'CHIC' WAS SHREWS LOSS ...





WHAT A TRANSFORMATION

Sixteenth place at the turn of the year, being transformed into a play-off place by May, was too much for even my imagination to deal with, causing me to write early in 1989 that this season was destined to be one of consolidation, three points this afternoon and I could, just this once, be proved wrong. Those who had more faith than me can expect my sincere apologies at quarter to five.

UNPREDICTABLE

Our unpredictable season has never been emphasised more than in our past three games, our fine performance against rivals Crystal Palace was followed by two struggles against relegated opposition.

Last Saturday at Walsall, it didn't rain and we couldn't lose, but enough chances went begging to make it two points lost rather than one gained. Duncan Shearer's early goal gave us the perfect start, but a pair of defensive lapses saw us trailing against an ordinary Walsall side relying on the ageing Howard Pritchard to feed their amply built strike force. Colin Calderwood's equaliser showed sleight of foot that Gazza would have been proud of and brought delight to an away terrace depleted by some over zealous arrests for swearing. A few faded warning posters obscured by supporters or their own officers would have been better supplemented by a tannoy announcement or even a verbal warning that swearing would not be tolerated. Some of the chances we missed were enough to make a saint cuss anyway. Obscene chanting should, of course, be eradicated but displays of dismay are hard to stop, particularly when the supposed offenders are allowed to pay to get back in. A little more thought can stop a situation from becoming far more unsavoury.

Bad performances that result in a win are the strength of sides who gain promotion, a good sign for the possible struggle ahead.

Although the play-offs and the chance of a place in the First Division are lurking and could greatly help Swindon Town, the sooner the Football League get rid of them the better. Why should we have the chance to leap-frog Watford if they have more points than us over the course of the season? A sensible return of old ways could be to abolish the play-offs if the 'Town' are promoted this season and then remove relegation from the First Divison, that would suit us fine.

The return of Dave Bamber to the County Ground is certainly something to look forward to, his eccentric displays around the penalty area are sadly missed, at least we know that a tackle in the area is a bad idea and hopefully won't fall (excuse the pun!) for it. It is a shame that Dave is not lining up alongside another former 'Town' favourite Chris Kamara, whose midfield displays have been equally missed, though the brilliant form of Steve Foley prior to his injury may have kept him out of the side anyway.

WE DON'T WANT TO VISIT OLDHAM NEEDING POINTS!

We must sincerely hope that we gain a place in the play-offs by virtue of a win this afternoon and not have to rely on a good result on the dreaded plastic at Oldham on Saturday. In spite of their lowly League position the Lancashire Club are one of the Division's highest scorers largely by virtue of their artificial home advantage, a shame for them that their performances away from home on grass have been so diabolical. Hopefully we won't care by then though!



A LOOK AT THE SECOND DIVISION SCENE

CITY TAKEOVER AND THE RECRIMINATIONS!

Former Swindon Town Manager Dave Mackay has taken over as General Manager of Third Division bound Birmingham City. Dave Mackay, who took over last week, quit as Manager of Fourth Divison Doncaster Rovers eight weeks ago, steps in after a £1.6 million take over by the Manchester based Kumar brothers, heads of a Manchester based leisurewear empire.

Dave Mackay who won the League title as Manager of Derby County said, "We can get back to the Second Division. You cannot believe that a Club of this size that the crowds have gone below 5,000. We have to get the Club back and give the fans something to shout about."

The multi-million pound fashion and leisurewear company, Kumar, have purchased 62 per cent controlling interest of Birmingham City's Chairman Ken Wheldon. who is to remain as a consultant Director.

The new owners are the Indian brothers-Ramesh 32, Samesh 26 and Bimai 39 - who have intensive soccer interests. They have built up a £20 million textile trading empire.

Brian Slater, the brother's legal advisor, has been added to the Birmingham board of

In the meantime Gary Pendrey is ready to launch a £40,000 battle for compensation after walking away from the Club

Ramesh Kumar, Birmingham City's new Vice-Chairman said. "We are not going to be taken to the cleaners by anyone. If he doesn't want to stay, we can do a deal. If he is such a true Birmingham man he should have stayed. He did not turn up for training, which has angered me because it's not a gentlemanly thing to do. I'm told he's a good coach but he couldn't have been a brilliant one or the Club would not have gone down. We need someone with an older head."

Birmingham City have also clinched a new three-year sponsorship with clothing manufacturers Mark One worth £250,000

SETTLED

Former, Brighton Manager, Chris Cattlin has settled his differences with the Club after a three-year legal battle to clear his name. Cattlin, 41, was dismissed in April 1986 when he still had 17 months of his contract to run. He sued for the remainder of his money owed under the term of his contract but Brighton counter-claimed, citing negligence, misconduct and breach of duty. A recent joint statement confirmed that both parties had dropped their legal action.

