



WE DESERVED TO WIN I was disappointed that the match with Barnsley did not produce two extra points. It was a match where we did not play as well as we can.

There was no obvious answer on the day and there still isn't one now. These things happen in football. One match everything goes your way and the next it appears to be the opposite. Despite the fact we could have performed more in keeping with our ability I felt we still deserved to beat Barnsley.

WELL DONE, PAUL

The Barnsley match did give me the opportunity to introduce another of the talented young players we have at this Club. defending whatever the situation demands. We attacked in force and it was pleasant to see the goals coming early in the match.

IT'S A TEAM EFFORT

Fraser Digby was able to play two matches without conceding a goal, which made me a happy man after the Cup-tie at Shrewsbury. The defence and the team as a unit are also responsible for helping Fraser to achieve this.

WORKING HARD TO IMPROVE There are several aspects of our game that we need to improve and we are working hard to achieve this. I have commented about the defensive part of our game.

Hotspur, I was always very aware of what a lot of talent they had at their disposal. A tremendous choice of what could be described as the best of the schoolboy talent. So our 3-0 win in the South East Counties League was pleasing. I have stated before that we have some good boys here at Swindon. Everything is going fine and our Youth team set-up is very good.

Following our 3-0 win at Shrewsbury the Leeds United match was a massive disappointment. It emphasised the gulf between two opponents and the standard we need to attain.

One win in our first seven matches is a poor start and the players here will have to cast their minds back to the 4-0 defeat they suffered at Sunderland last season. The remainder of the season was then an improvement.

We have the same squad of players that were at the Club last season and they must start to find a level of consistency with fight and determination.

The Second Division is a tough one and it will be easy to find ourselves fighting relegation if we are not careful. The players know that they are better than that and have to prove it with results on the field of play. Leeds spent £3 million on their team and have every right to expect some return for it. Money is not always the answer. Determination is an attribute, we must start to show we can put Saturdays 4-0 defeat behind us and begin to climb the League table. We owe that to ourselves. I expect a reaction to Saturday, it is up to the players to show that reaction with three valuable points. We have not scored in our last three League matches. We must start to find the back of the

In midfield we need to become more tigerish, with more fight when we need it. Finishing is something we need to improve upon and at present we are working very hard to achieve these aims.



OUR HISTORIAN TAKES A LOOK BACK AT SOME PREVIOUS MEETINGS WITH TODAYS OPPONENTS

SOUTHERN LEAGUE DAYS

Today we meet Plymouth Arayle for the 53rd time in the Football League and for the 83rd time since the Devonshire Club first joined the Southern League back in 1903.

The County Ground hosted 13 Southern League encounters between the Clubs from which Swindon could boast eleven victories and no defeats. Between 1909 and 1913 Archie Brown made a habit of scoring when Plymouth were visitors, hitting ten goals.

Similarly, the Town failed to inflict a defeat upon Argyle in the 13 Southern League games at Home Park. In fact, on only one occasion in 1906/07 - did the visitors manage to score more than once, Johnny Kidd netting both goals in a 2-2 draw.

FORTY YEARS ON!

It was 1923 before Swindon recorded their first success in Plymouth, Cyril Daniel (2) and Tom Phillipson scoring in a 3-1 win-and it was to be forty years before a Home Park victorious!

Argyle were the most consistent side in the Third Division's South in the 1920's. They finished in second place in six successive seasons, only the champions gaining promotion in those days. During that period Swindon won only three out of the ten meetings at the County Ground.

In 1930, Plymouth finally secured the championship and the two Clubs did not cross paths again until 1950.

BAT AND BALL

George Dews, the Argyle insideforward and Worcestershire cricketer, scored in all four encounters against Swindon in 1950/51 and 1951/52. His striking partner Maurice Tadman scored in three of them. The Town took just one point from the four fixtures. The 5-1 reverse at Plymouth in March 1951 followed an 8-2 defeat in Swindon's previous away game, at Southend. The 23 away trips that season yielded three wins and 20 losses!

REMEMBER FRANK?

Swindon's post-war victory over Plymouth came 32 years ago this month. Frank O'Mahony was the match-winner with a 12th minute goal, his fifth in only six games for the Town.

After suffering defeat in seven previous visits to Home Park, Swindon returned with a point in January 1958. Argyle looked to be well in command when they led 2-0 after only 14 minutes, but Andy Micklewright pulled a goal back on the half-hour and then snatched an equaliser just seconds before the final whistle.

