
Well, they took six points from both matches and it was a pleasing experience for **David Geddls** to return to his former Club and score the only goal of the match at Shrewsbury last Saturday.



THE GOVERNMENTS FOLLY

The 'Town's' two League wins in a row for the first time since the start of October, have been completely overshadowed by details of the identity card scheme being laid out by the Government.

The Police Federation, the Clubs and supporters themselves have all made their opposition clear and between them have easily the most detailed knowledge of what actually goes on both inside and outside a football ground.


Expert opinion disagreeing with their own has never bothered this Government, so it seems certain that supporters will officially be second class citizens, identified by name and number, by the end of the season. A Prime Minister and Sports Minister who ignore the facts of crowd violence can see the Identity Card idea solving the supposed problem. All that the experts can see are disadvantages and some potentially dangerous ones at that

A Boxing Day local derby with huge queues outside a small ground seems to be one of the many situations ignored as the Government rush to do something about a problem which has recently come under far more control. A breakdown or overload in the computer controlling entry to the ground as kick-off approaches, brings the possibility of a fatal surge towards the turnstile. It is plain to see who should shoulder the responsibility of a death in those circumstances.

THE LEADING LIGHT FROM DARKEST LUTON

An obvious leading light in this game of cards is Luton's David Evans, himself a Tory M.P. The instigator of three evils at Kenilworth Road, banning away fans, laying a plastic pitch and the dreaded I.D. cards, comments that

football is the only event where spectators turn up a-mere ten minutes before the start and should arrive much earlier. He also says that there is no way that the same would happen at the Wimbledon Tennis Championships, what a comparison! But just the sort of thing to be expected from someone who probably views the game from the warmth of an executive box. Any longer wait than ten minutes on a freezing terrace in mid-winter is like some terrible torture treatment to those of us without his dubious privileges.

Ironically the financing of the new scheme may hit Luton harder than most if they have to replace their existing card entry system. The Government's intention seems to be that either the Clubs or the fans (or both) should pay for something that neither agree with and which has been legally forced onto them.

HEADING FOR AN EASTERN BLOC EXISTENCE

The likelihood of dozens of less affluent Clubs going to the wall is a very strong one, with the demise of the Football League not too far distant. But of course should your Local Club go bust, you won't be able to use your new found casual status anywhere else. In its efforts to destroy the game at every level, the Government wants to deny the right of the casual supporter to go to whatever ground he likes. Perhaps the Kiev Reds flag at Watford had it right, as the average fan seems to be heading for an Eastern Bloc existence.

In the vain hope of changing the Governments mind it is the duty of everyone with an interest in the game to make their opinion known. Accepting what the Government throws at us now will bring terrible problems for football in the future. What seems to have escaped the powers that be is that football is a source of great entertainment to millions and the minimal violence that attempts to cling to it is being eradicated inside the ground by the game itself.

COMING TO VALLEY PARADE, SIR

Before the bill goes to a parliamentary vote, I would like to invite Swindon's M.P., Simon Coombs, to experience a football supporters lot at first hand. This would enable him to make his decision properly without just toeing the party line. An away game with its many inconveniences would be better, but a home fixture may still serve to open his eyes to what really happens at a football ground on an average Saturday afternoon. Perhaps after such an experience, he would then agree with Jimmy Greaves who said recently in a rare flash of intelligence that "we're safer in a football ground than walking the streets".

Oldham Manager Joe Royle, the former England centre forward, came within a whisker of leading the Club back into the First Division two seasons ago, for the first time since 1923. Under normal circumstances their final position of third place in the Division 2 table would have

guaranteed them promotion.

However, the new system of only two up and play-offs denied them of a place back in the top flight when they lost to a late Leeds goal in the play-off semi-finals.


This disappointment seemed to have a lasting effect and for the first half of last season Oldham struggled towards the foot of the Division 2 table.

At the beginning of December they lay in

deep trouble in 21st place. Gradual recovery saw them eventually move up the table to safety, and finally finish in tenth place. This season has seen Oldham once again struggle for points.

When these notes were penned they had only won five out of 19 League games and were in 20th spot with 22 points. Only one of those victories has been away from home. That came early in the season at Manchester City when Roger Palmer netted a hat-trick in the 4-1 win. Since then Oldham have only managed two draws in seven further away trips.

Formed in 1894, Oldham were elected to the Football League thirteen years later and, between 1907 and 1922, enjoyed a highly

successful period. They finished as runnersup in Division 2 during the 1909/10 season and runners-up in Division 1 five years later. They were relegated from the top flight in the 1922/23 season . . . and are still trying to regain that status 60 years or so later.

