Welcome to Swindon, all their supporters, players and staff. Since the arrival of Lou Macari they have recreated the glory days of Trollope, Rodgers, Smart, Noble, Harland, Burrows and the like. Successive promotions and a stable first season in Division Two have established Swindon as a side needing healthy respect.

Tonight we will be seeking our third consecutive home victory and I have been pleased with the response of the players. Particularly so as injury and suspension has seen us short of several influential players. Opportunities have arisen for Darren Williams, Martin Russell, Grant Brown and Paul Groves in recent weeks and they have all given of their best. With Jimmy Quinn and Jari Rantanen away on international duty last week and Phil Turner, Peter Weir, Paul Ramsey sidelined there were further

games for YTS, boys to enjoy at Reserve level. Already this season Richard Smith, Des Lyttle, Jason Peake and Scott Oakes have played against strong Reserve opposition. Indeed Derby came with their senior squad last week and eventually out powered our Reserve side by 4 goals to 1.

The transfer market is still spiralling for players moving clubs within contract and it illustrates to supporters the difficulties of enticing good players. The fees paid under freedom of contract for centre backs like Linighan, Gayle, Bould and Osman seem insignificant when one reads of the excellent Donaghy leaving Luton at 31 for Manchester Utd. for £750,000. Or Colin Pates leaving Chelsea for Charlton for £430,000. Or Keith Curle, Reading to Wimbledon for £500,000 and the impressive Burrows, West Bromwich Albion to Liverpool for £500,000.

It is these pointers that make negotiations so difficult when we are striving to improve the quality of our Club. Brighton recently paid Barnet a thriving Vauxhall Conference Club £115,000 for centre half, Nicky Bissett and two weeks later paid a further £175,000 for Larry May from Sheffield Wednesday.

Last Saturday I watched Leicester Schools Under-15 XI progress to the next round of the English Schools Shield. It was a brisk October morning but I was disappointed at the lack of support around the touchline. School tutors work long and hard despite an alarming lack of support from Education Authorities and the Minister. Some schools are no longer affiliated, other activities mean that boys may now, if they're lucky, get only one period of soccer a week, and local newspapers give virtually no publicity at all to their fixtures and

Their has been a sad demise in schoolboy football - yet competitive Sunday Youth Leagues are thriving. I have pledged every support we can possibly give to schoolboy football. Last Thursday evening we hosted an England Schoolboy Trial and we know we are looking at the professionals of the future. They need encouragement and support. If someone reading these notes feels there is a worthy boy who is not getting an opportunity or warrants our attention please get in touch and we will endeavour to give him a chance at our evening coaching sessions.

Finally, congratulations to the Chairman who's birthday was last week, Iris who has become a grandmother but her early morning cup of tea is still as good, Andy Jeffrey our YTS. defender with a good head as well as two good feet; he has achieved nine GCSE results with high grades, and our tremendous away supporters who gave such loyal backing at Elland Road on Saturday.

What we would like to say is that if any of the club's staff or supporters' are in our area, then the door to our hotel – which of course is painted blue and white - is always open and they will be made most welcome.



I am 23-years-old and have been following York for eleven seasons home and away. I work at the University of York and enjoy writing, reading, music and of course football.





ast week's unhappy League meeting at Villa Park may yet prove to be the catalyst for an improved League Management structure in the future.

It was indeed unhappy, as there could be no pleasure for anyone to see the removal from the Management Committee of President Phil Carter and his colleague David Dein.

Regardless of the rights or wrongs - and it's no secret that Leicester City supported the resolution to make the changes - it was important to see the maintainance of the principle that each Management Committee member must always put the interests of the League as a whole first before those of his Club or a section of Clubs.

But the point that struck me as most encouraging was the observations made from Members of the Management Committee that the present Divisional representation is not proving a success - indeed the opposite.

Our Chairman Terry Shipman and I have always expressed the firm view that it was a grave mistake to change two years ago the system of Regional representation and regional meetings of League clubs.

The old system allowed clubs of all four Divisions to meet in relatively small numbers at Regional meetings to discuss League business - and in so doing the First Division learnt of the views of the Fourth and vice versa.

