcastle team-mate of Jack's in the Fifties, telephoned from Chester-le-Street to say how the smaller names like himself appreciated him. "When we first got into the team he was marvellous at encouraging us and making us feel at home," he said. "A super bloke."

Not a soul would disagree. Considering his enormous, exciting talent as a lightening-fast centre-forward—his 13 England caps include one for a Roker appearance against Wales in 1951 — he was a stunningly humble man.

We miss him terribly. But the memory of him warms us.

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
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SWINDON TOWN 'The Robins'



Four years ago Swindon were in the lower reaches of Division Four with home gates dipping below 3,000. Now the Wiltshire team is one of the best equipped in Division Two and in many people's eyes capable of mounting a sustained challenge for promotion to the top flight.

Of course Lou Macari has to take the bouquets. Since his appointment in 1984 a complete transformation has taken place at the County Ground and there are just three players — Barnard, Henry and Hockaday who preceded the Scot. Significantly only Dave Hockaday at full back is still a first team regular, though the other two are valuable panel members.

Swindon easily adapted to the rigours of Second Division life in 87/88. A comfortable twelfth position was attained, and at one stage in the season they were in fourth spot. Six away victories were secured at Reading, Huddersfield, Hull, West Brom, Barnsley and Middlesbrough.

During the close season freedom of contract permitted several players to exercise their right of leaving the club. Most significant was Northern Ireland shooting star Jimmy Quinn who moved to Leicester in a £250,000 deal. Others to leave the County Ground were Dave Bamber for £105,000 to Watford, Chris Kamara priced at £27,500 who has teamed up with Stoke, and Bryan Wade, a real bargain at £10,000 for Swansea, Kieran O'Regan moved on to Huddersfield.

The major job was to replace free scoring Quinn. Manager Macari moved quickly and signed the highly-rated Duncan Shearer from Huddersfield, utilising all of the Quinn transfer money in the process. Up to last Saturday though, Shearer had not produced his 87/88 goal

scoring form. In fact it is free transfer man Steve White who is consistently the sharpest in front of goal. Happily for Swindon goals are coming from all departments with eight names already on the scoresheet. So White and Shearer are the front running duo, with the fleet footed Bobby Barnes in support. He had a fine game for Aldershot at Roker last season, and is relishing the challenge of Second Division football.

Swindon's other major signing was defender Ross Mac-Laren from Derby.

The £150,000 fee was finally settled by tribunal, but the Scot has missed the last three games. However, the remainder of the defence has been ever present in the opening games, namely full-backs, King and Hockaday and central defenders Gittins and Parkin.

Skipper Colin Calderwood is playing a sheet anchor role in midfield, and with the mobile Steve Foley, providing vision, the Swindon strikers receive ample service. After missing most of last season through injury former Oxford man Mark Jones returned to first team duty for the game at Watford.

Swindon come to Roker with an impressive away record. Only one defeat — at West Brom (1-3) — has been suffered while they have recorded impressive draws at Barnsley (1-1), Blackburn (0-0), and Oxford (1-1). Even more noteworthy was the 3-2 win at Watford. Last Sunday Swindon drew 0-0 with Leeds, in what was described as a dour struggle.

Their other league results at the County Ground have been wins over Bournemouth (3-1) and Brighton (3-0) and a 1-1 draw with Portsmouth. The only setback so far was an early dismissal from The Football League Cup at the hands of Crystal Palace.



The lads were well in control when Swindon last visited Roker in November 1973. Dennis Tueart completed a fine hat-trick but the whole team played well. At the end of the season Swindon were relegated to Division Three. They had occupied a bottom three place since October so it was hardly unexpected. Incidentally that Dennis Tueart threesome was his only hat-trick for Sunderland.

Today will be the Wiltshire club's sixth visit to Roker Park in search of league points - and they have been beaten on every occasion. A huge 41,334 crowd packed Roker on their first visit in February 1964 and were not disappointed. Sunderland, on their way to promotion from Division Two netted six goals past the West Country men with Nick Sharkey scoring a hat-trick. Northern Ireland International John Crossan chipped in with a couple, and Brian Usher completed the rout.