Cattlin is expected to receive £40,000 in breached a strict Club code by being out compensation.







JUNIOR ROBINS



Today we welcome parties from the Junior Potters, who gave us such a splendid day out earlier in the season, and from the Swindon Club Pack who are having their presentation ceremony at the Ground today. Can to spot the Swindon player hidden in the picture below?



OUR NEXT OPPONENTS

Watford, Crystal Palace and Blackburn Rovers appear to be the teams who will be joined by Swindon Town in the play-offs. The wealth of Elton John has been a bonus for Watford. The managerial skills of Steve Coppell and Don Mackay at Selhurst Park and Ewood Park are becoming readily recognised. The attacking duo of Mark Bright and Ian Wright are the focus of media attention at Selhurst Park.

Few teams can boast the type of consistency achieved by **Blackburn Rovers** over the past two seasons. They are heading for the drama of the sudden-death play-offs for the second year running. Few people realise that the **Ewood Park** Club have not been out of the top five positions in the League table since January last year.

Three players who have turned on the style for Rovers this season have been Simon Garnet, Howard Gayle and Andy **Kenedy** who have hit nearly **60** goals between them. In fact Simon Garner recently passed the Rovers Club record of 142 goals previously set by Tommy Briggs and which stood for 30 years!

The real beauty of Rovers involvement is that they have spent less money than the other Clubs involved in the play offs. In fact their 23 strong playing staff cost less than £250,000. Since Blackburn Rovers lost to Chelsea in the First Round of last year's playoffs they have bought £Andy Kennedy from Birmingham City for £50,000 while former Scunthorpe United full back Mark Atkins and Crystal Palace defender John Finnigan were recruited for £40,000 each Of the 23 professionals at £wood Park half a dozen have graduated through the Club's own Youth policy.

The ample evidence of tight purse strings compared to the other play-off-contenders is in stark contrast. Watford spent £300,000 in signing Willie Falconer from Aberdeen. Former Notts Forest striker Paul Wilkinson cost an identical amount His striking partner Garry Thompson from

Coventry City was purchased for £325,000
The total outlay of the Vicarage Road Club
staff was also supplemented by Paul Miller
moving to Watford from Charlton Athletic
for £80,000.

Crystal Palace boss Steve Coppell spent almost £½ million signing Jeff Hopkins for a fee of £240,000 from Fulham in August and Eddie McGoldrick in January for a fee of £200,000.

In comparison our own Lou Macari has strengthened his signings this season by signing Duncan Shearer from Huddersfield Town for £250,000, former Derby County defender Ross Maclaren for £180,000 and former Aberdeen midfield player Tommy Jones for £80,000. An outlay of £1/2 million. Who spent their cash the wisest will be determined by the play-off system. Although detractors will always be able to justify that finishing in third position in a seasons performace should earn its just reward. We justified third position in 1986/87 will we be able to upset the odds and remove the Clubs who finish above us this term! We have an interesting two weeks in which to find out



Founded in 1863, Stoke City are the second oldest Football Club in England, though it was only in recent times that the Potters enjoyed their best successes.


At one stage, the Club dropped from the First Division to the Third Division but made a rapid recovery and in 1972 the side won their major trophy, the Football League Cup.

When the original Football League was formed in 1888, Stoke City were invited to become one of its 23 founder members. After finishing bottom of the table in the first two campaigns, they failed to gain re-election.

They were given another chance a year

later and held their First Division place until relegation overtook them in 1907. Financial problems then reached such proportions that when, in 1908, an appeal was launched to rally around them and only three shareholders bothered to attend a crisis meeting, the Club resigned from the League.

After 11 years of non-League football. Stoke regained a place in Division Two in 1919 to commence a hectic yo-yo period which saw them rise into Division One for the campaign (1922-23), then only four years later drop into Division Three (North). They were champions of the section at the first attempt and eventually returned to Division

One in 1933, to remain under 1953.

Then followed 19 seasons of Second Division football until promotion was achieved in 1963. Steady progress was made and in 1972 the Club reached Wembley for the first time, defeating Chelsea 2-1 to win the Football League Cup.

Many of Stoke's recent League sides have been developed in the Clubs junior teams. Some of the truly great players to wear Stokes' famous red and white stripes in modern times have included Gordon Banks, Peter Shilton, Stanley Matthews, George Eastham and Peter Dobing.

The inflated transfer market however, prevented these sort of 'bargains' and City were relegated in 1977. Alan Durban succeeded George Eastham and in 18 months took Stoke back to the First Division. After one season of consolidation finishing 18th, Stoke City surprised all but their loyal fans by finishing 11th in the First Division, which has been described as a Super-League.

