INJURY LIST — IMPROVING




NATIONAL MEMBERSHIP SCHEME — OUR VIEW

Details were announced last week of the proposed 100% National Membership Scheme which the Government are planning to introduce next season. There will be many difficulties in implementing such a scheme which is being opposed by Stoke City Football Club. What it will mean is that every person who attends a Football League game will need to apply in person for a membership card which must show his or her name, address, club supported, national allegiance and a photograph. This card must then be produced at the turnstile and fed into an electronic card reader for acceptance. Over the last three seasons more than 75,000 spectators have attended our games at the Victoria Ground and there have been just 90 arrests — an average of one arrest per approximately 8,500 spectators. This is hardly a case for the introduction of a 100% National membership scheme.


YOUTH CUP



CLIFF CARR

Twenty four year old Cliff Carr scored his first goal for Stoke City in the 4-0 victory at home to Hull last Sunday. Cliff, however, is no newcomer to goalscoring having found the net on sixteen occasions during his five years at Fulham.

Born in London, Cliff signed for Fulham in June 1984 and made 145 League appearances before joining Stoke for a fee of £45,000 last July. Whilst at Craven Cottage Cliff was capped for England at Under 21 level and was also appointed club captain.

At just 5'4" tall he is one of the smallest players in the Football League but what he lacks in inches he more than makes up for determination and committment and this was typified in his tremendous goal last weekend. Always ready to make foraging runs forward he has established a good understanding with Gary Hackett and Peter Beagrie and has become an important figure in our exciting wing play. He has proved a most consistent performer in recent weeks and has shown his true grit with some resolute defending to compliment his natural tendency to attack.

The arrival of Mark Higgins from Bury, together with the



return of George Berry from injury and the form of versatile Tony Ford at right back has meant that the back four now has a very solid look about it and this is down, in no small way, to the efforts of Cliff. Only two goals have been conceeded in the last five league games.

Cliff was married to his long standing girl friend Kim during the close season and they have settled down well in their new home in Stafford. He is looking forward to a long and successful career with the Potters and relishes the thought of playing in the First Division with the club.
















The Robins, our visitors today have yet to achieve their ultimate goal of a place in Division One and once again we are encountering a club where our previous Football League games have all been in Division Two. Indeed of course last season was the first time we had met them in League action excluding the two seasons we were both in the Southern League earlier in the century.

A review of League matches is therefore short. At the County Ground on October 20th we lost 3 - 0 whilst Simon Stainrod got the only goal in the return on 23rd April here his first for the club. As mentioned earlier our paths had crossed in the Southern League Division One. In 1911-12 Swindon were our Christmas opponents. They beat us 3-0 at Swindon on Christmas Day and 4-1 here on Boxing Day. The following season Stoke actually finished bottom but took their first point off the Robins in a 1-1 draw at Stoke. They beat us 3-2 at Swindon. Overall therefore we have only one League win over them - our last game.

There have also been 5 Cup ties with the Robins. In the F.A. Cup we won 3-1 in the Third Round away in 1949 but lost 1-0 at home in a replay (after 1-1) in 1952. Swindon also took us out of the League Cup in the Third Round in 1979-80, 2-1 at Swindon after a 2-2 draw here.

The game here last season saw Simon Stainrod fighting back to fitness netting his first goal for the club.

FRASER DIGBY Born. 23.4.67. at Sheffield. This former Manchester United goalkeeper joined the Club in December 1986, for a fee of £32,500, after an initial period on loan at the County Ground. He was also included in several of the end of season squads named by England under-21 Manager, Dave Sexton.

DAVE HOCKADAY Born. 9.11.57. at Billingham. Dave signed a two year contract with the Club in the summer of 1988. The former Blackpool Player, enjoyed one of the best seasons of his career, last season. Since moving to a full-back position, his form has improved. Dave has been a regular member of the Swindon Town team that had risen from the Fourth Division under the guidance of Lou Macari's managership.

PHIL KING Born. 28.12.67. at Bristol. Phil was the only Player to appear in every league match last season. Phil began his career with Exeter City in May 1985, before joining Torquay United in July 1986. Phil originally joined Swindon Town on a months loan in February 1987. This became permanent a month later for a £12,000 fee.