It was to be another seven seasons before Swindon again came North. And in four years of trying they could not take a point from Roker - though on two occasions they only lost by the odd goal.

This is Swindon's third spell in Division Two. For most of their history the club played in the Third Division, but the early sixties saw a rich talent emerge under the guidance of manager Bert Head. Don Rogers, Mike Summerbee, John Trollope, Roger Smart and Roger Hunt formed the backbone of a team that won promotion to Division Two in 1963. Much was expected of the Wiltshire team, and though they started off at the higher level with a six game unbeaten run, the bubble burst and in two years were back in Division Three.

However, season 1968/69 saw their greatest triumph, before a capacity Wembley crowd and on a pitch badly cut up by horse jumping, they beat Arsenal 3-1 to lift the Football League Cup. Fittingly the goals were scored by Don Rogers (2) and Roger Smart. On their way to the Final Swindon had overcome Torquay, Bradford City, Blackburn, Coventry, Derby County and Burnley.

A couple of months after taking the League Cup, Swindon regained their place in Division Two. The next season, 1969/70, they finished fifth, their highest ever league position and also lifted the Anglo-Italian Cup. Again the Wiltshire club seemed set for a spell at the top but by 1974 relegation was suffered and 1982 saw them in Division Four for the first time.

All this time Wroughton born John Trollope was turning out at full-back for the Robins. He had made his debut in 1960 and went on to play 770 games for Swindon before hanging up his boots in 1980. Tall, well built, John was an outstanding member of the teams that won promotion in 1963, the League Cup and promotion in 1969, and the Anglo Italian Cup a year later. He was manager at the County Ground for a brief spell in the 1980's.

BILLY SIMMONS

Welcome to Swindon Town, a team that first visited Roker Park on 22nd February 1913, in the Third Round of the F.A. Cup. A game which Sunderland won 4-2 in their march to reach the final, only to lose to Aston Villa by 1-0.

Many years rolled by before Swindon next visited us. It was a league game played on February 1st 1964, which resulted in a great win for Sunderland by 6-0, a result which contributed to the club finishing runners up to Leeds and being promoted to Division One.

Really there has been very few transfers between the clubs. The first one to take place was when Albert Milton (left-back) was transferred to Swindon in May 1914. After playing 122 league games in the red and white shirt. Albert was a steady back and a good tackler, but luck did not go for him and an injury in a game before the F.A. Cup Semi-final against Burnley in 1973 lost him his place in the Cup Final against Aston Villa.

But he did win a League Championship medal for the same season. He moved to Swindon in May 1914, and was later to join the forces to be tragically killed in action in 1917.

F. R. Cook centre-forward was signed by Sunderland from East Kirby (Lancs) in July 1919. He was a strong player with plenty of dash, but with Charlie Buchan returning from the forces, he only managed twelve league games before moving to Swindon May 1921.

Tommy Lawley outside-right was a Scottish lad signed from Dundee in May 18th 1929, he was a winger with plenty of speed and a good crosser of a ball. Yet some how he did not fit into the forward line and after ten games he was dropped into the reserves, before moving to Swindon in May of 1931. Steve Berry wing-half was signed by us from Portsmouth in July 1984 and soon found himself in the first team. A good worker, he showed good foot-

ball skills. He made ten appearances in the Milk Cup competition, right through to Wembley, only to be beaten by Norwich.

Steve played 32 times in the league games and was allowed to move to Newport, then on to Swindon.

David Cole half-back gave up his job as a bank clerk on The Isle of Man to chance his luck as a Sunderland player, somehow he did not make it at Roker and left for Crewe Alexander then later to Swindon.

Roy Greenwood outside-left was another player who had connections with the two clubs, he joined Sunderland from Hull City, then moved to Derby County and finishing up at Swindon: I talked to Roy on Saturday, he sends his best wishes to all.