Ritchie Barker manager the Club from July 1981 to December 1983, being replaced by his Assistant Bill Asprey before Stoke were relegated at the end of the 1984/85 season and former England Captain Mick Mills took oer as a player/Manager in June 1985. He has completely transformed the Club and is hoping to lead them next season back to the top flight once more.

MEET THE MANAGER AND PLAYERS

Mick Mills (Manager). Commenced a new career as Player/Manager of Stoke City on 1st July, 1985 and went on to make 31 Second Division appearances for the Potters in his first season. He began his career as an apprentice with Portsmouth in 1966 and later joined Ipswich, with

whom he spent 16 years and made over 700 appearances - a record which may never be bettered at Portman Road. Led Ipswich to success in the F.A. Cup in 1978 and in the U.E.F.A. Cup three years later, but a First Division championship medal eluded his grasp. His international career took off in 1973 when he won the first of the 42 caps for England against Yugoslavia, and was Captain during the 1982 World Cup finals in Spain. In 1982 Southampton paid out a £50,000 transfer fee for his services and he went on to make 103 appearances for the 'Saints'. In the Queens' New Years Honours list of 1984. Mick celebrated his 38th birthday by being awarded the M.E.B. for his services to football.

Scott Barrett (Goalkeeper). Born in Derby, he began his career with Ilkeston Town. After spending three seasons with Wolves, he joined City for £10,000 in July 1987. He took over from Peter Fox in November 1988 and played in 27 League games last season.

Peter Beagrie (Forward). A native of Middlesborough he was signed by his local Club in 1983/84. The following season he became a regular first-team player and signed for Sheffield United for £35,000 in the summer of 1986. Cost Stoke £215,000 last June.

Carl Beeston (Midfielder). Locally born he can play midfield or in the back four. Made his debut in the First Division against Coventry City in 1985. He was a late call-up for the England Under-21 side and played at right-back in the end of the season tournament.

George Berry (Defender). Central defender and Club skipper who was signed on a free transfer from Wolves in 1982. He has gained five international caps for Wales. Made 35 League appearances last season scoring five times including three penalties.

John Butler (Defender). Signed at Christmas from Wigan Athletic for £75,000. Made his debut on Boxing Day against Manchester City. Played almost 300 games for Wigan scoring one goal Born in Liverpool he began his career with non-League Prescot Cables.

Bave Bamber (Striker). Another Christmas signing, he cost £190,000 from Watford. Last season he scored 17 goals for Swindon, and 46 altogether in 137 matches. Left the County Ground last summer after rejecting a new contract. Joined Watford for £105,000 – the fee determined by a Football League Tribunal. His previous Clubs include Portsmouth, Walsall, Coventry City and Blackpool. Cliff Carr (Defender). A £45,000 signing in 1987 from Fulham where he was Club Captain Played over 150 games for them and gained an England Under-21 cap.

Chris Hemming (Defender). Locally born he made his League debut at Spurs in March 1984. A natural athlete and accomplished in many sports, he can play anywhere in the back four. He has attracted worldwide publicity as the first player to be fitted with a pacemaker. He made 20 League appearances last season.

Nicky Morgan (Forward). Made 27 full League appearances last season scoring five goals. He was signed from Portsmouth for £40,000 in 1986 and began his League career with West Ham.



Gary Hackett

Gary Hackett (Forward). A left winger who was signed in March 1988 for a fee of £110,000 from Aberdeen. He played 150 games for Shrewsbury Town scoring 17 goals before joining Aberdeen at the start of the 1987/88 season. Born in Stourbridge he began his career at non-League Bromsgrove Rovers.

Tony Henry (Midfielder). He was signed from Oldham Athletic for £40,000 in December 1987. Born in Sunderland he made almost 100 appearances for Manchester City before signing for Bolton Wanderers. He then signed for Oldham Athletic in March 1983 making over 175 appearances and scoring 24 goals.

Carl Saunders (Forward). Born in Birmingham he made his League debut at Goodison Park in April 1983 coming on as sub. He is equally at home at full back or in midfield as well as his normal front running role. To the start of this season had made 109 League appearances and scored 20 goals.

Graham Shaw (Forward). Locally born, the 21 year old made 30 full League appearances last season and scored 6 goals. He suffered last season when a bad run of injuries meant he had a different partner almost every game alongside him.

Mark Higgins (Defender). Cost £150,000 from Bury at the end of September and made his debut v Bournemouth. He has played at the top level with Everton and Manchester United. The central defender has signed a three year contract.

Paul Ware (Midfielder). Locally born, the 18 year old former trainee has forced his way into the first team squad on a permanent basis this season. Made one League appearance last season.


