OFF TO BISHAM ABBEY


After our 0-0 draw with West Ham United last week we faced another tense match in the replay at Upton Park. The previous week we had spent a few days at Weston-Super-Mare.

RE-ADJUSTMENT NEEDED!

Although Mark Hughes appears to be rejuvenated at Old Trafford on his return to my old Club, Manchester United, they also could have waited. Lee Chapman at Notts Forest took time to re-settle. My betting is that Glen Hoddle and Clive Allen would also need time to re-adjust to the increased pace they would meet.



WELL DONE FRASER



IS IT JUST THE REFEREE?

Cup holders Wimbledon seem certain to fight for many days to come following their bruising 4th Round performance at Aston Villa. Any admiration for the 'Dons' nofrills approach soon goes when it is accompanied by needless use of the elbow and reckless tackles. My attendnace week in, week out at the County Ground hardly classifies me as a footballing purist, but even I found the 'Dons' methods at Villa Park upsetting as a means of success.

Whilst Bobby Gould publicly frowns on his players misdemeanours, his only action seems to be a careless shrug of the shoulders as if events on the pitch were out of his hands once his 'gang' get out on the pitch. His comments after the Cup-tie seemed to sum up his attitude, suggesting that it is purely the referee's responsibility to curb

violence on the pitch, with Managers having no bearing on the problem. With that sort of remark, Gould rivals the buck-passing of politicians and National team Managers. When results go badly, the buck stops at the Managers office and so it should also be when the side gives an undisciplined, violent perance. Managers need to instil into players that excessive dangerous play helps no one. Our own Steve Foley was very lucky to escape with a booking at Upton Park as he stupidly leapt with his elbows angled towards an opponents face. Quite how inflicting a serious facial injury on a West Ham player can help Swindon Town in a Cup-tie is difficult to imagine. Admitedly my judgement is with the benefit of Sportsnight slow motion, but the incident still happened and an elbow in the face is still dangerous. A rigid guideline to send off any player using this tactic is the only answer.

ADVERSE PUBLICITY

Brighton's Gerry Armstrong however, has his own rather more unique way of helping football's flagging public image. Headbutting a spectator during a game should ensure Armstrong genuine punishment. Apart from the adverse publicity he has attracted, his actions were fairly amazing for any professional sportsman. Are we approaching an era when the fencing at grounds is to protect supporters from players rather than the other way around? Maybe Brian Clough's lead has brought football violence respectability, should Gerry Armstrong offer the unfortunate fan the chance to kiss him too?

The seemingly growing tide of ill-temper and violence in the game is surely enough reason for many to consider a boycott, but fears about identity cards are raising even more panic amongst the players.

UNION CHIEF - GARTH

Union Chairman, Garth Crooks, fears a boycott of Clubs once the scheme is introduced, by fans unwilling to endure the membership card scheme. The Governments thinly veiled strategy to cut football attendances will surely cause many to think twice about attending and therefore attack the livelihood of the players themselves.

OUR ONLY LOCAL DERBY

Oxford United provide us with our only home local derby of the season today, hopefully their supporters will get a better view of the action than we had of this season's 1-1 draw at the Manor behind the towering fence. The atmosphere and passion of our two Cup games should not be forgotten as we take on board the old cliche and concentrate on the League this afternoon!







A DREAM IS OVER

It is no secret that at present we are experiencing a problem scoring goals and the fact that our two leading goal scorers **Duncan**Shearer and Steve White were absent from the two matches was obviously a blow to our chances of making progress.

A settled line-up is what all Managers look to have in their team and when you meet First Division oposition this is a must.

Our players gave their all and nobody can decry their efforts against a fine footballing team. We wish West Ham well in their remaining efforts for the season.

MORE AID FOR SPECTATORS
On Thursday January 26th I travelled to London with our Club
Secretary Dave King for a Football League meeting. There were
several issues that were the focus
for football spectators.

In the morning meeting we were given an insight into the Football Trust's explanation of the division of their funds by the trustees. It was interesting to hear Mr Tiny Wharton describe the grounds of the Football League Clubs as safe as any he had personally experi-

enced. Mr Wharton is a man who has toured the world, in his present capacity and also as a renowned referee.

He explained to the meeting that during 1989 a total of £5 million grant aid would be available. This money is collected from 'Spot the Ball' run weekly by the pools companies Littlewoods, Vernons and Zetters.

Further monies to be made available will be an increase from £1 million to £2 million for the installation or improvement of general toilets in the Football League grounds. The trust has already received 60 proposals to improve facilities.

THE SPORTS MINISTER
The Fooball League meeting was addressed by the Sports Minister,
Colin Moynihan. The Minister was in attendance to answer any

questions or queries made from the various Club Chairmen.

