

### A GOOD PERFORMANCE


Good evening to you all and welcome to Leicester City. I missed our last home match with Sunderland but obviously the result speaks volumes for the manner in which the team performed.

### OUR NEXT OPPONENTS

Next Saturday we travel to meet Ipswich Town at Portman Road hoping to fare better than we have on our last two visits to the East Anglian Club. Our last two trips across country have seen Swindon Town concede nine goals! Two defeats, one in a Littlewoods Cup tie and last seasons League encounter ended with the scorelines 6-1 and 3-2 respectively in favour of the East Anglian Club.

This season is one of disappointment for Manager John Duncan The Portman Road Club were widely tipped to be among the race for honours. The return of John Wark, the signing of Russian International Sergei Baltacha

Both players have recently returned to Boothferry Park, Billy Whitehurst following spells with Oxford United, Reading and Sunderland, while Keith Edwards enjoyed a rare unproductive spell in terms of goals with both Aberdeen and Leeds United.

Hull City have recorded wins at Portsmouth (3-1), Shrewsbury Town (3-1) and Barnsley (2-0) this season and will be looking for their fourth away win of their League programme.

The Boothferry Park Club have always found the County Ground a difficult venue. In fifteen visits they have only won one match! That was in 1983. They have lost on eight of those visits.





Leicester City were formed in 1894 and known as Leicester Fosse. They moved to their present home, Filbert Street, seven years later and in 1919 dropped the word Fosse, in favour of City.

Elected to the Football League in 1894, the City have spent their entire life fluctuating between the top two Divisions.


They have won the Second Division title on no fewer than six occasions.

They lifted the Championship for the first time in the season 1924/25. Further successes came in 1936/37, 1953/54, 1956/57, 1970/71 and 1979/80. They were also runners-up in 1907/08. On eight separate occasions Leicester have competed in the First Division, their best placing coming in the 1928/29 season when they finished as runners-up. They were beaten for the championship, by a single point, by Sheffield Wednesday.

Since the last war Leicester have reached the F.A. Cup Final four times, but have still to win the trophy.

In 1949 they were beaten 3-1 by Wolverhampton Wanderers, and in 1961 failed to stop Tottenham Hotspur completing the League and Cup double.

Two years later City reached Wembley again, only to go down 3-1 to Manchester United.

In 1969 Leicester had the double disappointment of losing in the Cup Final again, this time to Manchester City 1-0 and being relegated from the First Division as well.

However, the Club have won one of the Cup competitions. They became only the fourth name to appear on the Football League Cup in 1964, beating Stoke City 4-3 on aggregate. This was when the competition was played on a two-legged basis.

Over the past few seasons Leicester have produced two outstanding goal scorers in Gary Lineker and Alan Smith. Their pair were England's strike force in the recent International in Greece.

Both departed from Filbert Street for the First Division for very large fees. Lineker went to Everton for just over a million pounds in June 1985, while Smith moved to Arsenal for £750,000 in March 1987.

Over the past two seasons clashes between Leicester and Swindon have produced a feast of goals. Both sides ran out home 3-2 victors laster season while this season they shared six goals at Filbert Street.

### MEET THE MANAGER AND PLAYERS

David Pleat (Manager). Born in Nottingham. Had a playing career which covered five Clubs in ten seasons – Forest, Luton, Shrewsbury, Exeter and Peterborough – but made his name when returning to Luton initially as Coach then as Manager. His eight years in that post included a Second Division Championship in 1982, before he eventually took over at Tottenham in 1986. He steered Spurs to the Cup Final in 1987, but parted company with them later. Replaced Bryan Hamilton as City Manager during December 1987.

### David Pleat

Martin Hodge (Goalkeeper). Born in Southport, he made his League debut for Plymouth
Argyle back in April 1978. Since then he has
had spells with Everton and most notably
Sheffield Wednesday from whom he joined
Leicester on the eve of the season for a fee of
£200,000. In between these two Clubs spent
loan periods with Preston, Oldham and
Gillingham. A very experienced keeper
with over 300 League games to his credit.