In our opinion the present Divisional system has brought with it the splits between the Divisions that are probably part of the reason for the dismissal of Phil Carter and David

The separate Meetings in Divisions have brought about a 'them and us' attitude and a feeling of distrust between the First and Second Divisions, let alone between the Full Members of those Divisions and the Associate Members of the Third and Fourth Divisions.

Clubs like Ipswich, Watford and ourselves, who have spent time in both the First and Second Divisions under the new system, have been shocked at the different attitude of the two Divisions, and at the fact that on changing Divisions one is almost expected to take a certain view whether or not one believes it to be right.

Although of course we are not privy to League Management Committee meetings, the very set-up of four First Division members, three Second Division and one Associate Member representative is almost bound to result in a split Committee.

Indeed, as the President has up to now been a First Division member. the balance of power has really rested on the selection by the First Division of their members - whether or not they all come from the 'big six or whatever or if the smaller ten or so of the First Division are represented.

Now The League has neither a President or a Secretary, and is in the process of waiting for the First Division to elect two replacements before a President can be offered to the Clubs from the new Management Committee

We hear that the appointment of a new Chief Executive is in the offing. and in addition a body to consist of the Management Committee, an F.A. representative and nominees from the P.F.A. and the Football League Executive Staffs Association has been set up to examine the structure of the League and report back in eighteen months with recommendations for improvement.

I still firmly believe in a strong Football League, with the power largely in the hands of the First and Second Divisions.

I do accept the principle that a Frist Division Club should have a little more say than a Second, but I also think we can never proceed if the voting system allows Hartlepool and



Halifax to dictate to Arsenal and Manchester United.

I also believe that any meeting in any business of more than twenty or at the most thirty active participants achieves nothing excelt long minutes, which means that I believe there must be Club meetings in smaller numbers than those of the full ninety two Clubs.

But, to return to my opening theme, I think it paramount that such meetings include clubs of every status, and that Management Committee members must not be placed in a position where they have to balance their commitment to the League as a whole against the limited view of a Division that elects them.

It was a sad day, especially for individuals, but if it brings a new structure offering a better chance of unity and firm leadership, and a better environment for the new Chief Executive to operate, then perhaps the blood-letting will not prove to be

The Reserves two latest outings have both ended in defeat with a 3-2 reverse away at West Bromwich Albion being followed by a 1-4 home defeat by a particularly strong Derby County outfit.
At the Hawthorns City fell behind 0-2 to

a couple of rather sloppy goals but our rhythm was disrupted by the loss of Jason Garwood with a bad ankle knock - just a couple of minutes into his first game back after a month's loan at Northampton Town.

Phil Turner collected a similar sort of injury and had to go off at half-time which completed an unhappy and somewhat physical first 45 minutes, but City bounced back after the break.

Peter Weir scored to put us back in the match and substitute Dean Bridge levelled it at 2-2, and after that we had the openings to have gone on and won the game, but the finishing didn't quite match the build-up and Albion snatched victory with literally the last kick of the contest.

The match at home to Derby County was rather different as City fielded a number of YTS youngsters while The Rams, who were without a match on the Saturday because of the postponements for the World Cup games sent out no less than eight regular first teamers.

City in fact did admirably to hold the visitors to 0-0 at the interval and might even have been in front had an effort from Steve Wilkinson - also back from a loan spell at Crewe - not hit an upright.

Once Derby went ahead however they rarely looked like losing their grip. Goalkeeper Martin Hodge performed well in his second match back after injury but superior first team know-how saw City ultimately overpowered and all we had to show was a consolation goal from Ian Baraclogh ten minutes from the end.

Obviously, it is important to win matches, but on the other side of the coin, it does the young players little harm to occasionally have to cope against the sort of experienced line-up that Derby put up against them.

On the Youth team front, the club are delighted that local bakery firm 'Fresha' have agreed to renew their sponsorship of the youngsters.

The youth scheme is better served this season as The Purity Youth League is a genuine Under-18 league whereas before some clubs would slip in first teamers coming back from injury or use ex-perienced players to get the side through


This Sunday sees the start of the ITV 21 match schedule of televised live games. As 9 of the 37 matchday Saturdays have already gone, it means that we will now be able to watch a live game almost every Sunday from now until the end of the season! Especially when the BBC agreement to screen live F.A. Cup ties comes into force on December 10th (F.A. Cup 2nd Round). It is feasible, also, that both channels could show a live game on F.A. Cup weekends!