Despite the fact that most people associated with the game are opposed to the National Membership Scheme, it may be more advisable to fight for change from within. I personally feel that by working with the Minister we may be able to make amendments to the Spectators Bill. It is my considered opinion that the intent of the Prime Minister and Government officials will bring a result to their Bill. Football Clubs, by working together



with the Sports Minister and his department, may be able to produce an answer, although not complete or to everyone's satisfaction, but more acceptable to the majority.

A WARM WELCOME TO UNITED

I would like to welcome to the County Ground, this afternoon, our friends and relatively near neighbours from Oxford United. A warm welcome to the Directors, Officials, players and supporters of United.

Oxford United have achieved phenomenal success in the past decade and are an obvious guideline to all Clubs like ourselves. I am sure that the supporters of Oxford United will reflect in years to come on the past decade with pride.

During recent years I feel we can say we have taken considerable steps at Swindon to encourage young supporters. Visits to places like Watford and Crystal Palace remind one that we still have along way to go to reach the ideal. I mention this fact now, as, next season. We have been lucky in recent years to have the sponsorship of Nationwide to provide reduced price seating for Junior Robins and of the Alamo Club which has made us more than welcome in their premises. It would be nice if we could go on to have our own special area for refreshments and enter-

tainment on the style of Crystal Palace and Aston Villa. Such things cost money however, so if any Managing Director reading this feels they would like to help out please get in touch with the Club.

OUR NEXT OPPONENTS

Next Saturday we make our first ever visit to Stamford Bridge to meet Chelsea in a League fixture. We have travelled to Stamford Bridge four times in the F. A. Cup. Two Town players who will be looking toward this historic milestone will be Tommy Jones who was a former apprentice at the Bridge and former Huddersfield Town striker Duncan Shearer who scored one goal in two League appearances in the 1985/86 season for Chelsea.

It would appear that **Chelsea's** return to the **First Division** is imminent and a mere formality. The duo of **Bobby Campbell** and **Ian Porterfield** have galvanised the West London Club into promotion prospects following last season's relegation blue's!

Two defeats in their first three home fixtures against Blackburn Rovers (1-2) and Manchester City (1-3) and a draw against last week's vistors Oxford United (1-1) were but a temporary setback.

Four consecutive home wins against Leicester City (2-1), Walsall (2-0), Plymouth Argyle (5-0) and Brighton and Hove Albion (2-0) were halted when Sunderland drew 1-1 at Stamford Bridge on November 12th. A 2-0 win against visiting Shrewsbury Town, fourteen days later, saw a return to the winning pattern before Portsmouth shared the points in a six goal thriller on December 10th On Boxing Day the London Club scored three goals against Ipswich Town without reply. The top of the table clash with West Bromwich Albion resulted in a predictable 1-1 draw before the highest attendane of the season 25,906 at Stamford Bridge. They defeated London neighbours Crystal Palace 1-0 in their last home League match.

The recent signing of former Wimbledon captain Dave Beasant from Newcastle United for a Club record fee of £750,000 highlights the intent of Chelsea to return to the First Division at the first attempt.

The attacking trio of **Kerry Dixon, Kevin Wilson** and **Gordon Davie** is as lethal as any
strike force in the Second Division and they
will keep the Town defence at full strength
with their pace and constant interchanging

of positions.

Graham Roberts has added steel to the heart of the defence since his arrival from Glasgow Rangers last summer. His former Ibrox team mate Peter Nicholas has added the same dimension to the midfield section. Former Aston Villa full back Tony Dorigo has been reputed to have been in International form this season and many pundits claim that the Australian born defender should be high on the list of England Manager Bobby Robson for his European and World Cup plans.

Darren Wood, a target for the Cheisea boo-boys, recently departed for Sheffield Wednesday in a £450,000 transfer deal, while Scottish defender Joe Mclaughlin appears to have settled his differences with the Club.

It will be an interesting visit for Town boss Lou Macari who agreed to join the Blues coaching staff last summer, then changed his mind and remained at the County Ground It was his success here at Swindon Town that made him the target for several Clubs Our meeting with Chelsea at the County Ground last October saw Chelsea's Kerry Dixon score in the 1-1 draw.






This decade has seen today's visitors, Oxford United, enjoying their finest seasons in their brief Football League history.

Two League titles have been captured, First Division status gained for the first time and in 1986 they lifted the Milk Cup.

The Club were formed in 1893 as Headington United and turned professional in 1949. They became known as Oxford United in 1960.


Two years later, after a highly successful time in the Southern League, Oxford were elected to Division 4 in place of Accrington Stanley. And within six seasons

the U's had reached the Second Division.

