

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
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RARITY

The recent appointment of former Hull City Manager Brian Horton, who was previously assistant to the deposed Mark Lawrenson, will hopefully revitalise the Manor Ground Club who were relegated from the First Division at the end of last season.

The almost inevitable departures of players of the calibre of **Dean Saunders** and **Trevor Hibberd** left a void in the playing strength of United, one that will take a time to fill although a few more results similar to last weeks 3-2 win against **Leeds United** will revitalise

spirits in the United camp. It is the away form of the team from the City of spires that we are primarily concerned with.

Oxford have found life on their return to the Second Division difficult and their only successes have been achieved with a fine 2-1 win at Ipswich last October when goals from Jimmy Phillips and Martin Foyle surprised the Portman Road Club. The only other success that United have experienced was the 5-1 trouncing of struggling Walsall at Fellows Park on Boxing Day. Four goal Richard Hill and one from Martin Foyle sunk the "Saddlers" and increased the inevitable relegation they appear to be facing in May.

The season began with promise when United drew 1-1 with Leeds United on the opening day of the season, a Martin Foyle goal earning a point at Elland Road. They followed that promising result with another 1-1 draw at Chelsea, substitute David Leeworthy scoring at Stamford Bridge Successive defeats at Oldham Athletic 0-3, A.F.C. Bournemouth 1-2, and Portsmouth

1-2 with only **David Bardsley's** goals at **Dean Court** and **Fratton Park** to show for their efforts meant a bleak autumn, apart from the Ipswich result, for United.

The poor away form continued following the win at Ipswich Town with a single goal defeat at Crystal Palace. This was Brian Horton's first match in charge following the sudden departure of Mark Lawrenson after the sale of star striker Dean Saunders to Derby County for a £1 million fee.

Amazingly Oxford United suffered their fifth single goal defeat of their League campaign in away matches when they lost 1-2 at Manchester City. The lone goalscorer at Maine Road was Richard Hill

Full back **David Bardsley** scored against his former Club **Watford** in a **1-1** draw at **Vicarage Road**. There was no upsurge in form for in their next away match United lost by a **single** goal at **Stoke City**.

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
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

Wembley in that competition and if past results are a guide they could well be on their way in this year's FA Cup as well.


In the Third Round of the FA Cup, West Ham were paired against Arsenal with the eventual winner then drawn away at Swindon.

The sequence started in 1930 with Arsenal winning a Quarter Final Tie between the two Clubs and then winning the troophy.

1946 was an exception, but then in 1945 West Ham won a Quarter Final Tie against Arsenal 2-0 and went on the beat Fulham in the Final.

Five years later the two sides met in the Final at Wembley. West Ham, then a Second Division side, running out 1-0 victors thanks to a headed goal from Trevor Brooking.

The sequence continues when you then compare previous encounters between West Ham and Swindon.

The Clubs have met on four previous occasions in the competition with honours presently shared at two victories a piece

West Ham lost out to the Wiltshire Club in both 1912 and 1967. But in 1964 they won a Fifth Round home Tie 3-1 and 11 years later won a Fourth Round replay here at the County Ground 2-1 and on both those occasions the Hammers were to go all the way to Wembley and finish as the eventual victors.

They beat Preston 3-2 in a cracking final in 1964 and in 1975 won an all-London Final against Fulham 2-0.

Those two victories meant automatic entry into the European Cup Winners Cup and on both occasions the Hammers were to distinguish themselves in the Euro competition carrying the English flag.

In front of a packed Wembley in May 1965 they defeated Munich 1860 2-0, both goals being scored by Les Sealy to lift their first European trophy. But 11 years later they just failed to emulate that feat again losing in the Final 4-2 to Anderleeht in Brussels' Heysel Stadium.

Formed in 1895 as the Thomas Ironworks FC, hence the design of the Club badge, the Club turned professional five years later and became known as West Ham United.

They were elected to Division 2 of the Football League in 1919 and since have always been members of either of the top two divisions.

They have won the Second Division title on two occasions but never the First. The Hammers best season in the top flight was a third placing in the 1965/86 season behind the Merseyside giants Liverpool and Everton.

MEET THE MANAGER AND PLAYERS

John Lyall (Manager). Born in liford, he is the longest serving Manager in the Football League Only the fourth Manager at West Hamsince the war, succeeding Ron Oreenwood to the post in August

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1974. He had previously been the Assistant since 1971. John joined West Ham as a youngster and between 1959 and 1962 made 33 League appearances. A full-back, he was capped by England Youths, but his playing career was cut short by injury and consequently turned to the coaching side instead at Upton Park.