This does seem to give considerable exposure, but the ITV deal alone is worth around £47M over the four year agreement.

This represents a massive increase on the last joint contract which brought in around £6M for 14 live games per season over 2 years.

Under the new agreement, it will make sure more Clubs are shown, because no club will be able to appear on live televised matches in more than six League games (three at home and three away). The home Club will receive £150,000 and the visitors £50,000 on each occasion they

are involved in a live televised game.

Each of the First Division Clubs will also receive a seasonal payment of £200,000.

It is hoped from Leicester City's point of view, that ITV will show a few Second Division games, especially as the promotion race hots up towards the end of the season, as the play-off situation in Division Two, involving the top six Clubs, (two promoted, four to battle it out for the other place) is likely to be very exciting indeed, probably even more so than the First Division race, especially if it ends up as cut and dried as last season!

With the kind of revenue and exposure that is at stake with the new T.V. deals, it becomes even more important to be in Division One, both for the big sums of money available from the deals, and also the Ground Advertising and Sponsorship spin offs which will automatically follow.



It might come as something of a surprise to City supporters to discover that Paul Reid is one of the club's longest serving players, but then again, the way the 20-year-old has settled into his role on the right flank, it almost seems that he has been there for years!

City's best form so far in attack has coincided with Reid's return to a front line-up which proved so successful during the latter half of last season, and he has again staked his claim for a regular spot with a couple of cracking goals during the recent matches against Watford.

"It was great to score at home, because Gordon Lee has given me endless stick about the fact that my only effort at Filbert Street was that long range fluke against Palace last January, and he kept saying that it just didn't count!

"Because I'm naturally left-footed, I love being able to cut in and have a shot at goal, and the boss has given me such encouragement that I'm now completely used to playing on the right. What I've got to do now is confuse the full-back a bit more often and get in some more crosses as well as shots!"

One day when he memorably confused the defences was at Blackburn Rovers last season as he struck two splendid goals in a thrilling 3-3 draw.

"That's definitely my most memorable game so far, because not only did my second goal win the supporters 'Goal of the Season' award, but it was all on television as well, and

my Dad still keeps putting it on the video if he's bored on a Sunday afternoon!

It's strange, because before the game I felt really good in my head and had this little vision of me getting a hat-trick and being interviewed on the telly! I ended up with two goals and the Man of the Match, but the whole team were good that day, and at 3-l up it looked as if we had won it".

Reid's progress through the ranks is another encouraging plus point for City's youth programme, and the youngster has no regrets whatsoever about coming to Filbert Street.


"It's always been a good club, but it just seems to be getting better and better these days. I came down here for two years as a schoolboy, and then signed on the two year YTS scheme, and its gone on from there.

"What's good is that you always feel involved. I can remember what a thrill it was as a youth lad to train now and again with first teamers like Gary Lineker and Kevin MacDonald, and what a boost it gave to my confidence.

"Obviously, you've got to have a bit of talent, but I used to think you also had to be some sort of really special person to become a professional footballer; if you're dedicated, work hard and listen to advice there's always a good chance of getting on, and a set-up like the one at City can only help".

Certainly, Reid looks fit and full of running, a point picked up by Mr Pleat after the 2-0 win over Stoke City. "The boss said I was indefatigable... but although that's a word I hadn't come across before, he explained it meant I could keep running all day. It's something that comes naturally and I just like to keep going once I've started!

"It was always going to be a challenge for me to hold down a place this season, but it's great to be in the picture at the moment, and it's up to me to keep playing well, and keep scoring goals home AND away(!) so it's doubly difficult for anyone to get my place in the team. As a side I think we are just starting to pick it up and get rolling, and if we can get together a useful run before Christmas, then it should be yet another interesting second half to the season!"



Swindon Town are a team who appear to have adapted smoothly to life in the Second Division following two successive promotion years which has in turn perhaps inevitably led to Manager Lou Macari's name being linked on a fairly regular basis with a number of top jobs.

In the summer he was approached by Chelsea, and more recently has been trailed by both-Sheffield Wednesday and Newcastle United which is an indication of the continually growing reputation of the former Manchester United, Celtic and Scotland star.