They were promoted from Division 4 after finishing fourth in 1965 and three years later captured their first title, the Division 3 crown, finishing one point clear of runners-up Bury.

They were relegated back to the Third in 1976 after eight season in Division 2 and not too long afterwards hit upon hard times financially.

The intervention of publishing tycoon Robert Maxwell proved to be the turning point in the Club's fortunes on the field. However, off it Maxwell beacame engaged

in many heated battles with the local Council as he tried to negotiate for the Club to move to larger premises.

He failed to reach agreement with them and eventually handed over the Chairmanship to his son and switched his allegancies to Derby County.

The upsurge in the Oxford's fortunes began in the 83/84 season and within two seasons they had leapt from the Third Division into the First. Under the leadership of Jim Smith they ran away with the Third title in 1984 finishing eight points clear of runners-up Wimbledon and a further four in front of Sheffield United. Twelve months later the Oxford fans were celebrating again as the Club gained a place in the top flight for the first time, finishing two points clear of Birmingham at the top of the Second Division tree.

The fairy tale continued when a fantastic three seasons in a row were completed at Wembley in April 1986 in front of a crowd of 90,396. Oxford thrashed Queen's Park Rangers 3-0 to win the Milk Cup, with goals from Trevor Hebberd, Ray Houghton and Jeremy Charles.

Three years on, only two members of that Cup winning side, goalkeeper Alan Judge and midfielder Les Phillips, are expected to take their places in the Oxford side. Two players of note, Houghton and John Aldridge having transfered to Liverpool for large fees.

Oxford's brief stay in Division One – three seasons – came to an end at the end of last season. Even the appointment of former Liverpool player Mark Lawrenson as Manager in March 1988 failed to stave off relegation.

Lawrenson's reign as the boss at the Manor was to be a short-lived affair though. Following the transfer of striker Dean Suanders for £1 million to Derby, his outburst over the deal led to his dismissal and assistant Brian Horton stepped up to take charge.


MEET THE MANAGER AND PLAYERS

Brian Horton (Manager). Formerly Assistant Manager at the Manor, he succeeded Mark Lawrenson in October last year. Made over 600 League appearances during his spells at Port Vale, Brighton, Luton and Hull City.

David Bardsley (Midfield). Born in Manchester, he began his League career as an apprentice at Blackpool. Made 45 League appearances before joining Watford for £150,000. Whilst at Blackpool he was capped at England Youth level. Signed for Oxford in September 1987 for £265,000 (a Club record) in a deal which also bought Richard Hill to the Manor.

Mike Ford (Utility). Born in Bristol, he joined Oxford United in the summer of 1988 for £150,000 from Cardiff City. A utility player he was signed from non-League Devizes Town by Cardiff in 1985 and was a regular in the team until joining United. Played 162 times for Cardiff scoring 13 times.

Martin Foyle (Striker). Born in Salisbury, the 25 year-old free scoring forward started his career at Southampton. But with first team chances limited he joined Aldershot for a small fee. Oxford signed him from the Shots just before transfer dealine day in 1987 for £140,000. Last season in his first full season for the Club he scored ten times in 33 First Division games.



Martin Foyle

Colin Greenall (Defender). Born in Billinge the central defender started his career at Blackpool where he played with current team-mate David Bardsley. He joined Gillingham for £40,000 in September 1986 and after some solid displays for them signed for Oxford United in February 1988 for a fee of £235,000. To the beginning of this season, the 25 year-old had made a total of 257 League appearances for Blackpool, Gillingham and Oxford.

Philip Heath (Forward). Began his career with his home town Club – Stoke City. He made his League debut as substitute versus

Coventry on 7.5.83. He went on to make a total of 166 appearances – 19 goals for Stoke before joining Oxford in June 1988 for £80,000.

Richard Hill (Forward). Born in Hinckley. After a spell at Leicester City and at non-League Nuneaton he made his League debut for Northampton Town. Scored 46 League goals in a very successful two season stay there before joining Watford for £235,000. But after only a very brief time at Vicarage Road signed for Oxford for the same fee in September 1987.

Alan Judge (Goalkeeper). A Londoner he started his career with Luton Town and from there, joined Reading on a free transfer. Signed for Oxford in 1985 and was a member of the 1986 Milk Cup winning team. Has also spent short periods on loan at both Lincoln and Cardiff

Mickey Lewis (Defender). Born in Birmingham, his first League Club was West Bromwich Albion for whom he made 33 appearances before joining Derby County for £25,000. The former England Youth player played a further 49 times for the Rams before signing for United in the summer of 1988 as part of the deal which took Trevor Hebberd to Derby.