Allen McKnight (Goalkeeper). Born in Antrim, the Irishman celebrated his 28th birthday yesterday. Signed for £250,000 from Celtic during the summer, for whom he made 12 League appearances last season. The previous year was loaned out by Celtic to Albion Rovers and made his Scottish League debut on August 16 1986 for Albion against Stenhousemuir. Although unable to command a regular place at Celtic he won six caps for Northern Ireland last year.

Ray Stewart (Defender). Born in Perth, Scotland, he was signed by Dundee United from Errol Rovers. Made 44 League appearances before transferring south from Dundee to West Ham in 1979 for £430,000. A former Scotland Schoolboy, Youth and Unider-21 International he has won ten senior caps. One of the games most successful penalty-takers, the 29-year-old had made 334 League appearances for the Hammers prior to the start of this season.

Julian Dicks (Defender). Although Bristolian, the 20-year-old began his footballing career as an apprentice at Birmingham City. Went on to make 89 League appearances for the Midlands Club before signing for West Ham shortly before last March's transfer deadline. His impressive form in the final eight games for the Hammers last season earned him a place in the England Under-21 summer touring party.

Steve Potts (Defender). American born defender who signed for West Ham as an apprentice. Made his League debut against QPR as a 17-year-old in January 1985. A former England Youth International he had made 18 League appearances to the beginning of this season.

Alvin Martin (Defender). Bootle-born centre half and Club Captain. He has made limited appearances for the first team over the last two seasons due to serious toe and foot injuries which required surgery. A one-Club man, he joined West Ham as an apprentice in 1974 and has since made more than 350 appearances for the Club. The 30-year-old has won 17 caps for England.

Alan Devonshire (Midfield). Former England International midfielder (eight caps) whose career has been plagued by injury. Signed from non-League side Southall for a bargain £4,000 in September 1976, he is approaching 350 League games for the Club. That figure would be higher but for thigh and achilles tendon injuries which forced himn to miss the majority of the last two seasons. Born Park Royal. Ace 32.

Liam Brady (Midfield). Republic of Ireland International midfielder (67 caps). Began his career with Arsenal and spent six and a half years in Italian football with Juventus, Sampdoria, Inter Mila and Ascoll before he returned to this country with West Ham for £100,000 in March 1987. Made his comeback for the first team in October after a seven month lay-off – in which he missed the European Championships with Eire in June – after he sustained damaged knee ligaments in a League game at Derby County in February. Born Dublin, the 32-year-old had made 235 League appearances for Arsenal, 189 in Italy and 34 for West Eam prior to the start of the 1988/89 season.

Paul Ince (Midfield). Born in Iliord, the 22-year-old began the season as a sweeper for the match against Wimbledon to ease some of West Ham's defensive problems after than had conceded seven goals in their opening two matches. A former YTS trainee, he graduated through the Youth team to gain First Division status. He has recently completed 50 League appearances for the Club. Hit the national headlines by scoring twice in the recent 4-1 Littlewoods Cup win over Liverpool.

Kevin Keen (Midfield). Former England Youth International midfielder who began his career with West Ham as an apprentice. Made his debut for the Club against Liverpool in September 1986 and is now approaching 50 League appearances for the Club.

Alan Dickens (Midfield). Plaistow-born midfielder who recovered from knee surgery at the start of last season. He went on to make 28 League appearances for the Club, the majority of which were spent as an emergency striker in partnership with Tony Cottee following the departure of Frank McAvennie. A former apprentice the 24-year-old has made more than 150 League appearances for the Club and is an England Under-21 International.

David Kelly (Forward). Republic of Ireland Interriational striker who made a sensational debut by scoring a hat-trick against Israel. Now the holder of three caps. He was signed for £800,000 by West Ham from Walsall during the summer, despite opposition from Tottenham Hotspur, Liverpool and West German giants Mayern Munick. The 22-year-old scored 30 goals in Walsall's successful promotion to the Second Division last season – including seven in the play-offs – and was selected for the Republic of Ireland squad for the European Championship Finals in West Germany, although he did not make an appearance. Born in Alvechurch, he played for the local side before joining Walsall.

Leroy Rosenoir (Forward). He ended John Lyall's five-month search for a striker, after the departure of Frank McAvennie to Celtic, when he signed from Fulham last April for £325,000. Scored five goals in nine games, which were a vital factor in West Ham's successful fight against relegation. He has also played for Fulham (twice), where he began his career, and QPR. A Londoner, the 24-year-old scored the only goal a fortnight ago that knocked out Arsenal in the third round F.A. Cup replay.