PILGRIMS ON THE 'DOUBLE'

Plymouth were Division Three champions again in 1959 - and again recorded a League 'double' over the Town. Over 26,000 were at Home Park for the October fixture, when it was Argyle's turn to grab a last-minute goal Jimmy Gould,

Town side would again return from later to sign for Swindon, was the scorer, giving the home side a 3-2 advantage. The return encounter provided seven goals. Gauld again did the damage, hitting a hat-trick as Plymouth triumphed 4-3. Willie Marshall scored twice on his Town debut and Argyle's Peter Anderson also netted two - one at each end!

TOWN ON THE 'DOUBLE'

It was Swindon's turn to take maximum points from the two meetings in 1963/64, with a 2-1 home win and a 4-2 success at Home Park Ex-Town players scored for Argyle in both games. Cliff Jackson scored the opener in the Devon meeting, before a brace from 'Ernie' Hunt and two goals in the final six minutes, from Don Rogers and Bobby Woodruff, clinched the points for the visitors. The return fixture in March saw Frank Large score twice on his Swindon debut with Town old boy David Corbett getting his name on the scoresheet for Plymouth.

DANNY AND THE CUP PARADE AT HOME PARK

The Town recorded an early season win over Argyle in 1968/69, two goals in the 3-0 success coming from Don Rogers. His second of the game, in the 57th minute was a superb 30-yard volley. Just a week after lifting the League Cup at Wembley, Swindon travelled to Home Park to do League battle once more. Before the kick-off. Managers Billy Bingham and Danny Williams paraded the trophy around the ground, where 20,776 were present But Dave Burnside and Mike Bickle ruined Swindon's day by combining twice to give Plymouth the points with a 2-1 win.

AN APALLING RECORD BY THE 'BRINEY'

Goals from 'little and large' - Dave Cunningham and Chris Guthrie gave the Town their last success at Home Park in March 1978, their third in 42 trips!



NO EXCUSES

To be completely honest our performance in our last home match with Barnsley is the worst we have given this season. No excuses, we were poor on the day.

We probably tried one pass too many and invariably our moves were breaking down before we had started. A goal at any stage would have altered the whole complexity of the game. While the score remained at 0-0 we always thought we would be the first team to score. Although we pressed forward in vain we also had to safeguard against leaving spaces at the back. Overall a disappointment.

SIMILAR SITUATION!

What a start to the season for Alan McLoughlin. Playing in midfield with a licence to get up in attack as much as possible appears to have given Alan a real purpose about his game.

It reminds me of the Charlie Henry situation that we saw a couple of seasons or more ago. Alan, similar to Charlie, did not appear to be a regular goalscorer and then suddenly it's goals everywhere. Let's all hope Alan passes Charlie's total, although Charlie had the advantage of being an out and out striker most of his memorable season.

WELL DONE, 'OGGIE'

Thinking further about the Barnsley match, I was impressed with little 'Oggie' Hunt's debut. 'Oggie' came on fairly late in the game and then proceeded to buzz effectively.

Paul was positive in his approach, not frightened to take defenders on. I like the way in which he committed such as experienced campaigner as Malcolm Shotton. 'Oggie' has been turning it on in our Reserve team and I have noticed the spectators at these matches have an air of expectancy about them whenever he receives the ball. Quite simply he is an exciting type of talent.

TIME TO LEARN

PESSIMISTS


APTAINS LOMMEN

HOPE FOR THE FUTURE

The recent introduction of young players to our first team squad brings into focus how valuable a successful youth policy can be for the less wealthy Clubs. For Swindon Town the recent introduction of Paul Hunt and Nicky Summerbee has revitalised the hopes of many of the would be protogés at this Club. Trainees brought through the youth team ranks can now challenge the more established players at the Club. Not on a constent basis at this period of time, but with progress, certainly in a year or so.

IN STARK CONTRAST TO THE 'MONEYBAGS' LEAGUE

What a contrast this appears when compared with the Moneybags League'. Take, for instance, Manchester United. Their Manager, Alex Ferguson, has paid £11.8 million in his period as Supremo in the transfer market. The Old Trafford Club are still nowhere in terms of honours.

It was only ten days ago that Alex Ferguson overtook Graeme Souness of Glasgow Rangers with the £1.2 million signing of former Southampton striker Danny Wallace. The odds are that the spending league will be the only table that United will top this season.

Previously, Graeme Souness was leading the 'Moneybags League' after spending £11 million in a bid to make Glasgow Rangers the best Club in Europe until Bayern Munich intervened! That bid will now remain on ice for twelve months.


At Liverpool, Kenny Dalglish, currently lies third of the big spenders worth £9.2 million in four years. Although there comes the difference, with two championships and two F.A. Cup wins to his credit. Clearly a man who knows what he wants – and gets it.