TIM PARKIN Born. 31.12.57 at Penrith. Tim was named 'Player of the Year' in May 1988 by the Club Supporters. The vastly experienced defender is one of Lou Macari's best signings. The subsequent fee of £27,500 was settled by a league tribunal. The same tribunal had sat only minutes earlier deciding the fee that Torquay United had to pay for Phil King, who is now on the Clubs staff!

JON GITTENS Born. 22.1.64. at Mosely. The former Southampton defender proved himself a firm favourite with the County Ground faithful, with some determined and enthusiastic performances last season. Jon, moved to the County Ground for a £45,000 football league tribunal fee, in July 1987, he played non-league football for Paget Rangers in the Midland Combination league, before accepting a successful trial period at the Dell.

DUNCAN SHEARER Born. 28.8.62. in Fort William. Duncan was the subject of a quarter of a million pound transfer deal during June, that was a record for both Huddersfield Town and Swindon Town. He had been a target for Town boss, Lou Macari, when he was with Chelsea before moving north to Huddersfield.

SSWINDON TOWN

COLIN CALDERWOOD Born. 20.1.65. at Glasgow. Colin, joined Swindon Town from Mansfield Town in June 1985, for a Football League tribunal fee of £27,500.Colin captained the Club through two successive seasons of promotion in the 1985-86 and 1986-87 campaigns.

Colin has made 131 consecutive league appearances since his signing in July 1985. The form of the Scottish born defender has often attracted the attention of several of the country's leading Clubs.

CHARLIE HENRY Born. 13.2.62. in Acton. Charlie, who is due a testimonial match this season, after ten years service with Swindon Town, joined the Club as an apprentice. A utility Player, who can virtually play in any position, he was the Clubs leading goalscorer when Swindon Town won the Fourth Division championship, with a record number of points - 102 in 1985/1986.

STEVE FOLEY Born. 4.10.62. in Liverpool. Steve joined Swindon Town in July 1987 for a fee of £35,000. The former Sheffield United midfield Player had joined the Yorkshire Club from Grimsby Town in July 1985. His actual League debut came while he was on loan to Fulham in December 1983.

ROSS MACLAREN Born. 14.4.62. in Edinburgh. Ross joined Swindon Town on a conditional transfer fee, decided by a Football League tribunal at £150,000, in July 1988.

Ross joined Derby County in July 1985, after a Football League tribunal commission had set the fee at £67,500. In three seasons with the Baseball Ground Club, Ross helped the East Midland Club to win promotion from the Third Division, to the First Division.

TOM JONES Born. 7.10.64. at Aldershot. Stylish Midfield player former apprentice with Chelsea — drifted into non-league football with Farnborough Town. Spotted by Ian Porterfield then manager of Aberdeen who quickly signed him for the Scottish Premier Club in April 1987. Moved to Swindon in September 1988.

BOBBY BARNES Born. 17.12.62. in Kingston-on-Thames. Bobby, joined Swindon Town from Aldershot for £50,000, in October 1987. The former West Ham United apprentice scored 11 goals last season, to help the Wiltshire Club attain a comfortable mid-table position on their return to the Second Division.

WATCH OUT FOR STEVE WHITE



Born. 2.1.59. in Chipping Sodbury. Steve must represent one of the best free transfer signings in the history of the Club. Since he was signed from Bristol Rovers in July 1986, he has scored 35 goals, in 61 full first team appearances.

Steve, who was once the subject of a six figure transfer fee between Bristol Rovers and Luton Town, in his first spell with Rovers, signed a new three year contract in June 1988.



Meet the Boss LOU MACARI

After an illustrious career with Celtic, Manchester United and Scotland. He joined Swindon as player/manager in the summer of 1984. Since then his achievement to lift a struggling 4th Division side to a middle of the table 2nd Division side has become part of Swindon soccer folklore. In his second season they won the 4th Division title with a record 102 points and in the next season finished 3rd in the 3rd Division survived the play-offs to climb into Division 2. Last season they finished mid-table and produced a series of shock wins in all three cup competitions.