Harry Martin was Sunderland's outside-left in the 1913 F.A. Cup Final a team that just missed the double, later Harry served as manager with Swindon in the 1930 period.

Visiting the Hull City v Sunderland match on Saturday and during the interval two ex-International's Bobby Gurney and Horatio Carter made their appearance on the field to receive a great ovation from the 8,000 spectators.

How well they looked Bobby (aged 81), Horatio (75), and it made the day when someone threw a ball on the field and they both showed they still possessed their natural skills Carter finished off with his famous back flick.

They will always remain great in the minds of all supporters.

TIM CARTER

Bristol born Tim Carter who celebrated his twentyfirst birthday earlier this month has now been at the club for almost ten months. During that time he has had to exercise patience while waiting for a first team opportunity.

The season before last Carter made a total of forty-four appearances for Bristol Rovers and the ambitious goalkeeper now finds himself frustrated by the consistency of Jain Hesford. Since joining us last Christmas Eve Tim has made a total of eight first team appearances but only one of these has been for Sunderland.

After a disappointing start at Sunderland which saw him concede a goal within five minutes of his debut for the reserves and then sent off on his second home appearance for the second string Carter eventually found himself making his debut for Sunderland at Wembley in last April's Mercantile Centenary Tournament. Tim enhanced his reputation with a first class performance in keeping a clean sheet in the forty minute match with Wigan before we lost on penalties. A week later he made his league debut for Sunderland against Bristol City at Roker Park and though we lost 1-0 Carter gave us a very encouraging performance.

Since then he has been allowed to go on loan twice but hasn't made another appearance for

With third choice goalkeeper Barry Richardson now too old for the Northern Intermediate League side, Carter even has competition for a place in our Central league line up although as Richardson is presently injured Carter is needed at Roker and is therefore unlikely to be going on loan again in the immediate future.

Earlier this season Tim returned to Bristol to help out Joe Jordan's Bristol City whose regular goalkeeper, ex-Sunderland Youth Team player Keith Waugh, was injured. After three Division Three games for City he was recalled as cover for Iain Hesford. Tim also enjoyed four league games for struggling Carlisle towards the end of last season. He also had a brief spell on loan to doomed Newport County last season prior to his move to Roker.

Loan moves are very common these days of course and especially so with regard to goalkeepers. First choice Iain Hesford had loan spells with Fulham and Notts County during a three year barren period with Sheffield Wednesday, our former reserve keeper Mark Prudhoe has had seven loan periods during his career and indeed we had Steve Hardwick here on loan at the start of last season. Carter will have to play consistently well and wait for his chance. His contract is until the end of next season and his former club Bristol Rovers will be hoping he gets a run in the team as they stand to receive a further £15,000 on top of the original £35,000 fee if Carter has twenty-five first team appearances before his contract is up.

He made his league debut for Bristol Rovers as an eighteen year old against promotion chasing Reading at Rover's old Eastville Ground. Tim established himself during 1986-87 when he had an outstanding season. Understandably he lists former Middlesbrough centre forward Trevor Senior as his most difficult opponent as Senior grabbed four goals for Reading in a two-legged Littlewoods Cup tie to add to a goal he put past Tim on Carter's debut.

However, Tim did enjoy the brighter side of the game while with Bristol Rovers. One of the highlights was a 1-0 victory away to Bristol City on New Years Day last year when a 87th minute Gary Smart volley from outside the box delighted the Rovers followers in the 17,000 crowd. John MacPhail was with Bristol City at the time incidentally. City's Ashton Gate was a familiar venue to Tim that season as he played there for Rovers in what was officially a home game for the Nomadic Pirates while they arranged the sharing of Bath City's Twerton Park ground. The other visitors that day were by coincidence today's opponents Swindon Town and just for good measure Carter had another game at Ashton Gate against City in the Freight Rover Trophy.

