

# STELLE sees it



OOD afternoon.

Our disappointing run of F.A. Cup results of recent years continued up at Stoke a fortnight ago when we went out to Mick Mills' team by a single goal. The match itself was a typical third round tie, hard, fast, tense and close. We always knew that there was going to be very little between ourselves and Stoke

and so it proved, with clear cut chances at a premium and a single goal being sufficient to take the home side through to the next round.

We were again given tremendous support by our travelling fans, both in the numbers that came to the game and in the vocal backing they provided. Both sides had times when they were in the ascendancy and we had our best spells before the break, but all we could point to were two efforts that had glanced off the bar, and if we shaded the first-half then Stoke probably had the edge after the interval.

With over an hour played it was apparent to everyone that if the duel was to be settled it would be by one, single thrust, and that either side were capable of making that decisive breakthrough. Unfortunately, with only a quarter of an hour remaining, Stoke secured it, the ball being scuffed into our net off the legs of a prone Perry Suckling after our 'keeper had parried a fierce drive. All we were left with was the knowledge that we had contributed to a rousing Cup-tie and earned the respect of the victors.

Our Simod Cup match against Luton was another opportunity to pit our abilities against First Division opponents, and, as in the previous round against Southampton, we seized it to the full and provided another highly eventful and thoroughly entertaining evening for the enjoyment of our fans.

Two somewhat weakened sides looked pretty evenly balanced on paper, but it never worked out that way. Luton asserted their First Division calibre early on and took the lead, but once Mark Bright had equalised for us midway through the first-half we always looked the stronger team and had put ourselves firmly in control by the interval with two more goals from our in-form striker who took the ball home with him afterwards. Mind you, if Mark can continue scoring hat-tricks in our home games, we'll be pleased to earmark the ball for him!

Then, of course, lan Wright's timely strike right at the start of the second-half thwarted any hopes Luton had of a revival and we could have even added further goals to add to our emphatic victory.

We helped to provide a lively game in our London derby clash against Chelsea at Stamford Bridge last week where we again received tremendous support from our travelling fans. With Eddie McGoldrick making a useful and promising League debut for us our options were increased and we had our chances to open the scoring in the first-half, before we fell behind to a Chelsea free-kick. From then on it was always an uphill struggle against the experienced Blues — who included, as you must know, two imports priced at almost £1 million — and we were doomed to yet another afternoon of frustration, although we admired the performances of Perry Suckling and his back four who helped to salvage our dignity by keeping Chelsea at bay when they were in the ascendancy.

In the end, our ability to make inroads into the gap between ourselves and the top six clubs is going to depend upon whether we can improve our away form, and we are working hard to raise our level of performances and return on our opponents' grounds

Finally, welcome to Swindon Town and to my former colleague at Old Trafford, Lou Macari. Lou has built a side which no-one in Division Two can underestimate and which will provide us with stiff opposition this afternoon.

Like ourselves, Swindon have majored in family orientated appeal to their community – and I do congratulate our own Family Enclosure on its first birthday.



### QUALITY IN DEPTH

Following their very creditable performance in 1987-88 upon their return to the 2nd Division, Swindon Town sought to add further quality to the heart of their defence by signing Derby County's Ross MacLaren, although it took a tribunal-fixed fee of £150,000 in order to secure him. The 26-year-old Edinburgh born MacLaren had begun at Glasgow Rangers but had moved on a free transfer to Shrewsbury Town at the start of the 1980-81 season. He went on to play 161 League games, often as an immaculate sweeper, for The Shrews and became their club captain before he moved to the Baseball Ground in July 1985 and became Derby's Player of The Year twelve months later whilst helping County to return to the 1st Division.

### SCOOP

The Robins pulled off another fine scoop early in the close season when they persuaded **Duncan Shearer**, The Huddersfield and former Chelsea striker, to join the County Ground staff at a fee reported as being £250,000 and thus some £100,000 more than Town's previous highest transfer payment. Shearer hails from Fort William in the Scottish Highlands and was first noticed by Chelsea whilst playing for Inverness. He moved to Leeds Road in March 1986, scored a hat-trick in his first full game for Huddersfield and 7 in 7 + 1 appearances to help ensure The Terriers' 2nd Division status for another term.

### MUCH TRAVELLED

Towards the end of October Swindon boss, Lou Macari, signed proven striker **David Geddis** from Shrewsbury Town. Geddis, who cost Swindon something in the region of £40,000, made his Robins debut as a second half substitute in the home victory over hapless Birmingham (2-1). He had been with seven different clubs before joining The Town and had demonstrated his prowess in front of goal with all of them.