Freedomofcontractsaw severalkey men leave the County Ground during the close season, including of course top scorer Jimmy Quinn, his strike partner Dave Bamber and competitive midfield man Chris Kamara, but Swindon appear to have ridden through the problemand exclusing Saturday's trip to Sunderland had lost only one of their opening ten League games.

Macari also appears to have bought shrewdly, with talented forward Duncan Shearer arriving from relegated Huddersfield Town for a club record £250,000, while defender Ross MacLaren came from Derby County for £150,000 and Tom Jones from Aberdeen a month ago for £80,000.

In goal, England Under-21 'keeper Fraser Digby has fully recovered from a thumbinjury which restricted him to 31 appearances last term and the 21-year-old is now back to his best. Cover is provided by former Arsenal man Nicky Hammond who

played in this corresponding match last season.

Right-back Dave Hockaday has flourished since converting from a winger, and the former Blackpool man has been a regular part of Swindon's rise to prominence with more than 175 appearances to his name.

Left-back Phil King appeared in every League match last season and came from Torquay United for a bargain £12,000 in March 1987. Still only 20-years-old he looks to have a very bright future.

In central defence is Player of the Year Tim Parkin, a vastly experienced 30-year-old who cost just £27,000 from Bristol Rovers in July 1986 and must surely be one of Macari's best signings.

Jon Gittens is a 24-year-old former Southampton player who joined for £45,000 in July 1987 and is a determined and enthusiastic performer in central defence, while Ross MacLaren is a 26-year-old Scot who made well over 100 appearances for Shrewsbury and Derby County before moving in the summer.

One of Swindon's most talented and adaptable players is Colin Calderwood, who captained the team through their two promotions after signing for £27,500 from Mansfield Town in June 1985. Injury interrupted his progress last year, but the 23-year-old has also attracted the attention of several leading clubs.

In midfield Swindon have competitive Liverpool-born Steve Foley who cost £35,000 from Sheffield United in July 1987. Despite several suspensions last term, he managed 36 appearances in his first season with The Robins.

New arrival **Tom Jones** is an Aldershotborn24-year-old who came from Aberdeen last month to strengthen the midfield, while by contrast, loyal utility man **Charlie Henry** is in his testimonial season, but at 26-yearsold is still very much a part of the first team picture.

Another long-serving midfielder is Leigh Barnard, a 30-year-old who has played a significant role in Swindon's fortunes since arriving on a free transfer from Portsmouth in July 1984.

Other midfielders include two with Manchester United connections - Peter Coyne and Alan McLoughlin, while Paul Bodin wasa£25,000 buy from Newport County last March who is aiming to secure a regular role.

Up front is much-travelled 29-year-old Steve White, but the former Birstol Rovers, Luton and Charlton striker has just signed a new three year contract based on his excellent record of 35 goals in 61 appearances since his bargain free transfer capture in July 1986.

Tricky Bobby Barnes was a £50,000 buy from Aldershotand the 26-year-old former West Ham player hit 11 goals last season as well as providing for many more.

One player who is benefitting from that sort of service is free-scoring 26-year-old striker **Duncan Shearer** who cost £250,000 from Huddersfield in the summer and is the man the club hope can replace Quinn and help them improve on last season's respectable 12th place in the table.

City qualified for their only European campaign by virtue of being beaten finalists in the FA Cup in Spurs' double season and after despatching Glenavon of Northern Ireland in Round One came up against one of Spain's finest clubs. City were lying 14th in Division One, sandwiched between Cardiff and Blackpool (how times change!), and gave a most creditable account of themselves, being unlucky only to draw at Filbert Street, then falling 0-2 in Madrid. Atletico eventually ran out winners of the trophy, defeating Fiorentina of Italy in the final.

Swindon had been as high as fourth in the table in early October, but two successive defeats had caused a slip down the table by the time they visited Filbert Street a year ago. City meanwhile were languishing in 17th place with only one win in their last seven outings and fresh from surrendering a two goal lead at home to Oxford in exiting from the Littlewoods Cup.