Robbie Mustoe (Midfiled). Born locally he has progressed through the Youth and Reserve teams. Made his first team debut in November 1986.

Les Phillips (Midfield). A Londoner, the competitive player made his League bow for Birmingham City and joined Oxford for £5,000 in 1984. He was not a regular player until the 1985/86 season when he was a member of the Milk Cup winning team. Has a good goal scoring record in the Littlewoods Cup, scoring nearly 50% of his goals in that tournament.

Jon Purdie (Forward). Born in Corby, he joined Oxford on a free transfer from Wolverhampton in July last year. He made his debut for Wolves on the opening day of

the 1985/86 season and was a regular player for the next two seasons. Last season his appearances were limited and he went on loan to Cambridge for two months.

Gary Shelton (Midfield). Born in Nottingham, 30 year-old Gary started his career with Walsall in 1976 before joining Aston Villa. Whilst with Villa he had a loan spell at Notts County but became a first team regular after joining Sheffield Wednesday in a £50,000 deal. He spent 8 years at Hillsborough before joining Oxford for £150,000 at the start of last season.

Neil Slatter (Defender). Born in Cardiff Neil is a current Welsh International. The defender started his career at Bristol Rovers making his debut in 1981. Whilst at Bristol, earned Welsh Youth caps and six U-21 caps. He joined Oxford for £70,000 in the summer of 1985 but in each of his three full seasons at the Manor he has picked up an injury wich has hindered his progress. Despite missing 25 weeks out with injury won his 17th full Welsh cap last summer.

Garry Smart (Defender). Signed from Wokingham Town in the summer of 1988. Made his debut at Bournemouth in September 1988.

Jimmy Phillips (Defender). Signed from Glasgow Rangers in August 1988 for £150,000. Began as an apprentice at his local Club Bolton Wanderers and became Graeme Souness' first signing at Glasgow Rangers. He has experience of European Competition.

Paul Simpson (Forward). Born in Carlisle, the 22 year-old began as an apprentice at Manchester City. After making over 100 League appearances for City he became Manager Brian Horton's first signing joining Oxford in November last year for £200,000. He is a former England Under-21 International.

AN EXPERIENCE

It was a great experience for me to be included in our F.A. Cup line-up against West Ham United. It is no secret that I have been trying desperately to make the breakthrough into the first team on a regular basis.

My opportunities have been limited here at the County Ground but this season I feel that I have made considerable progress.

ALAN DEVONSHIRE - MY TARGET

My role in the Cup Tie was to mark Alan Devonshire and go forward in support of the strikers as much as possible.

It became a difficult task because the West Ham player did not do a great deal of chasing back. He mainly relied on his vast experience and there were a couple of times when his know-how exposed me. Actually it is not the first time that I have faced him for we have come in to opposition in Reserve team matches.

DID NOT CREATE ENOUGH

In the game with West Ham at the County Ground we did not create enough opportunities and our hard work came to nothing. In actual fact I think my header in the first half was one of the few rare opportunities and strikes that we made on goal.

if so we might figure in the Fifth Round against Charlton Athletic.

A HIGHER STANDARD

The standard of play in the Second Division is obviously a lot higher than the lower Divisions. Obviously in my loan period with Torquay United you come across the older type of professional and the pace is a lot slower.

Fitness is much higher in the Second Division and this season I have felt that I have become physically stronger. The problems that I experienced with my leg last season have now disappeared. This obviously gives a player a lot more confidence. A strange fact about the life of a fooballer is that you can never take anything for granted, you can be as fit as a fiddle one second and lying in agony the next Anyway, at the moment I am riding on the crest of the wave.

A DIFFERENT STYLE

Our style of play obviously attracts its critics and I must admit when I left Manchester United I found it difficult to adjust. At Old Trafford we had always been taught a passing game and in training we played in triangles. The first season here was a problem.

However, you adapt and it is a difficult system to play against, the penalty area of our opponents is constantly bombarded and after all it provides good entertainment for the paying spectator.

I ENJOY LIVING IN SWINDON I enjoy living in Swindon and I live in some great digs. Along with Nicky Hammond, we are the only players who have to live in lodgings. Most of the players are married and those that are not have girlfriends.

In my situation, my girlfriend Tracy is a Manchester girl and she has a good job there. Tracey is manageress of a Bistro and at this stage neither of us have made a commitment to each other despite the fact that we have been dating for four years. Marriage is still a little way off for us. I like to go home when I can and if we are playing in the north 'the Gaffer' allows me to stay up for a couple of days. Of course Tuesday matches cause a problem in this respect but that is a forfeit that the professional has to make in his career.