Originally signed by David Williams, Carter picked up three England Youth Caps before he made his league bow. In addition to being an unused substitute against Scotland (twice), Eire and Iceland, Carter played in a 2-1 win over the USSR, a two all draw with Italy and a 3-1 defeat against the Dutch. All of these games were squashed into the the first week of April 1985, Carter's team mates included Sheffield Wednesday's David Hirst (then of Barnsley), Paul Moulden who is now with Spurs plus another Tottenham forward David Howells and Arsenal's exciting prospect Michael Thomas.





So Howard Wilkinson has taken over at Leeds United. He becomes the first outsider since Jimmy Adamson to manage the Elland Road club. On three occasions United turned to stars of their great period in the sixties and seventies, but as is so often the case, it requires objective thinking not influenced by past traditions to rekindle success at a football club. Somewhat ironically Allan Clarke and Eddie Gray have enjoyed some success away from Elland Road in a management capacity and the same will probably be true of Billy Bremner. Billy did well enough at Doncaster, and indeed at Leeds to know he has what it takes.

Brian Talbot is everyone's favourite to take over at West Brom, following the departure of Ron Atkinson to the sunny climes of Spain and Atletico Madrid. He will not have done his chances any harm by masterminding last Saturday's 4-1 derby win at St. Andrews. The match included a remarkable sequence of events involving Albion midfielder Robert Hopkins. West Brom were a goal down when former Birmingham player Hopkins was on the receiving end of an off-the-ball foul by Vince Overson. The City man was sent off, Hopkins was left with a facial injury which could cost him two teeth and then he upped and scored twice in two minutes. To complete an eventful day, Hopkins got himself booked and was then substituted, no doubt to save him from any further involvement.

In an attempt to pep up the forward line at St. Andrews, Brum boss Gary Pendrey has recruited Carl Richards from Bournemouth for £70,000. However City at present have two crucial players sidelined. Steve Whitton will be out for six weeks because of a stomach operation and Ian Handwides is still recovering from surgery. In addition Kevin Langley signed only six months ago from Manchester City is on the transfer list as he cannot settle in the Midlands, and of course the aforementioned Overson will be missing a couple of games because of the dismissal.

After a bright start to the season Oldham have slipped up in recent weeks, not winning in five games. A spate of injuries to defenders caused Joe Royle to sign Hull centre-back Peter Skipper for £40,000. Skipper, who earlier in his career played for Darlington made his debut in the 1-4 defeat by Chelsea. Another newcomer for that match was goalkeeper Winston Dubose, an American international. With Andy Rhodes injured, and on loan custodian Peter Litchfield required back at Bradford, The Latics had to move quickly.

Watford pocketed £125,000 when midfielder Martin Kuhl moved to Portsmouth. He had only played four games for the Hornets. Last Saturday Watford were the victims of the shock result of the day when bottom club Brighton took a point from Vicarage Road. John McClelland with an own goal put the Seagulls in the lead, and it required a late Gary Porter penalty to salvage a point for the homesters.

Portsmouth are the only team to have scored in every game, and new forward Warren Aspinall netted in five consecutive matches. The one time Villa, Everton, and Wigan striker was not on target last weekend, but Mike Quinn and Mark Chamberlain found the net in a south coast derby win over Bournemouth.

Walsall are counting the cost of promotion. They lost £200,000 on the year ending 31st May and that was due to making sure of Second Division status said Chairman Barrie Blower. However the trading account did include the £600,000 received from West Ham for David Kelly.

They have acquired four new players since last season. Among them is Mark Atkins who played against us last year for Scunthorpe in the F.A. Cup. Rovers also picked up diminutive midfielder Ronnie Hilderslev who had an impressive game for Preston at Roker last December. Former Fulham and Palace man Tony Finnigan moved North and has been doing well at the back while the fourth newcomer, Andy Kennedy the former Rangers and Birmingham striker hs settled in well and scored in last Saturday's win over Barnsley.

Dangerman is long serving Simon Garner, scorer of over a century of league goals for Rovers in his three hundred plus appearances. Garner notched a hat-trick earlier this season and scored four times against us on our last visit to Ewood Park two years ago. Garner was a member of Rovers 1987 Full Members' Cup winning side as was Scott Sellars who joined Rovers on a free transfer from Leeds.