Simon Morgan (Defender). Born in Birmingham and signed professional forms in November 1984. Joined City from the Y.T.S. Scheme, and has since progressed to Under-21 honours for England. Can play anywhere in back four, but usually is found in one of the full-back berths.

Steve Walsh (Defender). Born in Preston and joined City from Wigan in June 1986. He played at Wembley for Wigan in the Full Members Cup Final. One of City's leading goal scorers last season with seven League goals.

Tony Spearing (Defender). Born in Romford Former Norwich City full-back who became one of David Pleat's close season signings. Highly rated as a natural left-sided defender, who was a regular in the Carrow Road line-up last season. Cost City £100,000. Previously had loan spells with Stoke and Oxford.


Alan Paris (Defender). Born in Slough Another of David Pleat's close-season captures, this time from Peterborough United, for whom he made some 180 appearances Previously with Slough Town and Watford, though he never made a senior appearance for the latter.

Alastair Mauchlen (Defender/Midfield). Born in West Kilbride. Signed from Motherwell in a £250,000 deal also involving Gary McAllister in August 1985. Previously from Kilmarnock A fiery midfield player who was converted

to right-back by David Pleat during the latter stages of 1987/88. Has made over 100 League appearances for Leicester.

Gary McAllister (Midfield). Born in Motherwell he scored on his International debut for Scotland 'B' in 1986/87. Stylish former Motherwell player who has blossomed in recent season, so much so that he is constantly being linked with a steam of big name Clubs. City's penalty expert. Top scorer last season with nine League goals including two penalties.

Paul Ramsey (Midfield). Born in Londonderry, a former apprentice at Filbert Street, turned pro in April 1980. He is an Irish International who was made skipper by David Pleat upon taking over the managerial chair. Prefers his midfield role although he has successfully held down the right back slot in the past. Has made over 250 League appearances for Leicester.



### • Paul Ramsey

Paul Reid (Midfield). Born in the Midlands at Oldbury. A former apprentice, the 21-year-old made his first-team debut under Bryan Hamilton. But it was not until David Pleat elected to use his natural left-sided style on the right wing that he established a regular place. Scored City's 'goal of the season' in 1987/88 at Ewood Park.

Phil Turner (Midfield). Born in Sheffield, the 27-year-old joined City from Grimsby in an exchange deal involving Kevin Jobling in February 1988. Cost £42,000. Formerly with Lincoln City for whom he made 241 League appearances. Used very much in a utility role last term.

Paul Groves (Midfield). Born in Derby, he celebrates his 23rd birthday today Signed from Burton Albion just after last season's transfer deadline. He was leading goalscorer

for Burton last term. A promising youngster who scored on his City debut. Cost £12,000.

Martin Russell (Midfield). Born in Dublin he cost City £25,000 from Manchester United, and has been capped by Eire at Under-21 level. However he has not yet established a regular first team place at Filbert Street. Spent a short spell on loan at both Birmingham and Norwich.

Mike Newell (Forward). Born in Liverpool. Signed for Leicester in September 1987 and cost a Club-record £350,000 fee when joining from Luton Town. An England Under-21 International who was previously with Crewe Alexander and Wigan Athletic. Scored for Wigan at Wembley in 1985. Was City's top marksman in 1987/88 in all competition.

Nicky Cross (Forward). Born in Birmingham he was a £65,000 capture from Walsall last January. He first came to prominence with West Brom. Started out as a midfielder, but has achieved more notable success since moving to the front line. Made over 100 League appearances for both W.B.A., where he began as an apprentice and Walsall.