### SCORELINES OF DISTINCTION

If Swindon's progress in this current season has been rather less marked than many observers of the 2nd Division scene had anticipated it has certainly included several excellent performances and results. Probably the best to date was their 3-2 win over Watford at Vicarage Road just a week after the Hornets had beaten the Palace at Selhurst Park (Duncan Shearer, Bobby Barnes and Tom Jones were on the mark for The Robins that day), whilst a richly deserved point was secured at Leicester towards the end of October when they went 3-0 up in 25 minutes with goals from raiding left-back Phil King, the talented Steve White and ever-willing Charlie Henry — only to see Leicester hit three in ten minutes after the break to equalise! It was certainly tough luck if you were behind the wrong goal at Filbert Street that evening!


### HE PLAYED FOR BOTH CLUBS – CLIFF JACKSON

Cliff signed for his hometown club of Swindon in 1958 and was there for almost five years making 91 league appearances and scoring 28 goals, having also won caps as an English Schoolboy International. He was a member of the 1962/3 promotion winning side from Division 3 to Division 2 for Swindon playing alongside the likes of Mike Summerbee, Ernie Hunt, and another former Palace player Bobby Woodruff and the team was managed by Bert Head. From Swindon, Cliff moved to Plymouth Argyle in the summer of 1963 but when Bert Head came to manage Palace after a short spell at Bury he recruited his former Swindon player from Plymouth in September 1966, whilst Bobby Woodruff had joined that June. Cliff was originally a wingman, about 5 ft. 9 ins, and played in that position for Palace in 1966/7 and 1967/8, but in 1968/9, with wingmen Mark Lazarus and Colin Taylor now at Selhurst Park, Cliff was moved to centreforward to play alongside Bobby Woodruff. That promotion winning season to Division 1 saw Cliff score 14 goals in 34 league appearances, missing 8 games in a row through injury, and a further 3 goals in the Football League Cup as Palace reached the 5th round. The following season Palace struggled in Division 1 and Cliff could only muster 4 goals in 21 league appearances and in the summer of 1970 with the arrival of Alan Birchenall and Bobby Tambling, he moved to Torquay United for £10,000 after scoring 25 goals in 106 Palace league appearances. In the next three years Cliff played over a hundred games for Torquay where he ended his league career and not so long ago was heard of in conjunction with managing an Essex sports centre.



### MANAGER



### LOU MACARI

LOU MACARI was born in Aberdeen but it was in the green hooped shirts of Glasgow Celtic that he came to the attention of Scottish and then British soccer fans as a tough, tenacious snapper-up of goal chances.

After making 56 Scottish League appearances for the Celts and scoring 27 goals Lou joined Manchester United in mid-January 1973 for £200,000 at the instigation of Tommy Docherty, who was prepared to pay a record fee for a Scottish player to acquire the little man's talented services.

Whilst at Old Trafford Lou transferred his attentions to the midfield areas of the park, made 329 Football League appearances, finding the net on 78 occasions, and played for The Reds in the 1976, 1977 and 1979 F.A. Cup Finals at Wembley along with our own Steve Coppell. He also became a regular choice for the full Scottish international side where he gained 24 full caps (plus two at Under-23 level), and was in the Scottish 1978 World Cup squad in Argentina.

When Lou left Old Trafford he received a testimonial game in May 1984 against his former club, Celtic and over 40,000 fans turned out in appreciation of his endeavours for United. The receipt, over £80,000 represents a record for a testimonial match in this country.

Mr. Macari was appointed Manager at The County Ground, Swindon, in July 1984 – player-manager in fact, because Lou did make 36 League appearances for Swindon in the course of his first two seasons with the Wiltshire 'Robins'.

In 1985-86 Lou steered Swindon out of Division Four not merely as impressive champions but with a record 102 points and he was obviously the only serious candidate for the Bells Fourth Division Manager of the Season award. Immediately, Mr. Macari took Swindon to third


place in Division Three in 1986-87 and, after a play-off replay here at Selhurst Park, restored them to their rightful place in the Second Division.

DELTA 1000

Last season was somewhat disappointing for the former Manchester United goalkeeper, who joined the club in December 1986, for a fee of £32,500, after an initial period on loan at the County Ground. A thumb injury sustained at Crystal Palace in late October, restricted Fraser's appearances to 31 League matches. It also cost him his England Under-21 position, although he was included in several of the end of season squads named by England Under-21 manager, Dave Sexton.

### **NICKY HAMMOND**

Signed on a free transfer from Arsenal in July 1987, the former Highbury apprentice was forced into first team action last season, due to the injury that Fraser Digby sustained in October 1987. Previously Nick's League experience had been confined to his spell with Bristol Rovers, on loan. The former Arsenal 'keeper signed a new two year contract with the club in May 1988.

### DAVE HOCKADAY

Dave signed a new two-year contract with the club in the summer of 1988. The former Blackpool player, who moved to the County Ground in August 1983 as a winger, enjoyed one of the best seasons of his career, last season. Since his conversion to a full back position, his form has been enhanced. Dave has been a regular member of the Swindon Town team that has risen from the Fourth Division under the guidance of Lou Macari's managership.