Still playing is the experienced Scot Ian Millar who previously played for today's visitors Swindon. However, thirty-three-year old is two years younger than goalkeeper Terry Gennoe who played for Southampton earlier in his career and the well travelled Alan Ainscow who is now with his sixth club. Ainscow made his name with Blackpool and later cost Everton £250,000 when moving from Birmingham. Former England Under-21 International and Manchester City player Nicky Reid adds further experience to Blackburn's line up as does Scottish International Ally Dawson who made over two hundred appearances for Rangers.

Other Scots in defence are Colin Harvey who got on the scoresheet this season in a 3-0 home victory over Birmingham and John Millar

who like Billy Hughes was born in Coatbridge.

David Mail won an F.A. Youth Cup medal with Villa in 1980 but never got a first team chance with the midlanders, before moving to Blackburn who he has represented since 1982. Completing the squad is teenage defender Keith Hill who made his debut against Middlesbrough last season and has been on the bench in recent weeks. An excellent match is in prospect so make sure you come along to see how we fare against this promotion chasing side.

Horatio Street Sunderland's third ground and the first on the North side of the river. It was our home for only one season, 1884- Nicknamed The Dolly's Field.

James Potts Henderson Became the clubs first chairman when we became a limited company. Henderson held the position from 1895-1903 and was a prime mover behind the creation of Roker Park.

Hannah David Hannah played in three championship winning sides in the 1890's. Jimmy Hannah was a Scottish International who played for us for six years in the 1890's also winning three Championship medals. He joined us from local rivals Sunderland Albion and became second top scorer in two of those Championship winning sides.

Harvie A small, tough Scottish player, Johnny Harvie had two spells with us in the 1890's playing in our first league game and our first game in the "proper" rounds of the F.A. Cup.

Hogg Made over 300 appearances for us between 1899 and 1909 before joining Glasgow Rangers. Hogg became the first Sunderland player to be capped more than once by England. Won three championships with Rangers before returning to coach at Roker Park.

Holley In a decade with Sunderland immediately prior to the First World War George Holley netted 154 goals in 325 games as well as playing ten times for England between 1909 and 1913. Only Dave Watson and Arthur Bridgett have played more games for England while on our books but Holley's eight international goals make him our top scorer in games for England. Seaham born Holley was a tremendous player and prompted Charlie Buchan to say he could be spellbound watching Holley. Member of the side who so nearly did the double in 1913.

Halliday Dave Halliday is famous as our greatest goalscorer in a season. He earned this record when scoring forty-three goals in forty-two First Division games in 1928-29. He was top scorer in each of his four full seasons and amassed a total of 162 goals in only 175 games to become one of only three players (Buchan and Gurney the others) to score more goals for us than Holley. He registered a staggering four-teen hat-tricks for us, actually scoring four times on three of these occasions. Amazingly uncapped by Scotland as he was kept out of the side by Hughie Gallacher.

Hall Scottish full-back Alex Hall made over two hundred appearances for us in the thirties winning First Division Championship and F.A. Cup Winners medals while at the club.

Hastings Formed an excellent partnership with Hall on the left side of our defence during the thirties. Alex Hastings earned his Championship medal but missed out in the F.A. Cup. However, he did earn two full Scottish Caps while at the club for whom he made over three hundred appearances.

Hall Fred Hall was our regular centre-half for the first ten years after World War Two making over two hundred appearances for us. His only goal was at Roker Park on Christmas Day 1953.

Hudgell Arthur Hudgell was our regular left back during Fred Hall's era and totalled 275 games following his move from Crystal Palace.

Hedley Regular right back during the mid-fifties partnering Hudgell for part of this time. Like Hudgell he played almost three hundred games and never scored in those days when defenders defended! Unlike Hudgell though, Jacke Hedley appeared for us in the F.A. Cup Semi-finals of 1955 and 1956.