Jimmy Quinn (Forward). Born in Belfast and no stranger here at the County Ground, having spent two spells with Swindon. The independent tribunal fixed a fee of £210,000 when he joined City during the close season from Swindon Town. An Irish International who has also had spells with Oswestry Town and Blackburn Rovers. Topped the Division Two scoring charts last season with 31 goals. Jari Rantanen (Forward). Finnish International who has played for JK Helsinki (Finland).

The most attractive game on paper must be




He's also come up with a suggestion for Swindon's own inflatable object – a plastic celery – any enterprising businessman out there able to oblige? It would be terrific.



# **««VIEWPOINT»**

I have been asked by the Club Secretary, Dave King, to write this programme's Viewpoint with regard to the progress of Mark Jones. The diminutive midfield player has been out of action for a period of eighteen months with a serious injury. On a personal basis I would therefore like to pay tribute to his dedication, courage and willpower to overcome adversity. I am sure you will join me in wishing Mark every success in his comeback bid.

### THE SETBACK

Mark Jones returned to full time training on Monday 13th February, 1989, at 10.30 a.m. As some of the supporters are already aware, Mark's problems started on the 13th November 1987 – yes 1987.

When Mark sustained an injury to the left knee. After various attempts to regain fitness and play 90 minutes of competitive football, Mark had to have surgery on his left knee This was carried out at Harrogate General Hospital on the 19th January 1988. where Mark underwent a left Leeds CRIO-Anterior Cruciate Ligament replacement. He was then discharged on the 30th January 1988 with his left leg encased in a plaster cast cylinder from the toes to the top of the thigh. His next appointment was on the 22nd February 1988, when the plaster cast was removed and a brace applied.

### LILLESHALL

On the 18th April 1988 Mark reported to the Football Association Rehabilitation Centre at Lilleshall, Shropshire, under the supervision of Mr Graham Smith (GRAD DIP PHYS MCSP DID TP CERT ED SRP), and from then on it has been a long hard road to fitness for Mark. He had to learn to walk all over again.

There was no easy way for Mark, he had acute muscle wastage of the left

leg. This had to be built up on a gradual basis starting from static non-weight bearing exercises, then a build up to dynamic and strengthening exercises. This takes time, patience and lots of hard work, flection and extension of the knee then start to take place. Doreiflection and Planter flection of the ankle fall in line Quadriceps and hamstring groups get stronger. Tone returns to the muscles but this is over a long period of time.


### TRAINING PROGRAMME

Mark was working on rehabilitation from Monday to Friday mornings and afternoons. On top of this the cardio vascular system had to be exercised. This was done by circuit training. In the last six months of rehabilitation Mark used to spend two week at Lilleshall then two weeks with Swindon Town. Reports of progress were monitored by Mr G. Smith at Lilleshall and by myself at Swindon. we would then have a telephone coversation once a week and discuss Mark's progress and welfare.

### TIME PASSES

As the months went by jogging went to increased pace. Increased pace to sprinting, twisting and turning to introduce co-ordination and balance. Then introduce a football in the training just to get the feel of the ball again.

Mark was then put to the ultimate test in Lilleshall, take part in a small sided game. Mr C. Smith phoned me

after the game. Mark had done well. No reaction. He could be discharged from Lilleshall on the 11th February 1898 and report back to Swindon Town

### AT LAST

On the 13th February 1989 he joined the rest of his team mates back in full time training. At the time of writing Mark has done everything asked of him. I think I can speak for everyone, Lou the Manager, the coaching staff John, 'Chic', and his fellow players are all glad to see him back. The next progression will be an outing in the Combination team introduced as a substitute for twenty minutes or so, once again to gain confidence and mental fitness.

I cannot conclude this article without thanking Dr John Nicholas, the Club Medical Officer, the staff at both Princess Margaret Hospital and Harrogate General Hospital, Mr G. Smith, Director of the Lilleshall Rehabilitation Centre and all his staff, the Manager and coaching staff of Swindon Town, who have all played their part and helped me with Mark on the road to recovery.