Gary Strodder (Defender).Born in Leeds, he began as an apprentice at Lincoln City. Scored six goals in 132 League appearances for the Red Imps before joining the Hammers. Up to the start of the 1988/89 season had made 42 League appearances for West Ham.

Tony Gale (Defender). The central defender began his careeer with Fulham, where he made 277 League appearances before joining West Ham for a £150,000 tribunal fee in the summer of 1984. Was restricted to just 20 appearances last season through an achilles tendon injury. A former England Under-21 International.

Mark Ward (Midfield). Prescot-born 5ft 5in midfielder who was released by Everton as an apprentice Moved into non-League football with Northwich Victoria and also worked in a bakery before he joined Oldham Athletic in June 1983. Signed for West Ham in August 1986 for £250,000 and has made 131 League appearances for the Club.

Paul Hinton (Defender). Twenty nine year old central defender who began his career as a striker, winning three England schoolboy caps in that position. Born in Oldham, he started his career with Bury in 1978. Made more than 150 appearances for the Club before joining West Ham for £100,000 in February 1984.

George Parris (Utility). Versatile player who can operate equally effectively in midfield or at full back. He recently deputised for the regular left back Julian Dick, who was suspended. The 24-year-old missed three months of last season after he broke a leg in a League match against Luton Town in January but recovered in time to play a part in West Ham's successful fight against relegation. Born in liford has made over 100 first team appearances for the Hammers.



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
A TRIBUTE TO Mr. W. CASTLE

Former Director, Chairman and President of Swindon Town by Town Directors Mr. R. Mattick and Mr. C. Green

Nowadays, it is something of a fashion for football club Chairmen to obtain office by buying a Club rather as you or I might buy a new car. They attend first team matches, sometimes, and bask in the reflected glory of their Club's success. Fortunately, this has never been the case at Swindon. Looking at old Minute Books mentioning Trowbridge, Calne, Devizes and Great Yarmouth (splendid little Clubs, but hardly the glamour grounds of football), it is notable how often the name W. Castle, a Director for 23 years, appears alongside such names as Director in Charge of the Swindon side whether for a match at First, Reserve, Youth or 'A' team level. As Director and Chairman, Wilf Castle was always fully involved with the Club at all levels. I well remember my last conversation with him when he reminisced over his visit to Belgium with a Swindon Under-21 side which eventually brought back the Tournament trophy. "There was often a bit of mischief" he said, his eyes twinkling and looking at the end of his walking stick, as though he remembered applying it gently to the posterior of some miscreant, "but they were all good lads and loved their football." So did Wilf Castle!

He joined the Swindon Board in 1945. Of no time than then was it true to say it was a job which earned 'more kicks than halfpennies'. Unlike most Clubs, which continued to play during the War, Swindon's ground had been taken over by the War Department and turned into a Prisoner of War Camp. Only two players of the pre-war team played in the post-war side and a huge rebuilding job was needed both on the pitch, when money was short, and off it, where building restrictions handicapped ground restoration. It was not a question of success but of survival.

That the Club did survive was due to the hard work of men like Wilf Castle and his fellow Board members of the time who often used their very homes to



It was typical of Wilf Castle that he would use an event designed to honour him, to honour others.

His eighteen year period of office between 1950 and 1968 was one of tremendous change in football. When it began, England had just played in their first World Cup, when it ended they were reigning World champions. It was a period which would see floodlights introduced and the maximum age abolished. At Swindon, as well, the period was one of enormous change. The early years were not easy. In 1955–56 season the Club had to apply for re-election and between 1950 and 1957 never finished higher than sixteenth in the table. However, in the year when Division Three North and Division Three South were merged to make Divisions Three and Four Swindon jumped up to Fourth place and secured a base from which to progress. Mr. Castle's leadership helped to see a New Stand (now called the Old Stand) erected, after it had been purchased from the Aldershot Tatoo Ground. It was a tribute to him that the Club managed to obtain a stand which gave such a marvellous view of the game at such a low cost.

Perhaps of more importance was the faith he showed in Bert Head. Realising the Club's lack of finance, he refused to allow initial lack of success to lead to the Manager's dismissal, establishing a Club hostel for young players, and supporting him while he developed the Youth policy which was to produce the crop of young players which eventually, in the 1962–63 season, won the Club promotion to the Second Division for the first time. The Club used 22 players that promotion season, only four of them cost fees and the total value of those was £6,350. It must have been a proud moment for Wilf Castle when he became the first Swindon Chairman to take a seat as full member of the League after Swindon reached Division Two for the first time.