Swindon Town are one division away from these affluent Clubs but with a totally different approach and means.

A MERSEYSIDE CHALLANGE?

This may be a season where the Anfield clubs Merseyside rivals Everton provide a realistic challenge for the top honours. The Goodison Park Manager, Colin Harvey, is fourth in the 'Moneybags' League having spent £7.7 million which includes a £750,000 swoop for Norman Whiteside. Colin Harvey searches for his first major honour in two years.

Tottenham Hotspur's 'El Tel' is in the same dilemma having spent £7.4 million in the past twenty-four months. In comparison the Scrooge-like George Graham is laughing all the way to the bank. Championship and Littlewoods Cup success have been acheived at a





cost of just £3.2 million in his three years in charge at Highbury.

A superb youth policy has produced Tony Adams, Michael Thomas, David Rocastte, Paul Davis and Paul Merson in eye catching style. Money will not always guarantee success.

BRIAN CLOUGH HAS SHOWN THE WAY!

The Manager who knows the value of obtaining players at a tender age is Brian Clough. Despite the fact he spent some of the Neil Webb fee on Leed's former midfield star John Sheridan he still refuses to play him at the cost of some of his home produced players.

Are Swindon Town in no-mans land at present? A progressive youth policy is of

paramount importance. Of course we shall continue to seek crumbs of comfort in the transfer market but the appointment of former Town full back Terry Wollen as the Clubs Youth Development Officer is aimed at producing more young players of the ilk of Nick and Paul. There must be a continual line of production. It is difficult at times to realise that we are, at the outset of each season, forty-six matches away from joining the Anfield, Goodison Park and Old Trafford club in their 'Moneybags' league. If we cannot produce young players and strike lucky we might as well be wishing on a star - because frankly that is about as near as we might get to the real thing.

So please have patience with these young players, they need, and will no doubt receive, your extended patience in their apprenticeship to the real thing. For these young players Second Division football is a challenge and they are vital to the progress of Swindon Town.

STRATTON BANK

Following consultation with the Safety Team and Police Authorities on the implication of the Hillsborough Report issued by Lord Justice Taylor, fears for public safety have been expressed to the Club on the reduced capacity of the Visitors enclosure.

The Police Authorities have made representation to Swindon Town Football Club, in conjuction with the Safety Team, that the limit of 1,700 will cause immense problems and endanger public safety in specific instances.

The Directors of Swindon Town Football Club therefore had no alternative but to ask those people who now occupy the Stratton Bank End of the County Ground to move to the Shrivenham Road enclosure.

Swindon Town Football Club had no alternative in making this decision and the consequences of not only the disaster of Hillsborough but also the Hysel Stadium disaster have severe ramifications for football Clubs in general.

Similar severe restrictions are being implemented at Stoke City. That is having severe consequences for not only Stoke City but also visiting clubs. These are difficult times for clubs and will remain so for quite a period of time. It is pertinent to point out that Lord Justice Taylor's report was interim and his final report will have further implications for both clubs and supporters. It is a measure that we did not wish to seek to implement and Swindon Town apologise profusely for any immediate inconvenience.

PAUL PLOWMAN LOOKS BACK AT THE CAREERS OF TWO PLAYERS WBO SERVED BOTH SWINDON TOWN AND TODAYS OPPONENTS

Through the years there have been relatively few transfers between Swindon Town and Plymouth Argyle

But both Clubs have been fortunate in having had the services of two of the more prolific goalscorers of the period between the Wars.

HAT-TRICK ON HIS DEBUT!

Frank Richardson, from Barking in East London took his boots down to Home Park in 1920 after scoring 70 goals in a season for his local side. He hit a hat-trick on his debut in August 1921 and went on to grab 31 goals in 41 games that season. When, in 1923, Frank moved on to Stoke, Argyle were able to get £2,000 for him, a fair sum in those days. Before the year was out. Frank was on the move again, back to familiary territory at West Ham. He came to the County Ground in June 1924 and made his debut – at Home Park – on September 8. Sadly, he could not inspire his new team-mates to anything other than a 2-0 defeat.

AN ADMIRABLE GOALSCORING RECORD

Frank netted 15 goals for Swindon in 1924/25, two less than top scorer lack Johnson. In the following season he was leading scorer himself, with 18 from only 19 games before joining Reading in February. Frank also bagged ten for the Town in the F.A. Cup, all against non-League sides. He claimed four of the ten against Fulham and another four against Sittingbourne. Reading signed Frank in an attempt to clinch promotion to Division Two. He obliged, with 12 goals from 13 games and smashed home four in the championship decider on May I. Readin hammered Brentford 7-1. Frank had a 21-goal haul in the Second Division in 1926/27 and stayed at Elm Park until 1930, when he returned to Swindon for a season. He continued to live in Reading, where he died tow years ago at the age of 90.