ALMOST CHAMPIONS

1946-47 season opened with a great deal of expectancy at the Victoria Ground after the war years of Regional football. However the confidence was short lived as Stoke only collected one point from the first 4 games conceding 12 goals. Thereafter 6 straight victories ensued and after 10 games Freddie Steele had amassed 15 goals including two hat-tricks.

That winter proved to be one of the severest of the century and the Football League programme was badly hit with many postponements forcing rearranged games in May and June. Stoke went 10 games without defeat and were well placed with two games to go, away to Aston Villa and Sheffield United. The match at Villa Park was on Whit Monday and with Neil Franklin absent on international duty Frank Mountford returned from injury to deputise. In a season of many outstanding performances this turned out to be one of the highlights as a George Mountford goal (his form made light of the departure of Matthews to Blackpool in early May) was the only difference between the sides.

As the season stuttered to its conclusion with the final game for Stoke 19 days away the title race was finely balanced. On the following Saturday the Wolves versus Liverpool game was to be crucial as both sides were well placed in the chase for the championship. The game proved to be Stan Cullis' last for Wolves and to make matters worse they slipped up 2-1 at home.

This looked to be the best possible result to Stoke and improved their chances for the top spot as the table looked as follows:

Stoke were the only c h a m p i o n s h i p contenders with an unfinished programme and as can be seen needed to win at Sheffield to clinch the crown. A defeat or

draw would set them in fourth place. It was all or nothing but in any event this was the club's most successful campaign and they were assured of talent money for the first time since the scheme was introduced which incidentally worked out as:

The period to the Sheffield game (14th June) was not without incident as Stoke embarked on a short Irish tour with matches on successive days against Belfast Distillery (won 4-1) and Drumcondra (lost 0-3). The papers covered all the colour and background of the run-in and the players spent the Wednesday before the game at the Buxton Well Dressing. On the Thursday Frank Mountford handed in a transfer request as his first team games looked limited with the emergence of Johny Sellars and the consistency of Neil Franklin, who replaced Mountford as the only change in the side for the Saturday game.

Manager McGrory had announced his team early in the week. They were to play in a new strip of white shirts, black shorts (instead of their usual change strip of blue and white stripes) so that the fans — 10,000 were expected to travel — could wear the appropriate favours.

Bramall Lane had never been a happy hunting ground for Stoke and a certain piquancy was added to the match as United had knocked Stoke out of the F.A. Cup the previous season. United were in fact hit by injuries to inside forwards Jimmy Hagan and Brook and full back Furness as the sides lined up:

STOKE CITY: Herod; Mould, McCue; Sellars, Franklin, Kirton (Capt.); Moutford (G), Peppitt, Steele, Baker, Ormston.

SHEFFIELD UNITED: Smith; Young, Cox; Jackson, Latham, Forbes; Rickett, Nightingale, Collindridge, Pickering, Jones (G).

Handicapped by a pitch greasy from morning rain Stoke never established the methodical play which had characterised their displays during the season whilst Sheffield's dash, good football and determination won out. In fact in only 2 minutes Pickering recalled at 38 for his first game of the season scored with a low shot. However 2 minutes later Steele found Mountford on the right dashed into the box and nodded down Mountford's superb cross to the feet of Ormston who closed in to score, just after the break. McCue slipped trying to intercept a crossfield pass and Rickett dashed in to seal the score and Stoke's fate. They had played well enough to win an ordinary game but this was no ordinary game at the end of an extraordinary season.







Cup successes namely against 1st Division giants Burnley. Only the briefest mention and welcome to Stoke City is made. The centre pages are taken up in traditional format of both team line-ups surrounded by advertisements. Page 6 displays the league table for Division 3 South showing Swindon to be in 5th place. Page 7 includes a record of Swindons cup exploits dating back to 1907. The back page is taken up by the days fixtures for the half-time scoreboard. A feature rapidly disappearing from league grounds with the advent of electronic scoreboards and improved P.A. systems.