Harder times lay ahead, but Wilf Castle confronted them with the same cheerful optimism he had shown when fortune smiled on the Club. After the Club's relegation in 1965 one Director, Mr. Davies, lost his seat, but still had words of praise for his Chairman saying of him "He is the finest man I know . . . straight, honest and above board with everyone." Increasing age and the effect the strain of office was beginning to have on his health, led him to decide to stand down in 1968. It was a mark of the esteem in which he was held at the Club that the Board immediately created him President. When this decision was announced to the Shareholders meeting it brought a spontaneous ovation which left Wilf "too full up to say much." His feelings were much the same when the Board had presented a special Chair inscribed with his name in tribute to his service and which remains the Chairman's seat to this day.

In a remarkably prophetic speech, Wilf Castle's successor as Chairman, Eric Lane paid tribute, describing Wilf as straight, fair-minded, and, above all, anxious to see the other man's point of view.

"As a Chairman he has always conducted the board with skill, diplomacy and patience. I am sorry he is retiring because I think we now have a team capable of getting promotion this season."

Had he known that in the following season, Swindon would not only gain promotion but win the League Cup, I doubt it would have altered his decision to pass on the baton as it were, for he cared more for the success of Swindon Town than personal acclaim. It is good to think that fate spared him to enjoy twenty years of retirement with his wife and family and to see his beloved Swindon Town return to Division Two yet again. Resolute and loyal in adversity, modest and generous in victory, the memory of Wilf Castle should be an inspiration to us all.

I am a season ticket holder at Swindon Town F.C. and sit in the yellow section of the North Stand and would like to make the following comments and observations regarding the emergency fire evacuation that took place on Saturday 19th Jamary. Discussion steps are situated in front of my seating position but when we stood up we were told by the Stewards to turn right which meant that we had to walk across the back of the Directors/Rendezvous Box enclosure towards the next flight of Fire steps. This procedure took me exactly 10 minutes to reach the bottom of the Fire steps between the main stand and running track, and I might add there were a lot of people behind me so I think the reported 9½ minutes to clear the stand was widely inaccurate. There was also a problem when we reached the area at the bottom of the Fire steps because the advertising hoarding was still in place and very little gaps are left to enable people to get through onto the pitch and this caused quite a snarl up. I would suggest that 'God forbid' in the case of a real emergency a Steward should be designated to this area and the responsibility of removing some or all of these obstructions.

I hope you accept these comments in the manner in which they are meant and may I take this opportunity of praising you and the Football Club for having the foresight to carry out the practice.

Dear Sir.

The decision of Swindon Town F.C. to triple the amount of West Ham supporters on Saturday 28th January, gives us, the Drakes Roundabout area residents, grave cause for concern and anxiety as the greater majority of these will approach the ground from the M4, see the ground lights, and attempt as usual to park in this area.

As clearly shown by the visit of the comparatively far fewer numbers from Portsmouth on 10th January, when NOT one (repeat, NOT one) Officer or Park Ranger was placed in or patrolled this area to prevent blocked drives, illegal grass parking and consequential environmental damage, parking on children's play areas, etc., whilst groups of four or more Officers stood rooted to the same spot for over 2 hours within 100 yards of the ground. doing absolutely nothing except, presumably, acting as a 'deterrant' factor, these numbers fill us with apprehension. Patrolling for the benefit and protection of all within the ground's catchment area was non-existent, to the extent that as far as we are can ascertain not one ticket was issued to the many offenders. The current Senior Police Management attitude appears to many residents to be 'protect the Club - to hell with everybody else'

We are full aware that the decision will not be reversed, so we call on the Police to urgently review their strategy for the 28th and all subsequent major crowd games and positively suggest (a) full Police patrolling of Walcot and Park North areas adjacent to Queens Drive; (b) specific areas be opened up for visitor parking, i.e. Drakes Way playing fields, school playgrounds, etc; and (c) no hesitation in charging offenders (in place of verbal warnings currently used).

We intend to monitor, record and photograph for possible future action on this continued problem.

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

ONE OF A FEW

I shall probably be one of the few players in today's F.A. Cup tie to have been not only lucky enough to have played at Wembley, but also to have appeared in an F.A. Cup Final.