JIMMY COST JUST £60

Jimmy Cookson began playing for South Salford Boys Club, in the Manchester suburbs, before going to Maine Road, where his brother Sam was already a professional. He was unable to get into the League side there, but Chesterfield

thought he was worth a £60 gamble in 1925. Jimmy responded with a staggering 86 goals in 74 League appearances! Not surprisingly, scouts flocked to Saltergate and he was soon on his way to West Bromwich Albion, in June 1927. When Albion defeated Blackpool 6-3 in late September, Jimmy scored all six! He was leading goalscorer at the Hawthorns in each of his first three seasons there. In 1931, he was called up to tour Canda with the F.A. Representative XI.

TOP MARKSMAN AT HOME PARK

Jimmy signed for Plymouth on August 8 1933 and struck 27 goals in 29 League games to finish as Argyle's top marksman in his first year at Home Park. Three years later, almost to the day, he came to Swindon. A further 25 goals in 33 appearances in 1936/37 gave him the remarkable record of having been the highest goalscorer at each of the four Clubs he made League.

appearances for, in his initial season with them. Unfortunately, injury prevented Town fars from seeing the best of Jimmy Cookson. He was forced to retire from the League scene in 1938. His career thus came to an end on 292 League games, during which he banged in 256 goals! Jimmy died at the age of 66 in December 1970, at Warminster.

REMAINING TRANSFERS

Since the War transfers between the Clubs have included Ernie Edds, Tony McShane, Rex Tilley and Jimmy Gauld, who all arrived from Plymouth and Dave Corbett, Cliff Jackson and Garry Nelson, who went in the opposite direction.







Defenders: Full back Kenny Brown (22) is the son of the Argyle Manager and is now well established in the Home Park Club's defence after making 39 League appearances last season. Kenny was previously with Norwich City. John Brimacombe (30) is a local born player who is nearing a century of League appearances with the Club. Leigh Cooper (29) is a veteran of over 300 League matches. Leigh captained Plymouth Argyle to their F.A. Cup Semi-Final appearance four years ago. A

broken leg, sustained against Portsmouth last season, put him out of contention but he is hoping to regain his first team position this season. At the centre of the Argyle defence is Aidrian Burrows (30) and Mark Smith (29). Aidrian was a £10,000 signing from Northampton Town in July 1984. The former Mansfield Town defender has made over 300 League appearances. Forwards: The irrepresible Tommy Tynan (33), was soon off the mark this season with two goals in the Home Park Club's 3-0 First Leg win of the Littlewoods Cup against Cardiff City at Ninian Park. The former Sheffield Wednesday and Newport County striker is in his second spell with the Devon Club. Sean Mc-Carthy (22), a £50,000 signing from Swansea City, is in his second season with the Club. Injuries have prevented Greg Campbell (24), a signing from Dutch Club Fortuna-Sittard in 1988, from establishing a regular position in the Home Park attack, restricted to substitute appearances in the early matches of this season Owen Pickard (19), a former Club trainee, has made two League appearances for Argyle.

While most Clubs appear to play without a recognised winger, Argyle have been operating with two! David Byrne (29) was signed from Millwall in March just before the transfer deadline. The former Gillingham winger has spent loan periods with Cambridge United and Blackburn Rovers while he was on Millwall's staff Mark Stuart (22) was signed from Charlton Athletic in November 1988. A winger with an eye for goals, he has scored braces against Oxford United in the opening game of the season and in the 3-2 defeat at West Ham United two matches later Mark is now approaching 150 League appearances in his two-Club career. Former Club trainee Martin Barlow (18). another winger on Argyle's books, is still awaiting his League debut. Former trainee Darren Garner (18) made his League debut in the penultimate League match of last season against Oxford United at Home Park. 



It was left to former Town striker **Jimmy Quinn** to earn a point when he rammed his short range angled shot past Portsmouth goalkeeper Alan Knight in the **forty-sixth** minute following a pass from Kenny Wharton.

Eventually the Valley Parade Club won their first home League match of the season on Saturday September 16th when they defeated Leicester City 2-0 before an attendance of 8,732. It was substitute Kevin Megson who replaced Welsh International Alan Davies, when he was carried off with a broken leg after six minutes, who set up the first goal. In the thirty-third minute he whipped across a centre which was headed home by Mark Leonard. 
It was a match in which we should have fared better, for we had a high percentage of players in our team with plenty of experience. We did not tackle the task in hand and subsequently suffered.