Since then they have, over the years, plummeted all the way down to the Fourth Division, spending two spells there – the last between 1969 and 1971.

In between Oldham carried off the Division 3 (N) title in 52/53 and ended as runners-up in the Fourth in 62/63. A third place in Division 4 in 1971 began the start of the upward trend again. Three years later 62 points – a margin of just one point over Bristol Rovers and York City – gave them the Third Division crown. They were promoted to the Second and have remained as a member of the Division since.

MEET THE MANAGER AND PLAYERS

Joe Royle (Manager). Appointed Manager of Oldham in July 1982. Almost led them back to the First Division during the 1986/87 season. Enjoyed a distinguished playing career as a prolific goalscorer, capped six times by England. His Football League Clubs include Everton, Manchester City, Bristol City and Norwich.

Andy Rhodes (Goalkeeper). Born Doncaster. Started his career with Barnsley where he made 60 first team appearances before moving to Doncaster Rovers in 1985 for a £25,000 fee. He made over 100 appearances for Doncaster before joining Athletic in March 1988 for £55,000.

Denis Irwin (Defender). Born Cork, Ireland. Began his career as an apprentice with Leeds United in 1982. Made over 80 appearances for them before joining Athletic on a free transfer in June 1986. Quickly established himself as a first team regular and has made over 80 appearances for Athletic in

On his return he had spells with Norwich and Burnley before joining Athletic. Was appointed Player/Coach in July 1985.

Earl Barrett (Defender/Midfield). Born Rochdale. Signed from Manchester City for £35,000 in November 1987 making his Athletic debut against Plymouth Argyle. The 21 year old started his career on a YTS scheme with Manchester City where he made four first team appearances. A versatile player, is equally at home in midfield or defence and made 15 first team appearances for Athletic last season.

Andy Barlow (Defender/Midfield). A local, the 23 year old signed for Athletic in July 1984 making his first team debut against Birmingham City in August 1984. A versatile player equally at home in midfield or defence, he has currently clocked up over 120 appearances for the Club.

Mike Milligan (Midfield). Born Manchester. Signed for Athletic in 1985 and made his first team debut against Liverpool in the Milk Cup in October 1985. A tigerish midfield player, the 22 year old quickly established himself in the first team and has currently made over 80 appearances for Athletic.

Ian Marshall (Defender). Born Liverpool Started his career with his hometown club Everton, making his debut against West Bromwich Albion in 1985. Signed for Athletic in March 1988 for a £100,000 fee.

Mike Flynn (Central Defender). Born Oldham. Started his career as an apprentice with Athletic in July 1985. Graduated through the Youth and Reserve teams before making his first team debut against Bradford City in August 1987, and made 28 appearances last season. Toured Brazil in the close season as a member of the England Under-20 International Squad.

Roger Palmer (Midfield). Born Manchester. Signed from Manchester City for £70,000 in November 1980. A skilful attacking player with an impressive goalscoring record. He has made over 300 appearances and scored 100 goals for Athletic. Netted a hat-trick in Oldham's 4-1 victory at Manchester City early this season.

John Kelly (Midfield). Born Bebbington. Signed for Athletic in November 1987 from Swindon Town for a fee of £35,000. Made his debut against West Bromwich Albion in the Simod Cup. Started his career with Tranmere Rovers before moving on to Preston North End for £50,000. After making 130 first team appearances and scoring 27 goals he was surprisingly given a free transfer and signed for Chester City where he spent two seasons before moving on to Swindon Town in the summer of 1986.

Andy Ritchie (Forward). Born Manchester. Signed for Athletic for £50,000 from Leeds United in August 1987. Started his career as an apprentice with Manchester United where he made 33 first team appearances and scored 13 goals. Was transferred to Brighton in 1980 for £650,000. He made 89 appearances for the Seagulls before moving to Leeds United in 1983 in exchange for Terry Connor. A firm favourite with the Athletic fans, he was voted 'Player of the Year' by both the Supporters and The Junior Latics Club last season when he finished joint leading goalscorer with 20 goals.





And have we gone back to the days of the great Dixie Dean, when centre forwards get away with bundling goalkeepers over the goal-line?


The sort of refereeing I witnessed during the second half of this match, is an insult to the game of football and to the intelligence of football supporters (without whom, the game of football would soon die.)



trial but Jock Fulton arranged for me to join Shrewsbury Town.