That is a memory that can never be taken away and few players are lucky enough to appear in an F.A. Cup winning team like I have My lucky day came when, at 19 years of age. I appeared for Ipswich Town in their 1-0 win against Arsenal in the 1978 F.A. Cup Final. Some of you may recall that Roger Osborne scored the winning goal. We could have won 5-1 that day with the chances we had, we were worth that scoreline.

SLEEPLESS NIGHTS

There was no real build-up to my selection in that Ipswich team. It was the Thursday before the big day before I knew that I was playing. I was told that I was playing in our pre-match stay at Bisham Abbey.

I have to admit that I then spent two sleepless nights thinking about the match to come. Most players admit that they cannot remember much of the day or the game. For me it was different. I can recall the day and the match quite clearly in my mind. Perhaps deep down I knew it was going to be a one-off occasion for me and really I knew I was a lucky player to have the chance at so young an age. Strangely it isn't until someone mentions, the Cup-winners medal that I remember I've got it tucked safely away!

PLENTY OF COMPETITION AT PORTMAN ROAD

Despite the fact that I appeared in the Ipswich Cup winning line-up, I knew there would be no real future for me with the Club. There were plenty of emerging players at Portman Road.

Alan Brazil was one of those players and it was quite easy in those days to find yourself pushed out of contention for a first team place. There always appeared to be four or five players in line for the position that I was seeking. Injury did not help my situation and I soon began to realise it was time to move on.

NOTHING TO PROVE AT VILLA PARK

Eventually I joined Aston Villa for a £300,000 fee and although I was bought to replace the departed Andy Gray there was no real pressure for me to prove

myself despite Andy's £1.2 million price tag.

I reasoned that my fee was just a quarter what Welves were having to pay Aston Villa. For that money they must have thought they were signing a player who was as quarter as good!

VILLA ON TOP

When I reflect on my time at Villa Park it can appear that I may have wasted my time with the Club. When I think deeper I realise that I was part of Aston Villa's most prestigious period.

Villa had not had any success for a long time and then suddenly everything came to fruition for them. European success was achieved by the high standard of player available at Villa Park. On a personal note again I found some stiff competition for the strikers role, for both Peter Withe and Gary Shaw were top class players. It was success all the way at Villa Park in those days for they also captured the First Division Championship.

THOUGHTS ON BOBBY ROBSON

I am often asked about my thoughts on England Manager Bobby Robson. In my time at Portman Road he was a young Manager who was guiding a Club to their first European Cup. The young players at Ipswich were of an extremely high standard.

Bobby Robson's success at Ipswich was well deserved and I will always be grateful for the fact that he had faith in me as a young player. Bobby Robson bred good habits. I find it nauseating to see a good man pilloried by certain sections of the tabloid press. He does not deserve that. Bobby has visibly aged since accepting the England Managers position.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATION Several players have likened Swindon Town to my first Club Ipswich, mainly

because they are isolated country towns. It is suggested that this Club could achieve the same level of success. I have to disagree.

In the days of Ipswich Town's success money was more readily available and although their success came mainly due to a Youth policy, the financial climate was different. It is more difficult today, overall a great deal of finance is required to not only obtain First Division football but also to sustain it.

FLIRTING WITH RELEGATION

I have had a varied career and I probably spent too long with one or two Clubs who were always flirting with relegation. Birmingham City was such a Club, while Shrewsbury Town have to struggle for most of the time.

They have struggled more since 'Chic' Bates departure and have a hard battle to stay up this season.

STICKING WITH THE STYLE

Enough of League prospects. Today's game is all about the Cup and our best chance against West Ham United is to stick to our playing method.

They have some fine players and they are not only the easily recognised stars like Liam Brady and Alan Devonshire, also players such as Alan Dickens can play with style. A lot to be admired about West Ham, but today we have to set about disrupting their natural flowing style and impress our way of playing on their defence. Enjoy the match and please back us all the way.



The Eire International midfield player was back at Wembley a year later when Arsenal defeated Manchester United 3-2. Appearing in the Old Trafford line-up was Town boss Lou Macari.

The following year West Ham United defeated Arsenal in the 1980 Cup Final Liam Brady completed a hat-trick of Cup Final appearances appearing in the Highbury Club's 1-0 defeat. For the 'Hammers' there are still four players who can claim present day allegiance. They are Ray Stewart, Phil Parkes, Billy Bonds and Alan Devonshire Incidentally West Ham United were the last Second Division Club to win the F.A. Cup with their 1980 triumph.

I'VE BEEN HERE BEFORE!