### PHIL KING

Phil was the only player to appear in every League match last season. Phil began his career with Exeter City in May 1985, before joining Torquay United in July 1986, for a League tribunal settled transfer fee of £3,000. Although Phil originally joined Swindon Town on a month's loan in February 1987, his transfer became permanent one month later for a £12,000 fee. Torquay United are entitled to one-third of any transfer fee, if Phil is transferred in the future.

### TIM PARKIN

During the close season, Tim signed a new two-year contract with the club. The former Blackburn Rovers, Malmo and Bristol Rovers central defender was named 'Player of the Year' in May 1988 by the club's supporters. The vastly experienced defender must rate as one of Lou Macari's best signings, when he secured the signature of the Penrith-born player in July 1986. The subsequent fee of £27,500 was settled by a League tribunal. The same tribunal had sat only minutes earlier deciding the fee that Torquay United had to pay for Phil King, who is now on the club's staff!

### COLIN CALDERWOOD

Colin, who joined Swindon Town from Mansfield Town in June 1985, for a Football League tribunal fee of £27,500, has been a stalwart at the heart of the Town's defence in the club's last three seasons. Colin had the honour of captaining the club through two successive seasons of promotion in the 1985-86 and 1986-87 campaigns. After making 131 consecutive League appearances since his signing in July 1985, injury interrupted Colin's progress last season. Although the form of the Scottish-born defender has often attracted the attention of several of the country's leading clubs, he remains at the County Ground.

### JON GITTENS

The former Southampton defender proved himself a firm favourite with the County Ground faithful, with some determined and enthusiastic performances last season. Jon, who moved to the County Ground for a £45,000 Footall League tribunal fee, in July 1987, was playing non-League football for Paget Rangers in the Midland Combination league, before accepting a successful trial period at the Dell. It was a commanding central defensive performance against lan Rush, for the Saints versus Liverpool, that first brought him to the attention of Lou Macari.

### **ROSS MacLAREN**


Ross joined Swindon Town on a conditional transfer fee, decided by a Football League tribunal at £150,000, in July 1988. Ross entered the Football League from Glasgow Rangers on a free transfer to Shrewsbury Town. After five seasons with the Gay Meadow club, Ross joined Derby County in July 1985, after a Football League tribunal commission had set the fee at £67,500. In three seasons with the Baseball Ground club, Ross helped the East Midland club to win promotion from the Third Division, to the First Division. Ross was an ever-present during his first two seasons with Derby County.

### STEVE FOLEY

Steve joined Swindon Town in July 1987 for a League tribunal fee of £35,000. The former Sheffield United midfield player had joined the Yorkshire club from Grimsby Town in July 1985. Steve began his career with Liverpool, without making a breakthrough into the Anfield club's League team. His actual League debut came while he was on

loan to Fulham in December 1983. Suspensions dogged his first season with the club.

### LEIGH BARNARD

This hardworking midfield player is one of only three players who were at the County Ground, before Lou Macari arrived to take over the managerial role in July 1986. A free transfer signing from Portsmouth in July 1984. Leigh has played a significant role in the club's successful efforts to regain its Second Division status, after languishing in the lower Divisions for 12 seasons. Leigh signed a new one year contract with the club in July 1988.

### CHARLIE HENRY

Charlie, who is due a testimonial match this season, after 10 years service with Swindon Town, originally joined the club as an apprentice, and epitomises all the good factors of our national game. A utility player, who can virtually play in any position, he was the club's leading goalscorer in the season that Swindon Town won the Fourth Division championship, with a record number of points — 102 in 1985-86. Charlie signed a new one-year contract with the club in July 1988.

### ALAN McLOUGHLIN

The former Manchester United apprentice moved south to join Swindon Town on a free transfer in August 1986. Another of the players on the Town books who can be rightly be described as a utility player. Alan, who has spent two loan spells with Torquay United, signed a new two year contract with the County Ground club in May 1988. Alan was a member of Manchester United's Central League team during Lou Macari's playing career at Old Trafford, and played alongside the former Scotland international in the latter days of his career.

### PAUL BODIN

Paul was signed from Newport County in March 1988 for a fee-of £25,000. Amazingly he had only been with the Somerton Park club for four weeks following his signing from Bath City. The former Cardiff City midfield player must have been relieved to have another opportunity to build a career in League soccer, for Newport County were destined to leave the Football League at the completion of last season. Paul will be hoping to establish a regular position, in the Town's midfield section this season.