Things seemed to be going pretty much to form when Bobby Barnes gave the Robins a half-time lead, and the result seemed beyond doubt as Jimmy Quinn slotted home a spot kick for his ninth League goal of the season. Quinn's fellow Irish International Paul

Ramsey replaced Ali Mauchlen for City and pulled a goal back out of the blue with only 8 minutes remaining. However, instead of proving to be a mere consolation effort, it was the catalyst for a sensational turnaround. An intense spell of City pressure led to Steve Walsh heading an equaliser in the 88th minute, then, with Swindon still reeling, Mark Venus spectacularly vollied his only goal for the club to clinch a remarkable victory.

HISTORY

Formed in 1881, Swindon were original members of Division Three back in 1920. They remained at that level until 1963 when they won promotion as runners-up to Northampton. After just two seasons they slid back to the Third Division, but in 1968-69 they bounced back again, as

runners-up to Watford, and also became only the second team from Division Three to triumph at Wembley, in that memorable League Cup Final against Arsenal.

The following season, the Robins crossed swords with City for the first time, and goals from Peter Noble and Len Glover ensured the spoils were shared at the County Ground. The return fixture at Filbert Street was settled by two Arthur Horsfield goals as the visitors left with both

In 1970-71, as City were on their way to the championship, revenge was gained with a double over the men from Wiltshire. Peter Noble again netted for Swindon, this time at Filbert Street, but Ally Brown, ably abetted by own goals from Roy Jones and Stan Harland, clinched a City win, then a Bobby Kellard effort sealed the double at

the County Ground.

Swindon remained in Division Two until 1974, then were relegated once more, a fate they also suffered in 1982 to drop to Division Four. They became champions of that League with a record 102 points in 1986, and won promotion from Division Three the following season via the playoffs, overcoming Wigan Athletic and Gillingham in the process.

Last season, they finished in twelfth position, just one place above City, with a brace from Jimmy Quinn setting up a revenge 3-2 win at the County Ground.

In the FA Cup, the Robins finest achievements came as a Southern League club before World War I. In 1909/10 a magnificent run brought victories over Crystal Palace, Burnley, Tottenham Hotspur and Manchester City to set up a semi-final clash with the mighty Newcastle United at Tottenham. The Geordies had ended Fosse's then best-ever Cup run in the previous round and went on to triumph 2-0 against Town before defeating Barnsley in the final.

Two seasons later, incredibly, Swindon did it again. This time their victims were Sutton Junction, Notts County, West Ham United and Everton. Their semi-final opponents this time were Barnsley, who by coincidence had also removed Fosse in an earlier round, and a goalless draw at Stamford Bridge was followed by a lone goal success for the Yorkshiremen at Meadow Lane. Once again, the Robins conquerors went on to lift the trophy.

More recently, Swindon again tasted cup success when claiming the Anglo-Italian trophy in 1970, defeating Roma in the final.







HELPING THE GAME

The Football Trust receives £9 million annually from the Spotting-the-Ball competition run by Littlewoods, Vernors and Zetters and spends it all on projects which benefit football throughout the United Kingdom

Since 1979 it has been committed to the development of the game at every level and its broad and varying initiatives have ranged from essential safety work at Tortenham to social work at Tortenh. refurbishment at Wembley to repairs at Welling, obsed circuit television at all League clubs to community facilities at Oldham Antibleic transport improvements at Sheffield Wednesday to storm damage in the South East of England; from policing costs at Hull City to an arthroid pitch at Hvde United.

1988-89 will see The Football Trust increase its commitment by investing further sums in closed circuit television, transport facilities for supporters and projects to bring Football League clubs closer to their local community.

WARNING

At the beginning of the season more than 110 League grounds in England, Wales and Scotland will be equipped with CLOSED CIRCUIT TELEVISION which has been funded by The Football Trust.

It is there to increase crowd safety and to help the police. Recording facilities enable film and photographs to be taken of disorder, which may subsequently be used in a court of law.

SAFETY FIRST

Football grounds in England and Wales have reached their highest ever level of safety thanks to the £23,671,425 invested by the Football Grounds Improvement Trust since 1975.

Almost every League club has been assisted with essential safety work and further substantial sums have been spent to enable them to improve facilities. In the past year alone FGIT grants to Football League clubs totalled:

> Safety 2.254,723 Improvements 770,561

In addition to its safety programme, FGIT has also allocated £1.5 million to build or improve family and disabled facilities at League grounds during 1988.