Did you know that when John Sissons played for West Ham United against Preston North End in the 1964 F.A. Cup Final at the age of 18 years and 214 days it was his fourth appearance at Wembley? Once for England schoolboys and twice for England at Youth team level.

IN THE CHARTS

The song adopted by West Ham United followers Tm Forever Blowing Bubbles' managed to reach the charts when West Ham United appeared in the 1975 F.A. Cup Final against Fulham.

BUSY KEN

Current Plymouth Argyle Manager Ken Brown was a former player with West Ham United and even when he left the Club he retained his links with the Hammers'. At one time he played for Torquay United and was also working for the Upton Park Club's pools promotion office!

VIC LIKED LEEDS UNITED

Former West Ham United record goalscorer Vic Watson certainly had a liking for Leeds United! During the 1929-30 season, Vic scored nine of ten goals in two League matches and an F.A. Cup match. He scored four in the Cup-tie and also a hat-trick in the home League match.

WHO ARE THEY? NEVER HEARD OF THEM!

West Ham United have been showing no respect for reputations in Cup matches this season. In the Littlewoods Cup they smashed five goals past England International Peter Shilton when they defeated Derby County 5-0. In the next round they crushed mighty Liverpool 4-1.

ALMOST CUSTOMARY

During the past five seasons. West Ham United have not been eliminated from the F.A. Cup before the fifth round. They have won the F.A. Cup three times, in 1964, 1975 and 1980.

GOAL, GOAL, GOAL, GOAL,

If goals are an advert for any Club then West Ham United certainly know how to hit the high spots. Amazingly they have three times shared ten goals in a match All three were First Division encounters, on January 3rd 1931, when they drew 5-5 with Aston Villa at home, again on December 10th 1962 in a 5-5 draw away to Newcastle United and on December 17th 1966 when they drew 5-5 at Stamford Bridge against Chelsea.

ALMOST EVER PRESENT

Former West Ham United captain Bobby Moore, who led England to World Cup success in 1966, was absent on only 12 occasions during his entire International career, which lasted from May 20th 1962 to November 14th 1973 and embraced 108 appearances!

OMEN!

Swindon Town have proved a happy omen for the 'Hammers' on the way to two of their three F.A. Cup trophy successes. The London Club defeated the Town during their 1964 and 1975 campaigns!

BRIAN ONE OF EIGHTEEN ...

Only 18 players have scored five goals or more in a First Division Football League post-war match and one of those was West Ham United's Brian Dear, who scored five goals against West Bromwich Albion on March 16th, 1965, at Upton Park

... AND GEOFF

England's World Cup hat-trick hero Geoff Hurst went one better when he scored six goals for West Ham United against Sunderland on October 19th 1968. Geoff became one of four players to score two hat-tricks in one game in post-war League football.

VIC STILL IN FOURTH PLACE

While the late Dixie Dean of Everton, with 349 goals, is the highest aggregate goalscorer for a Football League Club, Vic Watson of West Ham United notched 306 goals between 1920 and 1935. Only George Camsell of Middlesbrough, with 326, and John Atyeo of Bristol City, with 315, scored more for their Clubs!

STILL GOING STRONG

John Lyall is the Football League's longest-serving Manager with one Club. John took over at Upton Park in August 1974 and he has led West Ham United in more than 700 first class matches.

WHAT A RECORD

William Thomas, who supports West Ham United, is 90 years of age! William has been supporting the 'Hammers' since he saw his first game at Upton Park in 1919 against Lincoln City. That was United's first match in the Football League, since then he has missed just one home match! More than 1,300 games over a 69 year period!

John Lyall on West Ham's recent Cup form "Survival in the First Division is our priority Still the Cup games definitely stimulate us, so perhaps the longer

we stay in the competitions the more our League form will benefit."

SECOND FAVOURITES

Following their 2-1 win over Aston Villa in the quarter-finals of the Littlewoods Cup, bookmakers William Hill have made West Ham United second favourites to win the competition at 11/4. Notingham Forest are evens favourites while Bristol City are 14/1.

A THOUSAND!

West Ham United achieved their 1,000th League victory when they defeated London rivals and First Division newcomers Millwall 1-0 on December 3rd. Paul Ince scoring the vital goal.

IT'S GAME No. 106

West Ham United will be playing their 106th away match in the F.A. Cup today. They have won 26, drawn 27 and lost 52. In the process they have scored 114 goals and conceded 180.


HAMMERS COMPLETE RECORD IN THE F.A. CUP