### PETER COYN

The former Manchester United apprentice was Lou Macari's first ever signing for Swindon Town, when he took over as manager in July 1984. The former England Schoolboy international, who was outstanding at this level, never matured to the level expected of him, and despite a short period at Old Trafford, and several seasons with Crewe Alexandra, he twice drifted into non-League soccer between spells with these two Football League clubs. Peter cost Swindon Town £5,000, when they signed him from non-League Hyde United. The former 'wonder boy' of English schoolboy soccer played the best football of his career as Swindon Town swept from Fourth Division to Second in the space of two seasons.

### BOBBY BARNES

Bobby joined Swindon Town from Aldershot for £50,000 in an exchange deal that took midfield player. Steve Berry to the Recreation Ground in October 1987. Bob was an instant hit with Swindon Town fans, with some dazzling displays. The former West Ham United apprentice scored 11 goals last season, to help the Wiltshire Club attain a comfortable mid-table position on their return to the Second Division.

### **DUNCAN SHEARER**

Duncan was the subject of a £250,000 transfer deal during June, that was a record for both Huddersfield Town and Swindon Town. He had been a target for Town boss. Lou Macari, when he was with Chelsea before moving north to Huddersfield. The free-scoring striker would appear to be an ideal replacement for Northern Ireland international striker. Jimmy Quinn, who moved to Leicester City in June, on a freedom of contract move.

### STEVE WHITE

Steve must represent one of the best transfer signings in the history of the club. Since he was signed from Bristol Rovers in-July 1986, he has scored 35 goals, in 61 full first team appearances. The former Charlton Athletic and Luton Town striker, had no hesitation in renewing his links with Swindon Town in the summer after his contract had expired. Steve, who was once the subject of a six-figure transfer fee between Bristol Rovers and Luton Town, in his first spell with Rovers, signed a new three-year contract in June 1988.





Our 0-8 defeat at Coventry on February 6th is as bad a beating as the club has ever suffered.

This 1931-32 season is the only one (so far!) in which we have remained unbeaten at home for the entire League programme. Two grand club servants were awarded a Benefit against a British Army XI on April 27th. Billy 'Rubber' Turner, who had begun as an inside forward but was now operating at half wing, and flying, goal-getting left winger George Clarke helped Palace to a 3-1 win in front of a crowd variously estimated between three and five thousand.



Earlier this week my postbag included a letter from Simon Higgins of Pound Hill, Crawley. Simon was interested to know the procedure for bidding for and buying new players for the club.

Obviously the club chairman allows the manager a budget for the different departments within the playing side of the club. The purchasing of players is determined by what is needed at any given time and how much cash is to be made available to fill the need. Having decided upon the need to purchase we find out: Who is available? - Is he under contract? - Is he in dispute with his club? - Is he on the transfer list? - Would a suitable offer tempt his club to sell?

We travel many miles to watch a player taking part in different games both home and away to try to assess his character. It is essential that we are as sure as possible that a new man is better than we already have and we must be convinced that he will improve the team.

Having finally decided who our man is, there are very definite rules governing the way we act. If we require to bid for a player who is under contract with his present club we can only enquire with the manager concerned and if the answer is 'no' then any proposed deal is a non-starter and must under no circumstances be made known to the press, the player or the public.

If the answer is 'yes' and a fee is agreed, permission is then granted for us to talk to the player concerned about personal terms which include wages etc.

If the new signing already lives in the south, the housing problem is not as great as for a player moving down from the north. Help with moving and purchasing property is part of the personal terms negotiated in certain cases. It has been stated by Steve many times that property prices in the south east stop many talented and top class players from joining such clubs as Crystal Palace.

Once signed and the initial travelling and stopping over period has passed it is surprising to see just how quickly professional footballers settle down into their new environment and show the form and type of play that encouraged us to buy them in the first place.

Now and again there are exceptions to the rule and players find that they cannot settle. In these cases a further move, this time away from Palace, is the only option.

I hope that Simon's query is now satisfactorily answered and I thank him for his letter. Please keep the letters coming in.

CHELSEA went top of the division after defeating PALACE at Stamford Bridge in front of 24,184, the division highest crowd of the day. Tony Dorigo's 42nd minute free-kick was the difference between the two sides, as despite much possession the visitors came away with nothing to show for their efforts.

'The Blues' went top as WEST BROM went down 2-0 at third-placed WATFORD. 'The Hornets' went ahead on 31 minutes through Rick Holden and Garry Thompson scored his first for the club with 14 minutes remaining against one of his former sides.

MANCHESTER CITY kept up the pressure with a victory at local rivals OLDHAM. Gary Megson celebrated his £250,000 move from Sheffield Wednesday with a debut goal, the only one of the game after 27 minutes play. Joe Royle's side now slip to fourth from bottom.

BLACKBURN went fifth drawing 1-1 at Gay Meadow against SHREWSBURY. Glaswegian Vic Kasole put the home side ahead with 10 minutes left on the watch, only for Ronnie Hildersley to level two minutes later.
